Masked Pair Take Cash Drawer In Early-morning Robbery

Halloween and "trick or treat" came late to Allsup's convenience store in Santa Anna when two persons in disguise robbed the store early Saturday morning. One of the robbers was wearing a Halloween mask and the other was wearing a ski mask.

Syble Dean was the only clerk in the store when the two arrived about 5 a.m. and demanded money. The robbers went to the back of the store

where Ms. Dean was replacing stock and placed what she supposed was a knife or pistol in her back.

Ms. Dean was put in the storage vault and told to stay until the robbers were out of the store. The entire cash drawer was taken from the register, containing \$100 or less and a stack of "hot" checks.

Santa Anna School Changed To New UIL Classification

High Schools in Texas are receiving new classifications as University Interscholastic League leaders changed listings to omit Class B. Santa Anna, presently in Class B, will change to Class A for the 1980-81 year.

In a Monday meeting Santa Anna Superintendent R. C. Smith met with administrators from area schools to make plans for the new district 7-A. Santa Anna will be in the west zone with Bronte, Irion County (Mertzon), Miles, Eden and Cross Plains which is dropping in classification and takes the place of Robert Lee that is being moved to another district.

The east zone of District 7-A will remain the same except for the addition of Goldthwaite and the re-assignment of Tolar to

another district. Goldthwaite is also dropping to a lower classification.

The assignments are based on high school enrollment with Class A having up to 134 students. The figure was 129 when assignments were made two years ago. Santa Anna now has 100 students enrolled in high school.

Although schools for the 1980 football schedule have been named, the dates are not complete.

Christmas Opening Re-Set For Friday, November 30


The Santa Anna Christmas opening activities have been

Former S. Anna Merchant To Be Buried Here Today

Funeral services for Ed K. Jones, 81, of Santa Anna will be held Thursday (today) at First Baptist Church at 2:30 p.m. The Rev. John Stanislaw, pastor of the church, will officiate at the services, and burial will be in Santa Anna Cemetery under direction of Henderson Funeral Home.

Mr. Jones died Monday night, November 5, at Ranger Park Hospital after a long illness.

Mr. Jones was born in Richland, Texas September 16, 1898, the son of the late James Samuel and Minnie Ann (Williams) Jones. He married Floy Maurine Laxson December 7, 1919 in Ballinger, was a veteran of World War I and a member of the Presbyterian

Church and Modern Woodmen.

He had resided in Santa Anna since 1912 and attended the Santa Anna schools. He was in the poultry business in Santa Anna Coleman and Valera for 23 years, and for the past 25 years had been in the new and used steel business in Santa Anna.

Survivors are his wife; two daughters, Mrs. Margaret Reid and Miss Allene Jones, both of Austin; three sisters, Mrs. Minnie Hambright of Dallas, Mrs. Ethel Williams of Anderson, Calif. and Mrs. Frances Strauss of Houston; two brothers, Curtis (Dick) Jones of Houston and J. He that believeth on the Son hath everlasting life. John 3:36.






