## 4-H Singing Americans Complete Kentucky Trip

The Santa Anna 4-H Singing Americans and their sponsors returned home Tuesday night, October 15, from a four day trip to Louisville, Kentucky. Five cars took our group from Santa Anna Saturday morning, arriving at Dallas Love Field in time for lunch. There we met Dickie Horner who had flown from Lubbock, where he attends Texas Tech.

Our American Airlines 727 Astrojet was an hour late—it had been circling Love Field waiting its turn to land. Airfield personnel said air traffic to the Mexico City Olympics caused the excess air traffic there, and all flights were late.

The plane stopped in Memphis, Tennessee, with time for the youngsters to walk around the beautiful new terminal building.

Upon arriving in Louisville, we went to the downtown Brown Hotel where we stayed. Our group had supper at different places in the busy business district, then walked around sightseeing and window shopping.

Sunday morning several of our group went to church, attending the Central Presbyterian Church several blocks from the hotel. We had planned to go to the Baptist Church, but the walk took longer than we had anticipated, so when church time arrived and as a Presbyterian Church was at hand, we stopped in.

The 4-H singers were registered and given instructions early Sunday afternoon by representatives of the Monsanto Company, sponsors of the Talent Revue. At 3:00 o'clock all of our delegation walked two blocks to the YWCA to visit the Service Club. The Singing Americans entertained the servicemen there and were guests at a buffet supper. We left the Service Club in time for the teenagers to have dinner (Yes, they all ate again) and attend the first rehearsal.

Monday morning our group took a city bus to Churchill Downs where the famous Kentucky Derby is run. We toured the beautifully kept grounds and visited the museum.

The singers had a tiring four-hour dress rehearsal on Monday afternoon, with the ten 4-H acts being coordinated into the complete program, pictures made, and stage lighting arranged. There was just time to return to the hotel for supper and to dress for the program at 7:30. The 4-H Talent Revue was held at the Louisville Convention Center, and a highlight of the national meeting of County Agents. About two thousand people were present for the program. The Santa Anna group was chosen for the last act and did their rousing "America the Beautiful" routine as the finale of the program.

Upon returning to the hotel, the youngsters went to a hamburger supper and a game party for all members of the cast.

At 10 o'clock Tuesday morning we checked out of the hotel and were met by executives of the Clayton and Lambert Manufacturing Company who took us in their cars to Buckner, about 25 miles east of Louisville. The drive through rolling Kentucky hills was spectacular, with the trees in shades of red, orange and gold. The Blue Grass covered the pastures, yards and fields. Many of us had expected Kentucky Blue Grass to be tall, grainlike grass, and we were surprised to find it very similar to Bermuda grass, only without runners.

After touring the Clayton and Lambert plant where silos, grain storage bins, swimming pools, and other things are manufactured, we were driven to a small country inn for lunch, then to the airport to catch the plane.

The Delta DC8 came by the way of Atlanta, Ga., which pleased all of us, and nearly everyone walked around the

terminal building in Atlanta. Our flight arrived in Dallas at 7:00 p.m., and we drove back to Santa Anna about midnight.

Santa Anna and Coleman County people may well be proud of the local teenagers as they did a grand job of representing our area. Not only were they well-mannered, courteous and attractive, but they met and talked with people and generally tried to promote the central Texas area.

However at least one person was apparently left almost speechless by the young western group. As they passed, the stranger stared and uttered in disbelief, "D—!"

## More Screwworm Cases Confirmed In County

MORE SCREWORM—14— Another confirmed case of screwworms has been reported in our community, found in a baby calf belonging to Lewis Miles Guthrie, who leases the Hays ranch in the Cleveland Community. The first case was on the Turner Ranch on Home Creek.

Early this week the drops of sterile flies had not yet begun on either ranch although a large white lime X had been marked on the Turner Ranch as a "target" for the drop. Area stockmen are urged to watch their stock closely for worms and report any cases suspected.

A short ceremony was held on the front porch of the Turner house when the famous old home was officially named a Texas Landmark last Sunday. The historical medallion awarded the house by the Texas Historical Survey Committee was placed near the front door of the house, and will remain as the only historical site yet marked in this part of the county.

A daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Fred W. Turner, Mrs. Rob. Griffin, of Fort Worth, introduced Mrs. Maurine Burroughs of Novice, who is the Coleman County chairman of the committee. Dr. Ben H. Moore former pastor of the Santa Anna Presbyterian Church and a longtime friend of the family, gave the invocation. Mrs. David Mercer of Coleman sang "Bless this House," and Mrs. Griffin spoke briefly of the history of the house, which was built in 1888, bought by her father in 1902 and enlarged from 8 to 12 rooms the following year. While He continued his career in ranching and oil exploration in Texas and New Mexico, the family of 12 children were reared in the house. Mrs. Turner, the former Bessie Moore, had been an early-day teacher in Coleman County schools before their marriage.

Following the dedication, members of the family displayed the rooms of the downstairs section to visitors, while Mrs. C. D. Bruce, a member of Coleman County Historical Survey committee, served coffee and tea in the large dining room.

## 26 Years Ago In The News

The October, 1942 issues of the Santa Anna News featured items about the Scrap Drive. All business houses closed during the afternoon of Wednesday, October 14, 1942, so that all scrap metal could be gathered in the area and shipped by trucks for vital war materials. Local men helping with the program were Calvin Campbell, Clifford Stephenson, W. B. Griffin, Neal Oakes, Roy Reid and Lee Hunter.

The News staff at that time were J. J. Gregg, Editor and Owner; W. L. Mills, Foreman and Printer; Mrs. Eris Jones, Operator and Miss Alene Jones, General Assistant. The Whon Home Demonstration Club had recently elected officers and Mrs. E. E. Baker was the new President. Other officers were Mrs. Clem Robertson, Vice-president, Mrs. R. J. Deal, Secretary, and Mrs. Sanford Tune, Council Delegate.

Ralph Thigpen, John T. Morris, Chester Mathews, Louis L. Brooks, Silas E. Baker, and Clyde Curry were among Coleman County men inducted into the Army. They were to be stationed at Camp Wolters, Texas.

The Santa Anna Mountaineer Football team defeated the Winters Blizzards 6-0 in 1942. The lineup for the Mountaineers were as follows: Wayne Haynes, Quarterback; Roy England and Harold Cupps, Half backs; Darrell Downs, Fullback; Billy Bible

and Ross Dale, Ends; Douglas Avants and Garland McCarrill, Tackles; Tomboy Johnson and Dale Nolan, Guards and Leroy Casey, Center.

Rural correspondents included Mrs. Ray Caldwell, Rockwood; Doris Jane Henderson, Watts Creek; Sue Holmes, Whon; The cotton picking and ginning was quiet in late October, 1942. Heavy rains had fallen in the community.

The monthly meeting of the Ward School PTA was led by Mr. L. V. Stockard, President. On the program for the October 1942 meeting were Mrs. E. D. McDonald, Mrs. Virgil Priddy, Mrs. C. D. Bruce, Miss Ouida Casey, and Mr. Jodie Baker.

Week-end specials in the Hunter Brothers and J. L. Boggus and Co. Red and White Stores included 10 pounds of spuds for 29c, Bologna for 15c a pound, linen or rope mops for 29c each. A 5 pound tin of Red Hen Brand jello cost 45c, and Bird Brand Compound was 69c for a 4 pound carton.

## Turner Home Officially Named Texas Landmark

## Letter To The Editor

(Note: Dr. Charles Henner is spending two months in Viet Nam and the following letter was received this week.)

October 7, 1968  
Meramide Hotel  
Saigon, V. N.

Just a short note to tell everyone our group of 10 American doctors working through the American Medical Association and the U. S. State Department gathered in Chicago at 7:00 p. m. on October 3, and were briefed for two hours. We flew out to Anchorage, Alaska, non-stop, and on to Tokyo, Japan, for a four hour lay over, then on to Hong Kong for a 24 hours lay over before going on to Saigon, our base of operations.

I was the only Texan in the group that included five general surgeons, a pathologist, an ophthalmologist, an internal medicine, and one general practitioner who had just finished two years in military service and was going back for another two months voluntary in an area of great civilian need.

A city of four million people, in the tropics, a city at war, with military people everywhere — mostly Americans. It is said the Yanks control the days and the Viet Cong the nights—but

that is not entirely true anymore, especially with our Green Berets, Marine units, and special forces groups supported by all types of military equipment. It is a deadly war — hardware everywhere — and ready for use. The air is filled with aircraft all day and night. Helicopters, 50 kinds of fixed-wing type, etc., moving in and out, patrolling constantly.

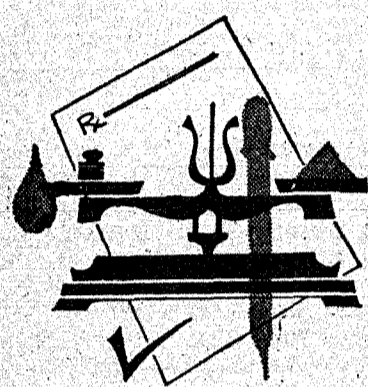

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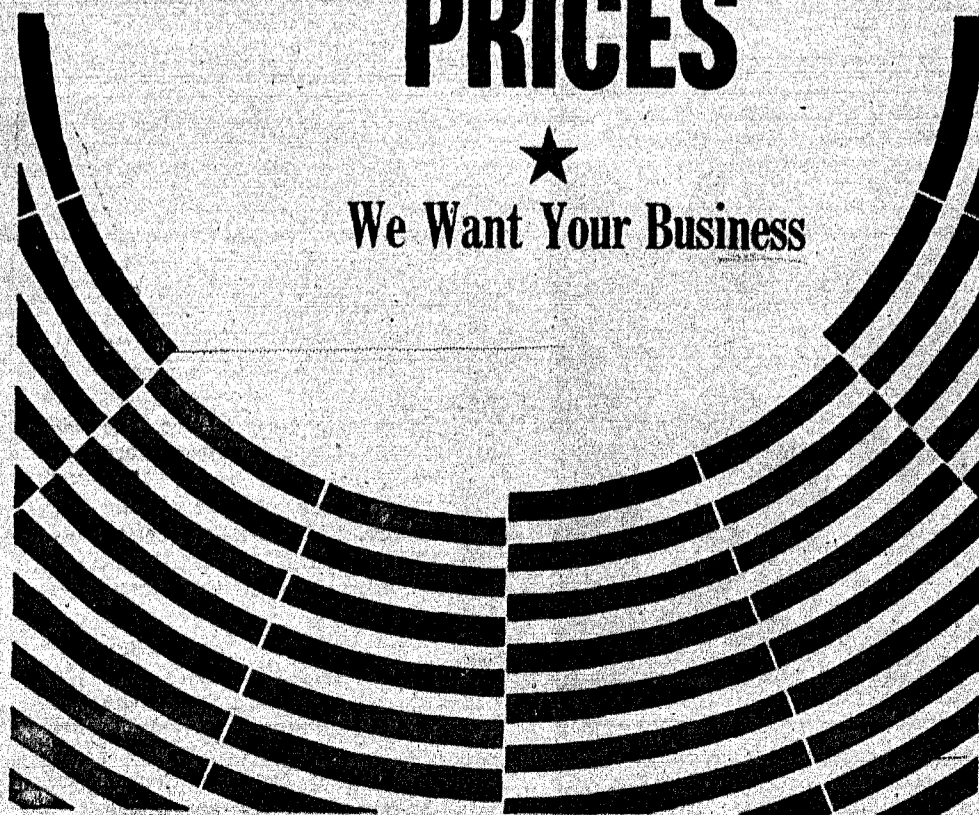
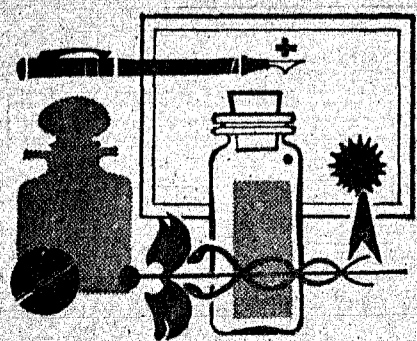
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# SPORTS AFIELD

Gilden autumn days of fishing and hunting lie ahead; but for those of us not fortunate enough to live in the South, the time will arrive to store our boats for the winter.

Wooden boats, improper-

ly blocked, are subject to twisting and warping when out of the water. The problem gets more acute as the boats get bigger. Don't forget that temperature and humidity changes are continually "working" the wood; also, water—even moisture—is damaging to wood. Any wood surface kept wet or even constantly damp will start to deteriorate when a fungus forms and starts wet or dry rot. If you can store a wood boat in a barn or garage, do so. If not, turn it over so the water is shed down the sides. It's too big for this, see that the boat is well covered and a drain plug opened to let collected water drain.

The stresses should be lightened as much as possible. Take everything you can out of any boat, especially out of a wood boat. The common practice of filling gas tanks to prevent moisture condensation is wrong for this reason. It's better to keep the tanks as dry as possible to

take stress off the hull. When a wood boat gets too big to turn over, it should be blocked in several places along the keel. Put additional support under engines or tanks. Quite often the bottom of a poorly supported boat will change shape, although the change is seldom visible. At least, screws, nails and bolt fastenings are strained when an improper blocking occurs. It is impossible to have too much support.

Both fiber-glass and aluminum boats are indefinitely strong for their weight than wood boats. Both are far less subject to warpage due to poor blocking. Still, they should be supported in several places; weights should be removed and special care should be paid to inboard-out-boards to see that the engine's weight is directly supported. For winter storage, notes Zack Taylor, Boats Editor of Sports Afild Magazine any boat can sit nicely on its trailer.

Water that enters in liquid form and then freezes can damage any boat in the same way it splits granite rocks. The water enters hairline cracks, then expands. Care should be taken to have any water automatically drained. Install a drain plug and see that the boat is blocked or tilted so that water runs to it. Snow, frozen snow, ice or rain won't harm the boat if water is not allowed to collect.

## Federal Tax Questions And Answers

This column of questions and answers on Federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q—I just finished paying some big medical bills. What records should I keep in case I get audited?

A—You should have sufficient records to show that the expenses were deductible and that they were paid in the tax year for which the return was filed.

Keep your cancelled checks or receipts that will establish the amount of the expense, the date paid and the purpose. It is a good practice to have a special envelope, cigar box or similar place where tax records can be stored. This will make it easier to prepare an accurate return next year.

Generally, to be deductible the expense must be paid for the prevention, treatment, diagnosis or cure of a mental or physical defect or illness.

Q—I worked on a farm this summer and the foreman said I will have to pay estimated tax on my wages. Is that right?

A—Farm wages are not subject to income tax withholding and you may have to file an estimated tax return to put you on a pay-as-you-go basis. September 15 is the next deadline for filing an estimated declaration or for amending a declaration filed previously.

Declarations must usually be filed if the estimated tax exceeds your expected withholding by \$40 or more. Details on the estimated tax requirements and the tax forms needed are available at local IRS offices.

### Parcel Post Rates Go Up

Postmaster John C. Gregg reminded postal customers today that higher parcel post rates went into effect on Saturday, Oct. 19.

The rate increase will average 10.5 per cent and in most cases will mean an additional ten cents postage per parcel.

The higher rates were approved by the Interstate Commerce Commission in July.

Under the new rates the minimum charge for local parcel delivery will go from 40 to 50 cents. The minimum charge for parcels destined outside the local delivery area will be raised from 50 cents to 60 cents.

Almost all parcels that are charged up to \$1.10 under the present rates will go up 10 cents. This accounts for more than 80 per cent of all parcel post, Gregg pointed out.

There will be a 15 cent hike on most parcels now charged between \$1.10 and \$4, and a 20 cent increase on parcels now charged over \$4.

Parcel post rates are based on the weight of the package and the distance it is mailed.

Higher rates for the delivery of packages and catalogs are required to bring revenue from this type of mail within four per cent of operating costs, as required by law, Mr. Gregg explained. The higher rates are designed to put parcels and catalogs, which are fourth-class mail, on a break-even basis.

Additional revenue is needed from parcel post and catalogs to offset higher costs resulting from pay increases approved last year for postal employees.
