JIMMY BOGGUS DIES SUDDENLY MONDAY NIGHT

J. L. (Jimmy) Boggus, 79, prominent businessman and stock farmer, died suddenly on Monday, April 17, about 8:00 p. m.

Funeral services were held at the First Baptist Church Wednesday afternoon, and burial was in the Santa Anna cemetery.

Born in Gorman on July 9, 1892, Mr. Boggus had lived in Santa Anna for many years and was owner and operator of the Red & White Grocery Store which later became a partnership with the Hosch family grocery store.

Mr. Boggus had been a member of the First Baptist Church for 48 years and was ordained a deacon in 1928. He served as treasurer of the church for the past 40 years.

A member of the Santa Anna Masonic Lodge, Mr. Boggus was married to the former Claudia Hosch. Although retired he still remained active in church and community activities and in the operation of his stock farm south of town. He was a director of the Santa Anna National Bank.

Survivors include his wife; three sisters, Mrs. Callie Pettus of Orlando, Fla., Mrs. Annie Milstead of Houston, and Mrs. Cleo Schulze of Fort Worth, and a number of nieces and nephews.

Nephews served as pallbearers. Honorary pallbearers were deacons of the First Baptist Church.

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In Our Opinion

IT'S ABOUT TIME, was the opinion of many when the White House released the fact that American Air Force and Navy bombers were again crossing the border into North Vietnam. There is a good possibility that the war would have been over if President Johnson had not ceased the bombing in the first place.

The pressure from the very liberal element in Congress was just too much for President Johnson, and he gave in to their demands.

Since that time the North Vietnamese have continually built up their forces and supplies and many American and Vietnamese lives have been lost because the bombing was stopped.

It is interesting to read the reaction of some of the Democratic presidential candidates since the bombing resumed. Of course they are more out-spoken than because the administration is Republican, but they made plenty of critical remarks under the Democrats.

It is our opinion that the presidential aspirants are sympathetic with the Communists, or else they would use any means to get the presidency, even at the expense of the people who they want to represent. McGovern, Humphrey and the unannounced candidate Ted Kennedy, were quick to jump on the administration when the bombing resumed. No one appreciated their criticism as much as the North Vietnamese. It was just music to their ears.

What do these people think we should do? Turn the Reds loose to take whatever they want and sit back and relax? They condemn the American military for the fact that some civilians are killed in the process, but they offer no comment on the atrocities committed by the Reds while this is going on.

We will have to give George Wallace credit for the fact that he did not condemn the President for this action. He said in effect, that whatever would get the war over with, get our boys home safely, was what we should do. That it should be a military war, not a political one.

We feel that no win wars are for the birds.

POLITICS IS GETTING HOT ALL over the state and politicking is going at a fast clip from the precinct to the state level. City and school boards are all over and now the people can concentrate on the higher offices.

The governor's race is getting pretty hot, and leading candidates are having coffees, receptions and even birthday parties in an effort to stimulate more votes.

This year there are contests for many offices, and that is as it should be. Voters should be given a choice, even if they have to choose the lesser of the evils. Of course we have some well qualified people running for office and it is our belief that the people generally choose the better one if they have a chance.

That is not always so in the presidential election. When political parties meet in convention and select one candidate to represent them based on delegate strength, some times the people don't have a choice. If they do, it is not necessarily one they would choose if they voiced their own opinion. Far too few people will take part in their precinct conventions, then on to the county and state conventions so that they have a voice in the selection of their own party as to a presidential candidate.

We are in sympathy of the presidential primary, giving delegate strength in the convention based on the popular vote each candidate receives. Even in the presidential primaries that is not the result. Sometimes a candidate who polls a good popular vote is not given delegate votes because of the distribution of his vote. In one case, because of the fact that he did not receive the highest total in any congressional district, a candidate was deprived of any delegates, although his popular vote was second high in the state. That is not right. That is not a democratic way of awarding the delegates.

We believe that popular vote should be the deciding factor regardless of what the election is. That is the will of the people, and in a democracy, the majority should rule.

STATE *Capital* **NEWS**

Austin — An ancient legal dispute involving Texas, sovereignty over its tidelands is in court again.

The U. S. Justice Department has filed a suit against Texas, challenging the state's regulation of fishing within the farthestmost two leagues (six marine miles) of the historic three-league (nine-marine-mile) boundary.

Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has requested President Nixon to intervene in the latest federal attack.

The Attorney General further requested an opportunity for the state to present its position to the State Department and Justice Department. The state, he noted in a letter to Nixon, was not notified prior to filing of the action.

Martin claimed the new action is contrary to the position taken by the Eisenhower-Nixon administration in 1953 and in 1957.

He submitted to the President excerpts from the state's brief filed in the original boundary suit which was decided in Texas' favor by the U. S. Supreme Court in 1958. He also included a 1957 letter from the late President Dwight D. Eisenhower to then-Gov. Price Daniel. Eisenhower expressed the opinion that Texas should "have the right to explore and exploit the submerged lands extending seaward of (its) coastline for a distance of three marine leagues into the Gulf of Mexico."

Martin urged Nixon to inform him if his position as president is the same as that expressed by President Eisenhower.

COURT REVISION URGED—A Supreme Court justice and president of the Texas Civil Judicial Council says it's time the legislature submits to voters a constitutional amendment on judiciary reform.

Associate Justice Tom Reavley said Texans are demanding "major surgery" on the court system. Suggested Reavley:

- The State Supreme Court of Criminal Appeals should be merged into a single court of last resort.

- Fourteen Courts of Civil Appeals should be given jurisdiction over criminal as well as civil cases.

- There should be fewer levels of lower courts with less overlapping jurisdiction.

- Appeals procedure should be "simpler and speedier."

- Judges and cases should be transferred to match resources with needs in keeping with better management of the court system.

The 63rd Legislature, Reavley said, should be asked next year to submit the constitutional amendment proposing court reorganization and modernization.

SPECIAL TRAINING APPROVED—The State Board of Education approved contracts for special training next school year of 2,611 children in non-public schools.

Largest single group involved is the trainable mentally retarded category, with 1,887 youngsters.

Pupils, from pre-school age through high school level, will attend 12 schools operated under the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation and 35 independent non-public schools.

The State Board of Education also reviewed a \$1.1 million research program supported by 90 per cent federal and 10 per cent local funds.

Board members voted to uphold orders of Education Commissioner J. W. Edgar sustaining local school board "haircut rules" and dress codes.

COURTS SPEAK—The Court of Criminal Appeals refused to go along with an argument that the aggravated assault law discriminated against men — and concluded it's still worse for a man to hit a woman than the other way around.

Texas Supreme Court held a county judge can't prevent a township incorporation election if 200 residents present the required petition. The decision upheld an Athens district judge and the Tyler Court of Civil Appeals.

The High Court sustained lower courts and refused to knock out of operation a Houston legal aid service for

the poor in spite of objections to it by some lawyers who claimed it is costing them money.

APPOINTMENTS—James W. (Jack) Ward of Amarillo has been named by Gov. Preston Smith as a member of the Texas Mass Transportation Commission for a six-year term.

Smith also named eight to the Real Estate Research Advisory Committee. They are Joe W. Loper of San Antonio, Glenn W. Justice of Dallas, Mrs. Katherine Boyd of Arlington, Dr. Walstein Smith Jr. of Waco, John A. Worley of Dallas, George O. Yamini of Houston and R. L. Pardue of Houston.

HEALTH STUDY LAUNCHED—State, local and federal health officials this week began an intensive study to determine if health hazards exist for workers in the American Smelting and Refining Company plant in El Paso.

Air samples will be taken within the plant to discover possible toxic materials, and blood and urine samples will be taken from about 800 employees.

The survey will complement a comprehensive health study to evaluate lead hazards in the plant vicinity which was initiated by local health officials several weeks ago in cooperation with the State Health Department. A.S.R.C. is cooperating in the survey.

PARTIES SLOW—Secretary of State Bob Bullock complained about early response to his request that county political party officers submit early estimates of May primary election expenses.

Bullock said a week after he asked for the estimates only 99 (of 254) counties were rep-

resented in replies. He warned again no state funds will be allocated to local parties until estimated expenditures are submitted on prescribed forms.

Some county chairmen explained they were taking their time since the new state primary financing act makes them responsible for inaccuracies in their figures.

JUNE 1 PUPIL TRANSFER DEADLINE—Texas Education Agency has held parents who want to transfer their children from their home school to a nearby district must submit requests by June 1.

Once approved by the receiving school board, the request must also be cleared by T.E.A. State approval is a term of a U.S. District Court order filed in Tyler relating to desegregation of schools. Under the order transfer are not to be permitted to reduce or impede desegregation or encourage discrimination.

SHORT SNORTS

Texas cities and counties would get about \$202 million this year under a federal revenue-sharing bill before a U.S. House committee.

College teachers in a meeting here endorsed the idea of collective bargaining rights for public employees.

Producers are reminded the final date for certifying wheat and barley is May 1. Farmers growing wheat and barley and NOT signed under the program must also report these acreages by the above date, if crop history credit is to be given, including substitution.

Program provisions have been amended by NOT requiring set-aside acreages be certified at the time wheat is certified. Set-aside acreages may be certified at the time feed grain or cotton is certified.

The final certification date for cotton is July 1 which is one month earlier than last year.

Another reminder of the importance of reporting eligible set-aside for 1972. Land designated as set-aside must be land which is free from all types of trees and brush and must also be land which is at least equal in productivity to average cropland on the farm. These requirements must be followed when producers report set-aside acreage at certification time. A reduction in, or complete loss of payment may result if a spot-check finds an incorrect certification has been made. Farmers and ranchers who plan to use aerial spraying of mesquite are reminded a good growth and dense foliage is one requirement for spraying. The late freeze may put off the starting date for spraying in the north one half of the county.

For oats grading number two or better, a one cent a bushel premium is made; and, for oats grading heavy an additional one cent is offered; and for oats grading extra heavy an additional two cents is offered. A producer may earn as much as three cents premium.

You will receive a letter on which you can make the report. This report is necessary. Failure to make it will result in being charged for the discount allowed on the grain purchased under the drought feed program.

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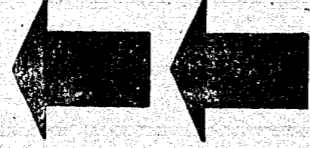
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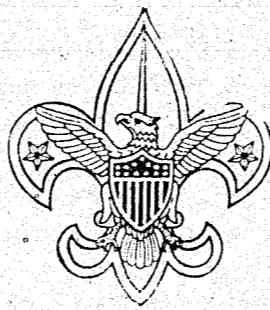
