## Water Situation Is Under Control

Santa Anna residents are able to maintain their yards now that rationing of water has been lifted. Most people in town are being very conservative, and city officials appreciate the cooperation being shown.

At the present time the water used in town is from the Santa Anna City Lakes and from the four wells that were drilled at the Lake Brownwood pump site. No water is being purchased from Brown County Water Improvement District although there is a supply at the pump site.

About five feet of water is in the large pool at the pump site and is used when needed.

The four wells, drilled during the critical shortage, still produce approximately 200 gallons per minute. That is supplemented by water from the city lakes northeast of Santa Anna.

## Small Increase In City Sales Tax

The City of Santa Anna received a check totaling \$7,361 as the refund from the State for the city sales tax. The amount was for the period ending May 25.

The figure was a nine percent increase over the same period last year.

The sales tax allocations for the State of Texas showed a healthy 17 percent increase over the 1977 collections, but the local increase would probably reflect the economic losses due to drought conditions in the farming and ranching area. Coleman had only a three percent increase over the same period last year.

## High School Principal Resigns Faculty Vacancies To Be Filled Before Start Of New School Term

Ken Bowker, Santa Anna High School Principal for the past three years, has resigned from the position effective this summer. His resignation was accepted by the Board of Trustees at their regular session Tuesday, June 13.

Prior to taking the Santa Anna post, Mr. Bowker was a county school counselor and also worked with the Small Schools Cooperative. He also was teacher and administrator at the Centennial School for a number of years. The resignation of Mr. Bowker leaves the local school system with seven vacancies. Also considered at the recent meeting were applicants for the other vacancies that include head coach, assistant coach, high school English, two elementary teachers and a high school remedial aide.

Anthony Strother and Bruce Smith were coaches for the past

term; Morris Williams filled the English position for the past semester following the resignation of Judy Chandler. Vacancies in the elementary school are for the position formerly held by Betty Key and for a teacher for the second section of the second grade that is to be added this year. Pa Rutherford has resigned a remedial aide and has moved to Center, Texas.

Debbie Harris, a spring graduate of Angelo State University, was hired as primary teacher to fill the vacancy of Mrs. Cathy Strother who resigned last spring. Debbie filled the position until the end of school this year. In other business at the meeting last week, bills and accounts were approved for payment totaling \$5,700. Major expenditure was for a covered stock trailer for the vocational agriculture

department.

Tommy White and Jack Walker of Countywide Insurance Co. met with the board for re-evaluating of the school property for insurance purposes.

A committee was appointed to plan the size, location and contractor for the new rest rooms and concession stand at the athletic stadium, and the trustees rejected a proposal to air condition the high school auditorium at the present time.

Henry Colyer of Brownwood was chosen as school auditor for another year, and the contract of John Skelton, school district tax assessor-collector, was extended for the coming year.

Rev. Ellis Holden, pastor of Santa Anna United Methodist Church, has been re-assigned to the Santa Anna Charge for the coming year. The announcement came at the recent meeting of Texas Methodist conferences in Fort Worth.

Rev. Holden has been at Santa Anna one year, coming here from Graham. He and his wife, JoAnn are parents of two sons.

The Santa Anna Charge includes the local church and churches at Rockwood, Valera and Trickham.

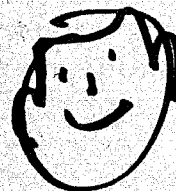

## 'Halfway House' To Reopen Soon In Brownwood

A halfway house is by definition a home which is between two points. On one end is the institution which is highly restrictive in terms of the freedom available to it's residents. On the other end is an open society in which few restrictions are placed on an individual. In order to live in an open society certain abilities are necessary. That is where a halfway house comes in.

The Central Texas Mental Health—Mental Retardation Center will open a Mental Health Halfway House by August 1. MHMR Staff will help persons with mental disorders and alcohol and drug abuse problems to return to an independent living situation. They will do this through individual and group psychotherapy, chemotherapy, and day hospitalization. Through cooperation with the Texas Rehabilitation Commission, the client will receive vocational counseling and job placement. The client will also learn personal and social adjustment such as grooming, cooking and recreation. These functions will be supervised by staff of the MHMR Center.

MHMR has leased the facility that formerly housed the Carlton House. It is presently being remodeled to conform to licensing specifications. Average stay at the new halfway house should be 60 days with the client returning to his own home at the end of that time.

## Screwworm Cases Increase In Area

MISSION: Seven Texas counties recorded their first 1978 screwworm cases during the June 8 through 14 period, reports Dr. M. E. (Cotton) Meadows Jr.

The director of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Screwworm Eradication Program says the Texas screwworm count climbed from 38 in 17 counties to 57 in 24 counties during the one-week period.

First positive 1978 identification of the parasite from samples in Garza, Kent Scurry Sterling, Runnels, Concho, and Jeff Davis counties was made in the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Services lab during the week.

Twenty-four cases have been reported in 14 counties within flying distance of San Angelo since May 15. The Program is preparing to establish a temporary distribution center at San Angelo during the week starting June 18.

A sample Werner A. Halfmann of Lowake took from a calf navel a mile south of town became Concho County's first recorded 1978 screwworm case, and Gary Gallant of Ballinger, Runnels County, took screwworms from a calf navel 12 miles northeast of town.

In Coleman County, there have been 3 cases to date, the latest reported by Louis Pittard of Gouldbusk, from a shearing wound in sheep three miles east of Voss.
