One sure sign of the season is a near-epidemic of childhood diseases among the primary school children. A number of local children are at home with chicken pox this week.

Everyone in the community knows that the Santa Anna Tile Co. closed recently. The closing of Santa Anna's main industry didn't go unnoticed by the NEWS staff -- we just couldn't get any official story about the transaction.

Frank Wesley, a former salesman for the company and purportedly a part-owner of the business, said recently that the owners of the tile plant were hoping to sell it to a company to continue the operation.

The Santa Anna Tile Co. was in operation in Santa Anna 25 years and employed 50 or more people at one time. Stockholders liquidated the company several months ago, and Mr. Wesley was manager of the plant from that time until it closed several weeks ago.

The closing of the ceramic tile manufacturing plant is a loss to the community, and local people are hoping it will re-open in the near future.

Felton Martin Campout Slated Attends Meet Of F-Bureau

Felton Martin of Santa Anna represented Coleman County Farm Bureau at the Farm Bureau's President's Conference held in Waco February 14-15. County presidents and other representatives discussed a wide range of issues, programs and problems confronting both the organization and the agricultural industry.

Regarding the current farm income crisis -- uppermost in everyone's mind -- the presidents recommended that the Texas Farm Bureau Board study and consider supporting the Dole Bill (S. 2481) which would provide variable target price incentives for reducing 1978 acreage in wheat, corn, feed grains and cotton. Under provisions of the bill, the more acreage a producer set aside, the higher his target price would be. A 50 percent reduction would provide a target price of \$5 a bushel for wheat; \$3.45 for corn; and 84 cents a pound for cotton. The grain sorghum target price would be based on corn.

The advisory recommendation will be studied by the Board, along with other reports from the conference, at its regular quarterly session February 22-24 in Waco. Subjects covered by task force groups included the

farm problem, Farm Bureau structure and programs, relationships with other groups, Government farm programs, energy and water resources, Federal and State regulations, International farm trade, agricultural public relations, service-to-member programs and policy development.
