C. David Keith, director, says the upcoming concert will be a blend of contemporary and traditional sacred music.

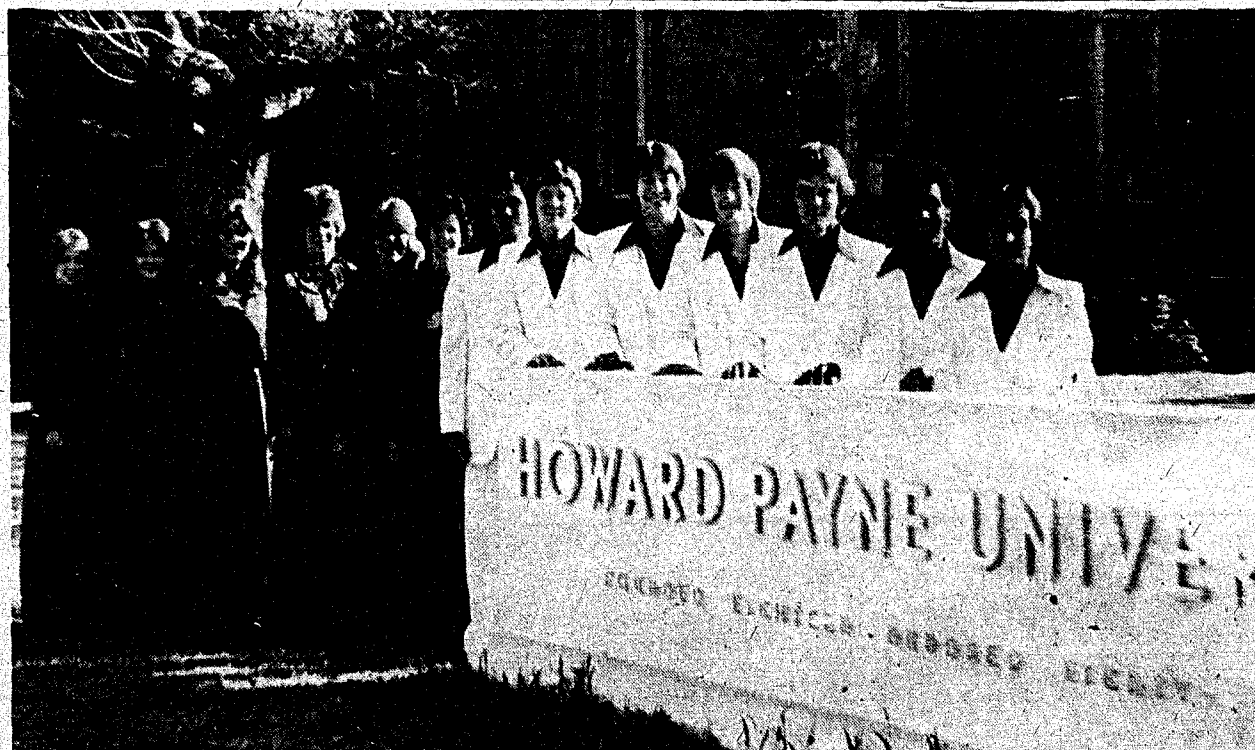

## Some Ineligible

### For Food Stamps

Primary wage-earners who quit their jobs without good cause would find their families ineligible for food stamps for two months under a proposal made recently by Assistant Secretary of Agriculture Carol Tucker Foreman.

"The proposed regulation will ensure that an able-bodied head of a household cannot quit a job in order to start receiving food stamps," Foreman said. The proposal implements a provision of the Food Stamp Act of 1977.

Foreman said that the new rule is consistent with the desire of the administration and of congress to assure that those not in need of food stamps not receive them while doing more to get stamps to the people who who are truly in need, such as the elderly and the working poor.

The proposed rule is scheduled to appear in Federal Register. Comments should be sent to Food Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. 20250. Deadline to receive comments is December 21.

## Electric Use Study Planned By West Texas Utilities

West Texas Utilities Co. within  
the next few weeks will install  
special meters and recorders for  
about 350 customers as it  
initiates a comprehensive study  
of electric usage patterns in its  
service area.

The 350 customers comprise a  
random sample chosen by  
computer from throughout the  
WTU system. Only residential  
and small commercial customers  
are included.

"These are the two classes of  
customers we know very little  
about, so far as their electric  
demand habits are concerned,"  
said Darwin Breeding, manager  
of WTU's Rate and Regulations  
Department.

Breeding emphasized that the  
information provided by the  
special recording devices will  
have no effect on the individual  
customer's electric bill, but will  
provide valuable information  
about the entire system which  
eventually could benefit all  
customers.

Probably the most important  
use of the research results will be  
in electric load analysis for  
future rate structuring. The load  
research program will provide  
accurate data for future rate  
issues as well as information to  
be utilized in the regulatory  
process. The first step in WTU's  
program will be to make personal

contact with each of the 350  
customers and to have them fill  
out questionnaires. The  
questionnaires will be  
administered by personnel from  
WTU's Customer Technical  
Services Department, headed by  
Bill Baxger. The questions will  
concern such basic facts as size  
of house, type and number of  
electrical appliances, amount of  
ceiling insulation, and number of  
persons in the family.

The special equipment then will  
be installed at the site of the old  
meter, and the information  
recorded by magnetic tapes will  
provide specific details on  
electric demand by each  
customer.

"With the information from the  
questionnaires and the accurate  
load data from the tapes, we'll  
get a better knowledge of  
our customers' electric  
use patterns," Breeding said.  
"It's possible that we can use this  
information to improve the  
utilization of our generation and  
transmission facilities, and this  
could be beneficial to all  
customers."

The initial phase of the load  
research program will last at  
least a year, and the project likely  
will continue as a permanent  
program, involving different  
types of customer samples.
