ISD Tax Board Meeting Slated Next Wednesday

The Santa Anna Independent School District Tax Board of Equalization will be in session at the school business office Wednesday, August 15, from 2 to 5 p.m. Property owners in the school district who have questions concerning taxation of their property are invited to meet with the group.

The assessment ratio on property in the district has been changed from 40 percent of market value to 100 percent, but the tax rate has been lowered from \$2.05 to 82 cents per one hundred dollar valuation, so the

City Of Austin Opposes Construction Of Stacy Dam

The City of Austin has filed suit to stop construction of the \$60 million Stacy Dam on the Colorado River in south Coleman County.

The city contends the Texas Water Commission exceeded its authority in granting permission for the Colorado River Municipal Water District to build the dam and reservoir.

The Lower Colorado River Authority filed a similar suit July 21.

No hearing date has been set on either suit in state district court.

Proponents of the dam contend it is needed to ensure an adequate water supply in West Texas. Opponents claim it will harm Central Texas residents and reduce drastically the water supply for the Highland Lakes along the Colorado River and city of Austin.

School District as property is valued under the new ratio at an average of \$60 per acre, several times less than a real market price of property. There are three classes of rural property, farmland, valued at \$73 per acre; improved pasture at \$64; and native pastureland valued at \$32 per acre. Taxes in the Santa Anna ISD are an average of 51 cents per acre a year.

Among other regulations to take effect in 1982 will be taxation based on productivity of the land, which in some cases will lower the taxes in this district.

Trees help cool hot summer months

COLLEGE STATION — One of the best ways to cut air-conditioning costs in the hot summer months is with nature's own cooling system, says a Texas A&M University scientist.

In a research project examining low-cost energy-saving techniques, forest science Professor Dr. Robert Dewar points out that the proper positioning of shade trees can substantially reduce power consumption by air-conditioners.

Because air-conditioning accounts for more than 19 percent of all residential energy use in Texas — compared with the national average of 6.4 percent — Dewar advises homeowners to plant more trees and protect the ones that are already there.

Alabama College Recognized By S-Anna Adventists

Oakwood College in Huntsville, Alabama—the nation's only black Seventh-day Adventist institution of higher learning—will receive the attention of the Santa Anna Adventist church services this Saturday.

Oakwood has been training leaders since 1894. Graduates have filled Adventist leadership positions from vice-president of the international church to the local church, hospital, and educational level. The treasurer of the Southwestern Union, of which the local church is a part is Elder V.L. Roberts, member of one of the black churches.

Prominent persons who have attended Oakwood include "Little Richard" Penniman, the

black entertainer who is now a lay evangelist.

The local Adventist church will take up an offering to advance the work of this college at Sabbath services this Saturday morning. With a student body of more than 1,000, Oakwood is fully accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools and approved by the Seventh-day Adventist Board of Regents in Washington, D.C. in 1964, the college became a member of the United College Fund.

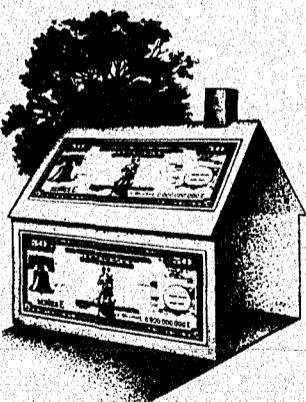

Interest Rates Change On SBA Disaster Loans

Interest rates on Small Business Administration Disaster Loans have been changed by enactment of Public Law 96-38, according to A. Vernon Weaver, SBA Administrator.

The Legislation, which was signed into law by President Carter last week, applies to SBA disaster loans which have been approved as a result of disasters occurring on or after October 1, 1978.

These are the two major changes:

1. Interest rates on the first \$55,000 of SBA primary residence and personal property disaster loans are lowered to 3 percent from 7-3/8 percent, except for any refinancing. In the case of refinancing, the interest will remain at 7-3/8 percent.

2. Interest rates on SBA Business disaster loans where credit is not obtainable from private sources and where refinancing is not involved are lowered to 5 percent from 7-3/8 percent. Interest rates on business disaster loans which in SBA's judgment are obtainable from non Federal credit sources remain at 7-3/8 percent.

Because of the retroactive feature of the law, SBA officials

will review, on a case-by-case basis, loans already made. Administrator Weaver said the reviews will be made as expeditiously as possible. The new law provides about \$1 billion in new disaster funds.

SBA disaster loans are available in areas declared to be disaster areas by either the President or the SBA Administrator. The loans may be used, within certain limits, to repair or replace damaged or destroyed property not covered by insurance.

Physical damage disaster loans on homes are limited to \$50,000. Loans on non-insured personal property losses are limited to \$10,000. A combination home-personal property loan is limited to \$55,000. Refinancing of existing mortgages is also available in certain circumstances of severe damage, to a maximum of \$50,000.

In general, business loans are limited to \$500,000.

Under the new law the SBA interest rate for non-business organizations will continue 7-3/8 percent. These loans do not require a test to see if credit is available through the private sector.

The 7-3/8 rate is tied to the

THE FREE MARKET

There has been a great deal of talk recently about confidence in government. Surveys show that people no longer have faith in our future — they are disillusioned, frustrated and uncertain. Our people turn to their government for leadership, but somehow the response they have received from government has been so wrong so often that we find a vast confidence gap.

As a private citizen, I wondered so often where we had gone wrong and what had caused our system to falter so helplessly. Like so many others, the thrust of government policy and the illogical absurdity of government regulations and programs left me with a sense of desperation. Now as a Member of Congress, after observing countless hours of debate on hundreds of issues, the reason for our imminent demise as the world's strongest nation is growing frightfully clear.

Absolutely no decision can be made in our government today, no matter what it concerns, that is not drastically influenced by totally unrealistic social politics and the completely absurd assumption that everything and everybody must be guaranteed, by law, success, security and the ability to have everything everybody else has — whether they deserve it or not. We have seen a legitimate concern for rights of many of our people turned into a circus of rights for criminals, homosexuals, snail darters, coyotes and consumers.

Obviously, we, the people, should take care of those who are old, sick, handicapped, or otherwise

inadvertently deprived. It is our obligation and their right in a compassionate, free society. There is, however, a vast difference between the social responsibility of government and economic necessity. The socio-economic politicians have never learned that in order to finance needed social concerns you must have a viable free economy. They totally fail to understand that as they destroy our ability to produce, and as they destroy capital accumulation, they kill the goose with the golden egg. Consumers don't need protection by the federal government — the free market is the **only** thing that will protect consumers. The free market will reward those who work and punish those who are lazy. Only in the free market is there opportunity. Only in a free market can true economic freedom be available, and history has proven that economic freedom is the basis of all freedom.

You cannot wipe out poverty with a law — you do it with work and proper incentive in a free economy. You cannot eliminate failure by law — you do it with individual incentive and determination. You don't solve the energy crisis with more welfare and more taxes — you do it with technology and capital. You don't halt inflation by printing more worthless money — you solve it with increased production and less waste.

As the great football coach, Darrell Royal, once said when asked who would start a particular Cotton Bowl game, "We will dance with them that bring us." Free enterprise brought us — we need to dance with her again.

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Law Changes Right of Way On Ramps And Frontage Roads

AUSTIN — Texas drivers need to know about an important new law which will seriously affect how they drive on freeway frontage roads.

The change is so important that ignoring it could literally become a matter of life or death.

The law, passed in the recent session of the Texas

Legislature, gives traffic entering or leaving freeway ramps the right of way over frontage road traffic.

It was signed by the governor on June 11, and becomes effective August 27.

It reads in part: "The driver of a vehicle proceeding on an access or feeder road of a controlled

access highway shall yield the right of way to a vehicle entering or about to enter or leaving or about to leave the road to enter the highway."

Many ramps on Texas highways already are arranged that way, and YIELD and other signs are in place on the frontage roads for this kind of

operation.

Other places where ramps and frontage roads meet, however, are not. There, the signs presently are arranged to require the ramp traffic to yield.

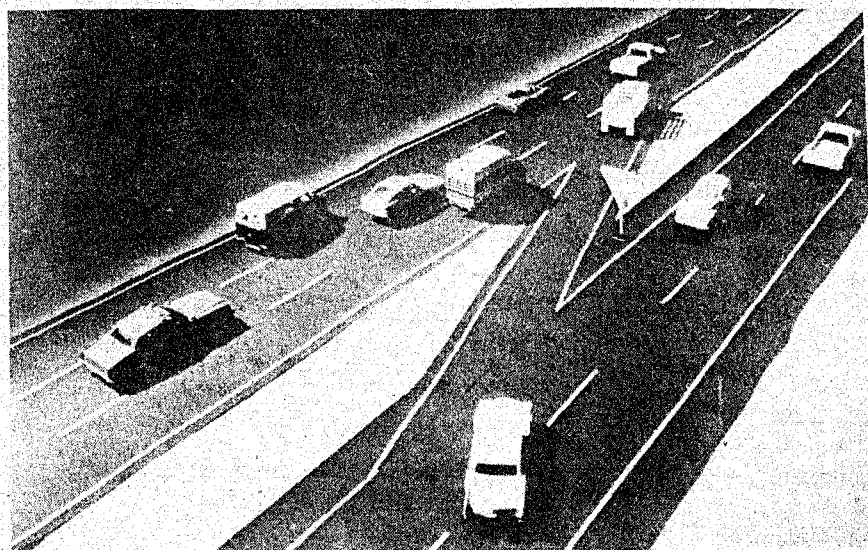
The situation is especially critical where the frontage road carries traffic in both directions. Ramp traffic both entering and leaving the freeway crosses opposing streams of traffic on the frontage road.

The wise motorist should be alert for any

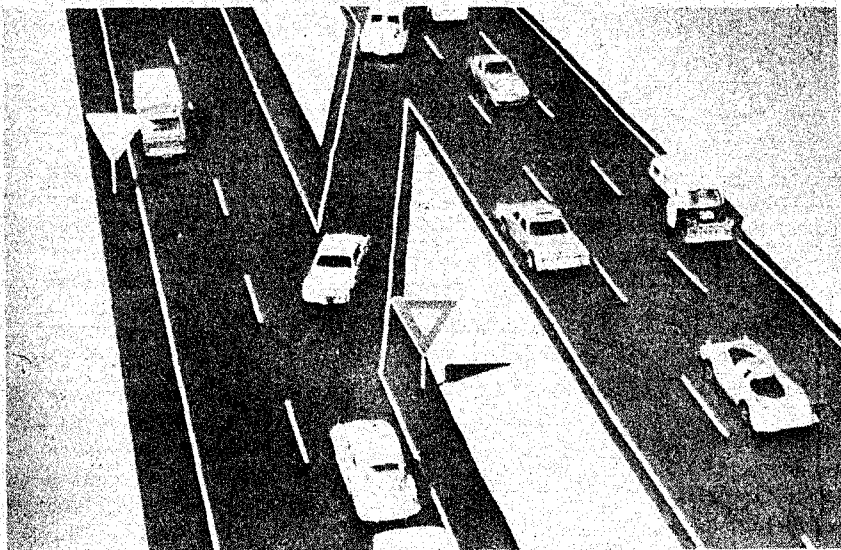
changes in signs on the frontage road he may drive regularly and should be aware that all ramp traffic will legally have the right of way over frontage road traffic later this summer.

He should also be aware when using freeway ramps that other drivers may not be aware of this law change and may overlook the new signs.

Signs are being changed now. Drivers should heed new sign arrangements as they encounter them.

COLLEGE STATION — Once depicted as an endangered species, the small Texas town is now very much alive and well, according to Dr. Robert Skrabanek, a demographer with the Texas Real Estate Research Center at Texas A&M University.

Between 1970 and 1975, three-fourths of all Texas towns with 100 to 500 inhabitants recorded population increases, he said. Of the 268 of this size, 194 had population gains. Only 74 had losses.

Skrabanek sees no end to the move to the country in the near future. He cites crime, pollution, congestion, drugs, delinquency and other related problems as reasons for dissatisfaction with big cities.

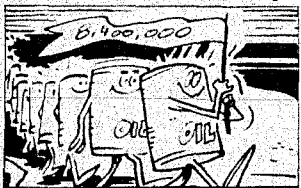

horses which belonged to him and which had been stolen by the Indians. His arrival dates back to the early day of 1828. As a result of his attempt to regain his horses, the first battle between red men and white was fought in this county. With twenty eight companions Captain Brown raided an Indian camp on Clear Creek in December, 1828, and here was begun the first Indian battle of Brown county. The Indians fled after a short fight, while Brown and his party moved westward. During the night they discovered an Indian camp about two miles up stream from their own camp. Early the next morning they surprised the Indians by swooping down upon them and succeeded in stampeding their horses. A real battle ensued. The battle continued for three days, with the white men eventually driving away almost as many horses as the Indians had stolen.

What is said to be the last battle with Indians in Brown county in the spring of the year 1874 on Clear Creek, the Texas Rangers battled the Indians at a spot which has later been called Sear's pasture. Two of the Indians were killed at Santa Anna Mountain by the Rangers. The Indians retreated after a hot fight.

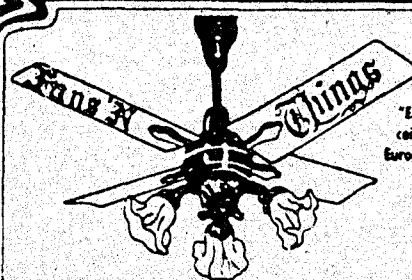

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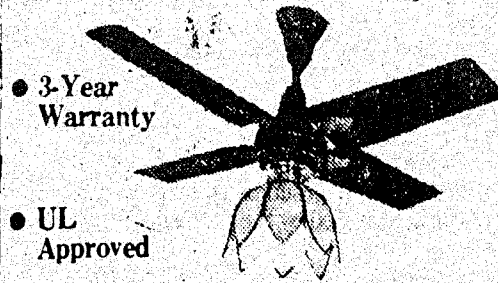

Habitat destruction causing more rabies

COLLEGE STATION — Destruction of wildlife habitats in East Texas is leading directly to increased rabies, a Texas Department of Health official claimed at an infectious disease conference held at Texas A&M University.

Alice Williams, a technician with the agency, said skunks, the primary wild reservoir for rabies, are being driven from woodland homes and into hay barns where they reproduce more rapidly and have a greater chance to infect family pets or even bite humans.

Williams said that the current hot spots in East Texas are in Van Zandt and Panola counties, where 13 cases have been reported since January, a twofold increase over 1978. Statewide, 172 cases have been reported, about 70 more than for the three-month period last year.

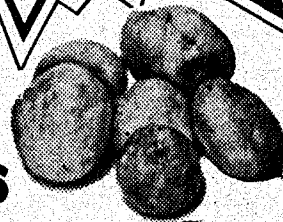

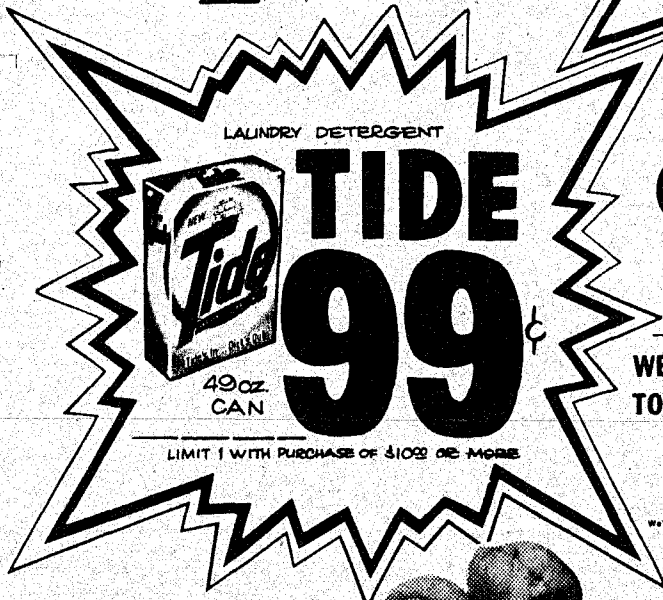
