Area Grass Fires Keep VFD Busy

The Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department has been busy in recent days with grass fires in the area.

Thursday, June 29, VFD members and trucks were called to the Norris place in the Liberty Community where a grass fire started from a passing train. The blaze was confined to the railroad right-of-way, and very little damage was reported.

Thursday afternoon several members of the local group were near Burkett to assist with a grass fire on a ranch near that community.

Saturday night, July 1, firemen responded to a call at the C. D. Bruce place, just past the little rock house on the highway, where a small fire burned in the pasture off the highway. The fire was thought to have started from fireworks.

Pumps In Operation; Conservation Urged

Parts of Santa Anna were without water for a brief period Friday afternoon when the water storage tank on the mountain was emptied during the three-day period the pumps from the City Lake were out of operation. The pumps broke down Tuesday and were replaced Friday night.

Santa Anna residents resumed water consumption Saturday, but Mayor Glen Copeland and City Superintendent Darwin Lovelady are urging conservation as the storage tank is refilling slowly and the water supply at the city lakes and at the Jim Ned pump site are dwindling due to the continued dry weather.

R-wood Strip Mine Hearing Held Wednesday, June 28

The population of the little town of Rockwood more than doubled for a day last Wednesday, June 28, when the Texas Railroad Commission held a hearing at Rockwood Community Center for the proposed surface mining operation in the area. An estimate of 150 to 250 persons gathered at the center for what appeared to be as much a social gathering as an official hearing.

Chesley Blevins of the Texas Railroad Commission served as hearing examiner. Those speaking on behalf of the project included David Williams of San

Cheaney and Coleman Banker Bill Sneed, who anticipate a boost in the area economy from the project that is expected to employ some 40 persons when in full operation.

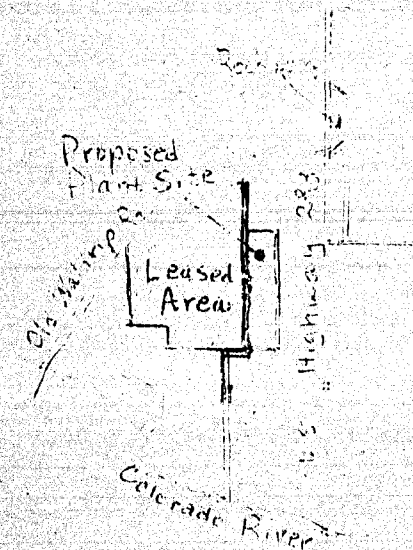
Royce McPhail of Rockwood spoke against the proposed project, asking for a delay of the hearing pending the outcome of a law suit in which he is involved concerning property in the mining area. McPhail, who moved to Rockwood from Ovalo several years ago, also expressed concern for high nitrate concentration in the soil following the strip mining. David Haynes of Clyde, a friend of McPhail, also spoke to the group concerning the possible disturbance of wildlife, and explained his interest in hunting in the mining area.

Hank Wise, reclamation manager for the project, answered questions and gave information assembled by game and wildlife specialists. There are no endangered species of wildlife living year-round in the area. There was also discussion on how the area would be leveled, seeded and watered when the mining was completed.

The public hearing June 28 was one of the final steps before the TRC grants or rejects a permit for the operation that is estimated to mine up to 200,000 tons of coal a year in the area just west and south of Rockwood.

A Commission ruling is not expected until September.

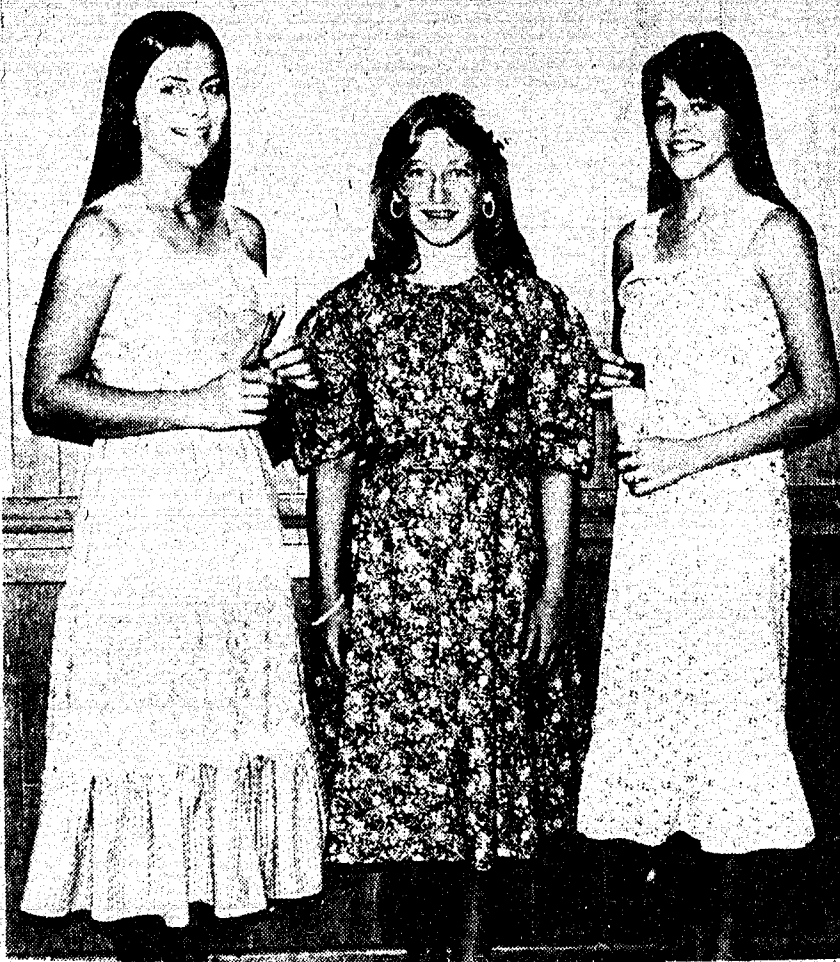
