COLEMAN OFFICER IS KILLED BY CAR

COLEMAN, Dec. 12.—Funeral services were held here this afternoon for Cecil Ray Winter, son of W. R. Winter, formerly of San Angelo, who was killed instantly when run over by a car here Sunday afternoon. The Rev. Mr. Winter is now presbyter of the Assembly of God church over a 24-county district.

The child was struck down by a light car driven by Roe Sadler, negro, employee of the Witt Motor Company of Coleman. Sadler stooped and rendered aid, then surrendered to Sheriff Frank Mills. After an investigation which showed the mishap unavoidable, the negro was released. The small daughter of Jim Watson, walking with the Winter child, escaped injury by only a few inches.

Surviving in addition to the parents are a brother, William, and a sister, Edna Earl.

Boss Shannon Visits Theatre Here

A surprise visitor at the Queen Theatre Saturday night was R.G. (Boss) Shannon, under life sentence for conspiracy in the kidnaping of Charles F. Urschell, Oklahoma City Oil man, upon whose farm at Paradise, Texas, Mr. Urschell was confined while arrangements were made to collect the \$200,000 ransom that was paid for Mr. Urschell's release.

Mr. Shannon is out on a 60 day leave, granted by the court, in order to arrange his business affairs for his long time departure. He is due to report in Levenworth, Kansas, January 8th, to begin his sentence. The elderly Shannon visited the sheriff in Dallas to pay his respects to the sheriff for the courtesies shown him while a prisoner in the Dallas jail, and sheriff Schmidt extended felicitations to the unfortunate prisoner.

Mr. Shannon and his party drove here from Dallas to see himself on the screen, as the Urschell Kidnaping case was being shown here Saturday night. The elderly prisoner mounted the stage and allowed himself to be introduced to the audience while here. He sat and watched the show until just before the sentence was pronounced, then departed.

"I will be a model prisoner," he declared. Shannon blamed George (Machine Gun) Kelly for his plight. He insisted he knows nothing of the whereabouts of that part of the ransom money which has never been recovered.

"Bates knows where that is," he said, referring to Albert Bates another of those under life sentence in the Urschell case.

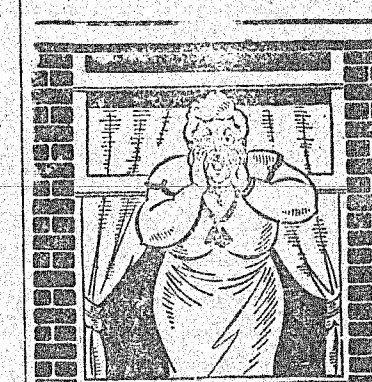

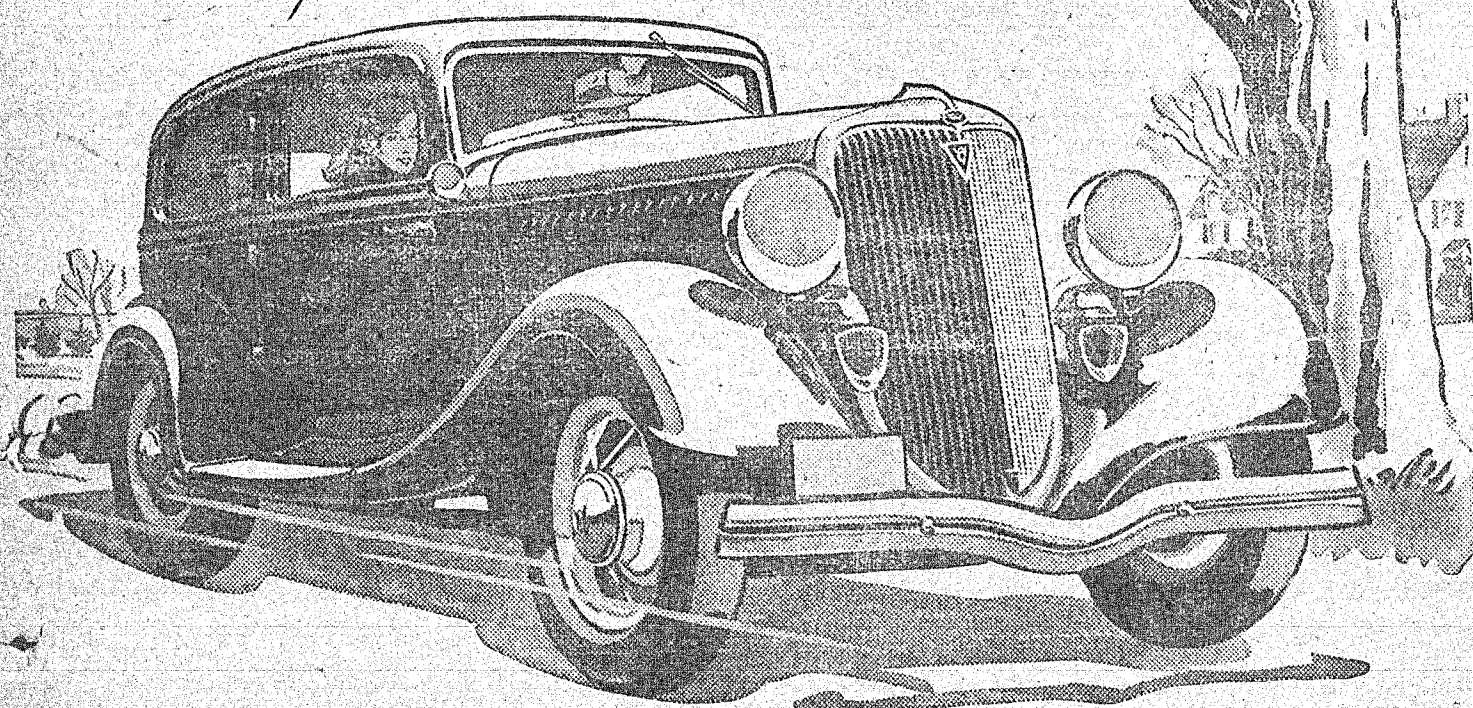


