Full Slate For Elections April 7

Hays Candidate For Mayor; Five Candidates For ISD Board

Thomas Myron Hays, a member of the City Council, filed last Wednesday for the place of Mayor of Santa Anna. He is the only candidate on the ballot for that position.

Candidates for the two places on the City Council will be Dale Bradley, incumbent, and also Bill Watson, Cynthia Hill, Dickie Horner, Pearl Wilson and Scott Patterson.

The City election will be Saturday, April 7, at City Hall. Absentee voting will be from Monday, March 19 to Tuesday, April 3.

Gale Brock, the other incumbent Councilperson, chose not to run for re-election. Also not seeking re-election is Mayor Glen

Copeland who has served one term in office.

Five candidates will be on the ballot for the School District Board of Trustees April 7, the two incumbents and three other candidates. The two candidates polling the highest number of votes will be elected for three year terms.

Felton Martin and Jay Weathers are both seeking re-election to the Board. Other candidates are Max Eubank, a former Board president, and Sammie Joe Powers, a former Board member, and Donald Strickland.

The Saturday election will be held at the Lions Club building. Election judge and clerks will be announced later. Absentee voting will start Monday and continue to April 3.

City Council Approves Utility Rate Increase

At the Thursday, March 8, City Council meeting, members of the group approved a rate increase for water and sewer services in town. The water rate minimum bill will be increased from \$5.50 to \$6.50 per month, and the sewer fee will be raised from \$2 to \$3 per month. The increase will be included in the May bill.

Glenda Cook met with the Council requesting the support of the City in a park project, and the matter was discussed and well received. The proposed park would be located just west of the school athletic stadium on land

owned by the city.

The contract of Edwin R. York was renewed for the collection of delinquent taxes. A resolution was passed concerning water purchase contract and right of way easement with a Brownwood Lake sub-division.

City Engineer Wendell Sparkman reported that 12 contractors have picked up specifications for the water project.

Plans were made for the annual City Clean-up to start March 19. City trucks will be available after that date for a period of three weeks to haul extra trash and debris from city property.

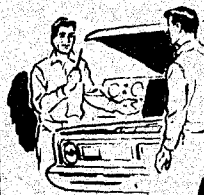

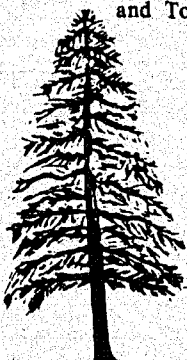

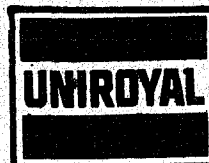

WHEREAS it is necessary for this Board to pass an order establishing the procedure for filing and conducting said trustee election:

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES of Santa Anna Independent School District:

1. That an election be held in said School District on April 7, 1979 for the purpose of electing to the Board of Trustees of said School District two trustees.

2. That all requests by candidates to have their names placed upon the ballot for the above mentioned election shall be in writing and signed by the candidate and filed with the secretary of the Board of Trustees at the superintendent's office not later than 30 days prior to the date of said election.

All candidates shall file with said application the loyalty affidavit required by Art. 6.02 of the Election Code.

The Secretary of this Board of Trustees shall post on the bulletin board in the building where the Board of Trustees meets the names of all candidates that have filed their applications in accordance with the terms and provisions of this Order, and said Secretary shall otherwise comply with the terms and provisions of Art. 13.32 of the Election Code.

3. That said election shall be held at the following place and the following persons are hereby appointed officers for said election:

(a) In election precincts numbered two at Lions Club Building in Santa Anna, Texas in said School District with Rose Bass as Presiding Judge and clerks to be selected.

The polls at the above designated polling place shall on election day be open from 7 o'clock a. m. to 7 o'clock p. m.

4. Judy Hartman is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee voting. The absentee voting for the above designated election shall be held at the School Office, Santa Anna ISD within the boundaries of the above named School District and said place of absentee voting shall remain open at least eight hours on each day for absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday or an official State holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the date of said election. Said place of voting shall remain open between the hours of 8:00 a. m. and 4:00 p. m. on each day for said absentee voting. The above described place for absentee voting is also the absentee Clerk's mailing address to which ballot applications and ballots voted by mail shall be sent.

6. The manner of holding said election shall be governed, as nearly as may be, by the Election Code of this state, and this Board of Trustees will furnish all necessary ballots and other election supplies requisite to said election.

7. Immediately after the votes have been counted, the officers holding said election shall make and deliver the returns of said election and perform all other duties as provided by the Election Code.

8. The Board of Trustees shall give notice of said election, and this combined Election Order and Notice shall serve as Notice for said election. The President of the Board of Trustees is hereby authorized and instructed to post or cause to have posted said combined Election Order and Notice at three public places where notices are customarily posted in this school district and said posting shall be made at least 20 days before the date of said election.

The President shall also cause a copy of this combined Election Order and Notice to be published one time in a newspaper of general circulation in the county where this school district is located. Said publication shall be not more than 30 days nor less than 10 days before the date of said election.

It is further found and determined that in accordance with an order of the Board of Trustees, the Secretary posted written notice of the date, place and subject of this meeting on the bulletin board located in the central administrative office of this school district, a place convenient and readily accessible to the general public, and said notice, having been so posted, remained posted for at least 72 hours preceding the scheduled time of said meeting.

It is further found and determined that in accordance with an order of the Board of Trustees, the Secretary furnished a notice of the date, place and subject of this meeting to the county clerk of Coleman County, Texas, the county in which most, if not all, of this school district's pupils reside.

The above order being read, it was moved and seconded that the same do pass. Thereupon, the question being called for, the following members of the Board voted AYE: Eddie W.
