Top Steer Ropers Will Compete In Laramie, Wyo.

Guy Allen, the 1977 World Champion PRCA Steer Roper, will be defending his title this weekend at Laramie, Wyoming at the Steer Roping Finals.

Guy and 14 other top steer ropers in the nation will meet for the Saturday and Sunday event, roping five steers on each day. The 15 ropers earned their berths in the finals by having the most money won during the 1978 season. They will be meeting on an equal basis at the finals, the top winner at the two-day event being declared the winner.

Entering the finals competition as 12th in the nation, Guy will be riding his big gelding, Macho, on whom he has roped all the year.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. James Allen, Guy is the youngest roper to win the World Champion title, a 1977 graduate of Santa Anna High school and now a sophomore at Ranger Junior College.

The local roper had not qualified for the finals until the past weekend when he placed well in a roping at Walla Walla, Washington.

Students Back In Class; School Enrollment Down

The enrollment was down at the Santa Anna schools at the first week of classes, an expected decrease due to the large graduating class last spring and a smaller than usual kindergarten class this fall.

High School had a total of 120 students enrolled Monday, a decrease of five from the first week's total in 1977. Elementary School had an enrollment of 261 on Monday, a decrease of eight from the first week last year.

The enrollment is expected to increase during the first weeks of school. The total number of students rose to 394 at the end of school in May, with the elementary classes increasing enrollment by nearly 20 students during the year.

Firemen Control Oil Tank Fire

The Santa Anna Volunteer Fire Department had a chance to try out their new equipment and procedures Friday night when they extinguished a fire at an oil tank battery on the Sigmor Oil Lease in the Liberty Community.

The blaze started from lightning which struck one of the tanks, then another tank was ignited by the blaze.

The fire was battled in a heavy rainstorm that accompanied the electrical storm.

Another oil tank fire on the Virgil Newman place south of town burned itself out during the same time and was extinguished by the time firemen arrived from the Liberty location.

The month of September started off in good fashion as far as rainfall is concerned. R. W. Balke, the official rainfall reporter, had 2.25 inches recorded at the official gauge Friday, September 1.

The early evening rainfall was one of the largest one-day totals for the year.

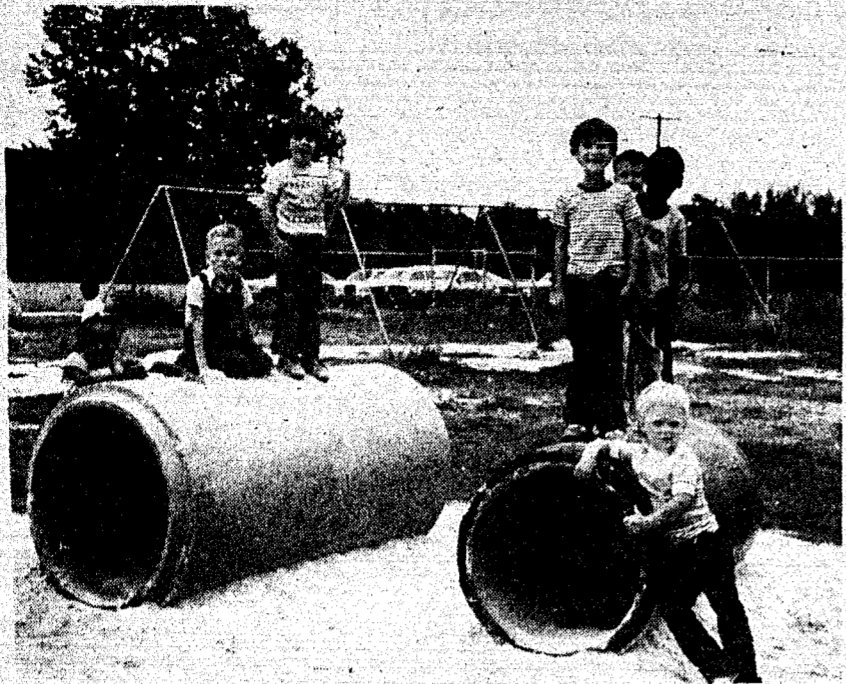
The afternoon of October 7 will be free for visitation and class reunions, and the Homecoming dance will be held at 8 p.m. that evening at the Community Civic

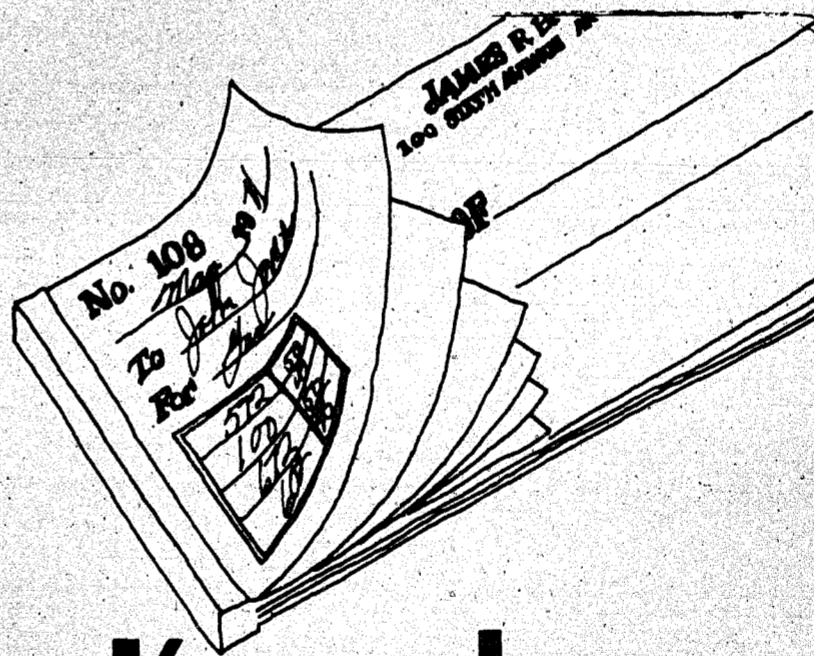

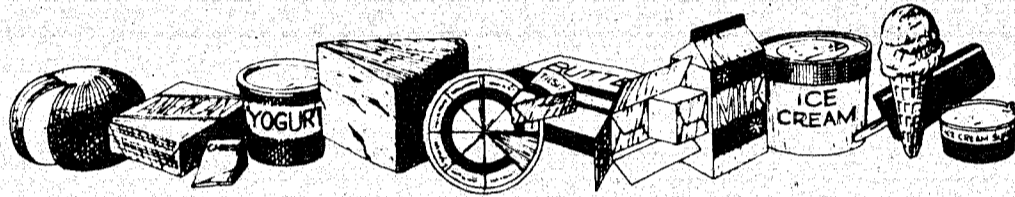



Health Tips Offered For Back to School

Schools days are at hand again for millions of American youngsters.

The American Medical Association once again reminds parents that there are health and safety considerations that are important in preparing the small fry for another nine months of studies.

The AMA recommends a thorough health examination for 5 and 6-year-olds entering school for the first time. Your physician will know what to do. His examination will cover all aspects of your child's health, and will include hearing (to make certain he can hear the teacher) and vision (to make sure he can see the blackboard). The doctor also will give any booster immunizations that might be required.

School boards in some com-

munities require a health exam for beginning students. Many schools also require certain immunizations. Your doctor will know of the requirements of your neighborhood.

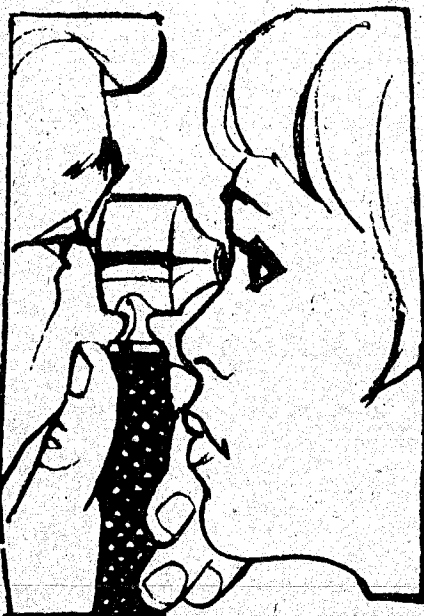
Most doctors feel that four or five thorough health examinations during the school years are sufficient for healthy youngsters. These usually are spaced at the start of the first year, about the fourth grade, about the seventh grade, at the ninth or tenth grade, and upon graduation.

A thorough examination is important, often mandatory, if the child is participating in school athletics. The doctor should be told that junior is going out for football, so that he can look for any health problems that might be heightened by rough contact sports.

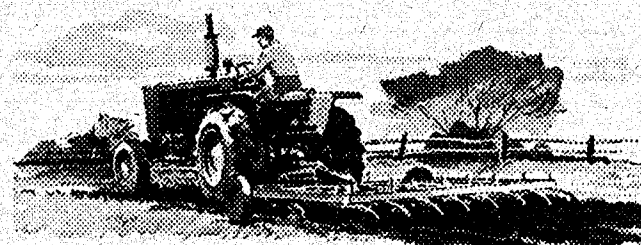
In the excitement of the first few days of school the small child may forget all of the safety warnings you've been teaching him. Screwworms Still Evident In The State

Biggest share of the 129 screwworm cases in Texas livestock during August were in the Big Bend area, with others scattered through the west Texas sheep and goat rearing section, says Dr. James E. Novy, acting director of the U. S. Department of Agriculture Screwworm Eradication Program.

Novy says the 364 cases reported in Texas the first eight months of 1978 compare to 35 a year earlier.

Reeves, Terrell and Upton counties each reported their first 1978 screwworm cases in August. Shearing of sheep and goats with its consequent wounds is now underway in much of central and west Texas, Novy said.

"With wild screwworms already in the area this will likely lead to increasing numbers of screwworm cases unless all ranchers and shearing crews take extreme care to prevent infestation."

Novy says livestock inspectors and entomologists report great numbers of Gulf Coast ear ticks on many animals within 150 miles of the Texas coast. If the area continues screwworm free the most deadly part of the combination which has devastated herds in the region in past years will not add to the problem, hopes Novy.

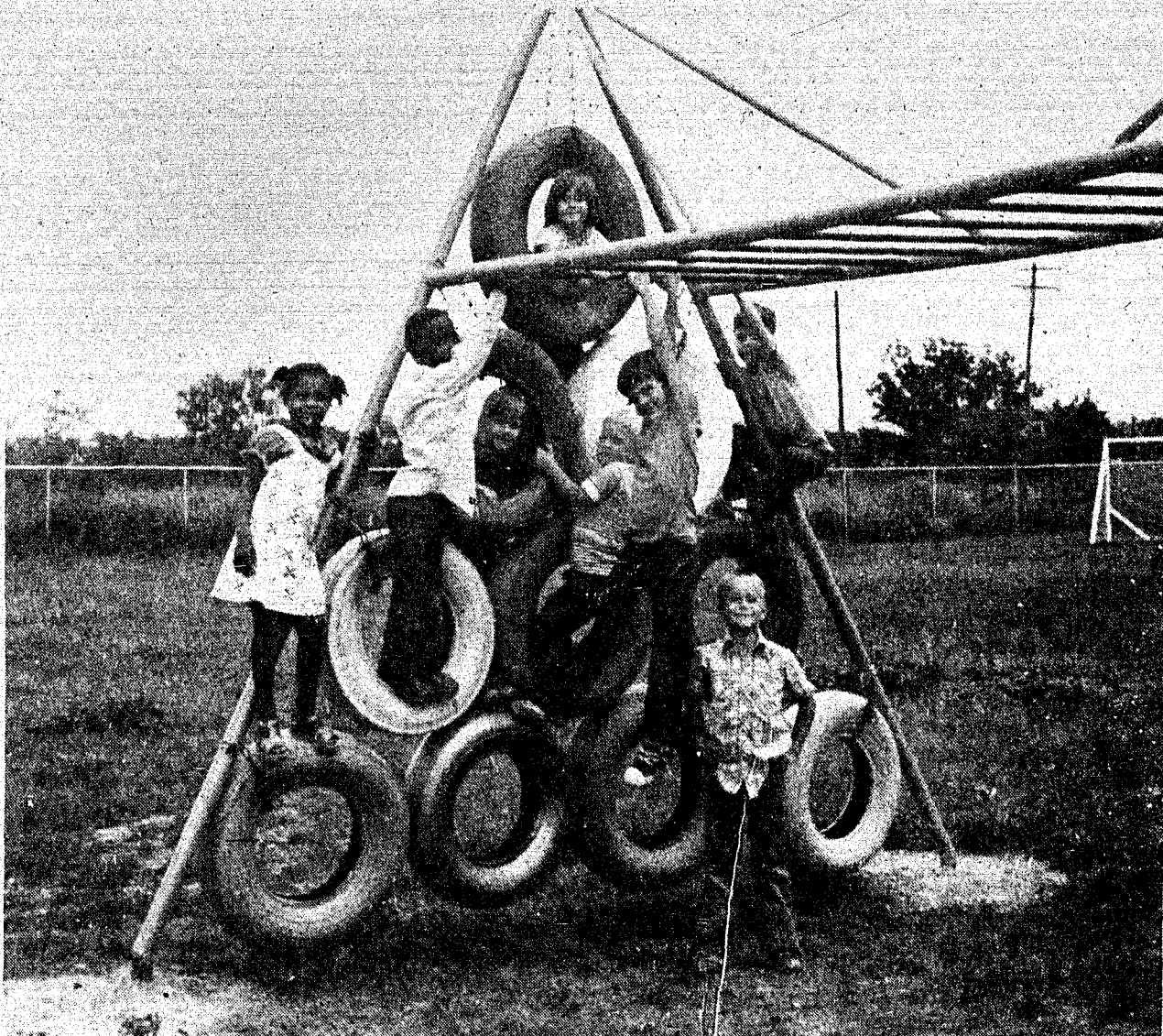

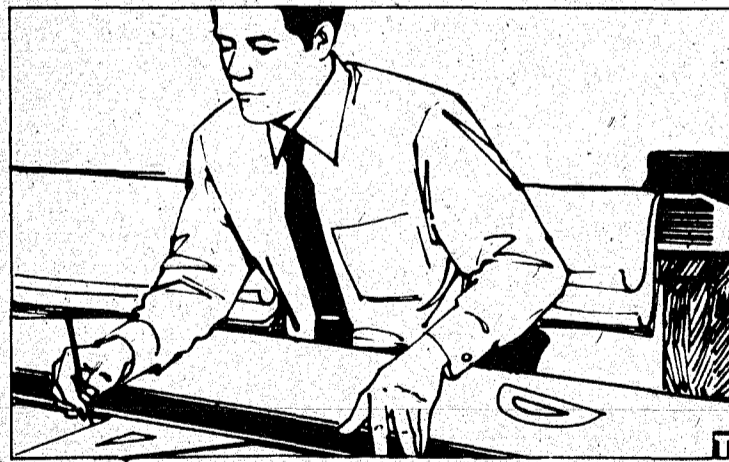
