A light turn-out has been predicted for the Tuesday general election in the state. Local people are encouraged to go to the polls November 7 to cast their ballots. Voting locally will be at the Telephone Cooperative building.

There are days when it seems I have been sitting at my desk at the NEWS office for at least a century, but as of this month it is ten years.

The NEWS has gone from the old letterpress method to offset, and we are in a different office from the old one of November 1968.

According to a news story in a 1948 issue, the NEWS was established in January 1886, so is now in its 93rd year of publication and the oldest continuously operated business in the town.

The 1948 story stated that Walter Weldon was printer-editor-manager of the NEWS, with the first issues printed in a small cave on the north side of the mountain, then later moved the 'plant' to the downtown area in the 'Gap'.

Early Morning Fire Damages Co-Op Gin On Tuesday

The seed house and cotton house at Santa Anna Co-op Gin were destroyed by fire in the early hours Tuesday, the blaze completely destroying the sheet iron structure that was adjacent to the gin itself.

Volunteer Firemen had been at the gin about mid-afternoon Monday to extinguish a blaze in the cotton hulls behind the gin and a small grassfire that started from the burning hulls.

Gin manager William Brown also said there had been a small fire in the cotton house earlier in the day, started from a piece of wire going through the machinery igniting the cotton. However the cotton bale was taken outside and the fire extinguished. Cause of the blaze has not been determined.

Jim Lovelady, city nightwatchman, discovered the fire about 1 a.m. and called the fire department to the scene. Destroyed in the blaze were 16 bales of cotton and four tons of cotton seed. The metal building was caved in when firemen arrived, indicating the fire had been smoldering for some time. Gin workers had been back to the gin several times during the afternoon and early evening to check on the burning hulls but

General Election Tuesday

Balloting Set For Candidates, State Constitutional Amendments

What Election Judge Glen Copeland has described as a "blanket-sized" ballot will be given to the voters who go to the polls next Tuesday, November 7, for the General Election. Santa Anna voters will go to the Telephone Cooperative building from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. to cast their ballots.

Races of major interest in this area are between the Republican

and Democratic candidates; Raza Unida party and the Socialist Workers party also have candidates in several categories on the lengthy ballot.

Eight Constitutional amendments and a tax relief amendment are to be polled on Tuesday.

The Santa Anna community has the distinction of being divided into two Congressional Districts, District 17 to the north part of the community, and District 11 on the

south. The Congressional District boundaries do not coincide with County Precincts or school district lines.

Assisting Mr. Copeland with the election Tuesday will be clerks Ruby Hosch and Omadean Horner and others to be named this week.

The eight proposed constitutional amendments and the tax relief amendment are listed elsewhere in the NEWS for those who are not familiar with the proposals.

Santa Anna To Take Part In Program

The County-wide Title VII Nutrition Program, starting this week in Coleman, is available to Santa Anna residents over the age of 60 and their spouses, and people in this area are invited to take part in the activity.

The program, sponsored and funded by the City of Coleman and Coleman County, is designed to provide meals and fellowship for persons who do not eat well because of finances, lack of skills or loneliness.

Mrs. C. W. Hamm of Coleman is program director for the three-times-weekly program that will be held at the Coleman Highrise Apartments dining room. Serving will be from 11:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. each Monday, Wednesday and Friday. There is no charge for those who cannot afford to pay for the meals, but donations will be accepted from those wishing to contribute.

The Senior Citizens' van will be leaving Santa Anna each day at 11:00 a.m. that the program is in effect. Those wishing to ride to Coleman for the noon meal are asked to contact Mrs. Joe Barnes at the Chamber of Commerce by 10 a.m. on that morning and they will be picked up at their homes if they cannot meet the group at the Chamber of Commerce office.

Included in the grand opening activities will be free cold drinks to be served during the three days, special sales items and drawings for groceries during the weekend event.

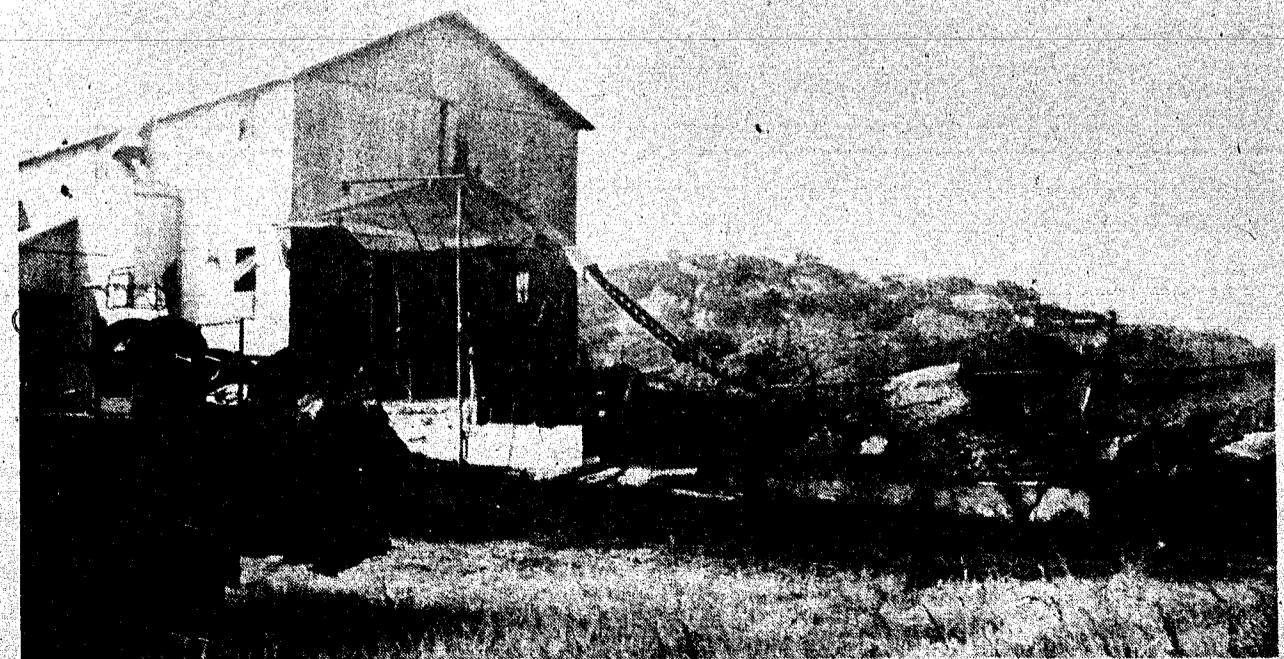
Gouldbusk Farmer Has First Cotton

Louis Pittard of Gouldbusk had the first cotton of the season at Santa Anna Co-Op Gin, bringing several bales to be processed Saturday.

The cotton was of good quality and was harvested from a field that is yielding about one bale per acre.

Rankin McIver of Trickham also had cotton at the gin at the weekend, with a total of 16 bales being ginned through Monday. Ironically, all the cotton except one bale was destroyed in the Tuesday morning fire.

Cotton was on the gin lot Tuesday awaiting the re-opening of the gin. Very little is expected from the Santa Anna area, but there is quite a lot of cotton in the Gouldbusk area, Brown said.

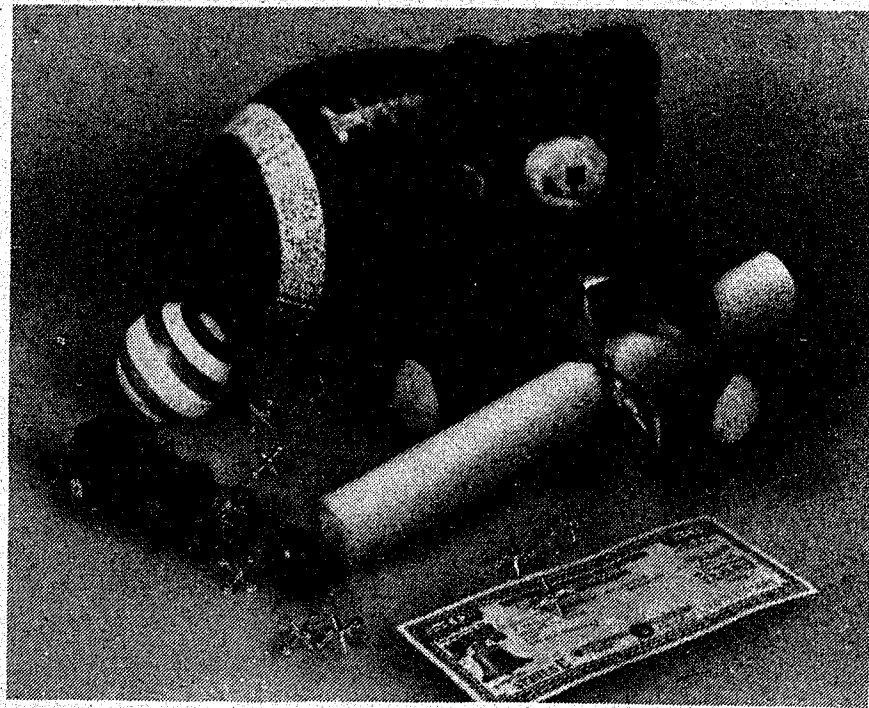

SDA Denomination Leader Resigns Head Office

Washington, D. C. ... Robert H. Pierson, president of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists, announced his resignation to the church's annual council recently. He will leave the office January 3, 1979, his 68th birthday.

Elder Pierson cited health reasons for leaving office before the end of his current five-year term, which expires in 1980. With his wife Dollie at his side, the leader to more than three million Seventh-day Adventists said he decided to resign the previous Saturday morning before leaving for church services.

The resignation was completely unexpected by leaders at the General Conference.

It was announced that constitutional provisions for the replacement of a president in mid-term, enacted in 1975, will go into effect. Moyses S. Nigri, executive vice president of the General Conference, will meet with the President's Executive Advisory Committee and the heads of the 10 world divisions.

A recommendation will come from that group on forming a committee to choose a successor. A time schedule will also be established for the election.

An interim president may be chosen to fill the place until the regular term in 1980, or a new one may be chosen to stand re-election at the quinquennial General Conference set in April, 1980 in Dallas.

Elder Pierson was elected president in June 1966. He was re-

elected in 1970 and again in 1975. Prior to that he served as president of the Trans-Africa Division, including most of Southern and eastern Africa, from 1958 to 1966. He was also president of the Southern Asia Division from 1950 to 1954, and has led a number of union and local conference organizations in the United States.

One of these local conferences was the Texas Conference. A number of Santa Anna members remember his leadership in this area.

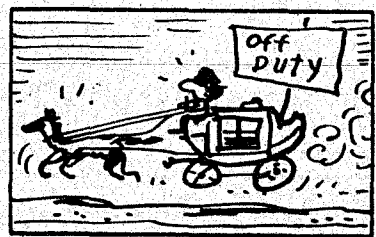

Farm Reports To Be Sought

From mid-November to early January, thousands of Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop or livestock questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service or will be personally interviewed by the Service's field staff. The information gathered through the questionnaire and interviews provides the basis for determining the final acreage, yield and production of crops and end-of-the-year livestock and poultry numbers for the state of Texas and for each county.

Reliable information on what is produced, how much and where is important to farmers, ranchers and others in making production and marketing decisions and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture. These are also essential to farm organizations and legislators in promotion, planning and enacting wise legislation and are used in establishing acreages and payment levels to producers under the various commodity programs.

The collection and publication of the statistics are a cooperative effort between the Texas Department of Agriculture and USDA. All farm and ranch information is kept confidential, and only state and county summaries become part of the final published estimate.

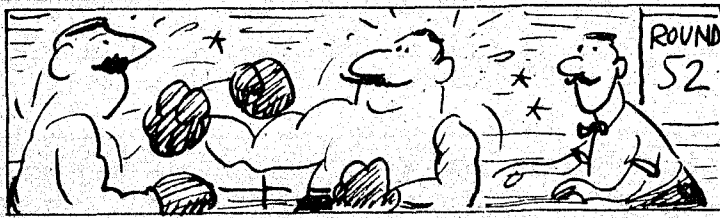
San Angelo... Open season for taking fur-bearing animal pelts for sale begins December 1 (mink and muskrat only November 15). But there seems to be a lot of illegal trapping operations already underway, especially for raccoons. Be forewarned! Game wardens have been alerted to this activity and will be watching closely.

In the past, as the winter sets in, some trappers have tried to get around the laws governing the taking of pelts for sale. Last year a number of these people were caught and filed on. Most of these cases involved persons possessing pelts out of season. The law states that possession of green or undried pelts, except muskrat, by licensed trappers after February 5 of each year and by licensed retail fur buyers after

February 15 of each year is illegal. Thus, if you were saving those pelts in a deep freeze, pelts you took last year, in hopes of getting a higher price this year, you have violated the law and are subject to severe penalties.

If you want to stay legal, talk with your local game warden and find out all the rules and regulations governing trapping in Texas. They are quite specific and every trapper should know them before beginning operations. In addition there are some new regulations governing the taking and tagging of bobcat pelts this year.

Landowners throughout Texas are advised to pick up their antlerless deer permits at the designated time and place to avoid any delay and inconvenience later on.

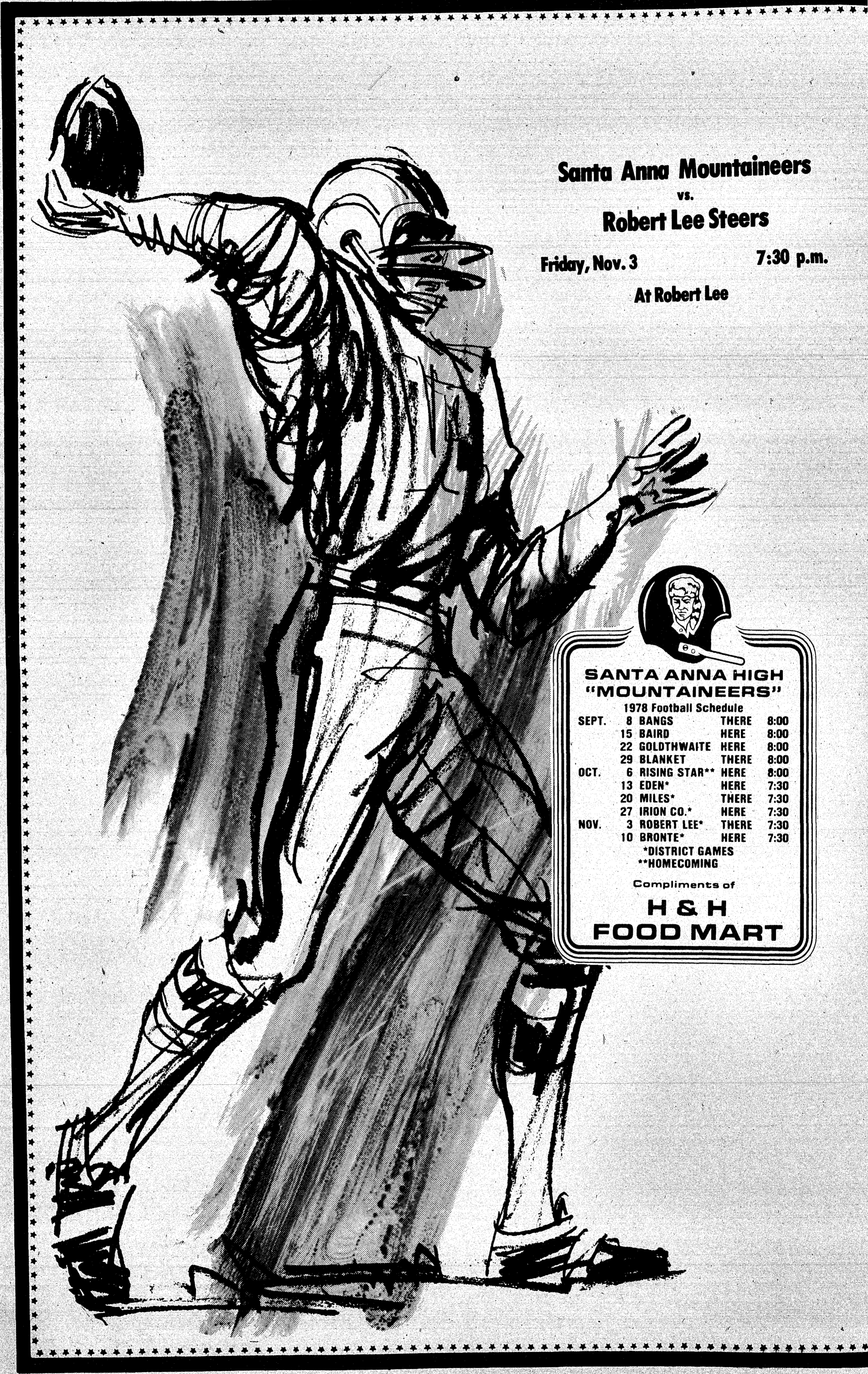

Voters Face 9 Amendments Santa Anna Folks On Ballot Next Tuesday Enjoy Vacation Won By Daughter

Along with the different races on the ballot for the general election, there will be nine proposed constitutional amendments. For the benefit of the voters, a brief summary of them follows:

Texas is one of many states feeling reverberations of "Proposition 13" adopted in California last June which makes drastic cutbacks in the levels of property taxation and limits future increases.

Although the California situation differs from Texas in that property taxes are much less in Texas and the initiative, which allows the electorate to force a statewide vote on tax relief does not exist under the state constitution.

H. J. R. No. 1 proposes seven different specific constitutional changes:

The present constitution requires all property to be taxed (with certain exceptions not relevant here). Intangible property such as bank accounts, stocks and bonds, life insurance policies, retirement benefits and similar paper assets has previously been omitted, and the act would bring the constitution more in line with the general practice by removing intangible property from the constitutionally-required tax base.

Presently the constitution exempts from taxation \$250 worth of "household and kitchen furniture" belonging to each family. The act would change this exemption by requiring the Legislature by general law to exempt "household goods" and "personal effects" not held or used for production of income and authorizing the Legislature to exempt all or part of the "personal property homestead of a family or single adult, the latter being described as personal property exempt by law from forced sale for debt.

In 1966 the voters adopted a constitutional amendment that requires taxation of qualified land to be taxed on its productive ability, but it restricted it to agricultural land owned by an individual. A new paragraph is submitted that would allow the Legislature to include some or all timberland, corporat-owned agricultural land and agricultural land owned by individuals who do not qualify under the current constitution.

Residential homestead exemptions by local governing bodies may adopt an exemption to include a larger segment than homesteads of persons 65 years of age or older, and also changes the requirements that the exemption be based of "market value" rather than "assessed value." "market value of every residential homestead from taxation "for general elementary and secondary school purposes," except for taxes presently being levied to pay off previously incurred debt. In addition to that exemption the amendment would authorize the Legislature to exempt from school taxation an amount up to \$10,000 of market value of an elderly or disabled person.

Provision is made to allow the Legislature to reimburse the school districts for revenue lost

under the amendment but makes no specific law for this action.

In Amendment No. 1, it would allow the state to purchase without competitive bidding all products and services purchased from "handicapped individuals employed in non-profit rehabilitation facilities providing sheltered employment." It would also remove the now required approval for such purchases by governor, secretary of state and comptroller.

Amendment No. 2 would allow subdivisions to issue revenue bond to develop employment opportunities, such as acquiring and constructing facilities for manufacturing or other enterprises that would provide jobs.

Amendment No. 3 would allow cities and towns to issue tax increment bonds to finance redevelopment of blighted areas.

Amendment No. 4 authorizes the Legislature to exempt from taxation solar or wind-powered energy devices. This is expected to help those who are installing energy-saving devices.

Amendment No. 5 would expand the jurisdiction of justices of the peace. At present they cannot handle a case in excess of \$200, but amendment would raise the maximum to \$500. The \$200 maximum was adopted in 1886 and the lawmakers feel that inflation has caused a need for the maximum to be raised. The amendment relates only to civil cases.

Amendment No. 6 would authorize the legislature to increase the number of associate justices on a court of civil appeals and permit a court of civil appeals to sit in sections. This is designed to relieve the case load of the present court.

Amendment No. 7 would abolish the State Building Commission, and State Building Fund, neither

of which are now operating. The duties of such have been transferred to the State Board of Control.

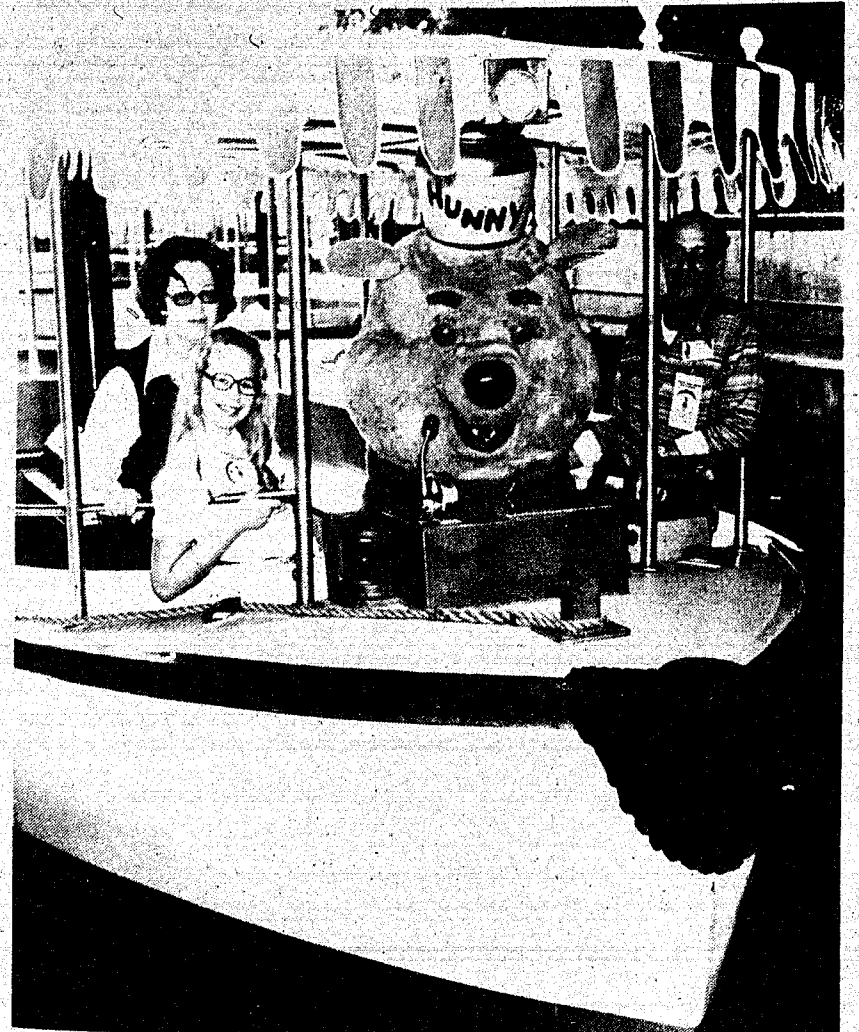

Amendment No. 8 would authorize water districts to purchase fire-fighting equipment and issue bonds and lend their credit for fire-fighting purposes. Many districts serve heavily populated areas and provide municipal-type services including water supply and waste water disposal. Previous efforts to supply fire-protection have been held unconstitutional.

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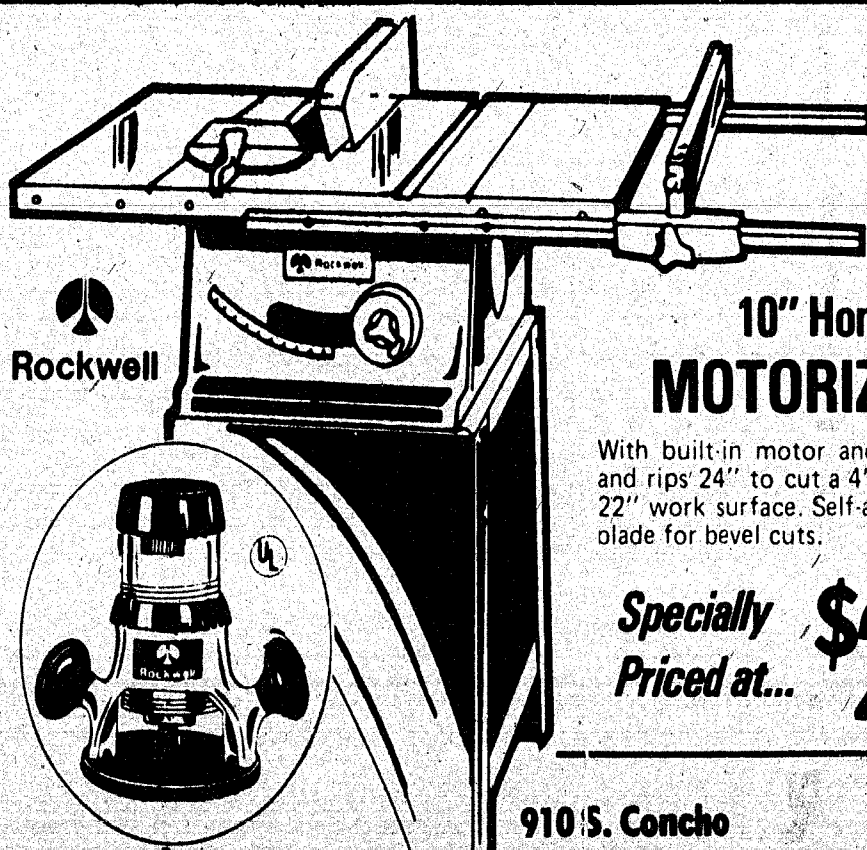

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Irion County Is Defeated By Mountaineers 34-6

In a reversal of recent games, Santa Anna struck with their first touchdown early in the first quarter of the Friday night game with Irion County. On the first play from scrimmage, Mike Warnock darted through an opening created by the blocking of Johnson, Young and Pape and raced 54 yards which left, with the aid of a penalty, the ball resting on the 12 yard line. On the very next play, Mike raced untouched into the end zone. The PAT failed, and with 11:39 minutes left in the first quarter, the score stood 6 - 0 in favor of Santa Anna.

Later in the same quarter Quarterback Tommy Harris connected with tight end Bruce Pape on a beautifully thrown and artfully caught pass which put the ball on the Mountaineer six-yard line. Two plays later Tommy Harris, following Mike Ballard's blocking, crept in for the touchdown. Again the PAT failed, but the score was Santa Anna 12 - Irion County 0.

In the second quarter a five-play 50 yard drive highlighted by a 30-yard scamper by Dwayne Warnock, resulted in another Mountaineer touchdown when Mike Warnock, escorted by brother Dwayne and Jerry Culpepper, swept into the end zone from the six yard line.

Later in the same period Harris found Pape once again on another 45-yard pass play putting the ball on the Santa Anna 26. Three consecutive runs by Albert "The Train" Collins netted the Mountaineers their fourth TD of the night. Jerry Culpepper kicked the Extra Point and the score then stood at 25 - 0 for the local boys.

With 10:49 remaining in the third quarter, Harris elected to
