Having been trial, most of the quotes in last week's paper were originally stated by the lawyer for Benton and Stearns, and not the court. The councilmen who were placed on the stand were extremely well-informed about the business of the city. Also, the first time the problem about the sewage was presented to the council was the notification that a law suit has been filed and the city entered litigation. The proper place to discuss a grievance with the city should begin during a regularly scheduled The State Department of Health was constantly monitoring and directing the handling of the treatment ponds as they testified at the trial. Sewage would have to flow from town, all the way out to the holding ponds (with chemicals in them), through a plowed and planted field, down a creek, and into another water supply on adjacent property, but uphill? I do not think that any city employee would intentionally load up a truck load of sewage and go "dump" it on someone's property. Might I suggest his cows dumped there?
In closing, I urge citizens to go to City Hall and read the documents in question to see wherein the truth lies.
