Coal Plant Under Construction

Lubbock Firm Constructing Cleaning Plant; Strip Mining To Start This Summer

Joe Williams, president of Texas Architectural Aggregates, Inc. of San Saba, was guest speaker at the Lions Club Tuesday, outlining the plans and processes for the mining and distributing of coal from the Rockwood Coal Mine.

Mr. Williams reported the foundation of the coal cleaning plant is laid, and much of the

equipment on the site. The plant is to be in operation by October 1, with mining of the coal expected to start in August or September.

Kaiser Cement Co.'s Longhorn plant in San Antonio will be the initial purchaser of the coal mined southwest of the town of Rockwood. Mr. Williams stated that other markets for the coal will be sought if production exceeds that

needed by the San Antonio plant.

An estimate of 200,000,000 tons of coal are available in and around the Rockwood site, giving a 20 to 30 year supply for the cement plant. The coal is in a strata of 20 to 30 inches in depth and approximately 20 feet below the surface at the actual plant site.

A staff of 20 employees is expected to staff the plant when it starts operation. As many as 140 should be employed there when in full operation, making quite an impact on the local economy.

Brown McKee of Lubbock is contractor for the plant facility.

S.A. Woman To Be Honored At State DKG Convention

Mrs. C. D. Bruce of Santa Anna will be one of two women honored this weekend in San Antonio at the State Delta Kappa Gamma convention as honorary members. Mrs. Bruce and the Coleman County chapter president, Mrs. Don Starnes, will attend the meeting June 7 through 10 at the San Antonio Convention Center.

Being named state honorary member is recognition to women not eligible for active membership, who have rendered notable service of at least statewide significance to education or to women. Mrs. Bruce has been an honorary member of the Delta Alpha Chapter for some 20 years and was nominated by that group for the state honor.

In the data supplied to the state committee by the local chapter with Mrs. C. F. Blanton as chairman, mention was given the services of Mrs. Bruce to local and area groups. These include heading the Edwards Plateau Historical Society, the Coleman Historical Commission and the West Texas Historical Association. She also holds membership in the Texas Historical Association and is author of five books on county and area history.

Mrs. Bruce, a Santa Anna native and former school teacher, has studied many subjects, but history and archaeology have been her first interest. She has visited pre-historic sites from Mesa Verde, Colorado to Chichen Itza in the Yucatan.

Two of the daughters of Mrs. Bruce are teachers and are members of Delta Kappa Gamma, Mrs. Tom (Margaret) Robin of Houston and Mrs. Jack (Evelyn) Kingsbery of Crystal City.

The presentation as honorary member of the year will be made at a luncheon Friday, June 8.

Leaday Community To Disappear? Out of Town Folks Here For Funeral Of Virgie Brown

Homes, Landmarks To Be Inundated By Proposed Stacy Dam and Reservoir

Don't let the high price of gas keep you from driving to Leaday on your next day off. The most interesting part of Coleman County was the homes of the pioneer ranchers in our area, who established homes and raised large families there.

The Leaday Post Office is all that is left of the town that at one time had several residences, a blacksmith shop, barber shop, two gins, a hotel, three gas stations, and a two-teacher school. It still has an active Baptist Church.

The land was originally owned by Col. Day, who was killed in a cattle roundup. His widow later married a Mr. Lea. She sent in an application for the post office in 1902, to be called Day Lea, which was changed to Leaday.

James Stephenson has been postmaster for some 20 years. He was raised there and has lived the past 25 years on the Colorado River three miles south of Leaday.

The Leaday Post Office has 18 rent boxes and 12 on the route. Truman Pepper carries the mail

each morning to Voss. The Postmaster's mother, Mrs. Ike Stephenson, has the only home left in Leaday, near the Post Office, where she has lived many years and raised a family of four sons and two daughters. The house will be under some 12 feet of water when the proposed dam is built.

Visiting with Elmo Hudson, who came for his mail, he said he has been foreman of the Day Ranch for some 32 years, living at the Day Ranch Headquarters one mile south of Leaday.

Shirley Stephenson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Stephenson, attends school at Mozelle. After the Leaday school was discontinued, they attended Voss school before consolidation with Mozelle in 1935.

The proposed Stacy Dam will back water as far as 12-Mile Bridge at Bethel in Concho County, causing many families on both sides of the River to be relocated and cover many thousands of acres of ranch and farm land.

The Leaday Cemetery will be surrounded by water, but not

covered, if present plans are followed.

The Gann Cemetery, on the bank of the River in Concho County, will be moved. These are the family of Mrs. Ike Stephenson, the seventh child in a family of ten children.

Family members buried in the cemetery are the following: W. O. Gann, born Feb. 24, 1852, died Jan. 10, 1913 (marker a tall shaft, WOW); Alice A. Murray, born November 13, 1891, died October 19, 1978; and George P. Murray, born January 22, 1886, died November 16, 1973.






