Rainfall Welcome In S-Anna Area

The Santa Anna and central Texas area received a much-needed rain Sunday night, measuring up to two or more inches near Coleman. The Santa Anna area received about one inch which was of great benefit to fields, pastures and yards but resulted in very little run-off water to fill the dry creeks and tanks.

The official measurement at Santa Anna was .90 inch. The largest amount reported in this community was 1.9 inches near Trickham.

The rainfall Sunday night caused no significant elevation in the water level at the city pump station at Jim Ned Creek or caught any water in the city lakes to ease the present city water shortage.

Workers To Meet For Assignments; Prizes To Be Given Winning Groups

The annual city-wide clean-up day is planned Saturday, April 15. Workers are to meet at the Community Civic Center at 8:30 a.m. for assignments, with plans made to work throughout the town during the morning.

Ministers of local churches will be directing the clean-up crews, composed of school classes, organizations and other groups.

Local Girls Teams Win JHS, HS Track Meet Titles

The Santa Anna Junior High and High School girls track teams won the championship trophies of their respective divisions in the Santa Anna Track Meet last week.

In the Junior High A. D. Donham Memorial Relays Thursday, the Santa Anna juniors scored 104 points to take the title. Runners-up were Menard with 85; Richland Springs, 80; Mason, 75; and Talpa-Centennial, 51.

The Mason JHS boys won that division with 97 points;

Runners-up were Menard, 70; Santa Anna, 69 3-4; Albany, 55 1/2; and Early, 38.

There were 16 teams in the boys division and 12 in the girls division.

Santa Anna JHS girls winning for the local team were JoAnn Collins, first in discus, second in shot put and fifth in 220 yard dash. Teresa Rolfe, fifth in discus, second in 80 yard hurdles, first in 880 yard dash; Juliann Jones, fourth in discus.

Lisa Rolfe, third in shot put, fifth in 80 yard hurdles; Robbie Clifton, fourth in high jump; Holly Smith, second in 440 yard dash; Gay Hosch, third in 100 yard dash; Lori Stevens, sixth in 880 yard run; Channie Dickerson, sixth in 1320 yard run.

The 880 yard relay team composed of Gay Hosch, JoAnn Collins, Sheri Wilson and Holly Smith placed first; the mile relay team, Juliann Jones, Holly Smith, Lori Stevens and Teresa Rolfe, won fifth.

In the High School division Saturday, the Santa Anna girls dominated the field with 136 points, leading by a wide margin over Throckmorton with 88; Lorraine with 66; Highland with 36; and Mozelle with 29 2-3.

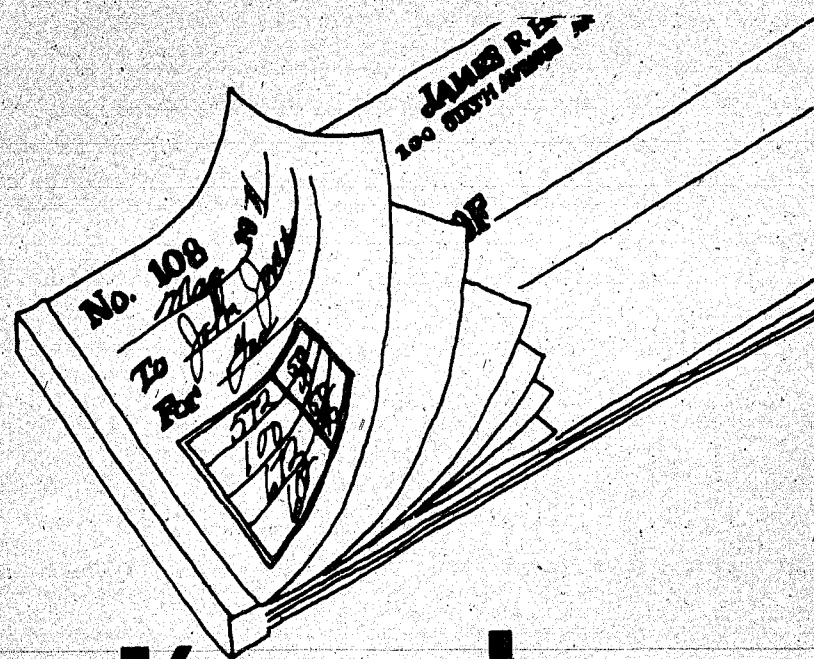

Spring Turkey Season Starts Saturday, April 15

Springtime turkey hunting has not really caught on in Texas. Perhaps it's the time of year, since emphasis seems to shift to fishing in spring.

Perhaps hunters doubt their turkey-calling ability, or maybe leases are difficult to find in some areas.

Whatever the reason, the number of hunters participating in spring turkey hunts is smaller per capita in Texas than in some other turkey hunting states, particularly in the Southeastern U. S.

The spring turkey hunts are to start in Texas in a 49-county area Saturday, April 15, and continue through April 23. There is a one gobbler limit.

This year's spring season will not only be the biggest, but it may also be one of the best, since there was a bumper crop of birds hatched last spring and apparently a good carry-over through the winter.

Water Situation Discussed At City Council Meeting

Mayor Glen Copeland and City Councilpersons expressed appreciation Thursday for the cooperation of local people during the current water shortage and rationing. The Council met in regular session April 6 at City Hall.

All negotiations have been made with the Brookesmith Water Corp. to tie on to the water line from Lake Brownwood for Santa Anna's emergency supply if needed. All concerned are hoping for a good rain to fill the pool at the Lake Brownwood Pump Station and the City Lake before the present supply is exhausted. It will take about one day to connect with the Brookesmith line northeast of Santa Anna where the Santa Anna line crosses the Brookesmith water line.

Council leaders were asked to remind local residents of the necessary precautions required when private water sources are connected to homes now using city water. Since water from wells or other sources is untreated water, there must be a special valve to keep the untreated water from entering city lines. Anyone planning to make such a connection should contact City Hall.

The city garbage trucks will be available an additional week for the clean-up drive, so residents needing trash hauled have until April 21 to arrange for a truck to haul trash or garbage by calling City Hall.

During the meeting Thursday, the recent election results were canvassed and accepted.
