That's another reason 1 enjoyed the vist with Mr. Haynes. He kept saying he would finish this one more
story sut and then "get out of here." But I was wisthing I could listen to his stories all day.
Mr. Haypes wid he remenbered on 10 190\%, when they were building the tiressanta Anna lake.
He and his father, Charlie Haynes came to town from Trickham, look ing to visit with L. L. Shieds, who was a livery stable owner and ran catte on the free range and who employed Charlie. The father and son went out to where the lake was being dugt to find

Shields, and Joe, who was a very young boy, remembered being imwessed with the size of Shieds. He he remembered that Mr. Shields manually freed a team of oxen and a plow from a large rock where they were stuck. Mr. Haynes said Mr Shields dropped a "big six-shooter" ut of his coat, which impresse Haynes as a boy.

Haynes also told of my gran ather, william H. (Bill Cupps, who had dropped out of schoel but became interested in sctool at the Bugtussle School House where
Haynes was a student. He said

Cupps would come to school and
have to ohey students, whic same rules as the other boys found very amusing Haynes said the teacher. Blanche Boyd, would write the rules on the blackboard and make everyone otey them. He said he remenbered Cupps having to "walk the campus several times,
Mr. Haynes also said he remembered an occasion when John and Reed Cupps instructed Tommy Harrison to make some sweeps,

## Drought planning ideas

Drought planning prin-
ciples for wildife actually boil down to range manage ment principles. Ecologically, there are a kiven number of plants to
support a given number of animals, livestock and wildilife, Since plant populations are down dur-
ing dry periods, it follows that livestock and wildtife numbers also need to be ad
justed in dry periods. This is the philosophy of Dr. Dwight Guynn, wildife
specialist with the Texas
Agricultural Extens Agricultural Extension
Service, headquartered at
He emphasizes that it is much easier to quickly ad-
just the stocking rates of livestock than those of
wildife. "With managers can only reduce
vildiife numbers during the fall hunting
diall season by allowing humting. As the hunting season
approaches, the owners approaches, the owners
and managers need to conand managers need to con-
duct wild life censuses to be able to predict what the the
wildife numbers will be in wildilife numbers will be in
the next year. The fall the next year. The fall
harvest is planned around those numbers to keep the
wilduife population in balance with the food supp-
ly," Guynn explains. During drought, ran-
chers many also reduce some of the numbers of with wildifife for forage and with widiute for forage and
browse. For example, cattle are not as competitive as sheep or goats; and
