Coleman County Telephone Cooperative has issued new directories during the past week. They replace the last ones dated May 1975.

CCTC Manager Thomas Wristen told recently that there are approximately 20 changes made each month in the local telephone system, so keeping a directory up-to-date is impossible.

By the time the new books are printed, each of us has the last issue heavily marked with new listings and deletions.

The old Santa Anna Gas Co. building on main street has been removed in stages, starting about two years ago. The north and west walls of the native stone structure have been gone for many months.

This week workmen are busy taking down the remaining stone walls. The large hand-cut rocks are being moved to Salado where they will be re-constructed in that historic town.

Superintendent Gets Vo-Ag Award

The award was given at the annual awards program in recognition of dedicated service and interest in advancement of vocational agriculture education.

Park Property Boundary Dispute Delaying Sale

Fourteen square feet of land at the Ranger Park is causing a dispute in the sale of the property on which the Ranger Park Building is located, containing 3.96 acres of land. Loyd King, Coleman rancher and businessman, had the highest bid at the recent sale--\$7,825.50--but is awaiting the outcome of the boundary dispute to continue the purchase.

Ray Barnett, Coleman County surveyor, found the 14 square feet of land to be under part of the Ranger Park Clinic building owned by Dr. Filemon Cabansag. Also in question by Dr. Cabansag is whether the road included in the sale is a public road or is eligible for private ownership. It is one of two entrances to the Park site and medical complex.

City Councilmen were asked to put the acreage up for sale and agreed to dispose of the property because of disuse of the site and vandalism to the old rock building.

King has been quoted as still interested in the property if the city and Dr. Cabansag can settle the matter of boundary lines and roads.

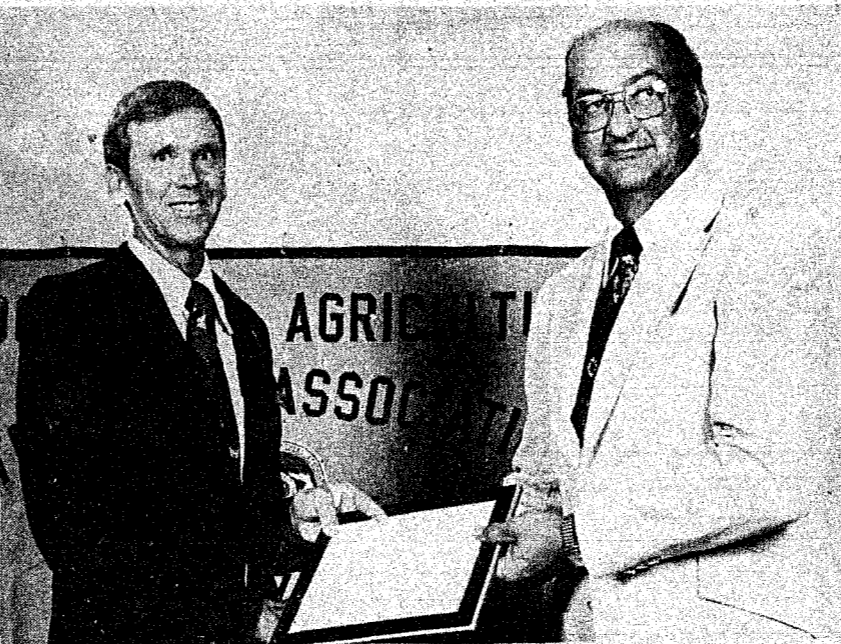
Dr. Cabansag was given six acres on which to build his medical facility, then later purchased an additional ten acres from the original 25-acre site.

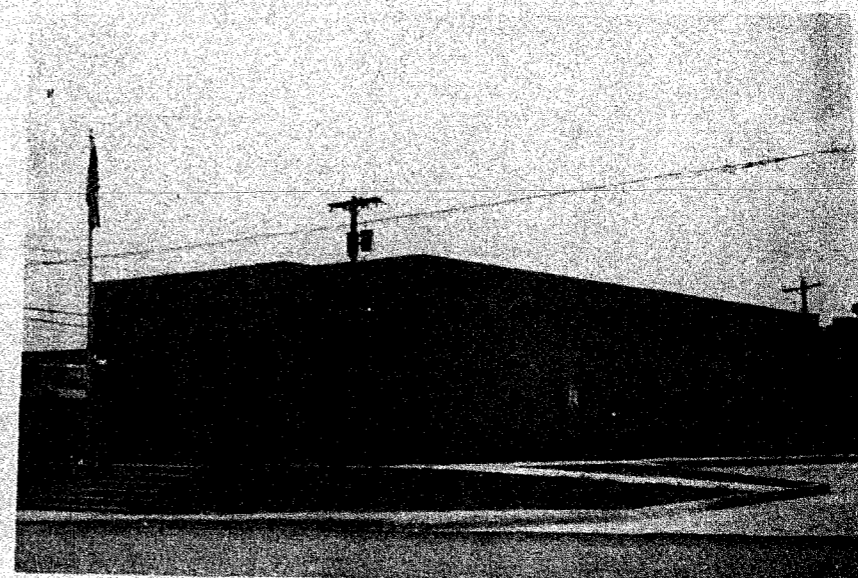

questions on your family's move...

Dear Miss Bowman: Can you give me some pointers on safely transporting houseplants in a long distance move? Also, can my plants travel in the moving van? Mr. S. F., Atlanta, Georgia.

Answer: Yes, your plants can travel in the van. However, you must pack them yourself, and, of course, your mover cannot guarantee their survival.

Here are some tips on preparing your plants for the move. Water them thoroughly just before packing, and trim off any buds or blooms. Wrap small plants individually, and then box several together, using plenty of packing materials. In the summer, use only paper for wrapping plants; in winter, use "cook" your plants. Plants require extra care and individual boxes. Mark each carton "plants" and "plants." A word of caution — if your plants must spend several days on the road in either very hot or very cold weather, the risk of loss is high. And if you are moving to California, leave your plants behind; only rootless cuttings may enter the state.

Dear Miss Bowman: Because of a job transfer, my family and I must relocate this summer. How many more moves take place in the summer than in the rest of the year? What suggestions do you have for making a successful move during this busy season? Mrs. M. H., Boston, Massachusetts.

Answer: Approximately 60 percent of the 43 million Americans who relocate each year move during June, July and August. The key to a successful summer move is planning ahead and flexibility as an extraordinarily heavy demand is placed on the nation's professional movers at this time. The more advance notice you can give your carrier, the better the chances of having the move scheduled on your preferred dates.

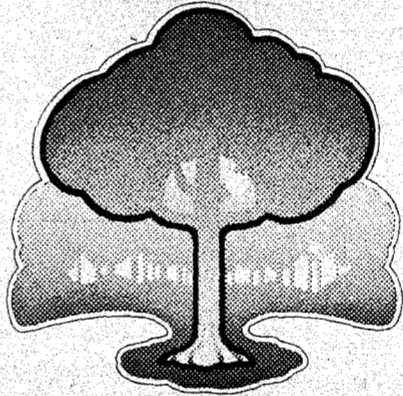
PSYCHOLOGY

Dugout house to feature a solar heating system

The construction of a dugout home by a Mid-West couple was recently featured on a major television news program. Purpose of the construction was to provide a low-maintenance home in the current time of high utility costs.

A Santa Anna man, John Womack, is also in the process of building a dugout home, having started the job last February. The building site is on the Womack farm in the Eureka Community northeast of Santa Anna.

Although Mr. Womack has no formal training in engineering or architecture, his work as a cartographer provided interest and information that has been beneficial in the planning of the house.

The building site is a natural cove that was enlarged and deepened with a backhoe to accommodate the structure located just north of the Womack home. Made of native rock from the nearby hills, the round house is 32 feet in diameter, facing south, the wall is to the eight-foot height, and a conical concrete roof will soon be poured to complete the exterior construction. At the roof's apex will be an eight-foot circular projection that will have openings for light and ventilation. The excavation area outside the wall is being filled into roof-height as

the work progresses.

The most unique feature of the house will be a solar heating system. A slanted glass wall outside the exposed masonry front will absorb heat reflected through the glass for winter heating. An awning-type cover will be used to shade the glass in the summer and serve as a cover during winter nights. Louvered windows will open to the south to provide light and ventilation, and glass doors at each side will provide two entrances.

The circular house will include a kitchen-utility-bath complex toward the center where the sewer and electrical connections are installed in the floor. The remainder of the structure will be divided by movable partitions to give a feeling of space. Mr. Womack plans to keep the decor as rustic as possible.

Woodrow Griffin of Santa Anna is assisting with the work, and no deadline has been set for completion. No work was done during the rainy weather of July but work is to continue soon.

A native of Mart, Texas, Mr. Womack lived near Santa Anna as a child, attending schools at Plainview and Shield in 1906 and 1907. He lived in the northwest many years while employed as a map maker for Sanborn Map Company, working out of San Francisco in an Eight-State area plus Alaska and Hawaii.

Mr. Womack and his late wife moved to Santa Anna in 1970 when they purchased the former T. K. Martin place south of Santa Anna. They later bought the old John B. Lowe farm and moved there in 1974. Mrs. Womack died a year ago.

Besides his house-building project, Womack has hobbies of ceramic painting and gardening. He is very modest about what he terms, "an old man's mess," but the dugout home should be an interesting and economical structure for our area.

Blind Children May Attend Camp

All blind children from the ages of 9 to 19 that wanted to could have attended a camp for the blind this summer. These camps are operated each year by the Christian Record Braille Foundation, Inc. with headquarters in Lincoln, Nebraska. All legally blind of any race, creed, color or economical status are privileged to attend these camps entirely free.

The aim of these camps is to give children and young people the opportunity to have a camping experience. There were 32 such camps in operation this last summer. The first such plan was in 1967. The children are well chaperoned—only four children to a counselor. The children have opportunities to enjoy such activities as crafts, ball games, archery, canoeing, hiking, camp fire, horseback riding, tumbling, and many others.

Frank A. Peterson is director of the National Camps for Blind Children. All counselors are trained in caring for the blind before they are asked to render such help as these children need.

All children attend free. This is made possible by contributions from the general public. All contributions are tax deductible.

Nursery School To Open Monday

Although the city-operated Mountain City Day Care Center closed last spring, Santa Anna will not be without a child care facility. Mrs. Roddy (Debbie) Dean is opening a private nursery school and child care center at the Community Civic Center where the Day Care Center was located. The new facility will open Monday, August 16.

Enrollment will be limited, and parents interested in the center are asked to contact Mrs. Dean Friday to make arrangements for their children's care.

Mrs. Anthony (Cathy) Strother, a certified public school teacher with several years experience in primary work, will work with the older children. There will be learning and awareness activities, and supervised indoor and outdoor play. Mrs. Dennis (JoAnn) Higgs will work part time with infants, and a Distributive Education student will work each afternoon at the center. Mrs. Dean will work with all ages and manage the center.

Mrs. Dean has been granted use of the building in order to provide the child care service for the community.

The new facility will be known as Happy Day Nursing School, and Mrs. Dean is inviting all interested people to visit the center and see the equipment and meet the staff.

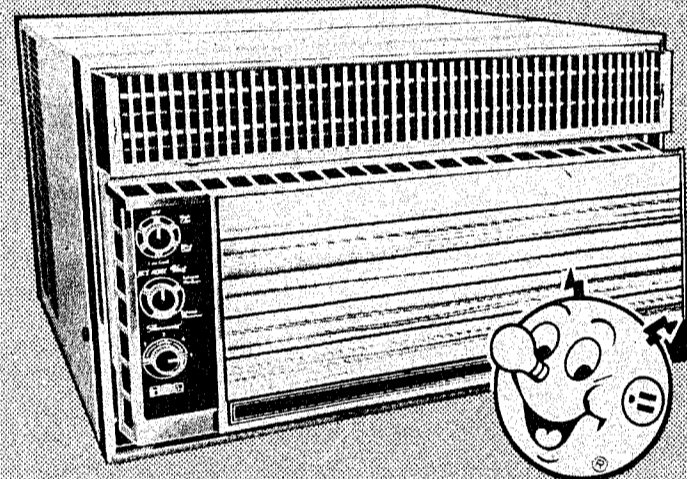

How high will gas bills go, and when will they level off?

There is no sure answer. It depends, to a large extent, on what Lone Star has to pay its natural gas suppliers.

Just a few years ago, Lone Star paid only about 19¢ for a thousand cubic feet of gas.

Today, we have to pay almost \$2 for a thousand cubic feet of new gas.

But you are still being charged at a much lower rate than that. You see, we are still buying old gas at lower rates under old contracts. So the *average* cost for gas, the cost that primarily determines your bill, is still just a little over \$1 per thousand cubic feet.*

As our older contracts expire, and new, higher-priced gas is purchased, the average price will continue to rise (even if we don't buy any new gas). We can foresee an average price of around \$2 per thousand cubic feet in a few years.

That's quite a big increase. We know because we're almost paying that price right now for new gas. But it should rise much more gradually in the next year or two than it has during the past year.
