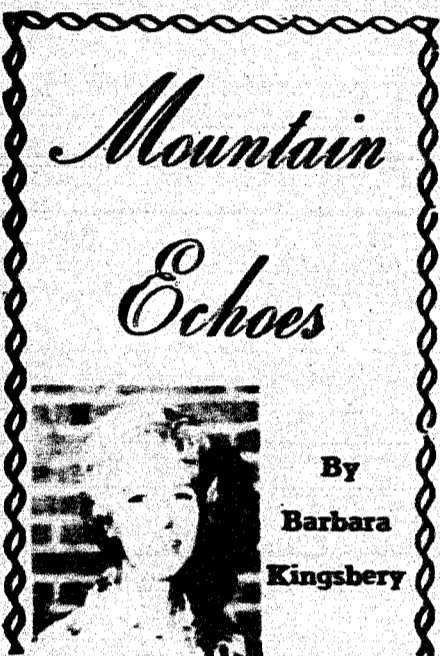

John Hensley Honored On Retirement

A Santa Anna man, Command Sergeant Major John Hensley, a 43-year veteran of military service, ended a long and successful career August 5 when he retired from the Texas Army National Guard's 49th Armored Division. The retirement ceremony was held during the annual training camp at North Fort Hood and included the presentation of a division plaque and certificate by Chief of Staff Col. John Waldrip.

Other honors and tokens of appreciation were presented Hensley by Col. Guinn Largent, brigade commander, Lt. Col. Paul Allen, brigade executive officer, and Maj. Bennie Adair, National Guard of Texas president.

Hensley was the top enlisted man in the division's First Brigade, which honored him with a review of the military career that began when he was fifteen years of age.

Hensley enlisted as a private in the National Guard in 1933 and became an infantry first sergeant in seven years. Sam H. Collier was Captain of the Santa Anna unit at the time of his enlistment.

Mobilized with the 36th Infantry Division in 1940, Hensley was stationed at Camp Bowie before being sent with his Division to the European campaign. He was recipient of numerous honors and awards during World War II including the Bronze Star with V Device, Oak Leaf Cluster, Purple Heart, Army Commendation Medal, Combat Infantry Badge, European Theatre Ribbon and seven battle stars.

Released from active duty in 1945 after five years, Hensley rejoined the 36th Infantry Division when it was reactivated in 1948. He served as first sergeant for 19 years and as a sergeant major and command sergeant major for 17 years, working in recent years in an advisory position working with units in South Texas and traveling extensively in that area during the past two years.

An active member of the National Guard Association of Texas, serving on the Board of Directors three years and as membership chairman of the 20,000 member group for two years.

Hensley is to devote full-time to his ranching interests.

Mr. Miles replaces Bruce Smith who was elevated to the high school coaching staff to replace Dennis Higgs. Miles is living in the Joe Wallace rent house on South Sixth Street.

Betty Key, a Santa Anna resident for several months, has been chosen to teach fifth grade, the position vacated by Nadean Harris who retired.

Mrs. Key and her husband, David, have two teenage children, Robert, a freshman student at West Texas College at Snyder, and Linda, a junior at Santa Anna High School.

A graduate of Texas Christian

University, Mrs. Key and her family moved from New Mexico to Brownwood last year and bought the John Veech farm (the former Bob Smith place) in the Plainview community last spring. Mr. Key is a chemist with the Pecan Experiment Station at Brownwood.

Funeral services were held at First Baptist Church Saturday morning, August 13, for Mrs. J. J. (Clara E.) Gregg, 91, who died Wednesday, August 10, in Overall-Morris Memorial Hospital in Coleman. Rev. Raymond Jones of Sunnyside and Rev. W. M. Price, pastor of First Baptist Church, officiated at the services. Burial was in Santa Anna Cemetery under direction of Henderson Funeral Home.

Born in Franklin County April 11, 1886, she was the daughter of the late M. A. and Martha Ann (Springfield) Buchanan. She married J. J. Gregg in Pecos December 26, 1910. He died July 3, 1954.

Mrs. Gregg was a resident of Santa Anna since June of 1920. Her late husband was owner and publisher of Santa Anna News for many years except when the business was leased to another newspaper for a few years. He retired from the publication in 1945. Mrs. Gregg was a member of First Baptist Church and a mother.

Survivors are four daughters, Mrs. Queenie Simmons of Riverside, Calif., Eris Jones of Bishop, Frances See of Santa Anna and Mary Jo Schulle of Watonga, Okla.; three sons, Joseph J. M.; 12 grandchildren and 20 great-grandchildren.

She was preceded in death by a son, Jim Bob Gregg in 1940, and two grandchildren.

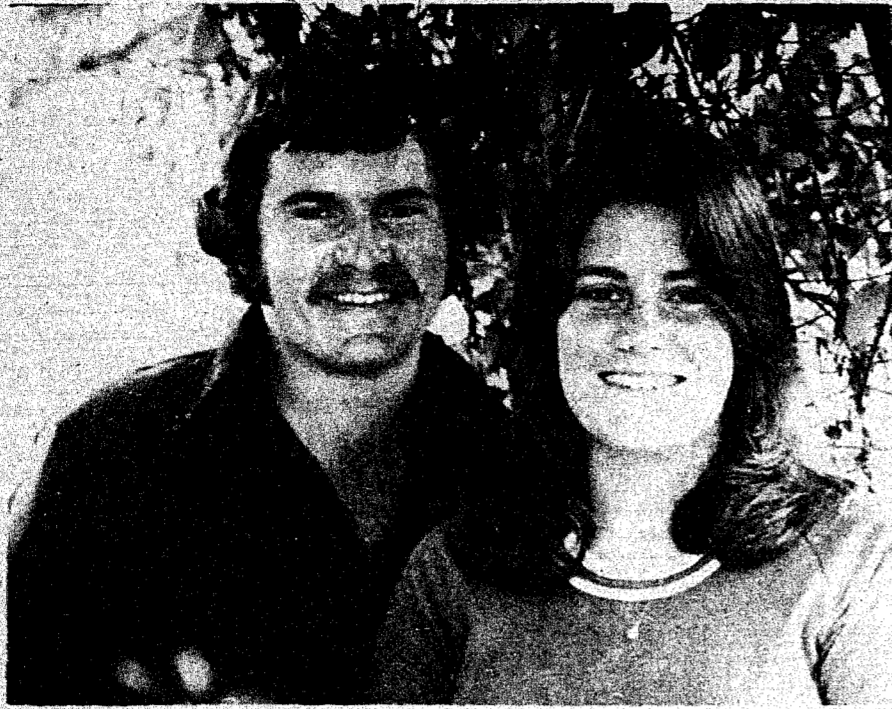

Pasture Fires Keep VFD Busy

The Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department has had a busy week with numerous grass fires in the community.

Wednesday of last week there were two fires, one at the Leland Thompson farm just north of the mountain where a trash fire got out of control and endangered the house and out buildings.

About 30 to 40 acres of pastureland was burned on the Riley place west of Trickham later that afternoon. The fire started along a county road.

A blaze of unknown origin started in the pasture at the Jake McCreary place near Rockwood Thursday, burning from 150 or more acres of pastureland. Assisting the VFD with the fire were neighbors and a dozer and road grader that were working in the area at the time.

The VFD also answered a call to the Fleming place in the Cleveland community Thursday to a minor grass fire on Thursday.

A fire thought to have started from lightning burned several acres at the Dr. Wes Wise place (the former Chip Eads place) on Home Creek Saturday. While firemen fought the blaze a dozer pushed a firelane to control the fire.

The danger of pasture fires will continue until we have good general rains, so everyone is urged to use caution to prevent fires.

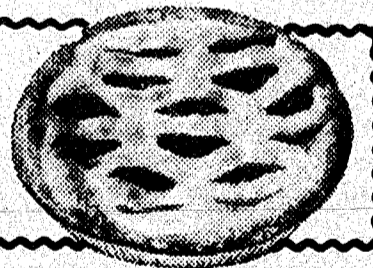

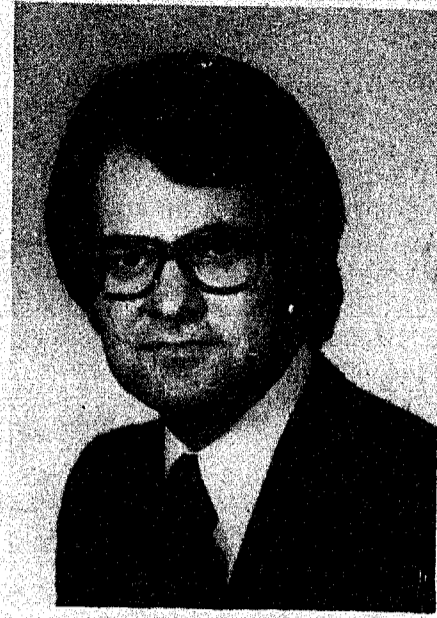

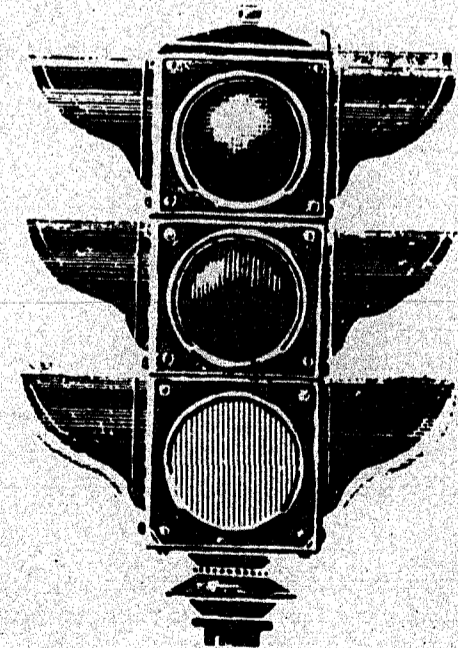
