The second confirmed case of screwworms has been reported in Coleman County recently. The latest case was from the Buddy Drake place in the Red Bank community, three miles north of Shields, where worms in the eye of a cow were identified as screwworms.

The first confirmed case in the county was on the S. D. Cupps ranch near Trickham.

Bill Brown of Coleman, the State Animal Health employee, stated that that (air drops of sterile flies are being made in the infested areas and that the livestock in the infested herds have been sprayed.

## Nine Teens Seek State Title At 4-H Round-Up Next Week

It's roundup time!

More than 1,800 4-H boys and girls from throughout the state will be invading the campus of Texas A & M University June 6-8 for the 1972 State 4-H Roundup. And they will be bringing a multitude of talents and abilities as they enter into statewide competition in more than 30 contests and demonstrations.

In addition to the 4-Hers, state 4-H officials say that some 600 adults including county Extension agents, 4-H leaders, friends of 4-H, contest donors and members of the board of directors of the Texas Youth Development Foundation will also be on hand.

The 4-Hers attending the Roundup have already been named county and district winners in various demonstrations and judging contests.

To be eligible to compete at the state level, the boys and girls must have won first or second place in district competition. There are 13 districts of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the parent organization of 4-H.

Those representing Coleman County and Santa Anna will be the District 7 4-H Share the Fun group, the Nine Teens. The musical ensemble, composed of SAHS students, will compete for state honors on Wednesday, June 7.

Sponsored by Mrs. Richard Horner and Mrs. Jane Wagner, the singing group has made a number of performances since winning county and district competition this spring.

Jimmy Benton is pianist for the group and also sings in the ensemble. Others are Linda Dean, Sherrie McIver, Janice Martin, Ricky Jones, Randy Long, David Horner, Mark Wagner and Sharon McCreary.

This year's Roundup will officially get under way with a general assembly at 5:30 p. m. on June 6 in G. R. White Coliseum. Special awards will be presented to 10 individuals, businesses and mass media representatives who have made outstanding contributions to 4-H work. These awards are provided by the Texas 4-H Youth Development Foundation.

One of the special activities of the Roundup is an adult leader recognition luncheon on June 7 honoring those who have given strong support to 4-H. Twenty-seven 4-H adult leaders will each receive a special plaque from the 4-H foundations. Contest winners and donors will be honored at a special recognition program that evening.

According to state 4-H officials, the annual Roundup is one of the oldest statewide 4-H gatherings in the nation. It began near the turn of the century before 4-H officially became the youth phase program of the Cooperative Extension Service.

Santa Anna public school driver education class began last week with 23 students enrolled. Pete Simmons of Coleman is teaching the course for the third consecutive year.

The classroom portion of the course is being taught in the big self-contained mobile unit which is parked on the school campus. The large unit is furnished by the Region XV Education Service Center of San Angelo and includes an air-conditioned class room complete with projectors, and screens, and the very latest in instructional equipment. The classroom work will be completed on Friday, June 9.

The driving portion of the course includes at least six hours of actual behind-the-wheel driving for the students and six hours of observing as other students drive. The local class will also go to Coleman for three days for practice with a driving simulator which is being used by the Coleman driver education group.

SINCE THE ATTEMPTED ASSASSINATION of Governor George C. Wallace, the cry for legislation against guns has again risen and many are calling for more laws to control the sale of guns.

Many people believe that additional gun laws will be an automatic cure-all for such attempted assassinations and crime, but if they will investigate, they will find that the individual who shot the governor was in violation of firearm control laws before he fired. What is needed is strict enforcement of the laws already on the books.

If additional laws are needed, they should be directed toward prohibiting the sale of crudely made and unsafe hand guns not suited for sporting purposes. It would be awfully hard for one to conceal a weapon that would be suitable for the sportsman in any kind of gathering.

There are places where one may buy small hand guns and their sale most certainly should be regulated. Last year Senator Birch Bayh introduced a bill against the so-called "Saturday Night Special." Even most sportsmen would support legislation against this bill. However the definition of what constitutes a sporting gun and the "Saturday Night Special" will have to be spelled out in no uncertain terms.

In a country with the freedom of the United States, it is hard to legislate anything that does not have some adverse effect on someone. Any gun legislation would be hard on someone who would only use a gun legally, but because of our freedoms, sometimes the rights of someone must be infringed upon.

THIS MEMORIAL DAY brings to mind the continued slaughter of people on the highways of this nation, and the fact that most of the deaths are due to carelessness on the part of some driver.

At the same time, we have a large group who are demonstrating against the war in Vietnam and our loss of men in that affair.

We wonder why they don't do some demonstrating about the traffic losses which far outnumber any deaths in any war this nation has ever been in.

According to statistics since 1900, more than two and a half times as many people have been killed on our highways than we have lost in every war this nation has fought in its history. The death record in 1971 alone was more than American battle fatalities in nine years of the Vietnam war.

It is too late to say drive carefully over Memorial Day, but maybe we can remember these statistics the next time we get out on the highway.

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STATE **Capital NEWS** By BILL BOYKIN

Austin — The long-awaited special finance session of the Texas Legislature has been called for 10 a.m. June 14.

Gov. Preston Smith issued the official proclamation last week, stating repeatedly he plans to present a 1973 budget which will require no new taxes.

The governor, who has implied he would veto a tax bill, said he does not think lawmakers can pass on without his placing the subject of revenue on the special session agenda.

Under the proclamation, Smith will allow legislators to consider "such other subjects as the governor may submit from time to time."

However, he made clear he does not plan to open the call to any other business until the 1973 budget — financing state operations from Sept. 1, 1972 - August 31, 1973 — is finally passed.

Smith vetoed all 1973 fiscal year appropriations adopted by the legislature during the 1971 regular session. In anticipation of more federal aid (that never was received), the Legislature did not enact a 1973 welfare budget — which made a special session inevitable even without the governor's veto.

A proposed state officials' code of ethics and a recommendation for repeal of a controversial new trailer brake law are among items to be offered the special session for action after passage of the appropriations act.

There is some speculation Smith may try to avoid the need for new taxes by proposing a welfare program finance act covering less than a full fiscal year. This would leave the balance of 1973 welfare appropriations as emergency business for the regular session next year.

**COURTS SPEAK** — The State Supreme Court dismissed the appeal of a Dallas man who sought a reduction of the \$250,000 fee awarded his ex-wife's attorneys in a divorce action.

The High Court upheld a Houston court of civil appeals finding that high fees collected by a woman in an insurance case were the result of the insurance company's prolonging litigation. National Life Insurance Company protested that legal fees ran five times as much as the insured collected.

In another case, the Supreme Court agreed that the state was immune from damages, after a blind San Antonio boy drowned in a Texas State School for the Blind pool.

**PARTY SWITCHING ILLEGAL** — Secretary of State Bob Bullock issued a stern warning that June 3 runoff election voters must "stay in the party primary where they voted on May 6."

Bullock said Republicans who voted in the GOP first primary or Democrats who voted in their own May 6 primary cannot switch and participate in the other party's runoff primary.

If violations are discovered,

said Bullock, they will be turned over to prosecuting authorities. It is also a violation, of course, for voters to cast ballots in two different precincts, within the same party, reminding the chief state election officer.

**\$25 MILLION IN BONDS SOLD** — A total of \$25 million in bonds have been sold to municipalities under the state's new financial assistance program for improvement or construction of sewage treatment facilities.

Texas Water Quality Board reported it has received 106 applications for loans of water quality enhancement funds amounting to \$28.77 million, and 72 applications totalling \$24.63 million have been approved. Thirty-four applications are pending in the amount of \$4.1 million, and \$4.2 million has been transferred to 16 projects where bids have been approved and cities are ready to start construction. Loans went to Atlanta, Borger, Clarksville City, Cleburne, Conroe, Dallas (four projects), Iowa Park, Mineral Wells, Montgomery County FWSD No. 2, Nueces County WCID No. 4, Rosenberg, Seagoville and Wortham.

The program makes it possible for cities to make improvements at about 25 per cent of project costs to themselves. Bonds provide the state's share, and the federal government pays the rest.

**AG OPINIONS** — A \$1 special fee is applicable to all delinquent tax receipts and certificates issued by county tax assessor-collectors for special districts and should be included in a "state cost" item on forms furnished by the comptroller, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded:

\* A requirement that portions of tuition fees be placed in a scholarship fund applies to charges for vocational-technical courses at public junior colleges. Up to 10 per cent of the fund may be paid to out-of-state students.

\* Collin - Denton County Water and Sanitation District has constitutional power to collect and dispose of garbage.

**APPOINTMENTS** — Governor Smith appointed H. Deskins Wells, Wellington newspaper publisher, Interstate Compact Commissioner for the Red River, succeeding William R. Elliott of Sherman.

Smith appointed Graham Bruce of Orange 128th district, and he picked B. R. (Pat) Fuller former Eagle Pass and San Marcos city manager, to head the Texas Department of Community Affairs.

William J. Pitstick is new chairman of the governmental operations committee of the Texas Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations. George Schrader of Dallas is chairman of the TACIR information services committee.

**GUARD CALLED OUT** — National Guard units from San Antonio and Austin were called out by the governor in a

pilot traffic safety effort over the Memorial Day weekend.

The Guardsmen rode as second man in highway patrol cars or manned Guard trucks and jeeps on "lifesaving" patrol.

If the experiment proves successful, Smith said he may call Guard units to special duty during other holiday weekends.

Meanwhile, law enforcement officers and traffic court judges were urged to "handle traffic violators in the full measure which our laws provide."

**LEGISLATORS HIT** — A former state legislator received a four-year prison sentence for using state stamps to buy a second-hand pickup truck, and four other present or former lawmakers were indicted.

Ex-Rep. Walter Knapp of Amarillo drew the prison sentence. Former Sen. David Ratliff of Stamford and Rep. John Allen of Longview were indicted in a scheme to hire each other's children as legislative aides without requiring them to work. Rep. Tom Holmes of Granbury faced indictment for allegedly using House of Representatives issued postage stamps to pay most of the price of a pickup truck. Former Rep. Hudson Moyer of Amarillo faces accusation of using House postage stamps to pay off a \$8,000 bank loan.

Travis County District Attorney Robert O. Smith, who prosecuted former House Speaker Gus Mutscher, handled all the investigations and vowed to crack down on any legislator who gets out of line if he can make a case.

**SHORT SNORTS**

Liberal Democrats are maneuvering to keep State Democratic Executive Committee Chairman Roy Orr from presiding at the state party convention in San Antonio June 13.

Agriculture Commissioner John White claims a grain theft ring was broken with the arrest of three itinerant grain truck operators at Cleburne.

Forty-two Texas prison inmates are on death row as the U.S. Supreme Court studies whether the death penalty is constitutional. There has not been an execution in the Texas electric chair since July 1964.

Veterinarians warned that Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis (VEE) vaccine should be administered to horses only by accredited vets.

State Health Department employees announced a massive attack against venereal disease financed by a \$1.17 million federal grant.

The Texas construction boom may be passing its peak, according to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

A Senate study committee report estimated a million Texans have used marijuana, and found state punishment excessive.

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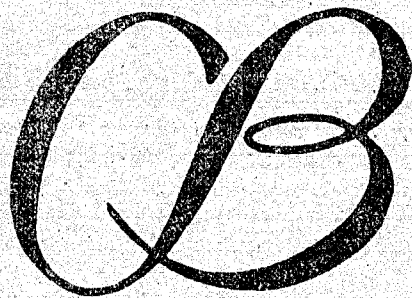
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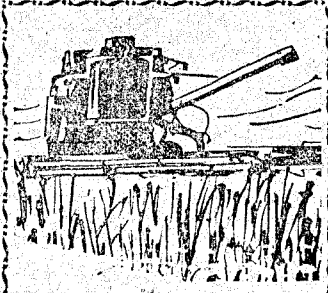


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## Rural Route

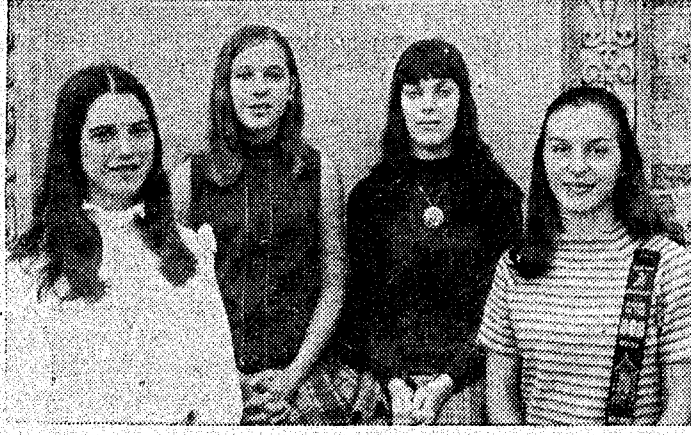

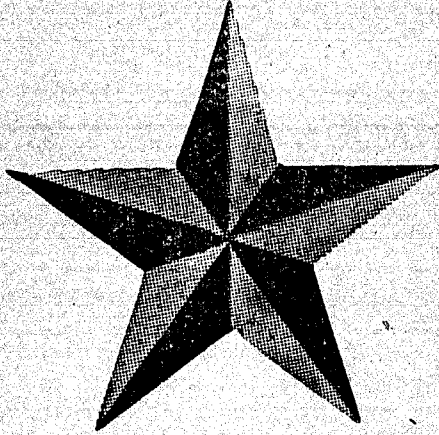

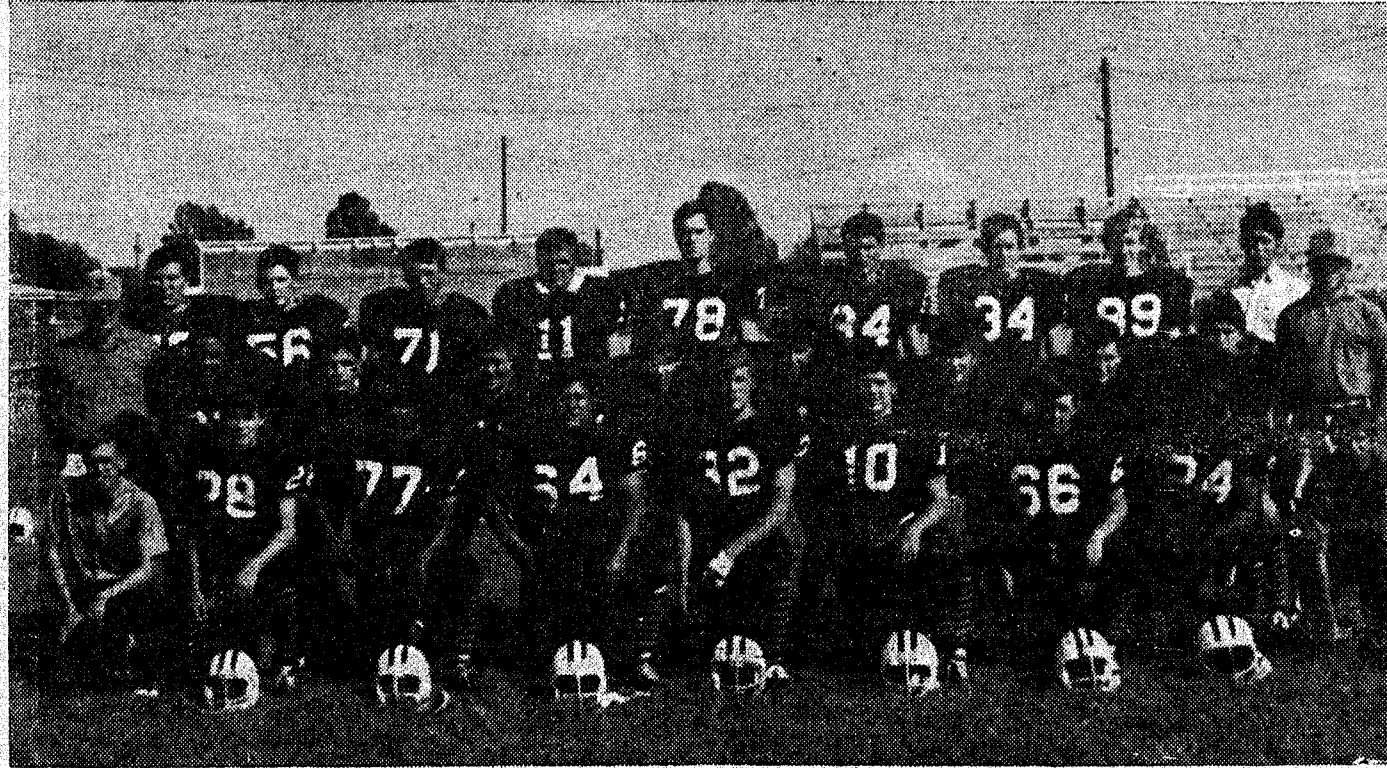

as castration, dehorning, and docking should be postponed until cooler weather, if at all possible.

4. All animals being shipped from infected areas should be sprayed before being moved. Animals, arriving at ranches from infected areas, should be thoroughly inspected for wormy wounds before being turned out on the range.

5. Samples of all worms that are found in wounds should be collected and sent immediately to the Mission Screwworm Lab for identification. Sample bottles can be secured from the Lab or from county agents.
