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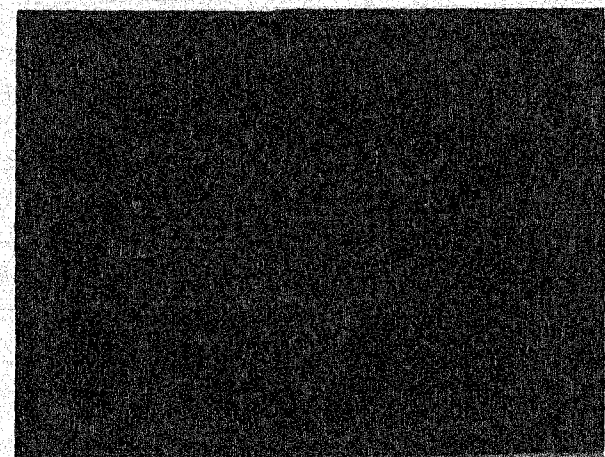

Police Report

The theft of a collection container for the Muscular Dystrophy Association from Allsup's was reported to Chief of Police Russ Ellis, last Thursday. Mr. Ellis said the clerk noticed the container missing after going to the rear counter to serve a customer. The container was discovered in the alley near the store ripped open and the money missing. The amount was estimated at \$10. Chief Ellis said the investigation led to the apprehension of two 12 year old Santa Anna youths and the recovery of approximately \$4 in change. Theft charges against the youths were filed in juvenile court. An electric irrigation pump was reported missing Friday from 208 N. 5th St. Chief Ellis said the unit was described as green, with a 3 1/2 HP Motor.

Chief Ellis, along with units from the Coleman County Sheriff's Dept., DPS and a Fish and Game Warden, responded to a disturbance in the 1800 block of Wallis Friday evening.

Football season has begun and ready for it are the Santa Anna Mountaineer's. Their first scrimmage was held last Friday night at Loraine.

Though the scrimmage was no more than a practice with another team, results proved we were ready for a game.

Each team had 35 offensive plays. On defense, Santa Anna had first possession. Each team had 20 defensive plays. The Mountaineers had 233 yards to Loraine's 3 yards, 12 first downs to their 1, and 3 touchdowns to their 0. In second possession, each team had 15 defensive plays. 122 yards to their 77 yards, 7 first downs to their 3, and one touchdown each.

Quarterback Raymond Castillo carried 10 times for a total of 151 yards, Quarterback Chris DeLeon carried 11 times for 77 yards, and Quarterback Shelby Tuttle carried 9 times for 57 yards.

Russell Williams completed 2 of 4 passes for a total of 55 yards. Doug Warnock caught 1 for 35 yards and Craig Buquette caught 1 pass for 20 yards.

The coaches say they are favorably impressed with this first scrimmage but realize that the team still has a lot of work to do.

The next scrimmage will be with Early this Friday. Junior Varsity will begin at 6:00 p.m. Coaches encourage parent attendance as support is a big part of a team's success.

A reminder was also passed along that although student's will have a school holiday on Monday for Labor Day, the varsity and junior varsity teams will practice on Monday at 4 p.m.

Upon arrival, Ellis said they broke up a fight between two Santa Anna women. A 40 year old woman and a 19 year old man, who was injured in an earlier scuffle at the same address, were treated for minor injuries at the Coleman Hospital. Assault charges were filed by a 31 year old woman against the two. Assault charges were in turn filed against her by the first woman. Chief Ellis said the parties involved are to appear before Municipal Judge Joe Taylor.

It was reported by Chief Ellis that an 11 year old Santa Anna youth was bitten by a dog on 2nd Street Monday afternoon. The owners were located and agreed to watch the dog more carefully. The dog had been tied but had broken loose, all shots were current.

Chief Ellis reminds drivers to be extra cautious this Labor Day weekend. Traffic is expected to be heavy and a high death toll is predicted statewide.

GHOSTLY BANDIT ROBBED ALLSUP'S

Tractor Thefts

With tractor thefts a major problem in rural areas today, farmers can take certain steps to hinder thieves, suggests a community development specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A & M University System. These include removing the rotar, shutting off the fuel line, locking the tractor in gear, chaining the wheels, and keeping a close watch on the tractor or hiding it. These steps can remove the opportunity for tractor thefts.

LABOR DAY SAFETY

The Department of Public Safety is estimating that as many as 54 deaths will result from traffic accidents during the Labor Day holiday. DPS Director Jim Adams said the estimate is based upon previous holiday experience.

'During the last Labor Day period, we had 52 deaths reported in both urban and rural accidents. The inclusion of subsequent deaths due to traffic-related injuries which occurred during the period brought the final count to 55,' Adams said.

'Obviously, we would be pleased to have no fatal accidents during this 78-hour holiday, but our statistics show that is not probable. We know that some drivers will insist upon driving while intoxicated, others will deliberately exceed the speed limits and still others will drive in a careless or reckless manner,' he said. 'Unfortunately, fatal accidents can be expected.'

'DWI and speeding are always the biggest contributing factors to our traffic deaths, but the failure to use

seat belts is another reason we have so many fatalities. If more drivers would simply stay sober, drive within the speed limits and wear seat belts, fatalities would decline still further,' said Adams.

DPS statistics for the year to date reveal a two percent decrease in fatalities statewide. Adams says the decrease in total deaths may indicate more people are using seat belts.

'While the decline in fatalities is not as substantial as we'd like to see, we do feel that seat belt use is increasing and may be a factor in this decrease. It is an obvious lifesaving device that is available in the vast majority of our vehicles,' noted Adams.

DPS will conduct two major programs during the Labor Day period. Operation Motorcide will provide updated numbers of traffic deaths to the news media as the accidents occur. Operation Holiday Stations troopers at locations where high volumes of traffic are anticipated or where violations are expected.

Everyone is encouraged to attend the booster club meetings each Tuesday night at 7:00 p.m. at the Ag Building.

HSU's registration for the fall term begins on Monday, September 3, with classes to start on September 4.

New student orientation will be held from August 30 to September 2. Academic advising for freshmen and new students will be held on August 31. Upperclassmen will be held from 8 to 12 noon and freshmen and new students from 1 to 5 p.m.

Academic advising for upperclassmen who have not previously pre-registered will be conducted from 8 to 12 noon on September 3. Fee assessment for all pre-registered students will take place on September 3 from 8:15 to 12 noon.

Actual registration for the fall term for those who have not signed for classes will be from 1 to 6:30 p.m. on September 3 at the Mabee Physical Education Complex.

The schedule for signing for classes is the following: physically limited students beginning at 1 p.m.; graduates, post graduates and students from Abilene Christian University and McMurry College, any time after 1:20 p.m.; seniors, P-Z, 1:20 p.m., A-G 1:30 p.m., and H-O, 1:45 p.m.; freshmen, sophomores and juniors, A-B, 2 p.m.; C-D, 2:20 p.m.; E-G, 2:40 p.m.; H-J, 3 p.m., K-L, 3:20; M-O, 3:40 p.m.; P-R, 4 p.m.; S-T, 4:20 p.m.; U-Z, 4:40 p.m. Latecomers may sign from 5 to 6:30 p.m.

Evening college registration will be from 5:30 to 6:30 p.m.

Tuition at HSU for the fall term will be \$98 per semester hour. The Abilene Intercollegiate School of Nursing, a consortium of Abilene Christian University, HSU, and McMurry College is \$126 per semester hour.

For a student taking 12 hours or more, the total fees are \$95 and are prorated for those taking less than 12 hours.

Also Medication Aide, Medication Refresher, Principles of Real Estate, Radio and Television Workshop, Real Estate Math, Supervisory Management Certificate Program, Communication, Typing Refresher, Typing Improvement, First Course in Modeling and Finishing (Junior High), Advance Course in Modeling and Finishing (Senior High and College), Aerobics, Conversational Spanish, Suzuki Class Strings, Techniques for Coping with Stress, Travel with Joe (a personally guided slide tour with Dr. Joe Timmons through twenty different countries), Computers for Kids I and II, and Gymnastics for ages 4-7 and 8-13.
