

The City of Santa Anna is currently replacing broken water meters around the city, and has issued a warning to citizens concerning vandalism of the meters.


According to City Secretary Pat Rutherford, property owners will be responsible for vandalism to the new meters, and will have to replace any broken facilities at a cost of \$50 per

Off the cuff

A visitor last Friday morning in the News office brought some good, old stories about some people and times he remembered.

I enjoyed a visit with Joe Haynes, born 1897 at Trickham and reared locally, who told me some stories on my own kinfolks.

Mr. Haynes said he remembered walking to parties and singings with my grandmother, Dixie Baugh Cupps, when they were youngsters. He said they were "friends, not sweethearts," but they ended up walking together a lot since he used

to "hang out" at the Baugh place. He said he also remembered Bill,

John and Reed Cupps, and he thought Bill, my grandfather, was "a wild little fellow," and Elmer Cupps was one of the best friends Haynes ever had.

I enjoy hearing about my grandparents, especially. Mr. Haynes' stories, like those of many who come into the office to share with me, made me think about my grandparents again.

I thought, in my youth, that they were wonderful, and I miss them now, in my young adulthood. I've wished for them many times, that I could enjoy them now that I am old enough to appreciate those who have behind them the wisdom of years.

That's another reason I enjoyed the visit with Mr. Haynes. He kept saying he would finish this one more story and then "get out of here." But I was wishing I could listen to his stories all day.

Mr. Haynes said he remembered in 1967 for 1908, when they were building the first Santa Anna lake. He and his father, Charlie Haynes, came to town from Trickham, looking to visit with L. L. Shields, who was a livery stable owner and ran cattle on the free range, and who employed Charlie.

The father and son went out to where the lake was being dug to find

Shields, and Joe, who was a very young boy, remembered being impressed with the size of Shields. He was a big man, Joe Haynes said, and he remembered that Mr. Shields manually freed a team of oxen and a plow from a large rock where they were stuck. Mr. Haynes said Mr. Shields dropped a "big six-shooter" out of his coat, which impressed Haynes as a boy.

Haynes also told of my grandfather, William H. (Bill) Cupps, who had dropped out of school but became interested in school at the Bugtussle School House where Haynes was a student. He said

Cupps would come to school and have to obey the same rules as the students, which Haynes and the other boys found very amusing. Haynes said the teacher, Blanche Boyd, would write the rules on the blackboard and make everyone obey them. He said he remembered Cupps having to ''walk the campus several times."

Mr. Haynes also said he remembered an occasion when John and Reed Cupps instructed Tommy Harrison to make some sweeps, made of iron, a little harder than usual. He said Reed Cupps forgot how hard they were and threw them out of his truck, and the things "just

broke all over the place."

Haynes said he also remembered Markum Henderson, who would have been my daughter's greatgrandfather, and he spoke very fondly of the Henderson family from the days when Ray and Clay and Roy and "all that bunch" were boys.

He seemed to have a wealth of memories to share, and I found it interesting to hear some old stories on people I now know and some I do not know. The history of a town is only as interesting as the stories about its people, and Joe Haynes apparently could write several chapters of Santa Anna's memoirs.





'Some consumers believe the food is no good if it's not, the fastest loss in food still in the store on the sell- value occurs during and date," she says. "Actuall, the food will be wholesome if used right away, but consumers should buy before the package date if they want to allow for home storage, even in the refrigerator."

The open sell-by dates on perishable foods are easy for consumers to understand, but are not required on all foods, she notes.

Semi-perishable food with a shelf life of 30 days to 6 months, such as cereals and crakcers, and foods with a shelf life of Salmon, yogurt and cottage cheese make Cucumber Salmon over six months, such as Mousse Salad protein-rich, low in calorie - and positively canned and frozen goods, also have sell-by dates. Drought planning ideas

Drought planning principles for wildlife actually boil down to range management principles.

Ecologically, there are a given number of plants to support a given number of animals, livestock and wildlife. Since plant populations are down during dry periods, it follows that livestock and wildlife numbers also need to be adjusted in dry periods.

This is the philosophy of Dr. Dwight Guynn, wildlife specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, headquartered at Uvalde.

He emphasizes that it is much easier to quickly adjust the stocking rates of livestock than those of wildlife.

"With wildlife, landowners or ranch managers can only reduce wildlife numbers legally during the fall hunting season by allowing hunting. As the hunting season approaches, the owners and managers need to conduct wildlife censuses to be able to predict what the wildlife numbers will be in the next year. The fall harvest is planned around those numbers to keep the wildlife population in balance with the food supply," Guynn explains.

During drought, ranchers many also reduce some of the numbers of livestock which compete with wildlife for forage and browse. For example, cattle are not as competitive as sheep or goats; and sheep are not as competitive for the same food supply as goats, he adds. This information may provide some guidance in Glorieta, New Mexico; times of drought

deaths per year linked to cigarette smoking in the United States, this habit continues to be a major public health problem. The Texas Medical

Association says one of the best ways to battle the problem is to educate teenagers on the harmful effects of smoking. Scientific studies have tied smoking to deaths from lung cancer, emphysema, chronic bronchitis, and heart disease.

the more difficult it is to quit. And those who begin at a young age have a longer total smoking time, so they face a higher risk or disease. Unfortunately, teenagers

may not consider the health consequences of their habit. The possibility of developing cancer or any other fatal health problem may seem remote and less important than trying to impress peers.

Many people believe that smoking just a few cigarettes will not hurt because they can stop whenever they want. Few people starting to smoke realize just how addictive the nicotine in cigarettes is.

The habit is also expensive. Parents and teachers can play an influential part in encouraging teens not to smoke by setting an example o not smoking and by:

Helping teens recognize how easy it is to get hooked on cigarettes.

Teaching teenagers how cigarette advertising uses misleading images to manipulate them into making decisions dangerous to their health. An ad may imply that the attractive, slender woman shown is happy and successful because she smokes, but there is, of course, no relationship.

Making sure teens understand how cigarette smoking damages health. In addition to the long-term risks of death, immediate effects include reduced physical endurance and poor athletic performance.

Helping teens resist pressure from peers who smoke by providing them with information needed to defend their decision not to smoke. Encourage them to educate others about the serious health risks and expense of smoking. Point out that a 1982 nationwide study of high school seniors revealed that only 6 to 7 percent felt that smoking a cigarette makes someone look "cool."






