Mountaineers Defeat Dragons

Baird To Host Santa Anna In Friday Night Contest

The Santa Anna Mountaineers got the 1977 football season off to a good start Friday night by stopping the Bangs Dragons 10-0 in the first game of the season. Hometown supporters were pleased to see the Mountaineer squad show so much spirit and poise as they defeated their Class A neighbors. The Santa Anna team took advantage of the Dragons' errors and intercepted four Bangs passes and accounted for one blocked punt. The Mounties had 15 first downs to Bangs' 8 and tallied 208 yards rushing to 131 for Bangs. The Dragons had 61 yards passing to none for the home team. The Santa Anna team also topped their opponents in penalties, losing 85 yards while Bangs was penalized only 20 yards during the game.

Duane Warnock scored the Santa Anna touchdown late in the second half of play on a six-yard run. Freddie Fellers kicked the extra point and added the other three points in the third quarter on a 25-yard field goal. Both teams moved the ball, but the game was one of defense.

Bruce Pape, Mike Warnock,

Terry Day and Jody Brusenhan each captured a Dragon pass, and Mike Pape and Bobby Permenter blocked the punt. Fellers had the most tackles in the game, and others named for outstanding defensive playing were Mike Ballard, Joe Dean Early, Jerry Don Culpepper, Joe Joe Morris and Doug Hall.

Before being taken out of the game at halftime with a bruised shoulder, Culpepper had amassed 70 yards rushing. Duane Warnock had 60 yards and Bobby Permenter accounted for 30. Coach Strother cited the offensive

line for their outstanding job and praised Jody Brusenhan and Tommy Harris for their quarterbacking of the team. Leon Baker and Mike Pritchard took turns at the fullback post when Culpepper went out of the game. Robbie Young and Dick Smith also did a fine job, Strother said.

The team showed great improvement over the early scrimmages, and the coaches were impressed by the quickness and overall team effort.

The Mountaineers will travel to Baird Friday night of this week for another Class A battle. Baird was defeated Friday night by Class AA Merkel and a good game is anticipated. Game time is 8 p.m.
