## Mountaineers Lose To Bangs

Dragons Take Season Opener 27 - 6;

Santa Anna To Meet Baird Bears Friday

The Santa Anna Mountaineers lost their first game of the season to the Bangs Dragons Friday night, the final tally being 27 - 6.

The first half of play was a defensive battle with neither

team scoring during the first two periods. The Dragons came alive in the third stanza, scoring two touchdowns and a two-point conversion. Two more TDs and a PAT on the last one gave the Dragons their 27 points.

Santa Anna's only score was in the fourth quarter when Jerry Don Culpepper pounded over from the Dragon two yard line. The PAT failed.

The Dragons led in statistics with 16 first downs to Santa Anna's 8. They led 208 to 123 in yards rushing, and 88 to 49 in passing yardage.

Coach Roger Goodwin cited the many mistakes of the team

as the cause of the defeat, but praised the boys on their effort and hard playing.

Steve Chance was termed the most valuable defensive player in the Friday night game.

Mike Salazar, a junior back, was injured in the game, suffering a minor concussion and neck bruises. He is expected to see limited play this week, according to Coach Goodwin.

The mountaineers will be in Baird for an 8 p.m. game this week. The Bears defeated Merkel last week and are a strong Class A team in this area.

Jerry Don Culpepper and Robert Barton are team captains this year. Joining them as game captains Friday night will be Duane Warnock and Curtis Fellers.

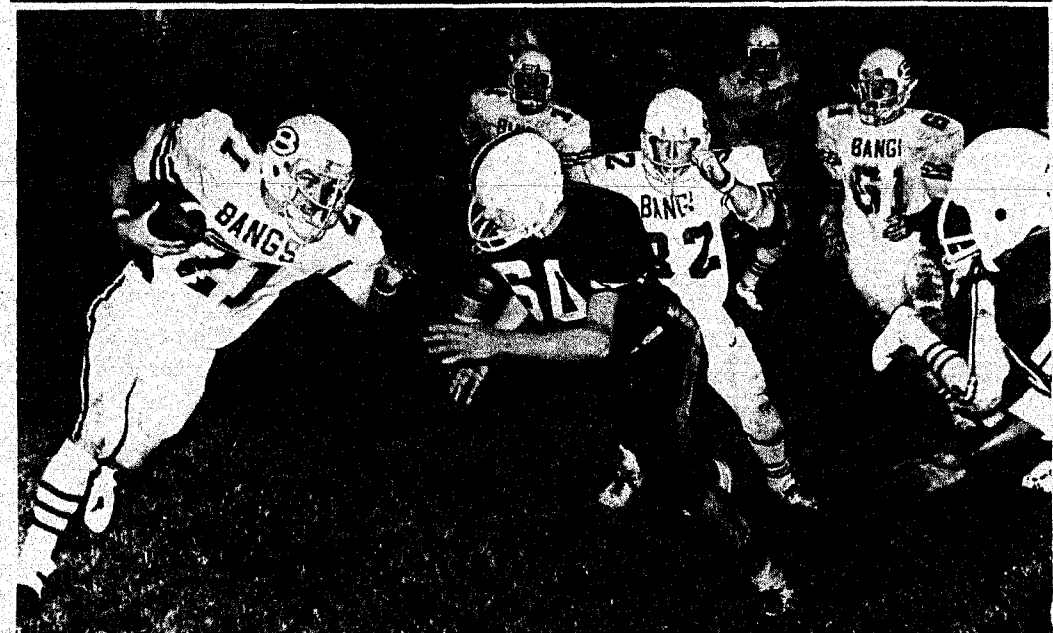
Quinton Daniel, Mayor Pro-tem, led the monthly session in

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# Suicide Ruled In Death At Colorado River

Apparent suicide was ruled in the death of a 46-year-old Lohn woman whose body was found in the Colorado River last Wednesday.

Bettie Margaret Smith was found by a road construction crew working on U. S. Highway 283 south of Rockwood at 5 p.m. Wednesday. The crew was placing a pump in the river when they spotted the body floating next to the bank beside the bridge.

McCulloch County sheriff's officers were notified and dispatched to the scene. The body was taken to Wilkerson Funeral Home in Brady where services were held last weekend. An apparent bullet wound in the temple was found.

McCulloch County Deputy John King stated that the woman apparently shot herself and fell into the river. A car belonging to Mrs. Smith was spotted near the bridge the previous day, officials said.

Etoile Cozart of Brownwood was on his farm several times during the week, checking on his cattle and the farm here.

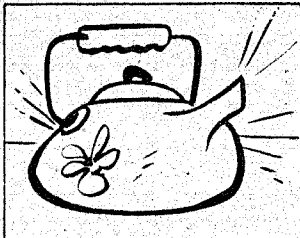

Diane Wetsel and Ben Hill are sponsors of the class that has 16 members.



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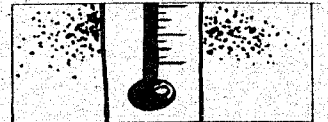

## Lake Fees For Winter Season Are Announced

The Fort Worth District, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers will start its Winter Season User Fee Collection Program on Tuesday, September 4, 1979, and will continue to May 1980, District Engineer, Colonel Donald J. Palladino, said today. Collection of Fees are required under Public Law 93-303.

Where economically feasible, fee collection is required under the law at all Federal campgrounds providing tent or trailer spaces, drinking water, sanitary facilities, access roads, reasonable visitor protection, and other facilities. Electrical hookups for campers are available in most of the winter fee parks. Electrical hookups in non-fee parks will be turned off on September 4, 1979, for the duration of the winter.

The fees range from \$1 to \$3 per day at designated campsites. Fees of fifty cents per day will be collected for use of electric outlets at the Corps of Engineers fee areas. The Corps of Engineers will provide several free camping areas without electrical hookups at each Corps of Engineers lake.

Holders of the "Golden Age" passport issued to Senior Citizens will receive 50 percent reduction on camping electrical hookup fees at all Corps of Engineers operated fee recreation areas.

The Fort Worth District will charge at 30 parks through the winter season, and these parks will be on a year-round fee basis. Included in the group is Hords Creek Lake near Coleman where fees are \$2 for basic family camping and \$2.50 with electric hookup.

## Mid-life women

AUSTIN, Texas (Spl.) — Goallessness often haunts women in their middle years, says a University of Texas professor of social work.

Dr. Martha Williams explains that when the demands of homes and families begin to slacken, women at mid-life find themselves without long-term goals to work toward. The danger of such goallessness, she says, is that it brings on a sense of floundering and depression.

Dr. Williams advises women to fight goallessness by engaging in activities that strike a balance between their physical, emotional and intellectual needs. But she cautions: Don't strive to be perfect, for perfectionism can lead to depression.

**PROPOSITION NO. 1**  
**ON THE BALLOT**  
 (H.J.R. 108)

House Joint Resolution 108 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution relating to the appointment and terms of notaries public. The proposed amendment would:

- Require the Secretary of State to appoint a convenient number of Notaries Public for the state; and
- Authorize terms of office of Notaries Public of not less than two years nor more than four years.

A temporary provision of the proposed constitutional amendment provides that the amendment would take effect January 1, 1980; that each person who was appointed a notary public before January 1, 1980, would continue to serve as a notary public for the term for which the person was appointed; and that this temporary provision would expire January 1, 1982.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for the appointment of notaries public for the state and for a term of not less than two years nor more than four years as provided by law."

**PROPOSITION NO. 2**  
**ON THE BALLOT**  
 (H.J.R. 133)

House Joint Resolution 133 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to enact laws:

- To provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department;
- To prescribe conditions for rules to take effect;
- To provide for suspension, repeal, or expiration of rules;
- To prescribe procedures; and
- To delegate powers to either or both houses or to committees of either or both houses.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for legislative review of

the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department."

**PROPOSITION NO. 3**  
**ON THE BALLOT**  
 (S.J.R. 13)

Senate Joint Resolution 13 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans used to purchase farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to provide for, issue, and sell general obligation bonds called "Farm and Ranch Loan Security Bonds" of the State of Texas not to exceed 10 million dollars. All money received from the sale of such bonds would be deposited in a separate fund with the State Treasurer and administered by the commissioner of agriculture without further appropriations. These funds would be used to guarantee loans for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate. The commissioner of agriculture would use these funds, under provisions to be prescribed by the Legislature for the purpose of guaranteeing loans used for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate, to acquire real estate mortgages or deeds of trust on lands purchased with guaranteed loans. These funds would also be used to advance to the borrower a percentage of the principal and interest due. The Legislature may also authorize the commissioner of agriculture to sell at foreclosure any land acquired in the manner authorized by this amendment. The commissioner of agriculture would be required to charge at least 6 percent interest on such loans. The proposed amendment appropriates an amount that is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the bonds that mature or become due during the fiscal year less the amount in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans for purchase of farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers by the sale of general obligation bonds of the State of Texas."

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# Fall Hunting Season Expected To Be Good

Officials of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department believe the 1979-80 hunting season will be especially good for pronghorn antelope, white-tailed deer, turkey, quail and possibly doves.

As always, weather conditions are the key factor in wildlife populations, and 1979 has seen some unusual weather. In general the wet spring and summer over most of the state was a big plus for wildlife.

Prospective hunters are reminded to have a current hunting license and other required items such as federal waterfowl and white-winged dove stamps. Check the department's free Guide to 1979-80 Hunting, Fishing and Trapping Regulations booklet available where hunting licenses are sold to determine regulations in all Texas counties.

Here is a general wrap-up of hunting prospects and hunting season dates for the more popular game species:

### MOURNING DOVE

The North Zone split mourning dove season is Sept. 1 - Oct. 21 and Jan 5-13. The South Zone seasons are Sept. 22 - Nov. 4 and Jan. 5-20. However, in counties along the Rio Grande which have white-winged dove hunting, the fall segment of the South Zone will end Oct. 31. The mourning dove situation is somewhat encouraging, with a good carry-over of birds which nested and wintered in Texas during the past year, according to Jim Dunks, dove program leader. Surveys showed the breeding population to be about 10 percent over last year, and reports from states to the north indicate generally good populations. How long the migrating birds remain in Texas during the seasons will depend on the

weather and available food, Dunks said.

### QUAIL

Over most of the western half of the state, the quail season in regulatory counties is Oct. 27 - Feb. 3. With some exceptions, the rest of the state has a Nov. 17 - Feb. 17 season.

Of all the game species, quail may be the most subject to boom or bust conditions due to the weather. Thanks to widespread rains during the critical spring nesting months, biologists are expecting a good to outstanding crop of birds in most areas of the state this fall. In fact, the Parks and Wildlife Commission has deferred setting quail bag limits until after August census line counts are completed, with the possibility of raising bag and possession limits where an inordinate surplus is found.

### DEER

The deer situation looks bright, both in terms of numbers and condition. A wet winter and early spring provided ample cover and forage, and over most of the state habitat conditions have continued favorable in the summer.

In regulatory counties throughout most of the central portion of the state, the white-tailed deer season is Nov. 17 - Jan. 1. Seasons are opened prior to the gun season in most counties for archery.

### TURKEY

Turkey populations look excellent over most of the state, with the exception of the western portion of the Edwards Plateau which failed to get its share of spring and summer rains. However, moisture came at just the right time for good turkey hatches in North Texas, the Panhandle and South Texas, and

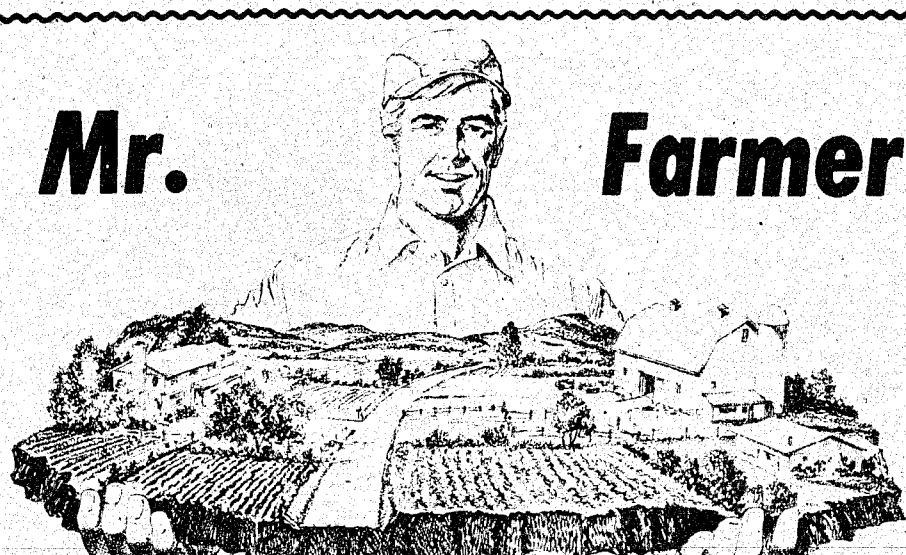

## Early Retirement Benefits Outlined by Social Security

A question that has been coming up frequently these days concerns what effect retirement before age 62 or 65 has on a person's future social security retirement payment, Priscilla Tercero, social security manager in Brownwood, said recently.

This increased interest seems to stem from the greater number of people who retire from private industry well before the age at which social security benefits can be paid. In some cases, people can retire as early as 55.

It's difficult to tell exactly how

early retirement will affect payments in specific cases unless all the facts are known, including a person's annual earning for each year since 1950.

In figuring a person's benefit, 5 years of the lowest earnings since 1950 can be disregarded. In most cases, these "Dropout" years are from the early 1950's when average earnings were much lower than they are now. Earnings for the remaining years, after adjustment for increases in wages over the years, are averaged and the

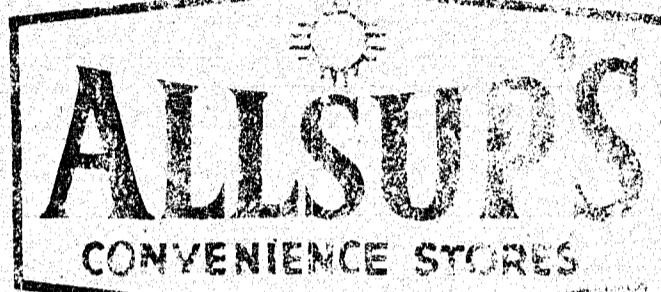
benefit rate is figured from this average.

If a person retires from work covered by social security at 55, 7 years before age 62, then, not only must lower earnings from the past be included, but 2 years of zero earnings be figured in.

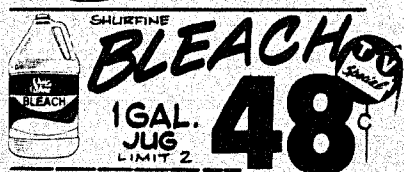
