Local Students Are Chosen For Regional Band

Two members of the Santa Anna Senior Band were chosen for the All-Region Band in tryouts at Cisco Junior College December 16.

Teresa Rolfe, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Rolfe, was chosen as second chair trumpet for the honor group; Angie Day, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clint Day, was chosen as 17th chair clarinet.

Both students are freshmen at Santa Anna High School and had the distinction as being the only students from Class B schools to qualify for the all-star group. Band students from high schools of all classifications competed for the 100-member regional group.

The first seven students for each instrument will be in competition for All-Area Band in Austin January 20. The group will also compete for All-State honors.

Games Underway at Perry Gymnasium; Teams From Seven Schools Entered

The Santa Anna Junior High basketball tournament is underway at Perry Gymnasium and will continue through Saturday. Teams from seven schools are entered in the event. The first round of play was to open Wednesday at 1 p.m. with games between the Santa Anna girls and Brookesmith. Other games Wednesday were Mezele vs the Santa Anna 'B' teams. Thursday competition gets underway at 1 p.m. with games between Lohn and Cross Plains girls 'A' team, followed by the boys' contest at 2:15. Games at 3:30 p.m. will be Talpa girls vs the Cross Plains 'B' team, and at 4:45 the Lohn boys will play

the Brownwood seventh grade team.

There will be no games Friday as high school teams will be in competition in district play, and tournament play will resume Saturday morning at 8:45 a.m. in the consolation bracket. Championship play will begin at 1:30 p.m. with the final games to be played at 7:30 for girls' championship and at 8:45 for the boys winner.

The Santa Anna athletic coaching staff is directing the tournament, with the concession stand to be open during all sessions of the tournament.

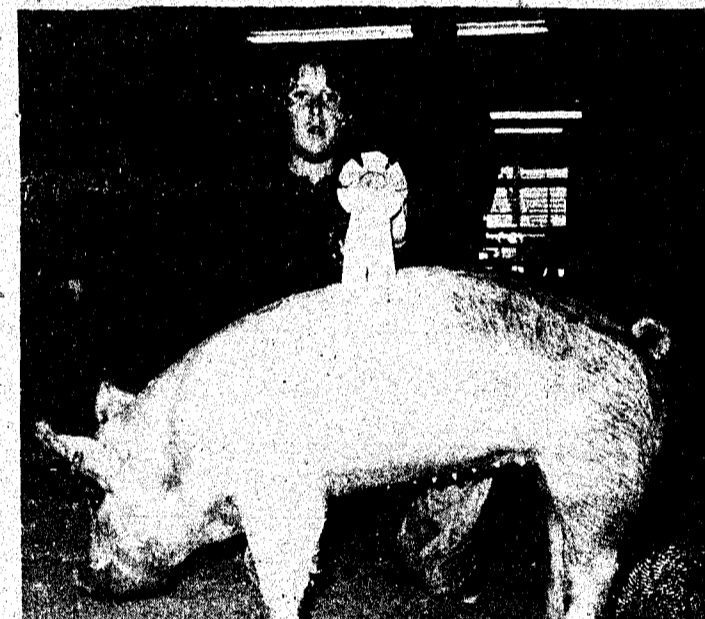
He is filling the position left vacant at the death of O. L. Cheaney.

City Council, Highway Dept. Compromise Speed Zones

A representative of the State Highway Department met with Santa Anna City Council Thursday at the regular session to propose a change in the speed zones in the city of Santa Anna. The official requested the speed zone in the downtown business district be changed from 30 miles per hour to 35 miles per hour, and that other speed zones be raised through town.

City Council members voted for the higher speeds in most areas, but declined the request for the 35 mile speed zone in the immediate downtown area.

Mayor Glen Copeland presided at the monthly session with all council members present.

A report was given on the new water project, showing the project to be nearing the construction stages. Bids for the construction have not been let at the present time.

Council members discussed a

sick leave policy for city employees and granted a 25 cent per hour wage increase, giving the city employees the minimum wage of \$2.90 per hour.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved and bills and accounts for the month approved for payment.

The next meeting of City Council will be Thursday, February 8, at 6:30 p.m. at City Hall.

Ginning Continues At S-A Co-op Gin

The Santa Anna Co-op Gin stopped ginning cotton, several days last week due to the bad weather. Ginning was expected to resume this week as several bales of cotton were on the gin lot and others expected.

Through December 31 there had been about 900 bales of cotton processed here, and several farmers in the Gouldbusk-Shields area will have more to be ginned before the season closes. The cotton is of very good quality, according to William Brown, Gin Manager, and prices this week were ranging from 50 to 55 cents per pound. Some farmers have reported as much as a bale of cotton per acre on some fields.

The harvest is larger than last year, according to Mr. Brown.

Good Season Reported By Texas Hunters

The year 1978 was a good one for the hunter and fisherman in Texas.

A better than expected deer season, higher numbers of some waterfowl and upland game birds, increased catches of non-native fish and numerous new state fish records all were of a successful year for the state's outdoorsman.

The weather started out badly, but dry early spring conditions eased with late spring and summer rains. Deer and turkey populations responded to the improved cover and forage and provided a good hunting season, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Reports from throughout the Edwards Plateau and South Texas hunting areas indicated there were plenty of deer and their body condition was generally good. Antler development was somewhat depressed because of the early spring drought.

Accurate estimates of the statewide deer and turkey harvest will be available in early 1979, but indications are that the season was a good one for both of these important game species.

Waterfowl hunters noticed a shortage of mallards and ground water during the 1978-79 season, but several species of ducks were more numerous than the previous year and the season generally a good one.

Texas anglers distinguished themselves by setting two new striped bass records during 1978. The current striper is from Lake Texoma and weighs 32 pounds, 12 ounces. Also broken was the state record for striped bass-white bass hybrids, with an 11 pound, six and one-half ounce fish caught in Lake Nasworthy near San Angelo.

before and after the casualty should be ascertained by competent, independent appraisals. You will also want to consider photographing the damaged property. Photographs of your property before it was damaged will be helpful in showing the condition and value of the property prior to the casualty.

Storm Damage Deductible In Some Cases

DALLAS--The last two days of 1978 brought destructive ice storms to much of North Central Texas. Taxpayers whose property was damaged by the storms may be able to deduct some or all of their losses on their Federal income tax return this filing period.

Losses to business property are generally deductible in full. Personal property loss deductions, however, are limited to the amount of loss exceeding \$100 for those taxpayers who elect to itemize deductions.

To claim a personal casualty loss for damage to ornamental trees and shrubs, taxpayers must establish that there has been a decrease in the total value of the real estate. In general, the amount of loss is the decrease in fair market value, limited to the adjusted basis, and reduced by any insurance or other reimbursements.

Decrease in the fair market value is the difference between the value of the property immediately before and immediately after the casualty. It is not necessarily the cost of replacing or repairing the property.

The difference between the fair market value of the property

Evidence Needed To Replace Card For S-Security

A person who needs a duplicate social security card to replace one lost or to change or correct information on his or her social security record must submit evidence of identity and evidence substantiating the change before the new card can be issued. For example, a woman who is changing her surname because of marriage should submit any evidence such as a marriage license or driver's license which shows both the previous and new names. A social security number will not be reissued if the evidence requirements are not met.

Previously, all a person had to do was submit the stub of the lost card, or the old card, and a new card could be issued on the spot. If the card was lost, it was only necessary that the individual complete an application for a duplicate card. Under recent changes, anyone who wishes to get a duplicate card must complete an application for and present evidence of his or her identity. In addition, the application must be checked against the records at social security headquarters before a new card will be issued. Since it takes three to four weeks to issue and deliver the new card after all documents have been submitted, the Social Security Office encourages anyone who has lost their card or changed their name to apply for a duplicate card as soon as possible.

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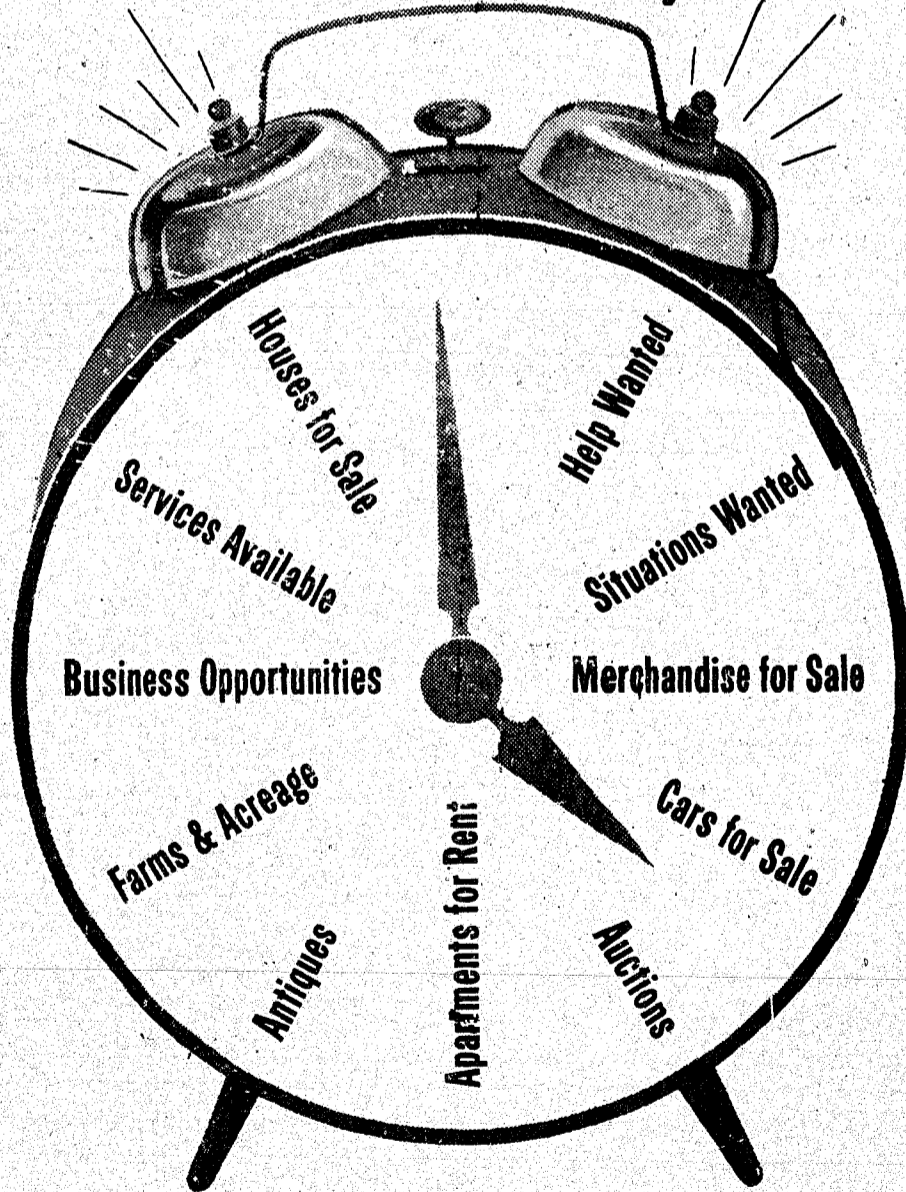

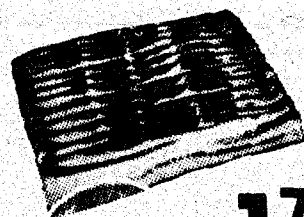
