Coleman County Junior Rodeo Starts Tonight, Ends Saturday

The annual Coleman County Junior Rodeo will be held this week with the opening performance to start at 8 o'clock tonight. The first activity of the three-day event will be a downtown parade (Thursday afternoon (today) at 5:00 p.m. in Coleman.

Performances will be held through Saturday night with over 200 entries expected in the 13 events.

Miss Jamie Hemphill, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy Hemphill of Coleman, is queen of the Junior Rodeo Association and will be introduced at each performance. Jamie is a student at Coleman High School.

Events in the rodeo will include tie down calf roping, ribbon roping, barrel racing, bull and steer riding, goat tying, pole bending, bareback bronc riding, and break-away calf roping. Trophy buckles will be awarded winners of each event and prizes will be given to the second and third place winners.

Local people are invited to attend the rodeo this weekend. Proceeds from the rodeo are used for a scholarship fund for some county college student.

Fish Kill Set Next Saturday At City Lake

The City of Santa Anna has slated a fish kill at the new city lake (Lake Sealy) on Saturday, August 12. Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials will be on hand to conduct the kill which is to eradicate all the undesirable fish from the lake.

Poison, toxic only to fish, will be put in the water early Saturday morning. It is expected that the fish will be killed and coming to the surface by 8:30 or 9:00 a.m. All area people are invited to be on hand for the fish kill and will be charged only one dollar a car to enter the lake property Saturday morning.

Although the poison will not affect the lake water for human consumption, it is planned to use water directly from Lake Brownwood for several days after the fish kill.

TP&W tests earlier this summer showed the new city lake to be inhabited by rough or undesirable fish while the old city lake is stocked with perch, crappie and other good game fish. The new lake will be re-stocked with channel catfish this fall, according to city officials.

New Assignment At Guam Air Base For Lin Wristen

Sgt. Lin Wristen left last week for a new assignment with the Air Force in Guam. He began the tour of duty on August 1.

CCTC Leaders Attend Confab In Denver, Colo.

Coleman County Telephone Cooperative manager Thomas Wristen, and directors Gordon Monsey, Grady McIver, Glen Copeland and Topsy Beaver, and their wives attended the recent regional meeting of the National Telephone Cooperative Association in Denver, Colo.

The Santa Anna delegation drove to Denver Monday of last week and returned at the weekend.

Total attendance at the meeting was approximately 150 managers and directors of telephone cooperatives and small independent telephone companies from throughout an eleven state area.

Conference sessions this year were centered on coping with problems and opportunities posed by new federal initiatives. Among the new laws discussed by speakers and by a panel were equal employment opportunity, fair credit reporting and rural development.

A highlight of the three-day meeting was the address of David A. Hamil, the Administrator of the Rural Electrification Administration. The Coleman County Telephone Co-op is a borrower from REA and obtains all of its capital from that agency. Mr. Hamil discussed REA loan activities during 1972 and the progress which has been made by the Rural Telephone Bank.

The National President of NTCA, James D. O'Connor, of Hancock, Indiana also addressed the meeting and told delegates that the biggest problem which faces them is meeting successfully the ever-increasing subscriber demands for first-class telephone service.

The National Telephone Cooperative Association is headquartered in Washington, D. C. and represents the nation's 238 rural telephone cooperatives. It has members in states coast to coast.

CCTC delegates also attended a one-day seminar which immediately preceded the general sessions. Taught by Dr. Elliott Thoreson, Chairman of the Department of Business and Economics at Augustana College, Sioux Falls, South Dakota, the seminar sought to inspire the leaders of small telephone companies to more efficiently use their resources in solving the increasingly complex problems which face them.

Offset Equipment Being Installed For Publishing News and Gazette

The Santa Anna News will now be printed by the most modern process of the day. Along with many other papers over the state it will be printed by the "offset" process.

"It is just a matter of keeping up with the times," W. T. Hays, publisher, said. "The offset newspaper has a better appearance and gives more variety to a publication." The

management plans to run more pictures and other features that are of interest to the readers.

Other than printing on a different press, there will be no great change in the paper as far as operation. The press will be used to print The News and The Brown County Gazette, but its local operation will remain about like it is. Barba Kingsbery will still edit and write the news and Billie Gregg will still handle the advertising as in the past.

For the convenience of the mechanical staff and in an effort to maintain a smooth "back shop" operation the press will be installed in Bangs. However that is merely a technical part of the publication of a newspaper and will have no effect on the service the paper provides the Santa Anna area readers.

Some equipment for the new operation has arrived and more is enroute from the factory, so a definite date for the changeover is not certain, but is expected to take place in the near future.

There will be some changes in the format of the paper, in an effort to make it a more easily read and handled paper, but other than that it will be "business as usual in the same old stand."

When the change is made the management will appreciate any comments from our readers about the product. We hope it will be a better newspaper in every way than we have been able to produce before.

FB Conference To Be Attended By County Head

Max Eubank, Coleman County Farm Bureau President, will be in Austin this week to attend a statewide conference for county Farm Bureau presidents. The meeting will be held at the Villa Capri Motor Hotel from Wednesday through Friday.

Issues facing agriculture will be discussed along with new programs of the Farm Bureau. Leaders from most of the 206 organized county units will attend the meeting, representing a membership of 130,000.

Speakers will include J. T. Woodson of Fannin County, president of the State organization, Warren Newberry of Waco, AFB executive director, and Jack Angell of Chicago, farm labor specialist for the American Farm Bureau Federation.

Neal J. Robinson, consultant with a Dallas-based market research firm, will report on a farmer-rancher image study conducted in Dallas recently for the Texas Farm Bureau.

Issues to be discussed during the conference include transportation, farm labor, environmental pollution, financing of public education, taxes, predatory animal and fire ant control, screwworm program and property rights.

Mrs. Eubank and three children will accompany Mr. Eubank to Austin and will visit at Lake Travis with her sister, Mr. and Mrs. Bob Jones and family.

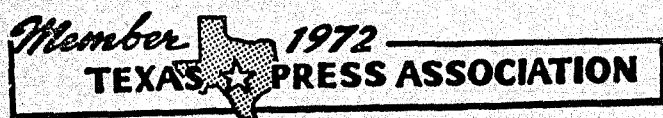

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In Our Opinion

SOME MAY THINK that George McGovern's selection of Sargent Shriver for a running mate will strengthen the ticket, but people in this part of the country will disagree.

Although Shriver has been active in governmental affairs and has had some good political jobs in the past and is also friendly with some of the old guard Democrats and labor.

However, the convention mess left some hard feelings that may be hard to cure, and besides, Shriver will not help the ticket in Texas much, if any.

Several people were contacted to take second place on the ticket before Shriver accepted, but it seems they, including Senator Muskie, didn't feel that it would be worth the effort. Could it be that they read the handwriting on the wall?

As the nominees stand, we don't think that they can carry any southern state, and believe that they will lose a lot of the north. They will carry the liberal element from all sections, and the welfare supporters of the \$6,500 per year guaranteed annual income.

Shriver was head of the Peace Corps among other things and is a brother-in-law to the Kennedys. That may not necessarily put him in a category, but it would be pretty hard to completely disassociate him with the Kennedy ideology, and that would carry little weight in this area, or the South.

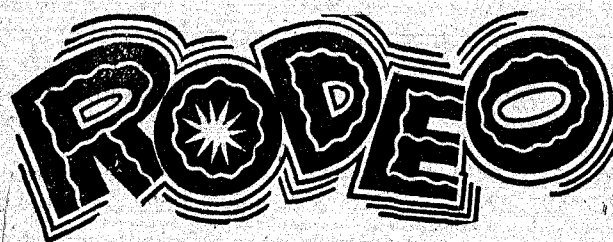
Of course the Republicans and President Nixon are not the most popular in this traditional Democratic state. They have come in for considerable criticism over the economic situation, but most of us country people see eye-to-eye with them on the handling of the war in Viet Nam. At the same time, the McGovern group, and we feel that Shriver would go along, want to pull everything out and take our chances on the return of the war prisoners. We wonder what their argument is about the French who have never been heard of since they pulled out many years ago. They were not returned home, and probably none of them are still alive.

The Eagleton fiasco in itself was enough to throw a lot of water on the campaign fires of the Democrats, and say what you will, there are some who will not support the ticket over that. It is obvious, however, that his remaining in the VP slot would not have helped either, after all the adverse publicity, whether true or not, and much of it was apparently untrue.

So, again we face the problem of the lesser of the evils. That has gotten to be the situation in a lot of political races of late, and it is a shame. Because of the filthy political situation, anyone who wants to preserve his reputation will not enter a political race because if opponents can't dig up something true to make a skeleton in the closet, they will find something that is untrue. A good man doesn't have a chance.

Austin — A recent statewide survey shows 22 per cent of Texans, or 2.5 million, are poor compared to a nationwide rate of 1 per cent.

Further, Texas accounts for nearly 10 per cent of the nation's poor.

Texas Office of Economic Opportunity submitted the 300-page report to Governor Preston Smith, terming it the most comprehensive study ever undertaken among the Texas poor.

The Rio Grande Valley area was shown as having the highest incidence of poverty in the state — 42.2 per cent of the population. East Texas was next with 29 per cent poverty rate.

The East Texas and Lower Rio Grande Valley areas also have the smallest proportion of persons completing high school.

About 55 per cent of the heads of poor households are employed, and 70 per cent of those have fulltime permanent jobs, according to the study.

However, low income levels make it difficult for these persons to bring their families out of poverty.

Guidelines for the report set poverty level for a family of four at an income of \$3,800.

More than one third of the Texas poor are children under 15, and four out of five are black or Mexican-American.

George P. Taylor, TOEO director, said the report will be the basis of programs to alleviate poverty in the state. Recommendations include bringing in new industry to decrease unemployment, housing expansion and better health care and food programs.

A proposed four-year anti-poverty plan for Texas would seek \$6.3 million in aid from national and regional OEO.

REFORM SESSION STUDIED

Governor Smith disclosed he is putting together a "full package" of insurance reform proposals in case he decides to call a special legislative session this year.

Reports indicated the governor was serious when he said he may call such a session on insurance matters. Smith himself continued to lash out at the insurance regulatory board. When members ordered a rate cut for auto insurance averaging 11 per cent statewide, Smith said a 21 per cent reduction was in order.

Smith said he must work closely with legislative leadership to achieve anything in a special session, but Lt. Governor Ben Barnes and House Speaker Rayford Price said he hasn't said a word to them about his plans.

If Smith calls the session, apparently he will propose wholesale reorganization of the board and a controlled competitive rate system for property and auto insurance.

ELECTION BILLS PAID — The state ran out of money before it paid 1972 primary election expenses and fell about \$325,000 short of meeting all its bills.

The last \$117,000 available was sent to county officials last week. A lot of election workers, printers, and suppliers have not been paid for their work.

The money was dispersed on a pro rata basis, amounting to 26.66 per cent of bills still outstanding in the counties. Remaining expenses will have to go uncompensated until the 1973 Legislature can make appropriations. An appropriation of \$2.1 million was set aside by the Legislature last spring for the 1973 primaries.

"I can find no other source of funds available at this time," said Secretary of State Bob

Bullock. "When we have paid all the county chairmen, we will not have one cent remaining of the \$2.1 million appropriated."

AG OPINIONS — Death penalties may be commuted to life sentences at any stage between jury verdict and granting of a new trial, Attorney General Crawford C. Martin held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded:

- One convicted of a felony may have rights of citizenship restored and become eligible to hold public office.

- A county clerk may record marks and brands given the same name if the marks or brands are themselves different.

- Podiatrists may not create a professional association under the Texas Professional Act but can create a professional corporation where all shareholders are licensed podiatrists.

- The county attorney of Harris County may investigate election frauds, although the primary duty is that of the district attorney.

- Established procedural rules for parole revocation under a new U.S. Supreme Court decision are not applicable to revocations prior to June 29, 1972.

- Parks and Wildlife Department officers have duty to preserve the peace and disperse riots.

- A notary who continues to meet any one of three statutory requirements has not "permanently removed" himself or created an automatic vacancy.

- A former state employee who was eligible to be a member of the Employees Retirement System is not eligible to receive a Texas Ranger pension.

COURT MERGER URGED

Merger of the Texas Supreme Court and Court of Criminal Appeals elimination of municipal and justice of the peace courts and non-partisan election of judges were proposed by the Chief Justice's Task Force for Court Improvement.

A series of seminars are being scheduled over the state to hear comments on the proposed revisions.

Under the recommendations, courts of civil appeals would become courts of appeals handling both criminal and civil cases.

The Legislature would be directed to create a system of county courts at law to perform the judicial functions now performed by all courts below the district level.

UNEMPLOYMENT JUMPS — A jump in the unemployment rate last month was spurred largely by new graduates and summer job seekers, according to Texas Employment Commission.

The jobless rate reached 4.6 per cent statewide, but this was less than the 5.3 per cent rate of June, 1971.

Actually, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reports, the Texas economy is getting better and better, and 1972 second-quarter and first-half performances of economic indicators ended on a solid upbeat. No boom is yet in sight, however.

APPOINTMENTS — Dick Whittington, formerly of Deviers in Liberty County, has been named deputy director of Texas Water Quality Board, succeeding Joe P. Teller.

Governor Smith appointed William H. Earney of Marfa district judge of the 83rd judicial district. He succeeds the late C. E. Patterson.

SHORT SNORTS

A special election is set for September 16 in District 46, Place 3 of Brooks, Cameron, Kenedy, and Willacy counties to select a successor to Rep. J. A. Garcia Jr. of Raymondville who resigned.

Agriculture Commissioner John White warned early destruction of cotton stalks in the Lower Rio Grande Valley is necessary to fight the pink bollworm menace.

New information on Texas fairs, fiestas, and celebrations during August and September is available from the highway department.

Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong has been elected secretary of the Western States Land Commissioners Association.

New bank charter applications have been filed for Woodway (McLennan County) and Addicks (Harris County).

Four minor party lawsuits to get on the November general election ballot have been set for hearing before three federal judges in San Antonio September 7.

A Senate committee probing health care costs was told hospitalization in Texas isn't quite as high as the national average — if that's any consolation.

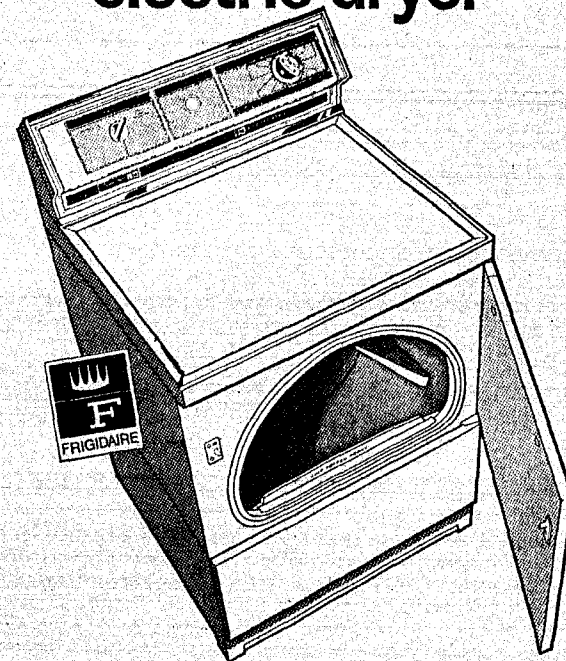

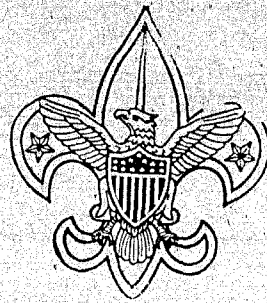

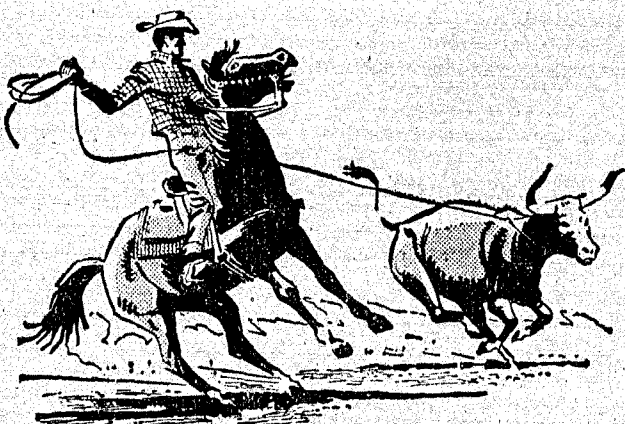

They weren't much interested. Their interest became lively when Dr. Preson's sister was discovered drugged in his apartment, and acute when a definite murder attempt was made.

Pam and Jerry North come into the picture since Jerry is Dr. Preson's publisher, a happy publisher, too, for the learned Curator of Fossil Mammals has the touch that converts research into best-sellers. Soon they are very much involved in some strange doings among the cases of ancient bones in the Bradley Institute of Paleontology.

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER 6 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 7)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article VIII, Section 1-b, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 1-b. (a) Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads as now defined by law shall be exempt from all taxation for all State purposes.

(b) From and after January 1, 1973, the governing body of any county, city, town, school district, or other political subdivision of the State may exempt by its own action not less than Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed value of residence homesteads of persons sixty-five (65) years of age or older from all ad valorem taxes thereafter levied by the political subdivision. As an alternative, upon receipt of a petition signed by twenty percent (20%) of the voters who voted in the last preceding election held by the political subdivision, the governing body of the subdivision shall call an election to determine by majority vote whether an amount not less than Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) as provided in the petition, of the assessed value of residence homesteads of persons sixty-five (65) years of age or over shall be exempt from ad valorem taxes thereafter levied by the political subdivision. Where any ad valorem tax has heretofore been pledged for the payment of any debt, the taxing officers of the political subdivision shall have authority to continue to levy and collect the tax against the homestead property at the same rate as the tax so pledged until the debt is discharged, if the cessation of the levy would impair the obligation of the contract by which the debt was created."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the various political subdivisions of the State may exempt not less than Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the value of residence homesteads of all persons sixty-five (65) years of age or older from ad valorem taxes under certain conditions."

NUMBER 3 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 41)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 61, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 61. All district officers in the State of Texas and all county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000) or more, according to the then last preceding Federal Census, shall be compensated on a salary basis. In all counties in this State, the Commissioners Courts shall be authorized to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts, to compensate all justices of the peace, constables, deputy constables and precinct law enforcement officers on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1973; and in counties having a population of less than twenty thousand (20,000), according to the then last preceding Federal Census, the Commissioners Courts shall also have the authority to determine whether county officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts to compensate all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, county law enforcement officers in-

ASC NEWS...

At the State and local levels, the functions and responsibilities of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, as well as those of the Commodity Credit Corporation, are administered by State, county and community Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) committees.

These committees are established in accordance with the provisions of section 8(b) of the Soil Conservation and Domestic Allotment Act of 1935, as amended.

The committee system administrative line in the field starts with Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) State committees. Under the general supervision of these State committees are some three thousand elected ASC county committees, most of which are in turn assisted by elected committees in designated local communities.

ASC State committees include from three to five members, appointed by the Secretary of Agriculture. In addition, in each State the Director of the Agriculture Extension Service is an ex officio member of the committee.

The State committee is responsible for the administration of farm programs in each State and for general supervision of the work of county committees. Each State committee appoints a State executive director who supervises and directs the work of the State office staff under policies established by the committee.

The ASC county committees, one in each "agricultural" county, have three farmer-elected delegates to a county convention. Since 1966, one committeeman is elected each year, with two committeemen being holdovers. The county agricultural extension agent is a non-voting ex officio member of the committee.

Alternate county committeemen are elected at the time of the annual committeemen elections. If for any reason a committeeman cannot serve, either temporarily or permanently, the first alternate committeeman serves in his place.

Each ASC county committee employs a county executive director who, for the committee, hires the necessary employees for office work and fieldwork and sees that the day-to-day office and field operations are effectively performed. The county committee, however, is responsible for program and administrative policies and decisions at the county level.

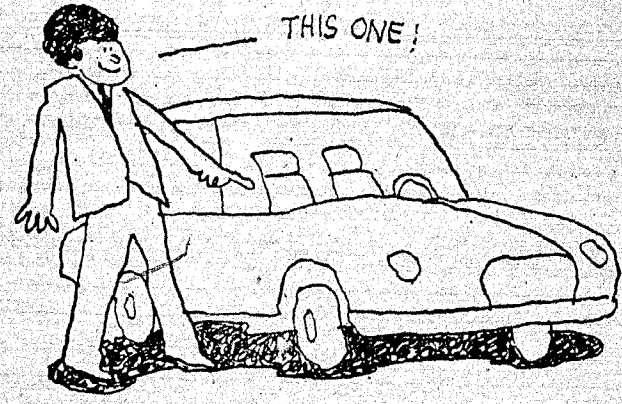

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
