Local Girl in National Contest In Atlanta, Georgia This Week

Miss Texas Teen-Ager, Carol Kingsbery of Santa Anna, is in Atlanta, Ga., this week taking part in the Miss National Teen-Ager contest and pageant. The SAHS senior was accompanied to Atlanta by her mother, Mrs. Tom Kingsbery, and her grandmother, Mrs. C. D. Bruce.

The Santa Anna delegation left Abilene by plane Tuesday morning, stopping in Dallas to change planes for the remainder of the trip. Pageant officials met the Texas title holder in Atlanta

and took her to the pageant headquarters, the Executive Park Motor Hotel.

The schedule for the week includes tours of Atlanta, parties, luncheons rehearsals, and other contest activities. Each contestant representing the 50 states and the District of Columbia will have an essay on "What's Right About America", the pageant theme. Each girl will also display a scrapbook of her activities. Prizes will be awarded to the winners in each category.

The state winners will have personal interviews with the judges and each will give their essays. The official judges will also meet and visit with the contestants at a dinner and will attend the rehearsals during the week.

Although there is no talent competition, each contestant was invited to take part in a "Do Your Own Thing" talent show. Carol will do a twirling routine as her talent presentation.

Several of the rehearsals will be held at the Atlanta Memorial Arts Center, the site of the Saturday night pageant. There will be two production numbers during the Saturday night finals with the 51 girls having costumes for each number in addition to their formal attire. On Friday the contestants will be guests of Atlanta Mayor Sam Massell at lunch.

The Saturday night finals will not be nationally televised, according to a late bulletin from the contest headquarters. However the entire week's activities will be filmed for possible later TV showing.

The winner of the national title will receive a new automobile, an expense-paid trip to the Holy Land, scholarships and gifts. Runners-up will also be given awards at the close of the contest.

State winners in the contest will be judged on appearance, poise, personality, scholastic and community achievement.

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In Our Opinion

ON MEET THE PRESS Sunday, Vice President Spiro Agnew made a real good impression to most people. He answered the questions put to him well and sensibly. And sitting before four news reporters who do not mind popping any kind of question is no picnic for anyone, as many can vouch for.

One of the things that he said was long past due and the newspapers and other media of the news should have been publicizing it all along. He said "They (the opposition party) speak of the bombing of the North, but never mention the rocketing of the cities of the South by the aggressors." He went on to say that whole segments of the population in the south have been obliterated by enemy rockets without regard to men, women or children. Yet the Democratic nominees never mention this when they criticize the bombing of the north. "Also," he said, "it is a funny thing, but if the Thieu government is so repressive, why is it that all the refugees from battle areas are always going south. If the North is such a good government, why don't they go north to escape the battle areas?"

To many people, Agnew would be a better candidate for the Republicans than President Nixon. In fact his views come nearer matching those of the people of this area than anyone else in high places. However, he will not be the presidential nominee, so that is how it is.

FORMER GOVERNOR John Connally was also on nation wide television Sunday when he appeared on "Issues and Answers."

Connally was queried considerably on his acceptance of the chairman ship of the Democrats for Nixon committee on a nation wide basis. He explained his acceptance of this job with one simple sentence: "I just believe that President Nixon is by far the best man of the two for the job."

Connally, who was a close friend of President Johnsons, and has been a life-long Democrat, has publicly and emphatically gone on record as supporting the President over George McGovern. As to that stand, he has a lot of support in Texas. It would be our prediction that Nixon will carry Texas this year in a landslide. Most Texans just cannot swallow the wild, liberal ideology of McGovern.

Reporters asked Connally if this stand would ruin his standing in the Democratic Party, and he said "if it does, so be it. I just cannot put my political life above my country." For that we must admire him during a time when almost all politicians put their own welfare above their country, it seems.

As far as we are concerned, Connally is a typical Texan in his thinking and we believe he is doing the right thing. So we join him in his stand against McGovern.

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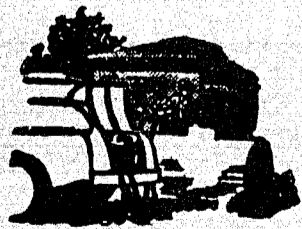

An accidental remark by a retarded handyman gives Mac his first lead and turns those four days into a nightmare and a grim race with death.

DEADLINE is another fine Dewey mystery novel in the suspenseful Hammett tradition, a solid, well-knit, ironic story of the many faces of justice.

According to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials, 454 Texans have died from water-oriented accidents in the first seven months of this year.

Of that already tragic figure, the saddest of all is that persons under 20 accounted for over half the drownings.

Each year the state adds to its lakes and increases the recreational potential for all Texans. Each year we lose more of our youngsters who cannot swim 50 feet to safety.

Perhaps a water survival program in the athletic departments of our schools would reduce the waste of young life.

Adults are the victims when it

comes to boating accidents.

Boaters between 26 and 50 accounted for most of this year's 166 accidents.

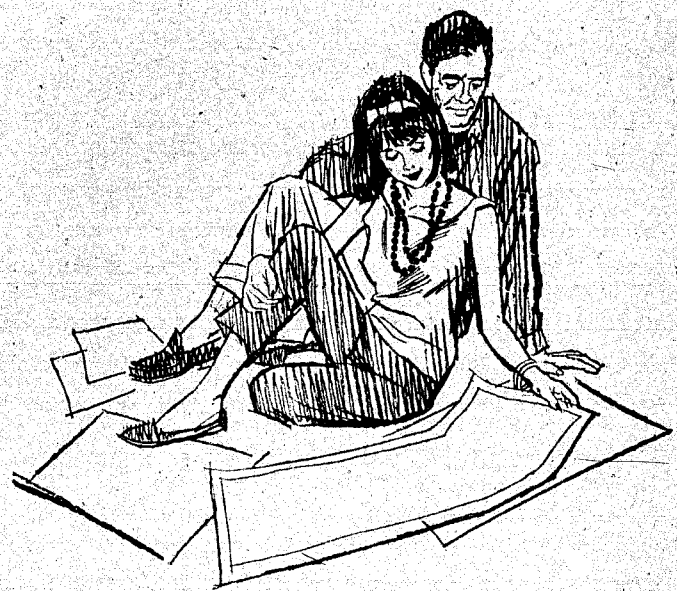
These boating Texans lost over \$100,000 in damages and 43 lives.

Kids Water Skiing Must Wear Vests

Water skiers who are 12 years of age or younger must wear U. S. Coast Guard vest-type life preservers to be in compliance with the law, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials.

The law states that water skiers are occupants of the boats which are pulling them. Therefore, skiers are subject to the provisions of the Texas Water Safety Act.

This means ski belts are out for the young skiers. It also means that while the older skiers may wear the belts, there must be a Coast Guard approved lifesaving device on board the boat for them.

ACCENT ON HEALTH

Air pollution is damaging people, plants, animals. And art treasures, even those inside museums.

"The contaminated atmospheres over modern industrial centers are shortening the life span of many forms of art," says Dr. A. J. Haagen-Smit, a biochemist at the California Institute of Technology. "Frescoes, stonework, tapestries, paintings, have all been subject to to some kind of chemical attack." Auto emissions and industrial pollutants are the chief culprits. At Boston's Museum of Fine Arts, fumes from a nearby garbage disposal plant have been pinpointed as the source of a tough black substance that has encrusted hundreds of ancient bronzes. The Museum of Modern Art in New York-- whose outdoor metal sculptures are coated with many layers of a heavy wax to protect them from pollution-- inspects its indoor galleries every day for the effects of gases and soot that are sucked in through air ducts and corrode the paintings. Today museum people regard air-filtering systems as the best method of coping with air pollution. The most successful both filter and "wash" the incoming air, removing from 85 to 95 percent of atmospheric impurities. But pollutants from auto exhaust still creep through the filter systems. The best systems, says Dr. Haagen-Smit, have elaborate charcoal absorption filters combined with washing devices. These systems, however, are so expensive that most museums cannot afford them. Air pollution's damage to the art of all ages can be seen by the naked eye. Its effect on human lungs is reflected in the rising rate of respiratory disease. Find out how you can combat air pollution. Contact your local tuberculosis and respiratory disease association. It's a matter of life

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

CROSS PLAINS
Checking on a lead by Cross Plains City Marshal Chuck Thomas for Comanche County officials has led to the arrest and charges being filed against 18 suspects, recovery of an estimated \$2,000 in stolen property and solving of between 15 and 20 thefts and burglaries.

Thomas, Coleman County Sheriff Corky Chapman and Cross Plains officers have worked on the case since last week on the series of arrests, charge filing and recovery of the stolen merchandise.

Cases dating back as far as two and a half years have been cleared, in Callahan, Coleman, Comanche and Eastland counties, and several within the city limits of Cross Plains. Most of the offenses were of the residential and farm burglary type although some felony theft charges have been filed.

At least 18 persons, most from Cross Plains, have been implicated. Ages range from 12 to 20 years of age.

Thus far an estimated \$2,000 worth of stolen goods have been recovered. Thomas said that merchandise has been picked up in Cross Plains, Odessa, Richardson, Wataga and Abilene. Included are guns, cameras, movie projector, antiques and various items of virtually every description.
