First, That I intend to remain in school the remainder of this school year, and, if possible, until I graduate, and

Second, That I shall study hard and make the best grades possible for me to make, and

Third, That I shall behave myself both in school and out of school and shall keep my deportment grade among the highest, and

Fourth, That I shall display and encourage good sportsmanship and good school spirit at all times, and

Fifth, That I shall refrain from the use of tobacco and alcoholic drink at least until I have finished High School and should I acquire the habit thereafter, I shall not use either while I am wearing my school's letter, and

Sixth, That I shall not permit others to wear my letter, and

Seventh, That I shall refrain from doing anything that will bring dishonor to my school's letter and colors, and

Finally, That if I ever carelessly or willfully break all or any part of this pledge, I shall place myself subject to the regulations of the school and shall of my own accord or at the request of school officials return my letter to the school.


