Mountaineers Pocket Falling Star Friday Night

On the second possession of the night on a nine-play drive, sparked by an opening play on which Mike Warnock scampered for 23 yards, the Mountaineers scored Friday night's first touchdown on a six-yard plunge by veteran Mike Warnock. The TD was the first of several to bring a 41-0 victory over the Rising Star Wildcats.

Minutes later in the second stanza, Quarterback Tommy Harris elected to keep the ball on an option play and scooted 39 yards for the second Santa Anna touchdown, making the score 12-0.

Capping a 48 yard drive in just three plays, Tommy Harris dropped a pass into the waiting hands of tight end Bruce Pape for the third SAHS touchdown of the night. A carbon copy play netted the locals two two-point extra point plays, thus the score stood 20-0 as the halftime festivities began.

Dwayne Warnock returned the Rising Star second half kickoff 60 yards and five plays later took the ball into the end zone from five yards out for another TD.

In the fourth quarter Dwayne Warnock found the double stripe for the second time as he was on the receiving end of a 16-yard pass from QB Tommy Harris. Mike Warnock provided the two extra points as he hustled the ball into

Former Santa Anna students from as far away as California and Georgia were in town last weekend for the 1978 Santa Anna Ex-Student Homecoming and class reunions. Olivia Land Carroll of Fresno, Calif. was recognized as the former student traveling the farthest to attend the event; Earl Jean Woodard Alexander of Atlanta, Ga. was given recognition for organizing the reunion for the Class of 1948 and helping with the homecoming preparations.

A highlight of the Saturday business meeting and program was the introduction of Roy Richardson of Artesia, New Mexico, the 1978 "Ex Student of the Year." Mr. Richardson, a graduate of 1928, is a banker and civic leader in Artesia. Belva Heilman Rutherford of Coleman was presented as "Coming Home Queen." She is a 1958 graduate of SAHS and a homemaker and civic worker.

Other recognition was given Elsie Lee Harper, Class of 1914, the earliest graduate attending; Maude Evans and Roy Holt,

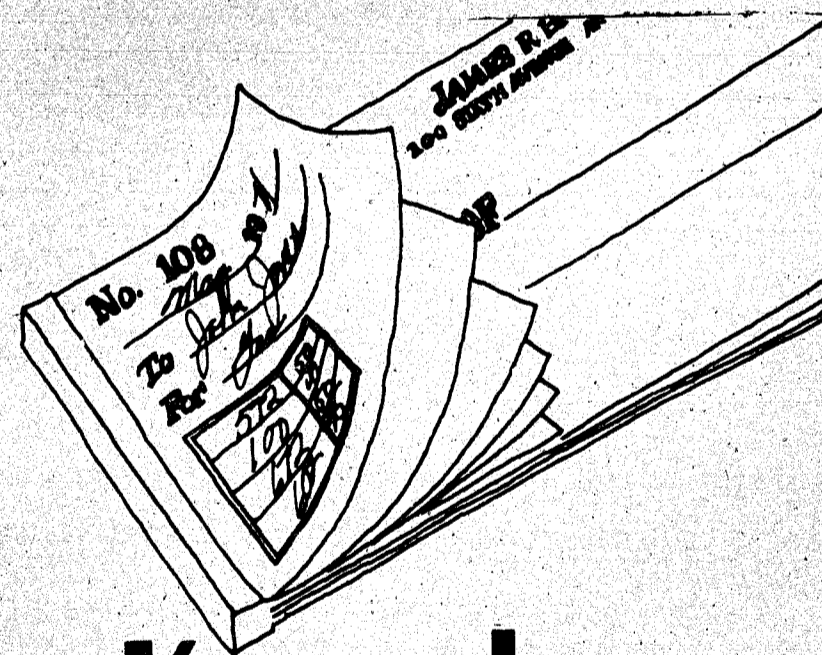
Hill backs tax relief on ballot November 7

Congratulations to Miss Harper for being chosen 'Resident of the Month.'

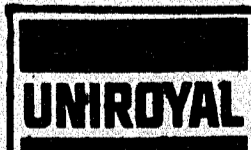
