JULY 4 WORSHIP SERVICE CHANGED TO INDOOR SITE

The Community Bicentennial worship service on Sunday, July 4, will be held at First Baptist Church instead of the school athletic stadium, it was decided this week.

In order to make the morning service comfortable for those attending, the site was changed. The Baptist Church has a seating capacity of about 500 with the adjacent Sunday School room and balcony, and the newly installed air conditioning system should make it most pleasant at the 11 a.m. hour.

Three local churches are making initial plans for the service. United Methodist, United Presbyterian and the First Baptist, and others are invited to

attend so that it can be a community-wide event.

The 11 a.m. hour was chosen so that each denomination may have the regular Sunday School classes prior to the combined service.

Choir members from the three churches will be enlisted for the service which is planned as an appropriate beginning of our Nations' third century.

Swine Influenza

Innoculations

Planned in SA

Plans are being made to have a free inoculation clinic for the Swine Influenza vaccine, and several local people were in Abilene last week for an area planning session.

Myrtle Burden, Jewel Hosch, and Bessie Pallet, local Registered Nurses, and Mrs. Henry Newman, Chamber of Commerce secretary, were in Abilene for the training session and orientation for the program.

Planned for early August, the vaccine will be given in Santa Anna to those 65 years of age or above. The next group to be given the vaccine will be the chronically ill, and after that time it will be available to any others.

The federally funded program is being coordinated in this area by the West Central Texas Council of Governments and the Governor's Program on Aging.

The Santa Anna-Bangs chapter, American Association of Retired Persons will meet Monday, June 21, at the United Methodist Church annex. The meeting will open with a covered dish luncheon at 12 noon and be followed by a business meeting and program.

All members of the group are urged to be present for the meeting.

Local LL Teams To Meet Friday

The two Santa Anna Little League baseball teams will meet Friday night, June 18, in a 6 p.m. game at the Santa Anna ball park. The Rams won the first-half outing over the Mets last month.

In other games Tuesday, ending the 1976 season, the Rams will host the Tigers and the mets will travel to Coleman to play the Rangers, both games at 6 p.m.

The Minor League Cats will go to Mozelle tonight for a game with the Aggies at 8 p.m., and on Monday night complete their schedule when they host the Bears in a 6 p.m. game.

In Senior League action, the Orioles will play the Cubs in Coleman at 8 p.m. tonight and host the Astros Monday night, June 21.

The Pee Wee Eagles will complete their season tonight with a game in Coleman with the Owls at 6 p.m.

Vintage Fire Truck Spared; To Remain in VFD Possession

Members of the Santa Anna Volunteer Firemen are all smiles this week as they became full owners of "Old Faithful", the 1944 Ford fire truck that was forced into retirement recently. The truck, still in excellent condition and with less than 4,000 miles on the speedometer, was over the approved age limit for approved departments and was replaced recently by a newer model.

Members of the VFD will restore the old truck and mount a 500 gallon water tank on the frame to be used as a supplemental rural truck. "Old Faithful" will not be equipped or used for grass fires, but will be a faster vehicle for rural house or barn fires.

Firemen are pleased with the new addition and have expressed appreciation to the Mayor and City Council for the truck. Bids on the truck were rejected recently as it was decided that the truck would be of more value as a supplemental vehicle in the

department. Freddie Dodson, VFD officer, mentioned that "Old Faithful" has a longer tenure in the Santa Anna VFD than any of the present members of the group.

Local Landmark, Property To Be Sold by City of SA

The Santa Anna City Council recently agreed to sell the acreage and the park building at Ranger Park. Sealed bids are being received at City Hall for the disposition of the property that covers 3.96 acres at the center of the one-time city park.

Built in the late 1930s as a memorial to former Texas Rangers and used as a reunion site for that organization several years, the building has been in disuse most of the time since World War II. Different groups have tried to utilize the sturdy

rock building, but efforts to use the site have failed. The Boy Scouts and American Legion are the last organizations to use the building, and no meetings have been held there in about a year. Vandalism has also taken its toll of the structure.

Bids for the acreage and building are to be opened at the City Council meeting July 3 at 10 a.m.

Several parties have expressed interest in the property which is the last of the park area still owned by the City.

Annual Cowboy Camp Meeting To Open Here Friday Night

The tenth annual Cowboy Camp Meeting begins Friday, June 18, at Flying H. Acres between Santa Anna and Coleman. Services will be held daily through June 27.

"Little" George Havens, founder and director of the Camp Meeting, invites everyone in the area to attend and take part in the Bicentennial edition of the old-time camp meeting. Special activities are planned next week in observance of the nation's 200th birthday in the form of exhibits and displays of crafts and skills used in pioneer America. The exhibits are planned Thursday through Friday, June 24-26, from 5 to 7 p.m.

Outstanding speakers will be on hand for the 10-day meeting, and special music will be presented at every service. Morning services will be held Monday through Friday under the big tent, and special campfire groups will meet each evening following the 8 p.m. services.

Chuckwagon suppers will be served Saturday, Tuesday, Thursday and the final Saturday at 6 p.m. Meat, bread and drinks will be furnished and each family attending is to take other food for the meal.

Bob Munsey of Daisey, Oklahoma, Rev. Marvin Sheffield of Brownwood and Bobby McMeans and the Christian Corral Boys of New Braunfels are among the regulars at the camp again this year. Several other speakers will appear during the series of services.

People from all over the nation are expected at the meeting, and local people are encouraged to attend and help welcome the out-of-town visitors. There are exhibits and displays throughout the camp that are open to visitors at any time, and all are welcome.

Havens, grandson of the late Mr. and Mrs. John R. Pearce and the late Mr. and Mrs. John Havens, has been in evangelism the past 26 years. His younger years were spent in the entertainment field as a movie actor, stunt man and singer. Swim Classes To End Friday

Santa Anna children will conclude swimming classes this week ending the second week of the annual session. Over 50 children have been enrolled in the beginner, advanced beginner and intermediate groups conducted at the Coleman pool.

Classes will start Monday, June 21, for kindergarten children and five-year-olds, but no transportation will be provided from Santa Anna. Parents of children in this age category are encouraged to organize car pools to transport children to Coleman for the two-week session that ends July 2. The class will be from 11-11:45 a.m. each weekday.

Mrs. Charles Hosch serves as coordinator of the Santa Anna program that is held in conjunction with the Coleman Summer Recreation Program.

Grain Harvest Almost Over

Grain harvest in the Coleman County area is almost over with most combining expected to be completed by the end of next week.

Production is reported to be only one-third of the last year's crop, with prices ranging from \$3.35 to \$3.65 a bushel for wheat and from \$1.70 to \$1.85 for oats.

Grain processed through the local elevator is being shipped to Fort Worth, then on to Beaumont for export. Early this week over 32,000 pounds of wheat had been shipped from Central Texas Grain Co., here.

Colorado River Folks Relax;

Aggressive Fish Not Piranha

Area fishermen, swimmers and canoers were pleased with a report this week that the black fish caught last week below Rockwood in the Colorado River was NOT a vicious black Piranha as was first thought. A Waco fish biologist identified the scrappy individual as a pacu, a tropical fish often mistaken for a piranha.

The 12-inch, one and one-half pound fish was caught on a trotline by Brownwood fisherman R. H. Hallford last week. The fish had

bitten into a carp used on the line located about 75 yards downstream from the US 283 Bridge south of Rockwood.

A nephew of Hallford was bitten by the fish as he attempted to remove it from the hook.

Hallford took the fish to a Brownwood aquarium dealer where it was tentatively identified as the flesh-eating variety. However, the official identification showed the fish is a vegetarian.

FIGHTING INFLATION

Nuclear Energy Linked To Economic Growth

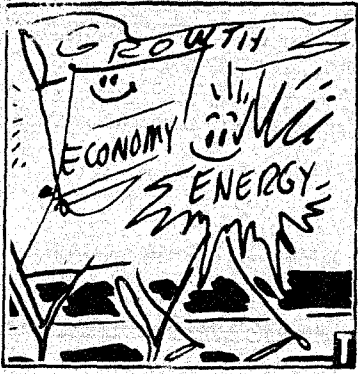
"Left, right, left, right!" When most Americans hear those words they think of a parade of marching men, in step, a stirring sight in this bicentennial year. But to an economist the words possibly serve to remind him of how our economic and energy growth have been in almost perfect lock step for the past 20 years.

If you were to make a plot of our annual growth rate, it would show a one-to-one correlation with our economic growth. That energy consumption and standard of living are inexorably tied together is true not only for the United States but for the whole world.

Our domestic reserves of oil are limited, and our reserves of gas are being rapidly depleted. Those who have studied the fuel situation often agree that conservation can only go so far and that the answer lies in

using more nuclear power and coal.

Today, there are 55 operating nuclear plants generating a total of 8 per cent



of our electric power. Interestingly, many major areas such as Chicago and Boston rely on nuclear power for 30 per cent of their electric power.

It has become increasingly clear that nuclear energy and coal are the only means of providing additional energy which will allow for economical growth and more jobs.

Families of the students and special friends attended the recital.

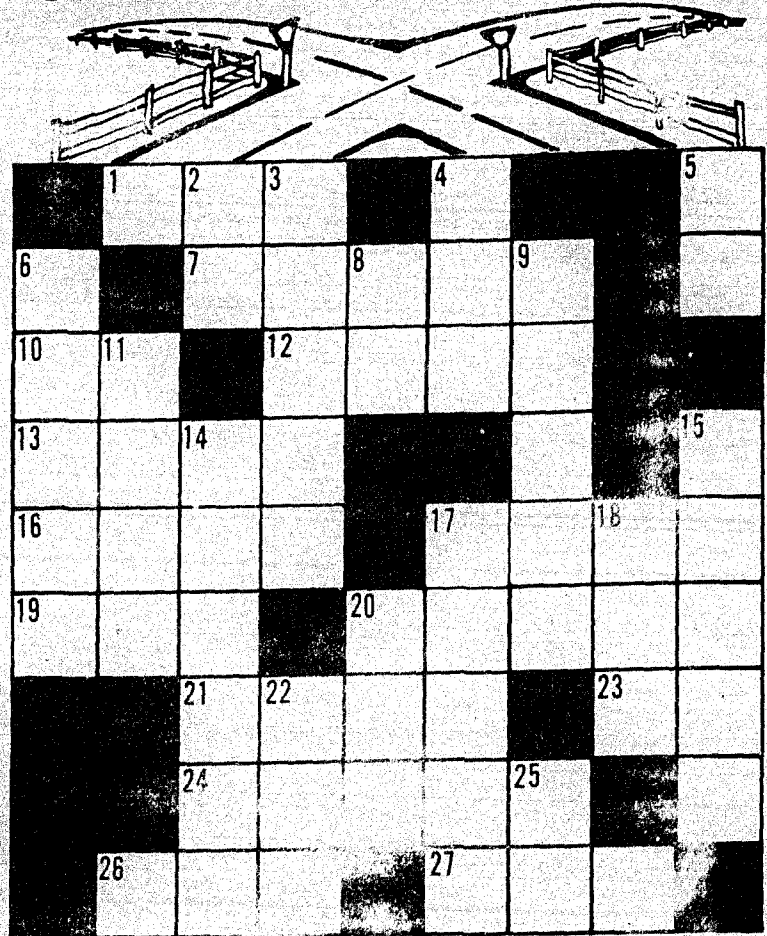
Smith Grandson Gets TSU Degree

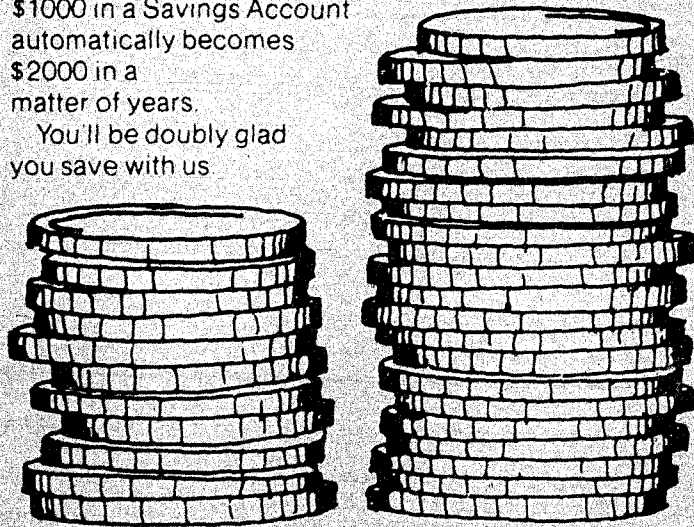


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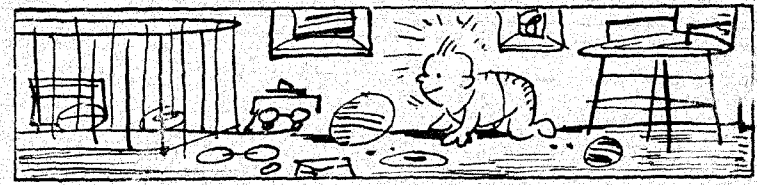

If a farmer could just do the work that was actually required to carry on his business he might fare a little better, but most of the time when he starts a job it mushrooms into half a dozen more than he counted on.

It has been this way for as long as there have been tillers of the soil which takes it back to the days when plows were pulled by horses. The fuel for this type of plowing didn't come from a pipeline and was not delivered to your door. Boy was it not delivered to your door! You hitched old Rowdy, Toby and Josh to the row-binder and went out and made it happen. The row-binder cut and tied the feed in bundles, and while the horses got a rest, the farmer went back to the field and shocked the feed.

For the younger generation, "shocking" does not mean sticking a hot wire to the bundles.

It means you pick up a bundle in each hand and stand them up so that they support each other. Then you pick up two more and add them to the first, and before long you have a nice trim shock of feed.

The surprises you found under the bundles didn't add any pleasure to the job, so if you could hold out and didn't have a heat stroke, ump-teen snakes and stinging scorpions later you had a field of shocked feed.

Have you ever had a scorpion drag his singer from your ankle to your knee on a hot day? Now you are beginning to see why the farmers are so proud of their tractors and implements of today. Also, when a tractor isn't working it doesn't have to be fed.

When the time came to pipeline the bundle to the stack-lot, you hitched the horses to the wagon and went out and covered the field for the third time, handling each

bundle again. At the end of many weary days the farmer was the proud owner of a haystack and his horses were assured of food for the winter.

We now come to the extra work that always accompanies any task and this time it came in the form of a huge ugly snake that makes that hair raising sound that strikes fear to the heart of farmer and city dweller alike. When the farmer went to get feed for the horses he heard the snake and saw it disappear under the tack. Since he couldn't stand the thought that the snake might grab him by the leg some morning, there was no alternative but to move the feed and evict the rattler. Move it he did, and there the thing lay under the last bundle he picked up, the biggest "Bull" snake he had ever seen. Some days it just doesn't pay to get up!

Local Pastor Assigned Here Another Year

The Rev. and Mrs. E. Richard Chaffin and Mr. and Mrs. Darriel Warnock have recently returned as delegates to the Central Texas Annual Conference, held in Waco June 6-9. The represented the Methodist churches of Santa Anna, Valera, Trickham and Rockwood of which Rev. Chaffin is pastor.

The Central Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church is composed of 120,167 members. At this year's conference priorities were set up which included Evangelism and World Hunger. The Conference also approved a budget in the amount of \$1,768,044.

Rev. Richard Chaffin was appointed to Pastor the Santa Anna Parish for his third year.

"It was a very significant conference," stated Mr. Chaffin, "that we set two very important priorities. We realize that the mission of the Church is to reach the lost for Jesus Christ and to reach out a hand to help those in the world who are starving while we have to diet."

The appointment of a new District Superintendent was also read by Bishop W. McFerrin Stowe. Rev. Jack Riley will move into the Brownwood parsonage this coming week. He is the former pastor of First United Methodist Church of Corsicana and was once pastor in Bangs.

The Churches of Santa Anna, Valera, Trickham and Rockwood will undergo a study of the individual churches, where they are today and where they want to be in the next ten years. Plans are now underway to implement this study.

Floyd Marshall Elected Judge Of McCulloch Co.

Floyd Marshall, a former principal at Santa Anna High School, has been chosen Democratic candidate for McCulloch County Judge following a recount of the June 5 run-off election. He is unopposed on the November general election ballot.

In the May primary, Marshall and Lamar LeFeiste were the top candidates in the three-man race and met in the recent run-off. Marshall polled 1497 votes to 1487 for his opponent.

LeFeiste requested a re-count, and Tuesday the official report submitted by the McCulloch County Democratic Committee showed the margin had widened to 1505 for Mr. Marshall and 1477 for his opponent.

A native of Lohn, Marshall was with the Santa Anna School system three years as high school principal and teacher. Prior to that time, he was a teacher and administrator at Lohn and Melvin and active in many McCulloch County organizations.

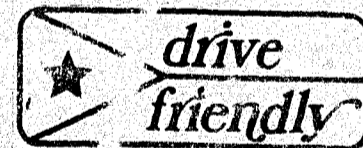
Man Known Here Is Chosen For TASA Director

Dr. Charles F. Mathews, a native of Bangs, is the executive director of the Texas Assn. of School Administrators in Austin. The organization represents nearly 1,200 Texas school administrators whose purpose is to promote the progress of education on local, state and national issues.

Mathews comes to the new position after serving as superintendent of the Plainview ISD (1953-61) and superintendent of the Llanview ISD (1961-72) and executive vice president of Kilgore College (1972-75). He was a classroom teacher in Santa Anna in 1936-39 and served as principal of the local elementary school from 1939-41. He married Anita Kirkpatrick in Santa Anna in 1939.

Mathews is a graduate of Bangs High and Howard Payne College. He received his master degree from the University of Texas and Doctor of Education degree from Texas Tech University. He has an honorary doctor of Laws degree from Wayland College.

He served as president of the Texas Association of School Administrators and as a member of the Board of Trustees of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. During World War II, he served as commanding officer of the U.S.S. Submarine Chaser 774 in the South and Southwest Pacific.

Graveside services were held Wednesday at Rockwood Cemetery with Mrs. Langer buried beside her late parents.

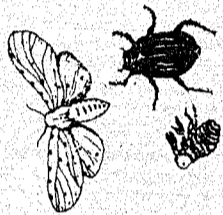
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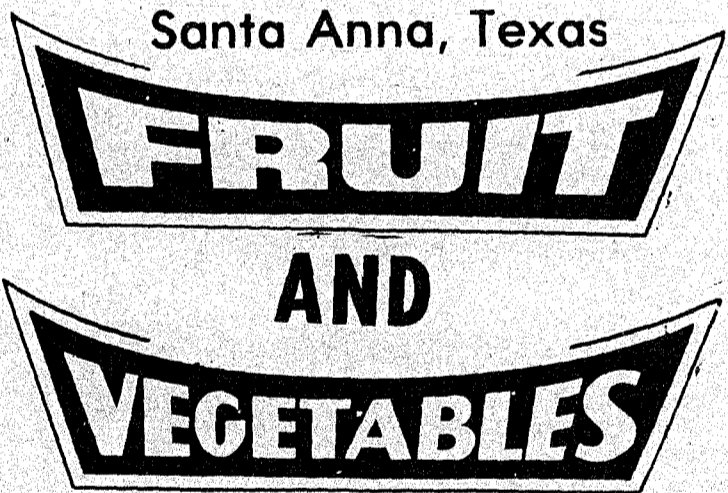

War Medal Given 30 Years Late

Curtis H. Van Dalsem of Santa Anna was awarded the China War Memorial Medal by the Republic of China, the Government of China, Kaishek. The order for the medal was lost at the end of World War II and only recently found at a meeting of the China-Burma-India Hump Pilots Association in Miami Beach, Florida by General S. K. Hu Minister of the Chinese Embassy in Washington. The Van Dalsem award was made absentia.

Flying the Hump over the Himalaya Mountains were called the "Hellcats" and was the major means of supplying the American and Chinese Armies and Air Forces. Weather over the mountains was as hazardous as the Japanese fighters and bombers and more than 900 aircraft were lost. The awarding of the medal is evidence that the successful efforts to keep an entire nation alive under the greatest odds is remembered by the government now on Taiwan.

Van Dalsem is also holder of the Air Medal with Oak Leaf Cluster, Two Battle Stars, and a Presidential Unit Citation.

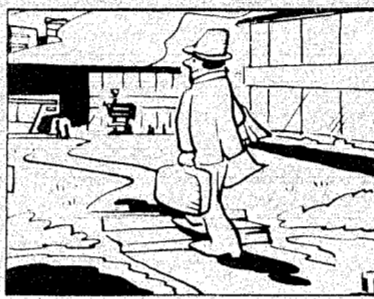
