Late in the second quarter the Mountaineers mounted a fifty-five

yard seven-play scoring drive featuring a 24-yard run by Mike Warnock. Dwayne Warnock crossed the goal line from eight yards out to give the locals a 6-0 lead. Dwayne also scored the two extra points. These were to be all for the Mountaineers on that

fateful night.

On the first Santa Anna offensive play of the second half, an errant fumble was covered by an alert Bronte defense on the Santa Anna nine-yard line. Two plays later the score was knotted 8 - 8.

Later in the third quarter Longhorn Cody McClure scored another TD, the PAT failed, score Bronte 14 - Santa Anna 8.

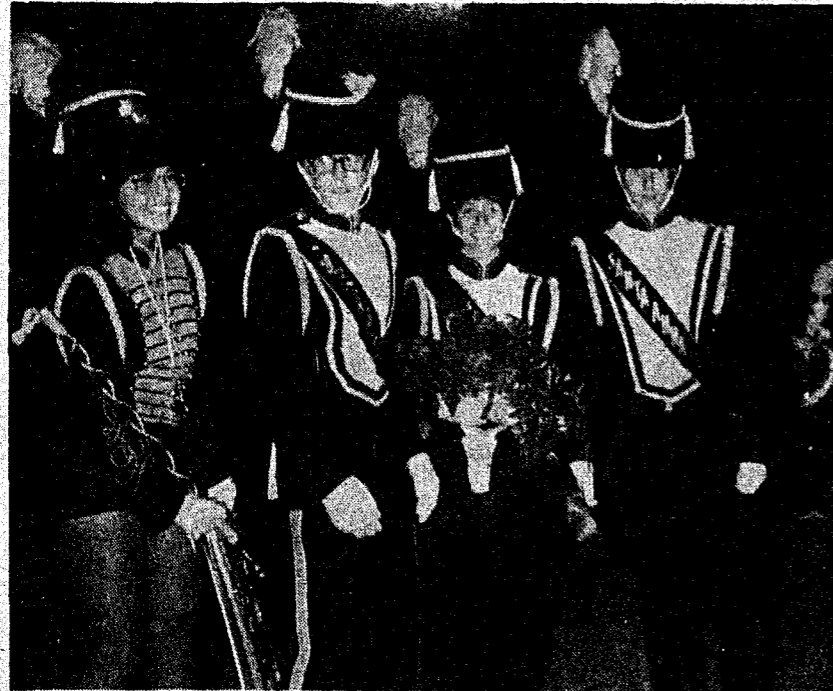
On the ensuing kickoff, Santa Anna once again fumbled, giving Bronte the ball on the Santa Anna eighty yard line. One play later the score stood 20 - 8 for Bronte.

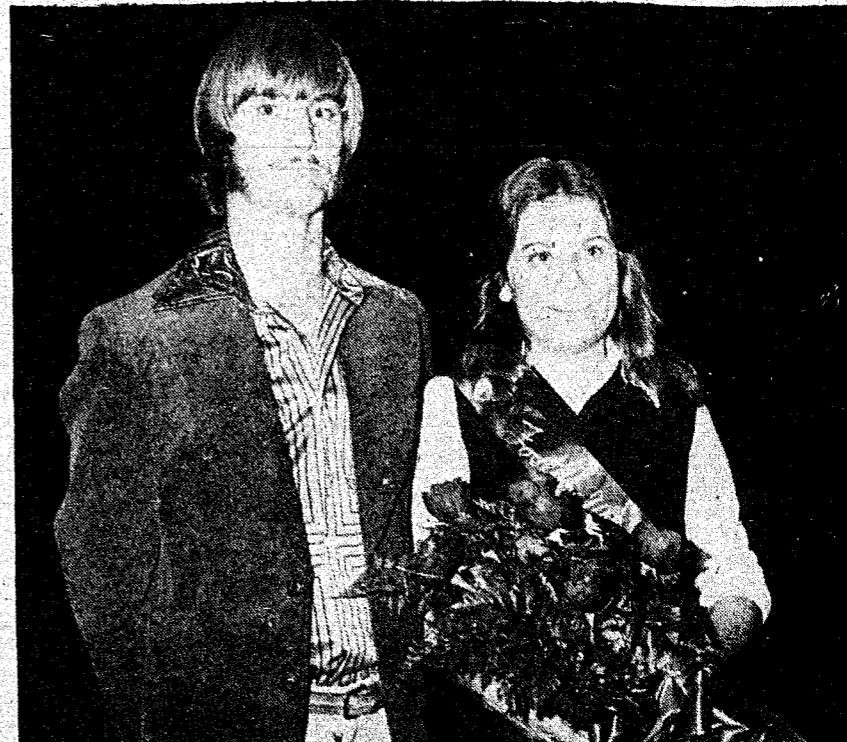
