## SAHS Defeats Robert Lee

### West Zone Title On The Line In Friday Night Home Clash

The name of the game is the line of scrimmage, and Friday night at Robert Lee an aggressive Mountaineer offensive line took charge of the scrimmage line and led the locals to a stunning 30 - 22 upset of the Number 9 rated team in the State. The victory for Santa Anna also threw the Zone race into a three-way tie, giving the Mountaineers a chance to take it all this coming Friday night as they entertain Bronte on the local field.

The Mountaineers jumped off to a two-touchdown lead in the first

quarter Friday night, the first touchdown came on a one-yard plunge by Quarterback Tommy Harris, the second on a nine-yard pass from Harris to Rusty Buzzard. Jerry Culpepper kicked the PAT following both touchdowns.

By halftime the Steers had scored two touchdowns and had also converted both times, making the score 14 - 14.

The small but enthusiastic crowd of Mountaineer boosters greeted the team as it opened the second half with Mike Warnock returning the kick-off 15 yards to the 34 yard line. Ten plays later Jerry Cuppepper took the ball into the end zone capping the 66-yard drive. Tommy Harris elected to keep on the outside veer and spun into the end zone for the two-point

conversion.

Robert Lee, not to be denied, came back with eight points of their own and the game was again knotted 22 - 22.

Still in the third quarter the Mountaineers collected their pride once more and marched 63 yards in five plays. Scoring on a 44-yard run by Dwayne Warnock, the touchdown play looked like one you see in a coaching manual as (See FOOTBALL, Page 3)

According to a report in the last week's issue of Coleman Democrat Voice, activity is slated to start soon on the coal mining operation near Rockwood.

Joe Williams of San Saba stated that four bids have been received for the construction of the wash plant, and a contract was expected to be awarded and construction to start in a few weeks.

Specifications call for the wash plant to be completed within a year. The actual mining of coal will begin two to three months prior to completion of the wash plant.

At the mining site water wells have been drilled and water is to be piped to the site. Work is also expected to start soon on an entrance road to the plant site.







## Texas Parks & Wildlife News

San Angelo -- Trout in West Texas? Well, not just yet, but it won't be long. In fact, sometime this month a Texas Parks and Wildlife Department inland fisheries crew will dump over 10,000 catchable-sized rainbow trout in waters in and around West Texas city of San Angelo. Another 15,000 will be stocked in hatchery ponds nearby to grow and sustain a put-and-take trout fishery.

Word is not yet out on the exact date and locations of the trout stockings, but as soon as everything is lined up and approved, we'll let you know. In the meantime, you might get out that flyrod that's been gathering dust in your closet and start practicing.

### NEW HEAD WARDEN

Jack Woodford has been named Region I law enforcement director for the P&WD. A game warden for more than 30 years, Woodford previously was district law enforcement supervisor in Bryan.

He assumed the post the retirement of Edgar Strdivant November 1. Region I will now be headquartered in San Angelo, having been moved from El Paso.

### NATURAL AREAS

The Texas Natural Areas Survey committee is revising its priority list of 100 significant natural areas for the second five-year Texas Outdoor Recreation Plan now under preparation by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The group will make many changes in the present list, reflecting impairment of many of the previously listed areas and protection of others through their inclusion into the Big Thicket National Preserve, the Texas Scientific Area System or the Nature Conservancy ownership.

The passed week has been a record for car accidents in Santa Anna. Last Thursday Beth, the little six year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ford Barnes, was badly cut on the face by the fender of the Meader delivery truck. This proved to be not very serious and she is fast recovering.

Account of one accident is one of the saddest to us we have ever chronicled. It happened last Sunday afternoon in front of the Dewey Marshall home when Baby June, the little three year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dewey Marshall was run over by the writer's car and the writer was at the steering wheel, inflicting

several bruises and an ugly gash on the forehead. Medical aid was quickly sought and the injuries were found not to be fatal, but several bad bruises were on her head, body and limbs.

The NEWS has been requested to announce a box supper at Love Hill School house November 22. The proceeds to be used to purchase an organ for the church.

The following is a brief report of the accomplishments of the Santa Anna Hospital for the year ending November 1, 1924:

There were 255 patients admitted, 41 medical and 214 surgical cases. There were 7 deaths.

Total receipts for the year was \$8,490.90; total expenditures were \$11,375.90 making a difference of \$2,885.00. \$1,265 was paid out for new equipment and \$949 for charity.

The only disappointing feature about our hospital is its size. As is well known, this is the first hospital erected in Coleman County and was a pioneer in the small town hospital experiment and has now been in successful operation for 5 years. The hospital has made the above remarkable record with only ten beds.

Facts from a pro on driving to survive.

**Q. If an intersection has a left turn signal, can you still turn left when the through traffic has a green light but the left arrow isn't showing? — L. F., Caddo Mills**

**A.** Yes, as long as you give through traffic the right of way. The arrow indicates that your left turn is protected and that you have the right of way.

**Q. When towing my ski-boat it sways from side to side when driving about 45-50 miles per hour. This makes it difficult to control the car and when I put on the brakes to slow down the swaying gets worse before it goes away. What can I do to prevent this? — E.J., San Antonio**

**A.** The most likely cause is insufficient trailer tongue weight. You can increase the tongue weight by moving the boat forward on the trailer or by storing your extra gear in the bow instead of the stern. The tongue weight should be in the range of 100-150 pounds (some trailer manufacturers specify a recommended tongue weight). Trailer sway is dangerous and if severe enough can flip the trailer and the car.
