## Candidates Still Scarce For City, ISD Elections

With one day before the filing deadline, there was no candidate for Mayor of Santa Anna. Five persons had filed for a place on the City Council ballot by Tuesday, seeking the two places that will be vacated in April.

Candidates for City Council are Dale Bradley, incumbent, Bill Watson, Cynthia Hill, Dickie Horner and Pearl Wilson.

The other incumbent is Gale Brock who is not seeking re-election this year.

The term of Mayor Glen Cope-

land is expiring in April and he is not seeking re-election.

In the Trustee election for Santa Anna Independent School District, Jay Weathers, an incumbent, was the only candidate as of Tuesday, March 6. Mrs. Frank (Maymie) Taylor, who had earlier applied for a place on the ballot, requested her name be withdrawn and will not seek the post that is being vacated by Felton Martin.

Deadline for the ISD filing is also March 7.

## Rain Cancels Track Meet; Teams To Bangs This Week

The Santa Anna Invitational Track Meet was postponed last weekend as rain fell Friday morning leaving a muddy track.

The meet opened at 9 a. m. and continued until nearly noon when officials called it off. The Saturday meet for junior high teams was also cancelled.

Coach Bill Jennings, meet director, announced this week that the high school track meet has been re-scheduled Friday, March 23. A date for the Junior high events has not been set at

this time.

The Santa Anna track teams will be in Bangs this weekend with junior high teams to compete Friday and high school events Saturday. Jennings is coach of the SAHS boys team that has 26 members, and Barry Miles is coach of the girls divisions. George Fuller is coach of the boys JHS team.

The high school district contests will be held at McMurry College in Abilene April 3; the JHS district meet is set in Brownwood April 11.

Although some of the field events were completed Friday before the meet was cancelled, Jennings said the competition would start from the beginning on March 23.

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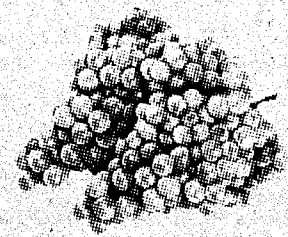
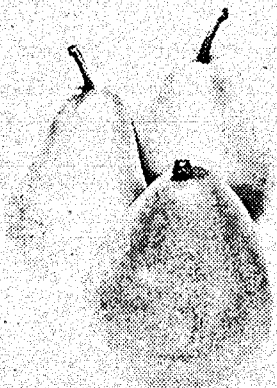
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### Response Is Good For Proposed 'Block Home' Project

## TFB Membership Week Underway This Week

Coleman County Judge W. W. Skelton has officially proclaimed the week of March 5-10, 1979, as "Farm Bureau Week". Governor Bill Clements has designated the week as a state wide observance.

During this week, the Coleman County Farm Bureau is having a membership drive with a special effort to poll opinions of members and non-members about Farm Bureau and how it can more effectively represent agriculture. The present membership totals 228,079 member families in 212 Texas counties.

The membership chairman for the Coleman County Farm Bureau is Bob Turner of Voss, according to Victor Cardinas of Coleman, county president.

The effectiveness of the state's largest agricultural organization was shown through the overwhelming victory of the Tax Relief Amendment in the Nov. 7 general election, said County President Victor Cardinas. He

said Farm Bureau is also working on other problems such as inflation, threat of export controls, foreign ownership of land, parity prices, and land-use proposals.

Part of the "Farm Bureau Week" official proclamation, signed by Judge W. W. Skelton, reads:

"An adequate supply of food and natural fibers is essential to our Nation. Many of our citizens of Coleman County are directly or indirectly dependent upon agriculture for their livelihood. All of our citizens benefit from the advancements made in the agricultural industry.

"Our farmers and ranchers have learned the value of promoting their industry through organization. Four out of five agricultural producers in the Nation are voluntary members of Farm Bureau."

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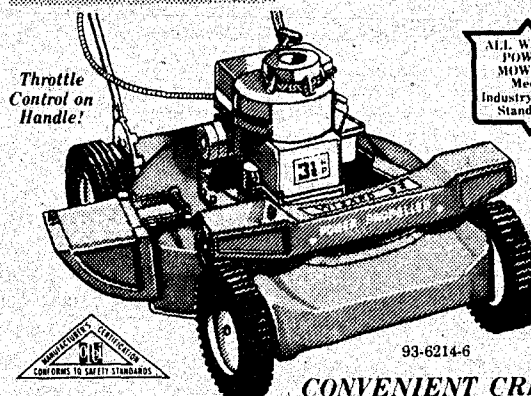


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# Whon News

## SDA Crusade Is Successful

On the very day that People's Temple leader Jim Jones and over 900 followers committed suicide in Jonestown, a successful Seventh-day Adventist evangelistic series was winding up in Georgetown, the capital of Guyana. At its completion, 226 persons were baptized into the Adventist faith.

William Scales Jr., associate ministerial secretary of the Adventist world headquarters, led the crusade. He was assisted by his father, a pastor from Portsmouth, Virginia.

They found that the Jonestown massacre had surprisingly little affect on their meetings. The Adventist meetings began on November 1 and concluded December 10. Jones and his followers died on November 18.

Each night of the seven-night-a-week meetings, there were approximately 1,000 people in attendance. After the massacre the attendance went up to 1,500 and they had to rent an additional 500 chairs.

The Guyanans did not confuse the Jones phenomenon with traditional or genuine Christianity, and as a result they were open to the crusade.

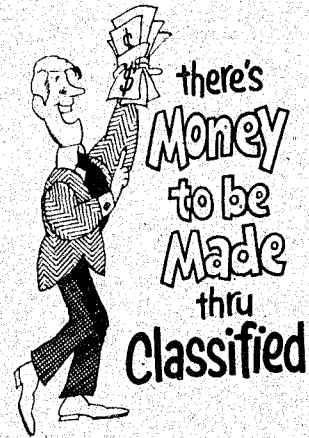

### State Opposition To Food Labeling

Coleman County farmers are urged to write the Food and Drug Administration opposing a new "substitute labeling" proposal, according to Felton Martin of Santa Anna, chairman of the Coleman County Farm Bureau Dairy Advisory Committee.

Under the FDA plan, imitation products would be allowed to be labeled as substitutes of the products they imitate, he said. For example, soybean milk could become "milk substitute," and imitation cheddar cheese could bear a label as "cheddar cheese substitute."

Mr. Martin said that Farm Bureau is opposed to such a plan. He explained that dairymen are not afraid of the competition from the new products, and ask only that they be marketed under their own product names.

Mr. Martin said that Farm labeling could cause the consumer to identify the product with the original animal food product. The fear of dairy producers is that the vegetable origin foods might be inferior, causing a dissatisfaction with all similar products. This could hurt dairy markets in many cases, he said.

What the Farm Bureau is asking is that the imitation products be allowed to enter the market under their own product names. Examples are already on the market. Margarine, Tang, and Egg Beaters are all substitutes, but marketed with a clearly recognized product name.

Mr. Martin asked all Coleman County Farm Bureau members to write the Food and Drug Administration to oppose the plan. The address is: Hearing Clerk, Food & Drug Administration, R. 4-65, 3600 Fishers Lane, Rockville, Md. 20857. The deadline for public comment is March 19.

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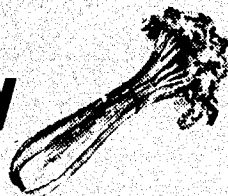
