Santa Anna's two boys doubles tennis teams were winners of the Regional tennis meet in Abilene last week and will be taking part in the State UIL Tennis Meet in Austin May 15-16.

Rusty Buzzard and Tommy DeLeon met teammates Pauley Vasquez and Junior Salazar in the finals, with Buzzard and DeLeon winning the first match 6-1, losing to their opponents 6-1 in the second match, and winning the third by the same score. The two local teams went into the regional meet in reverse order, with Vasquez and Salazar winners of the district championship last

month.

Rusty and Tommy qualified for the state meet last year but lost in the first round of play.

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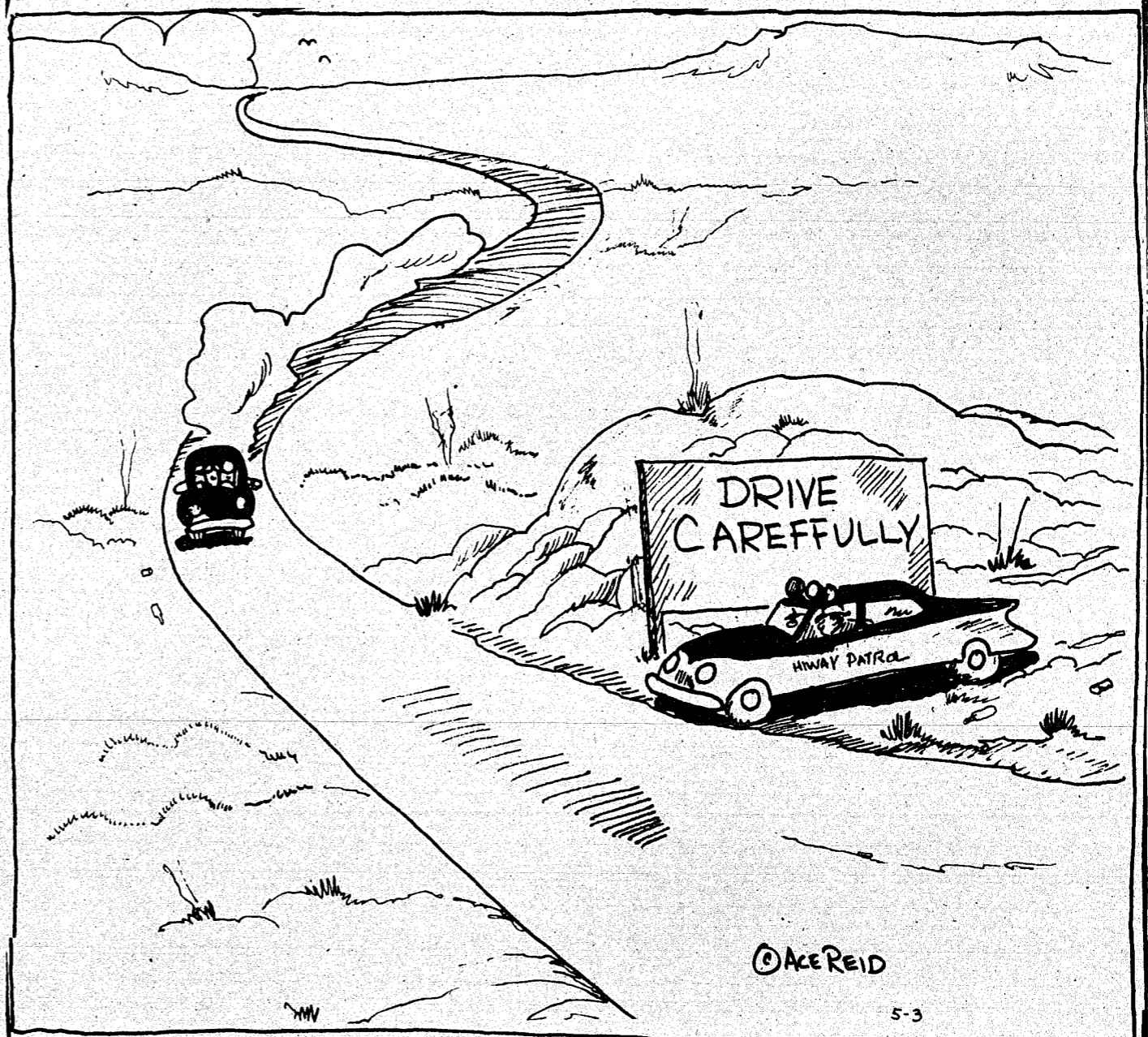

Restrictions Are Listed For Medicaid

Older Texans who get rid of their property and become poor to qualify for welfare now are being denied eligibility for Medicaid, Marlin W. Johnston, commissioner of the Department of Human Resources, said today.

Divestiture of assets to get health care now is against the law, Johnston warned, referring to a federal statute which took effect March 1.

Johnston said DHR has documented cases where assets excess of \$100,000 were given away or sold at less than market value to establish eligibility. The property usually goes to sons or daughters, or other family members, so that the former owner can qualify for nursing home care under Medicaid.

Before March 1, there was no law preventing divestiture of assets, Johnston said, although DHR long had sought such restrictions.

Under the new law, a penalty is imposed of 24 months suspended eligibility for anyone giving away or selling property for less than market value to establish eligibility for Medicaid.

Persons who become eligible for Medicaid through divestiture of assets before March 1, will not be affected, Johnston said.

Area Drilling Sites Staked

Doyne McIver, San Angelo, filed application to drill No. 1 Doris Kelley as a Coleman County wildcat five miles northwest of Trickham.

The planned 2,000 foot venture is located on a 160-acre lease.

It is in the Pleasant Young Survey 494, A-727.

Thomas-Powell Royalty Inc., Fort Worth, filed application to drill four Coleman County wildcats seven miles northeast of Coleman.

Each test has a proposed depth of 3,200 feet.

No. 1-C S. E. Weaver will be drilled on a 22-acre lease in Andrew Gable Survey 271.

Site for No. 1-D Weaver is on a 667-acre lease. Lewis Johnson Survey 480.

No. 1-B Jack and Pat Pritchard will be drilled on the same survey.

The lease is composed of 23 acres.

Other wildcat is No. 1 E. Rider, the same survey. Site is on a 115 acre lease.

Charles F. Dominy, Coleman, No. 5 S. M. Russell is a planned 2,900-foot venture for the Santa Anna (marble Falls) field six miles southeast of Santa Anna.

Location is on a 285-acre lease, Section 17, John Martin Survey 752.

Greg Mobley, son of Mrs. Oleta Mobley of Santa Anna, is having an interesting visit in Mexico, arriving there March 17, with friends who are archeologists.

The group are on a rancho that is a two-hour drive from Tampico, living in a hacienda owned by the aunt of one of the friends.

According to Mobley's reports, the ranch is vast, lush and beautiful. Greg says he has never in all his life seen such pure, natural splendor. The wild life, vegetation, various fruits and vegetables, many of which are edible and delicious, grow in abundance the year around. There are lakes and streams full of fish, many of which are unfamiliar with the Texans.

The house in which they are staying was a complete surprise. Greg had envisioned "roughing it" in jungle-like surroundings. But the house is relatively new,

built like a fortress on two levels. Solid windows have steel bars and screen wire covers.

The upstairs contains bedrooms with a modern bath with hot and cold water and the most beautiful tile ever seen. The downstairs portion has a kitchen furnished with gas range and refrigerator, a dining room, a bathroom, and a living room with a television set. The entrance hall has a spiral staircase leading to the upper level.

Meals for the group are prepared by ranch workers or by themselves. Once a week they drive into town, a small village called Tamerin, to pick up their laundry and food supplies, all amounting to less than \$6.00 in American money.

At night they can walk out of their bedrooms onto a balcony that overlooks a laguna, with nothing but utmost peace and quiet. The stars seem close

enough to touch with no city lights to interfere.

However, come sunrise, the scene changes. The birds, cows, roosters, geese, etc., set up such a din that any thoughts of sleeping are soon dismissed.

Then there is the less attractive side. The roads are terrible, the mosquitoes, flies and chiggers cover one up when they are outdoors. The snakes are plentiful --- from tiny ones to very large, and most of them deadly. The group carry anti-venom injections with them and wear knee-length boots and carry handguns strapped to their waists. Also on their expeditions they carry machettes. By drinking only bottled water and keeping an ample supply of different antibiotics, none of the group have been ill.

Mobley, who now resides in Austin, also tells of the sad part of the visit, which is the utter abject hunger and depraved conditions under which a great majority of the people live. He expects to have many other interesting stories to relate when he returns at the end of the summer.

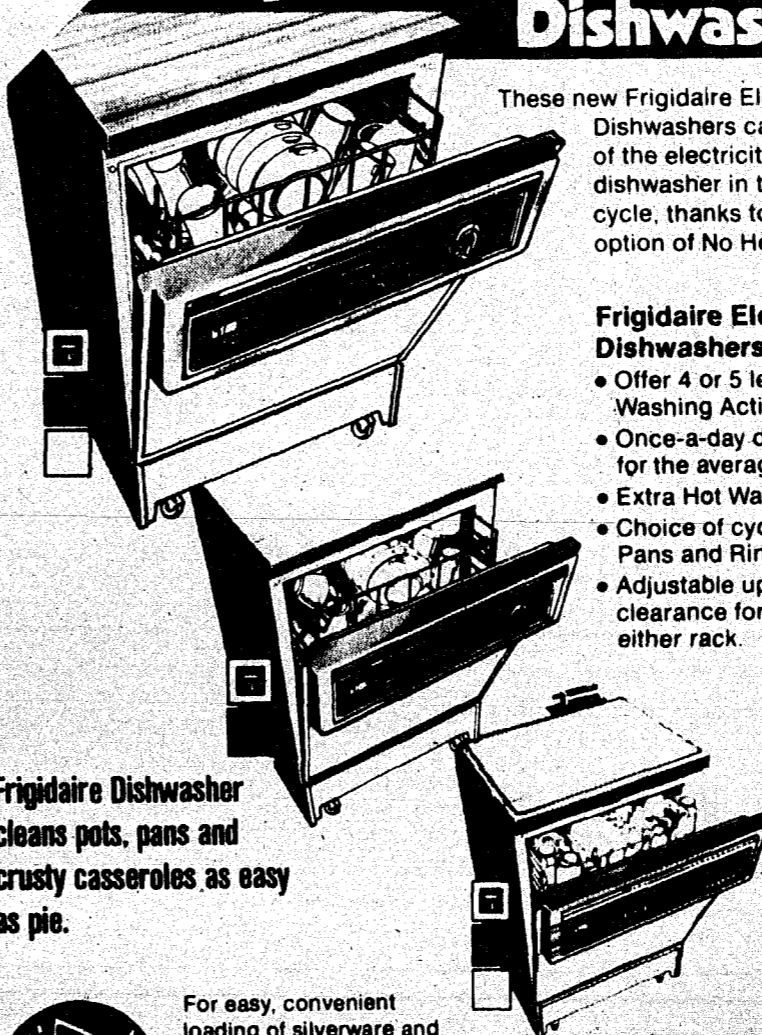
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The Mail Box

Dear Parent:

Which of the following situations would you consider to be a community drug problem?

-- 68 percent of youth 17 - 18 years old get drunk at least once a week.

-- 33 percent of youth 15 - 16 years old smoke pot at least once a week.

-- 14 percent of youth 12 - 14 years old use "uppers" at least once a week.

-- 9 percent of children 10 - 12 years old "sniff" glue at least once a week.

Answer? ALL of the the above situations are community drug problems. The unwise use of drugs, whether they are obtained legally from a pharmacist or illegally from a drug dealer, can result in increased school vandalism, crimes against person and property, violations of traffic safety laws, and permanent physical and psychological damage - and death.

Does Santa Anna have a drug problem? Are any of our school-aged youth risking their physical and mental health, if not their lives, by abusing alcohol or marijuana or "speed" or "acid" or glue? The future of our community and our country rests in the hands of our children. How many of those hands are being used to put drugs into those developing bodies and developing minds?

Seeking answers to the above questions, the Santa Anna Independent School District, in cooperation with the Santa Anna Council on Drug Abuse and the Central Texas Mental Health/ Mental Retardation Center, will conduct a drug abuse survey among school- aged youth, Grades 5 through 12, on Thursday, May 14. Purpose of the survey is to provide our community with reliable information about the possible use of drugs among our children. The information will be used in developing a comprehensive drug abuse prevention program for Santa Anna, if needed.

The survey will consist of a questionnaire containing 80 question related to drug use, knowledge and attitudes. Students completing the questionnaire aren't required to sign their names on the form. We only want to know what grade they are in and if they are male or female. We will do everything in our power to ensure the anonymity of each student taking part in the survey.

Participation in the survey is voluntary. If you do not want your child to take part, please state so in a written note and have your child deliver the note to his or her homeroom teacher.

Information obtained from the survey will be made known to the community as soon as the questionnaires can be scored. Questionnaire can be scored and evaluated.

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June Hearing Slated On Stacy Dam

The Third Court of Appeals in Austin has made the rare request for additional arguments in the matter of the Colorado River Municipal Water District's permit to construct the Stacy reservoir.

These arguments, according to O.H. Ivie, general manager of CRMWD, will be heard June 10. The Court first heard the case November 19, 1980 when the Lower Colorado River Authority and others appealed the District Court decision upholding the Stacy permit granted by the Texas Water Commission.

At a meeting of the CRMWD board of directors in Big Spring efforts of the District to amend its act to make boundaries of the District conform to those of the January 1, 1981 corporate boundaries of the member cities of Odessa, Big Spring and Snyder. The change also would prescribe extra-territorial jurisdiction in which the District would cooperate contractually with public agencies, industry or individuals in financing or installing works required under the Clean Air and Waste Water Management Acts. The LCRA again has injected the

Stacy project into this matter, said Ivie, and Charles Herring, LCRA manager, has circulated a letter complaining that it would give CRMWD the powers of a water authority, or the same powers LCRA possesses.

The HIPLEX program of weather modification research will not be operative in Big Spring and area this summer, Ivie told the board. The Texas Department of Water Resources, however, will indemnify CRMWD for commitments and expenses made in preparation for 1981 HIPLEX, he said.

Diligent Heart Keeping Essential to Growth in Grace

Keep thy heart with all diligence; for out of it are the issues of life. Proverbs 4:23.

Diligent heart-keeping is essential to a healthy growth in grace. The heart in its natural state is a habitation to unholy thoughts and sinful passions. The affections should center upon God. Contemplate His greatness, His mercy and excellences. Let His goodness and love and perfection of character captivate your heart.

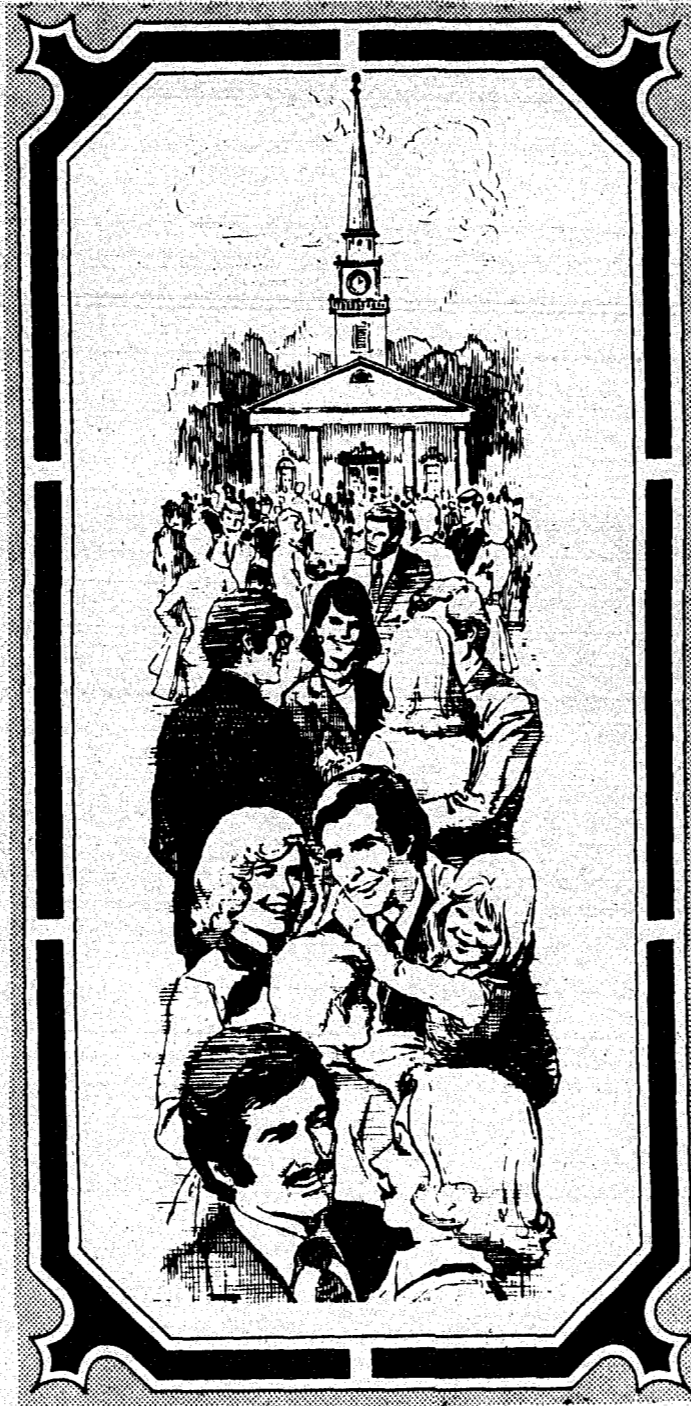

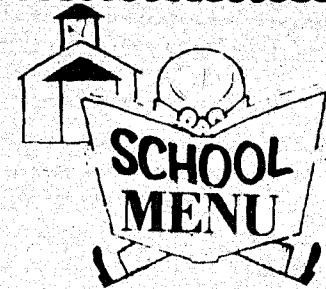
