## Former Banker Buried In S.A. Friday, July 7

Former Santa Anna banker Hubert A. Turner was buried in the Santa Anna Cemetery on Friday after memorial services at the First Baptist Church. Rev. Bill Brewer officiated at the services.

The retired banker died in Natchez, Miss., on Wednesday, July 5, while on vacation.

## Proposed County Vo-Tech School Depends on Budget Allocations

The requested \$217,000 as start-up funds for the proposed Coleman vocational-technical branch of Cisco Junior College is now a strong possibility, according to Rep. Lynn Nabers of Brownwood.

Rep. Nabers stated last Saturday that he "doesn't know for sure how much money CJC will get" from the state's four-college budget total of \$1,221,500 which was approved in special legislative session last week.

The amount must be approved by the Texas Coordinating Board of Colleges and Universities and Governor Preston Smith.

The budget total was ap-

proved by Texas House and Senate conferees for vocational branches within the districts of CJC (including Coleman), Western Texas College at Snyder, South Plains Junior College at Levelland, and Henderson Junior College.

Nabers has worked with Coleman County educators and businessmen for some time to secure an academic and vocational branch here.

The academic classes have been in session in Coleman since June and include a number of Santa Anna students.

The current funds are needed for the purchase of equipment for the vocational courses, Nabers said.



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**In Our Opinion**

THE PUBLICITY WRITERS for the Postal Corporation have done an excellent job of pulling the wool over the eyes of the American people. If you listen to them, the Postal Corporation has done a great job of reorganizing the postal service.

What they have really done is a great job of messing it up, and it is time for the revolution. The American people had better get up of their blessed assurance and flood the Congress with letters of protest.

Postal service is worse than it has ever been in the history of this country. And the new innovation that took place July 1 where a sectional center is supposed to assume the sorting and distribution of mail will prove to be even worse, is our prediction.

A good personal example is a first class letter mailed locally recently on Wednesday, arriving in Abilene Saturday. It had to travel first to the Brownwood sectional center, then the approximately 90 miles to Abilene, and ONLY took three days.

A lady in Maryland recently planned a birthday party for one of her children. She mailed the invitations ten days ahead of the time of the party. The big day came and she prepared for the children with festive decorations, a birthday cake, favors and an excited child. But the guests never arrived. For reasons the post office can't explain, the invitations weren't delivered until six days after the party — 16 days in transit!

Regardless of the stories the Postal Corporation puts out about improved service — the facts refute them. A letter moves more slowly between cities than it did three years ago. The Postal Services own figures show it takes a letter traveling 258 miles a minimum of 37 hours, and in many cases it has taken much more depending on what the sectional centers and distribution centers does with it when it arrives there. Another cut in service is evident to all users of the mail services because we no longer have any mail service on Sundays, and very little on holidays, and if a letter arrives at the post office after 5:00 p.m. it is not handled until the next day.

There have been considerable cutbacks in service since last July. Window services have been curtailed considerably, and man hours from local post offices have been gut to the bone, while giving more and more to sectional centers and distribution points. And the result of this change has been poorer service. We always have had better service when the local offices have handled the mail, which includes sorting it and postmarking it, then tying it out to destination points. Our own experience has caused us to mail in the local office and not in pick-up boxes which goes to the sectional center. But the new innovation will take care of that — all mail will go to the sectional center unless the patron requests it be postmarked locally.

Customers complaints are rising daily, and gripes from the patrons to Congress is the only way we can get any changes made. The common complaint is "The postal service is giving us less every day and charging us more!"

Congressional gripes are growing every day as constituents send gripes to their Congressmen. Unless things improve, legislators threaten to revamp or even repeal the law that set up the agency, largely free of Congressional control. Rep. William Scott, a member of the post office committee warned recently, "If a vote were taken today to repeal the Postal Reorganization Act, a majority of the House would vote to repeal it."

Along with external troubles, the postal service has its internal troubles. Black employees think they are being pushed out by new postal facilities that are being built in White suburbs, creating a morale problem which is probably one of the reasons for poor service.

First class and below is not the only poor service. A survey was taken by the National Association of Professional Bureaucrats, an organization which spoofs excessive bureaucracy, and they found that only 15 per cent of special delivery mail it checked arrived before the eight-cent variety, and one special delivery letter was a full day behind a regular first class letter mailed at the same time.

They made an award to the postal service for its service, by "saluting the U. S. Postal Service for its dynamic inaction and forthright twiddling."

Many disenfranchised business men are turning to private delivery services, and the United Parcel Service, which for the time being, can only deliver packages from out-of-state origin in Texas, has surpassed the postal service in service. They are trying to get a permit for intra-state deliveries in Texas and if they do, there will be another blow to the Postal Corporation.

There is one thing we can say for the postal service, it has just about reached the bottom and about the only way it can go is up.



Austin — The Parks and Wildlife Commission handed one controversial issue back to the Attorney General and was handed another one by the Legislature.

PWC voted four-to-two to ask Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin to review and reconsider a May 26 ruling that a 1970 contract to purchase 3,965 acres of Mustang Island property for park development is a "binding obligation."

Martin's opinion, according to PWC Chairman Jack Stone of Wells, is expected in about a week.

The Mustang Island battle as raged from Austin to Washington and back and through the federal courts and has figured in battles over Senate confirmation of PWC members.

Legislators, in special session, thwarted long-standing plans of the State Highway Department to build a 10-story, \$20 million headquarters building on a block near the capitol and governor's mansion.

Instead, the Legislature decreed, the Parks and Wildlife Department would purchase with \$15 million from its cigarette tax the barren, dusty block in downtown Austin and convert it into a park.

The highway department was directed to consider placing its plush new building elsewhere.

Neither agency, conceded legislative leaders, was deliriously happy with the arrangement.

Under the circumstances, however, neither seemed to have much choice.

**GAME LAW FUSS CALMED**

— Texas game wardens will no longer enforce state game and fish laws near the mouth and jetties of the Sabine River, an area of disputed ownership with Louisiana.

Louisiana last month threatened to appeal to the U. S. Supreme Court Texas officers' attempts at enforcement in the area. Attorney General Martin informed Louisiana Atty. Gen. William J. Guste Jr. Texas will keep its commitments in the disputed areas of the Gulf south of Sabine River Mouth.

The area was recently found by a Supreme Court-appointed master to belong to Texas, but Louisiana appealed the decision.

**INFLATION STILL THREAT**

— Inflation is still a strong threat, though Texas is recovering from economic recession, according to a University of Texas Bureau of Business Research study.

Unemployment remains high, says UT BBR, but estimated personal income rose nine per cent in the last year and bank debits 10 per cent.

The unemployment level, frowned on by the Bureau, was 3.8 per cent in May, which is lower than the 4.1 per cent of a year ago and considerably below the national 5.9 per cent rate.

Consumer spending and residential construction were seen as strong. The rate of the consumer price index rise slowed somewhat after the presidential price freeze, BBR found.

**HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT WINS AWARD**

— Texas Highway Department received the National Safety Council Award of Honor for an outstanding occupational safety record during 1971.

"Less than five out of 1,000 of the nation's total number of work units meet the award

of honor requirements," said Howard Pyle, National Safety Council president.

The Texas Highway Department got the award for a 52 per cent decrease in frequency and 42 per cent decrease in severity of accident rates of its employees last year.

**TEXAS BEEF CATTLE LEADER**

— Texas is the nation's leader in all major categories of the beef cattle industry, Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White states.

The livestock industry in Texas is a \$2 billion industry, accounting for almost half the total agricultural income of the state. There were 12.8 million cattle and calves in Texas in January, more than five million head above second-ranked Iowa.

Rankings by counties for livestock categories include the following (one through 10):

All cattle and calves: Deaf Smith, Parmer, Hansford, Castro, Swisher, Sherman, Randall, Ochiltree, Hale, and Hopkins.

Texas ranks second in the nation in number of slaughter plants, third in cattle and calves slaughtered during 1971, third in sheep and lamb slaughter and 15th in hog slaughter.

**DEMOCRATS AT MIAMI BEACH**

— One hundred and 30 Texas Democrats — most of them new to the party wars — are busy at Miami Beach this week, helping nominate a candidate for president.

Another 70 alternates were named to the convention.

The Texas delegates, headed by gubernatorial nominee Dolph Briscoe of Uvalde, are closely divided as to supporters of George Wallace, George McGovern and Hubert Humphrey.

**TEXAS EXHIBIT PLANNED**

— A special Texas exhibit is planned at the fifth annual El Salvador International Trade Fair November 3-20.

The fair is one of the top trade expositions in Central America and attracts commercial firms from surrounding Central American states. Several Texas manufacturers have indicated an interest in sponsoring exhibits. The International Trade Division of the Texas Industrial Commission and the Texas Department of Agriculture are sponsoring the Texas exhibit.

**FARMWORKER GRANT APPROVED**

— A \$2 million federal grant will provide classroom instruction and on-the-job training for migrant farmworkers.

Trainees from 19 counties will benefit under the one-year contracts with five project sponsors.

Local agencies participating include Economic Opportunities Development Corporation of San Antonio (Atascosa, Bexar, Frio, Medina and Willson counties); Community Action Agency of South Texas (Starr and Zapata counties); Coastal Bend Migrant (Duval, Jim Wells, Kleberg, Nueces and San Patricio counties); Middle Rio Grande Development Council (Dimmit, LaSalle, Maverik, Uvalde, Val Verde and Zavala counties) and Laredo-Webb County Community Action Agency.

**SHORT SNORTS**

Former U. S. Ambassador to Australia Ed Clark, a prominent Democrat, will head Republican U. S. Senator John Tower's campaign organization in Texas.

A first-in-the-nation mobile

health clinic is starting services in the Lower Rio Grande Valley for veterans.

Attorney General Martin held that an act giving a fire chief sole authority to put a fireman on disability retirement or demand he return to work is unconstitutional. He said local pension boards have authority to determine the degree and date of disability.

Third Court of Civil Appeals affirmed a new savings and loan association to serve Baytown and the surrounding area in Liberty, Chambers and eastern Harris counties.

U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare has awarded \$300,000 to the Father Rahm Clinic in El Paso for health and family planning services to the Spanish-speaking.

Southwest Airlines serving Dallas, Houston and San Antonio announced it is raising its one-way fare from \$20 to \$26 between the points served.

A new Veterans Administration drug treatment is planned for Dallas.

The Rehabilitation Commission is dividing Harris and 24 other Southeast Texas counties into two regions for better supervision of services to mentally and physically-handicapped clients.

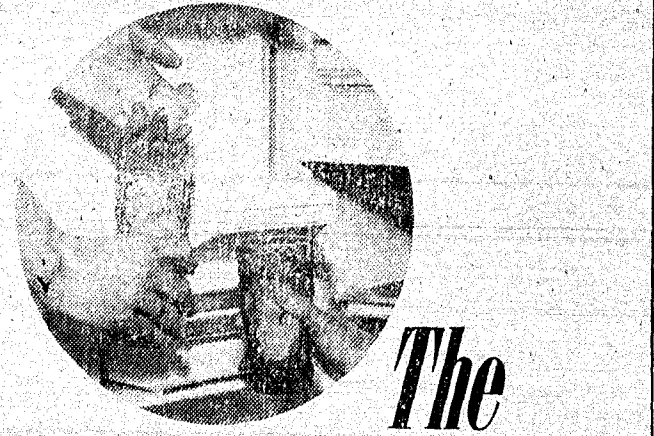

# S-ANNA METHODIST CHURCH ORGANIZED 87 YEARS AGO

The origin of the First-United Methodist Church here dates back 87 years.  
In the spring of 1885, one of history's immortal "circuit riders" came to Santa Anna with his saddle bags filled with books and organized the Santa Anna Methodist Episcopal Church South.  
The membership book shows that Seth Bradner was the first person to be baptised here, on July 15, 1888, during the ministry of the Rev. W. E. Caperton.

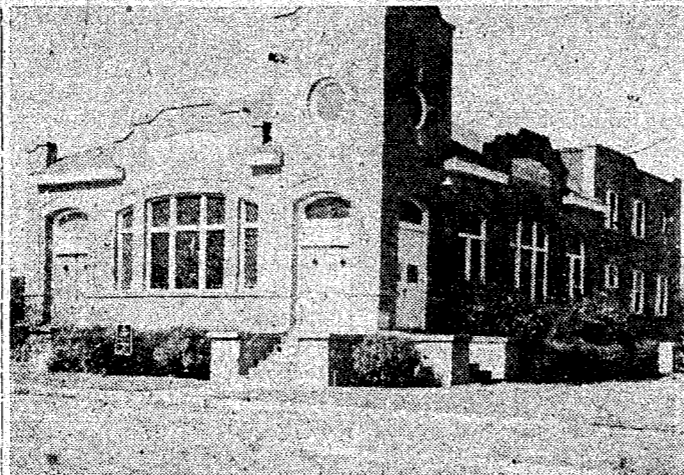
By the end of the year, the Rev. J. W. Bowden wrote: "We consider the work on a whole in a healthy condition—the membership greatly revived."  
The salary for the preacher that year was \$370. The church had 288 members.  
In the first quarterly conference in 1887-88, the Rev. W. E. Cook, E. W. Oliver and J. D. Simpson were appointed to secure a lot and get estimates for a building. E. A. McGlathery and Walter Holmes were added later to the committee.

The seventh to be baptised was Mary Sue Phillips. She was also the first to be married in the church's present building, in 1914. But her mother had been the first bride in the first building.  
The first death recorded was that of Mrs. Nannie B. Simpson. She died Feb. 17, 1886.  
In 1887, the name "Santa Anna circuit" appeared for the first time. Previously, it had been known as Thrifty Mission. Seven appointments were on the charge, including Clear Creek, Trickham, Muke Water, Thrifty, McDaniel, Fairview and Santa Anna.

ON DEC. 31, 1887, a committee was appointed to build a parsonage. Then on Oct. 12, 1889, a motion was made to raise \$400 to build it. Between 1890-94, the first parsonage was constructed.  
But the first church building had its cornerstone laid in 1888 by the Masonic Lodge.  
In 1890, the trustees reported: "We now have a church building costing between \$1,100 and \$1,200 with a debt of about \$80. It is unceiled and not comfortably seated."

SALEM AND Mt. View were added in 1889. At that time, the church was in the Northwest Texas Conference, now the Central Texas Conference.  
The pastors report said then, "We found the work in a cold and scattered condition and membership not well organized. We have been laboring as faithfully as we could under the circumstances. The present is more encouraging."  
The second report reads: "The spiritual condition is tolerably good, but not what it ought to be."

But the Ladies Aid came to the rescue and reports show this organization raised \$70 for the purchase of 200 new chairs.  
The circuit was cut to four churches in 1895—Santa Anna, Rockwood, Salem and Milligan. Rev. B. A. Snoddy became pastor in 1898. During his ministry, the chairs were discarded and circular oak pews replaced them. (The pews were used in the next building and are now in the First Christian Church here.)  
The 10th pastor, Rev. M. H. Major, reported in 1904: "The church has suffered somewhat on account of worldly amusements such as dram-

drinking, card-playing, dancing and theater-going. We have tried to show these erring ones that these things were wrong and contrary to the rules of our beloved church. Some left the church."  
THE NEXT pastor, Rev. J. W. Patison, started plans for a new building with twice the seating capacity. Sunday school attendance was 130.  
During this time, records show that Women's Home Missionary Society sent \$42 to victims of the Zephyr tornado.

Rev. H. C. Bowman had 370 members in 1941. The Sunday school class had 70 with lay leader O. A. Etheredge who is still active here as superintendent.  
Between 1943-46, Rev. J. D. F. Williams lead the church toward a unified budget and helped initiate a pledge system. During this period, the church organ was dedicated to Mr. and Mrs. S. D. Harper by their children. Miss E. Lee Harper has been organist a number of years and Ruby Harper and Mrs. Ora Harper Hunter are also active members.

Santa Anna saw a severe drought the following year and delayed the plans for a new building. But three years later during the pastorate of the Rev. J. B. Curry, the members voted to build a new church.  
The cornerstone of the present building was laid Feb. 14, 1914 with a Masonic ritual. About 20 members of the Women's Missionary Society pulled a rope through a block and tackle attached to a plow with Rev. Curry at the handles for the groundbreaking Jan. 26, 1914. Each member was expected to donate one day of labor.  
The first sermon was held in the new building May 10, 1914.

Methodist hymnals were bought with memorial and honor books donated under the pastorate of the Rev. W. F. Smith. The choir was also robed and improvements were made to the parsonage.  
REV. CARROLL THOMPSON became pastor and memorial stained glass windows were installed. With 372 members, \$10,833 was raised for all purposes. (He is now district superintendent at Temple.)  
Under Rev. Jack Payne, the youngest minister in church history here, the windows were completed and the sanctuary floor was refinished along with other improvements. During the ministry of Rev. Nolan Fisher, the old parsonage was razed and the present one was constructed.

Records for 1920 show that \$4,626 was raised and the pastor's salary was boosted to \$1,400. The total membership was 281.  
THE PARSONAGE across the street from the church was purchased in 1922. Sunday school attendance was averaging about 200 and the Epworth League, now the Methodist Youth Fellowship, had an average attendance of 60.  
The 25th pastor here, Rev. Hemer Vanderpool, stayed in Santa Anna a few months and later became pastor of a church at Dallas which recorded the largest Sunday school attendance in the world.

Rev. Frank L. Turner, Jr., now pastor of the Comanche First United Methodist Church, was pastor afterward. He was succeeded by the Rev. Ray Elliott, now superintendent of retired ministers of this conference after serving as pastor of the Brownwood Central United Methodist Church.  
During the pastorate of the Rev. H. H. Barnett the educational building was begun. It was completed under the Rev. Bobby Weathers, formerly at De Leon and now pastor of

Two books written by Catherine Marshall, "A Man Called Peter" and "To Live Again," have been added to the Santa Anna Public Library in recent weeks. The two books are on loan from the Brownwood Public Library.  
Brief reviews of the two books are as follows:  
A MAN CALLED PETER by Catherine Marshall  
At the time of the death of Peter Marshall, her minister husband in 1949, Catherine Marshall was left seemingly without love, without strength, without financial resources.  
Though not an editor, she selected and prepared a book of Peter Marshall's sermons which sold hundreds of thousands of copies and more important, showed how she could be of continuing service to God in helping spread her husband's ministry. Though not a writer, she wrote a biography of her husband, A MAN CALLED PETER, that became one of the most popular books of the decade, touching the lives of

thousands of people. Though without experience in motion pictures, as technical advisor she helped plan the story line of the highly successful movie based on her book.

#### TO LIVE AGAIN by Catherine Marshall

Here is a testament of one woman's deep belief in God and His love—and all that she was able to accomplish as a result of this belief. It is a stirring personal story written with a marvelous humility. She knows the plight of widows... the loneliness, the various stages of grief, the financial and social problems, the need for creative outlets, the complex matter of remarriage. Her story contains the answers to many of life's perplexing riddles.

Because Catherine Marshall's belief remained firm, hers is the story of the victory of faith over grief, and love over loneliness.

### ASC NEWS...

Farmers certifying and complying with cotton, wheat, and feed grain programs can expect program payment in July.  
Only a very few producers failed to certify their crops in June. A few farmers withdrew one or more of their crops from the program for failure to have sufficient land eligible for set-aside.  
The payments for the entire county will be somewhat larger than in previous years because the wheat and feed grain program contained provisions whereby producers could qualify on additional acreages and receive additional payments.  
Those farmers certifying early in June have already received their payments. One hundred and five checks were mailed last Friday totaling \$105,318. Other checks are expected within the next week.  
Cotton farmers have planted 23,780 acres of cotton. This is a substantial increase over the last several years. Coleman County has been planting in the neighborhood of 16,000 acres prior to this year.  
The county cotton allotment is 22,028 acres. Farmers may plant in excess of their allotment and comply with the program. This was one of the reasons of the increased plantings. The other reason being the price of cotton. A few producers contracted the cotton production this year for twenty-eight cents a pound.  
The drought is already taking its toll since thirty-five farmers could not get their grain sorghums planted and thirty-two cotton farmers could not plant their cotton due to natural drought disaster.  
Several farms west of Gouldbusk were hailed out recently. A severe blow to these farmers.

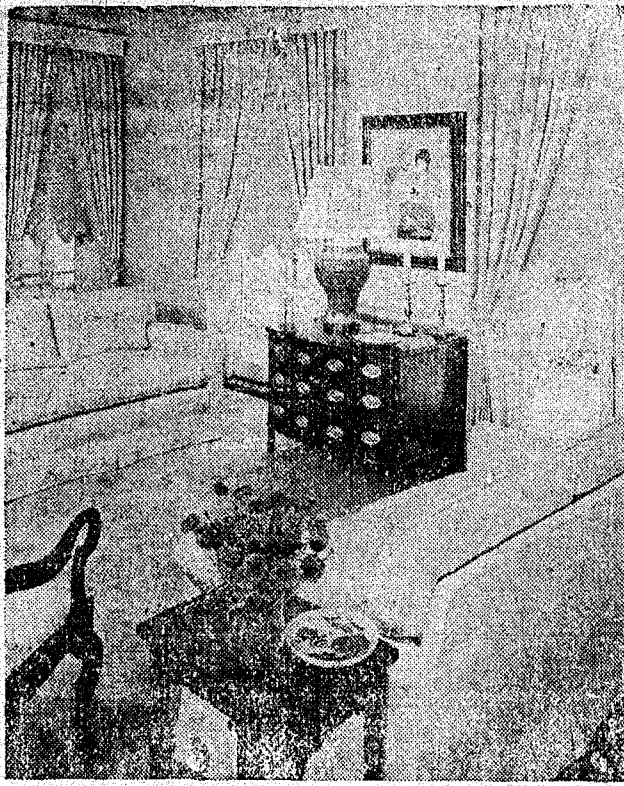

## ASC News . . .

Approximately one thousand farmers in Coleman County are scheduled to receive farm set-aside program payments totaling about \$800,000.

Nationwide, approximately 750,000 cotton, feed grain and wheat producers were mailed a total of \$850 million in expedited preliminary payments in time for the checks to arrive in producer's hands on July 1.

Payments under the set-aside programs are made to farmers who agree to set aside part of their land from production in order to meet a national objective of balancing supply and demand in certain commodities. These payments help to off-set the loss of returns from cropland that otherwise would be used for income-yielding production, and on which the farmer is obliged to continue to pay taxes and apply needed conservation steps, according to officials of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Payments to producers are limited to \$55,000 per person for each of three crops, feed grain, wheat, and cotton, under the Agricultural Act of 1970.

Nationally total payments are expected to be about \$3.7

billion.

Feed grain producers in the nation ultimately will receive about \$1.9 billion, cotton producers about \$825 million, and wheat producers about \$1 billion. Preliminary payments to wheat producers are limited by law to seventy-five percent of final payments. Final wheat certificate payments will be made after December 1. Feed grain and cotton farmers may or may not get a final payment, depending on market conditions.

The expected farm program payments are made possible by streamlined procedures inaugurated in 1970 by ASCS. The action enabled farmers to receive the entire payment due them in the 1970 and 1971 programs six to eight weeks earlier than everbefore.

These early payments help many producers reduce their need for long-term credit and cut the amount of interest paid. The flow of cash at this time will again be of major significance to rural communities and the U.S. agricultural economy, USDA officials said.

## SDA Study Shows A Longer Life

After a ten year study and comparisons, Dr. Richard T. Walden of Loma Linda Medical School gave out the information that Adventists live longer than their fellow Americans. Men live on an average of six years longer and women five years longer. He explains that members of the Seventh-day Adventist church rarely drink or smoke, use coffee and tea sparingly, eat much less meat than the national average, exercise regularly, and avoid being overweight.

In commenting on this D. F. Neufel states, "Remarkably, the Adventist life-style parallels in many ways that recommended by heart specialists. It contrasts sharply with the so-called 'good life' that characterizes the American style and which was criticized at the Ninth International Congress of Cardiology held in San Francisco recently.

Dr. Jeremiah Stamler, of the Chicago Health Research Foundation asks, "The risk of sudden death, coughing your guts out from cigarette smoking, being grossly overweight—how can you call this the essence of the 'good life'?"

From where did Seventh-day Adventists derive their health principles? What led them decades ahead of cardiologists to recommend a life-style that helps to prevent sudden death from heart diseases?

Health is a part of their religion. The Bible on which their religion is based teaches that man is a unit. Body as well as soul and spirit must be dedicated to God.

The health of the body profoundly affects a person's behavior. To the extent that health is impaired, a person becomes less competent to fulfill his role in the family, the church, and society. An abused body influences the nervous system and impairs spiritual functioning. Thus the religious life suffers. A diseased body makes a person less capable of choosing between right and wrong and thus contributes to the burdens of crime and misery.

For these reasons, Seventh-day Adventists believe it is their religious duty to keep their bodies in the best of health. Anything known to be deleterious to health they believe should be discarded. It is for this reason, not simply to live longer, that they discard such harmful practices as smoking, drinking, using tea and coffee, neglecting healthful exercise and rest, and overeating.
