City of Santa Anna Facing Law Suit

Four Local Landowners File Suit To Halt Sewage Disposal in Creek

The City of Santa Anna is facing a civil suit by four community residents concerning the operation of the City sewage treatment plant and for alleged violation of the Federal Pollution Control Act of 1972.

Tom and Mary Starnes, Carl and Velma Benton, landowners on the Horse Creek watershed below the city facility, have filed suit in the U. S. District Court seeking preliminary injunction restraining the city from discharging sewage and municipal waste into Horse Creek or any

tributary and from otherwise violating the Act and the terms of the State and Federal permits.

They also seek a trial on whether the city is in violation of the Pollution Control Act, for damages, costs of litigation, attorneys' fees, expert witness fees and for a civil penalty of up to \$10,000 per day to be imposed on the city per violation.

In a called meeting of City Council Monday afternoon, Mayor Thomas Hays and Coun-

cil members reviewed permits held by the City of Santa Anna that allow affluent from the city sewage system to be released, and were shown documents on file that indicate the City of Santa Anna has complied with all requirements for periodical release of wastewater into Horse Creek.

According to City Superintendent Darwin Lovelady, the city system, built in 1966 to serve the town of up to 1,600 population, is composed of an Imhoff tank, oxydation ponds, holding tanks and finally irrigation on the Dr. J. P. Jones farm that adjoins the plant located a mile southwest of Santa Anna.

Wise has conducted educational programs in sheep, swine, beef cattle, cotton, sorghum, and peanut production. This was accomplished through a close working relationship with the Program Building Committees in the three counties he has served. The city is operating the system under a permit issued by the U. S. Environmental Protection Agency that is in effect through November 3, 1979. City officials indicated they have complied with State regulations by notifying the Texas Department of Water Resources each time a discharge is made downstream. Analysis results from samples of the discharge, tested by a San Angelo laboratory, have been sent to the State agency each time and to date there has been no complaint from the agency.

In their suit against the city, the plaintiffs charge the discharge from the city facility is hazardous to human health and safety, undermines the value of their property and has interfered with their enjoyment of their properties.

The suit further alleges the discharge from the plant has resulted in a noxious stench along the watercourse that interferes with the recreational and residential use.

Listed specifically in the suit

are unauthorized discharges in February and March of this year. The Benton property adjoins the Jones farm, and the Starnes property is further downstream.

Representing the two couples in the suit is Bernard D. Newsom Jr. of Booth, Lloyd and Simmons of Austin.

They contend raw sewage is released from the plant and the city does not have a permit for wastewater release. They protested the city's application for unlimited release of wastewater in a hearing in Abilene in January by the Water Resources agency and feel the current suit is the only way to stop the practice.

In action Monday afternoon, Council members passed unanimously a resolution to add a surcharge of \$4.00 per month to city water bills to cover expense of hiring an attorney and defending the city in the suit. The charge will take effect immediately, with all unused money to be refunded to residents when the suit is settled.

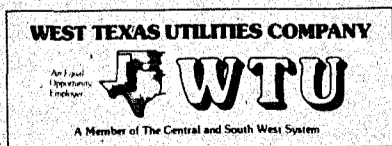
Other rainfall for August at the official gauge includes .35 inch on August 1 and .10 inch August 2.

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Oil and Gas Production Adds To County Economy

The sale of crude oil and natural gas from Coleman County wells in 1978 boosted the county economy and accounted for \$17.1 million of the \$17.1 billion value placed on Texas production last year, according

to Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

In a report on the economic impact of oil and gas industry operations in the top producing counties of Texas, the Dallas-based association said the

county ranked 133rd among the 202 counties having marketed production valued at \$100,000 or more, not including the sale of natural gas liquids.

The county's wells produced 901,000 barrels of crude oil,

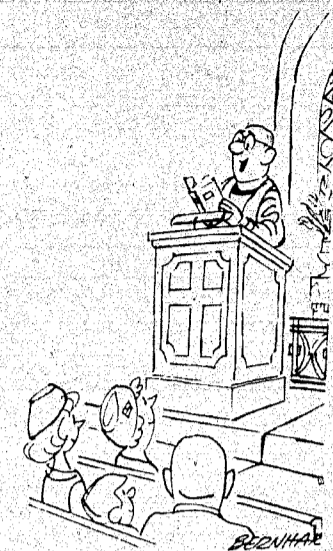
valued at \$8.4 million, and 8.6 million Mcfs of natural gas, valued at \$8.7 million. Owners of royalty in the county received \$2.1 million as their share of the output, the Association said.

"Considering the shortfall in total U. S. production relative to our nation's energy needs, production from every Texas county is more vitally important today than ever before," said the Association's president, H. B. (Hank) Harkins of Alice, an independent producer and drilling contractor.

In addition to paying local, county and state property taxes, producers in the county also supported state government through production tax payments estimated at \$1 million, according to the Association. Crude oil taxes amounted to \$386,000, while natural gas levies totalled \$652,000.

Based on Texas Employment Commission figures, some 132 oil and gas industry employees in the county received wages of about \$1 million in 1978.

In the search for new petroleum reserves in the

county, oil and gas operators spent a reported \$17.5 million in the drilling of 258 wells, including 32 wildcat, or exploratory wells. This effort resulted in the completion of 115 oil wells and 45 gas wells, although some \$4.4 million was lost in the drilling of 98 dry holes.

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Nimitz Center Receives Holt's WWII Collection

The collections of the late Roy D. Holt Jr. of Kingsland, made during two decades of service as a hospital corpsman in the U. S. Navy, have been given in his memory by his parents to the Admiral Nimitz Center in Fredericksburg. Also, Mr. and Mrs. R. D. Holt Sr. of Copperas Cove made a contribution to the Admiral Nimitz Foundation as a memorial to their son. Roy Jr. remembered Fleet Admiral Nimitz from occasions when they were together at Oak Knoll Naval Hospital in Oakland, California. The admiral was known for his interest in people and for never forgetting a name. It was his request that the state

museum in his birthplace be dedicated to all who served with him.

Roy Holt collected memorabilia of all kinds including books, military insignia and photographs. During 20 years of his Navy duty he served on 17 ships and saw duty with the First and Third Marine Divisions in Korea and Vietnam. His books and photographs will be placed in the research library of the Admiral Nimitz Center while the military insignia will be used in museum exhibits.

The gift will be recorded permanently in the Memorial Book of the Center, located in the Nimitz Steamboat Hotel on Fredericksburg's Main Street. During the time that the old hotel is being restored to its original appearance, it is open daily as are the Japanese Garden of Peace and the history Walk of the Pacific War. Many residents of the surrounding communities, unable to take long vacations, are finding many things of interest in Fredericksburg and in the LBJ State and National Parks at Stonewall, and no shortage of gasoline.

Holt is the grandson of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Pearce of Santa Anna and lived much of his life in Coleman County.

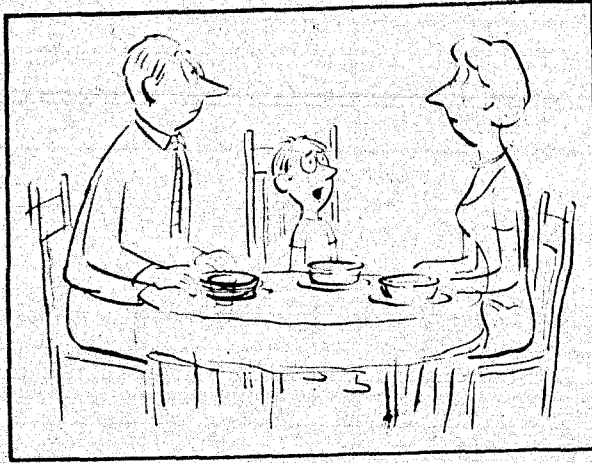

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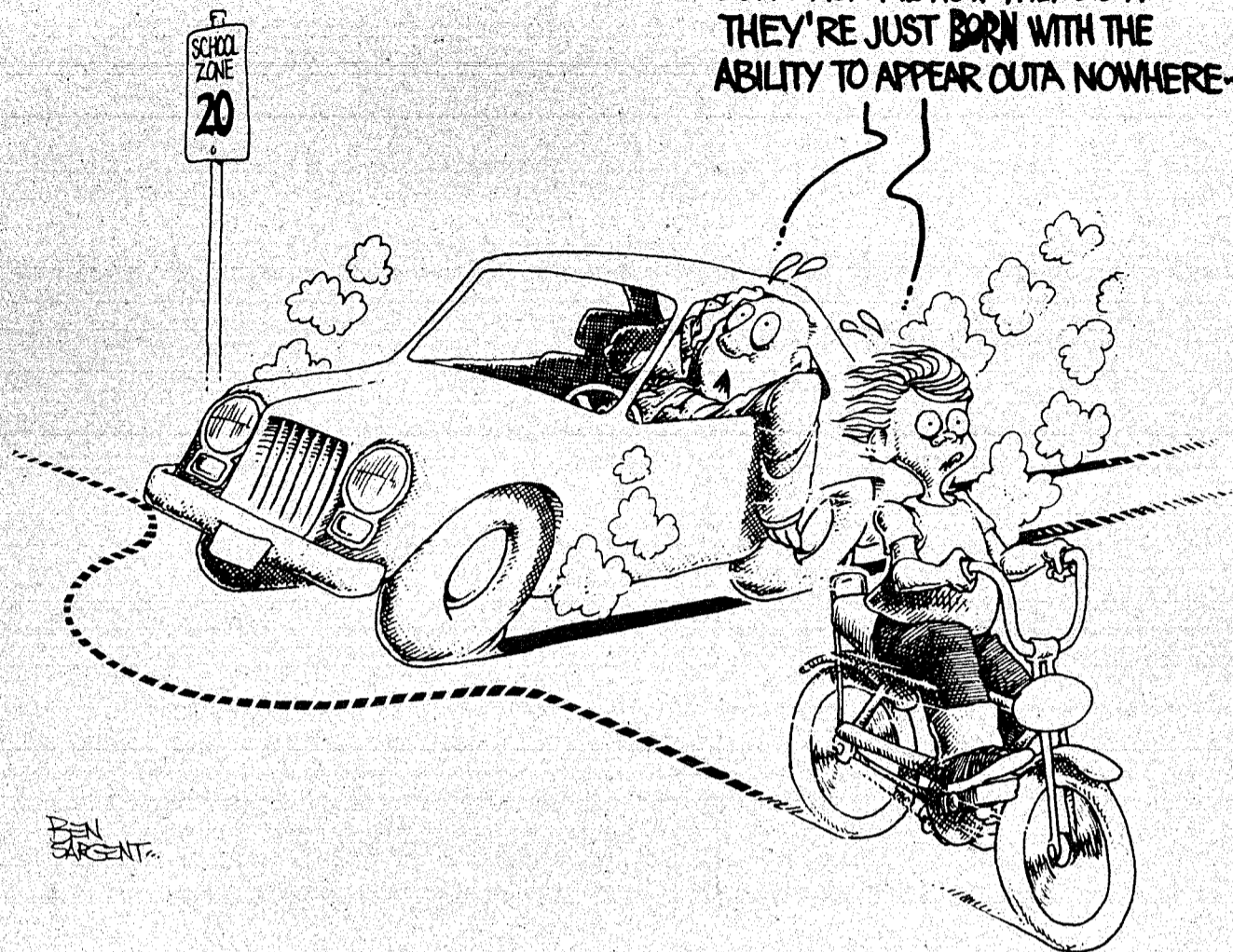

AUGUST — TIME WILL BE WELL SPENT

Some people have suggested that the Congress should forgo its annual August recess. These people argue that Congress should stay in Washington and work on energy legislation.

This question was put before both the House and the Senate, and each voted to proceed as planned and not be in session during August. This was, I believe, the correct move.

No one doubts that we have many pressing problems. The economy and energy, of course, head the list. There is danger, though, in passing legislation in a crisis atmosphere. Too many bad laws have been passed because Congress felt under pressure to do something — anything, but something.

This mood has been building in Congress in recent weeks. Sessions get longer and longer. More and more amendments are proposed. There is not enough time to give each serious consideration. Some amendments appear to be offered simply because certain Congressmen feel that they are called upon to offer something. Many of these amendments are not thoroughly thought out.

They sound good, but have many weak spots, and there is danger they could get passed.

Congress needs to take a break, step back, see what it has done and take some time to think — time to really study ideas and to devise plans that will accomplish our goals.

Also, in recent weeks with the heavy workload, Congressmen have spent too much time talking just to Congressmen. We all need to get out of Washington, away from each other, and visit with the people we represent. We need the input of the people back home. We need their ideas, their views on what has been done. We need to see the effects of the energy crunch and inflation in our own home districts.

This is what I plan to do. First, I will take a few days to spend with my family. Then I will be traveling throughout the 11th Congressional District. There will be some formal meetings, many informal meetings and quite a few hours visiting with people over coffee, in stores and along the streets of our Central Texas communities.

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Rural Energy Initiatives Announced

Energy initiatives aimed at helping small towns and rural areas cope with future energy problems through 1981 were recently announced by President Carter.

Federal funds totaling \$300 million will help renovate 100 small-scale hydroelectric projects across the country, says Jack L. Jones with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. The projects would generate about 300 megawatts of power. Eight federal agencies are involved in this Department of Energy program.

Nearly \$11 million will enable construction of 100 small gasohol (alcohol used for transportation fuel) plants, adds the community development specialist.

The Department of Energy and the Economic Development Administration will allocate \$1.25 million in grants to help about 20 economic development districts. The districts will plan integrated economic development and energy programs, giving special attention to alternative sources of energy, such as hydropower and wood-fired power generators, notes Jones.

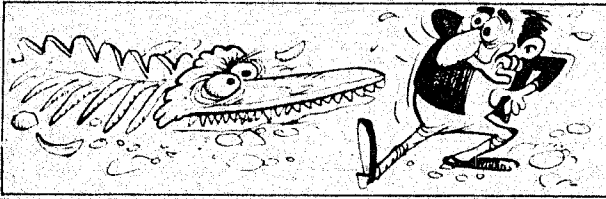

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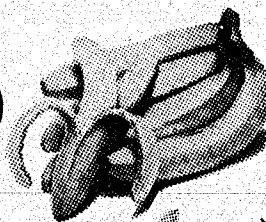
