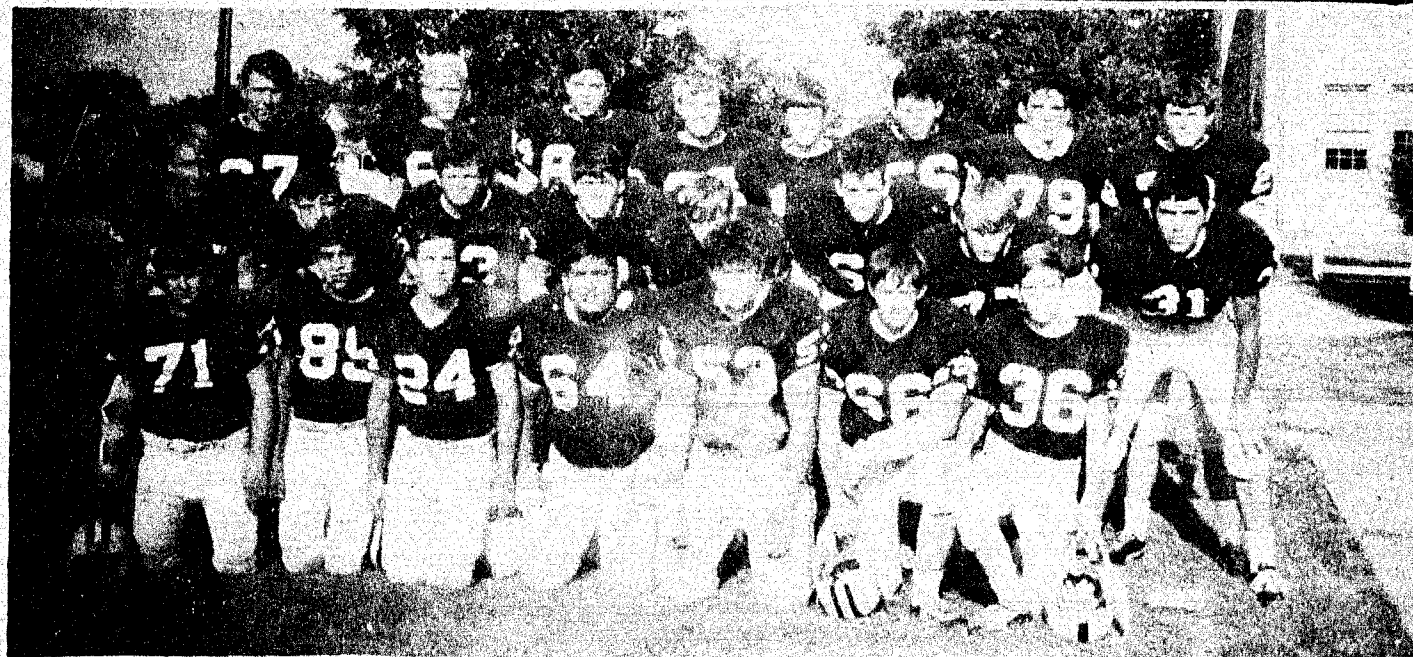
Everyone in the community is invited to attend the services next week.

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In Our Opinion

GEORGE MEANY, president of the AFL-CIO, said again Sunday that the big labor organization was not supporting either President Nixon or Senator George McGovern. He then said they recommended to the members that they support who they wanted to.

That is quite a turn-about from previous years when the labor boss gave pretty explicit instructions to the members as to who they should vote for. Of course many members still voted for who they wanted to, but in doing so they didn't follow instructions from the top.

If a member of management sent out instructions to his employees as to whom they should vote for, there would be a yell that would sound all over the country. We grant you that management may have tried to persuade employees to vote a certain way, but they had better not try to make it mandatory.

It is a privilege of our citizenship to have the right to our own choice in voting for candidates, and that is the way it should be. There is nothing wrong in trying to get someone to vote for your choice, but persuasion is the only tool that should be used. When one goes beyond that he is infringing on the rights of his fellow man.

Meany's suggestion that union members follow their own conscience when voting should be the practice of big labor in every election. Some union members feel that they betray their union if they don't follow instructions.

One thing that will not help McGovern in this case is the lack of funds from labor. Usually the unions provide a large sum of money for their candidate and traditionally it has gone to the Democrats. This year, however, they will just be out of luck except for what they can get from state organizations. The union's big contributions to politicians has given them considerable power in Congress and it is because of this that they have such a stronghold on the economy of this country. They don't like the President because he has tried to take away some of their power, but to most of us, he did the right thing when he brought in wage and price controls.

Both the unions and management are responsible for the run-away inflation that was prevalent in this country before controls went in. They haven't been completely successful, but they have helped.

It was a time when something had to be done.

THE PRESIDENT'S Labor Day talk was partly an effort to put some pressure on Congress to pass his non-bussing bill, and we hope it does some good. Pressure from the heads of some groups who claim to represent minorities has kept some in Congress from supporting the anti-bussing bill, but if those congressmen would look deeper into the situation they will find that the groups do not represent the minorities. Many of the Blacks and Latins do not support bussing. It is the organizations that do, and they do not represent the minorities they claim they do. They are organized, for the most part, to help some individuals. We like to compare them to the HEW. They are more harm than good.

WHY WAS THE BIBLE WRITTEN?

Names found in the Bible by which it is called: (Heb. 4:11-12) (Eph. 6:17) It is called the word of God. In Hebrews 10:7 it is called The Book. In John 5:39 and in 2 Timothy 3:16 it is called the scriptures. In Romans 3:2, Hebrews 5:12 and 1 Peter 4:11 it is called the oracles of God. In Acts 7:38 it is called Living Oracles.

Symbolic names applied to the word of God: Lamp and Light (Psalms 119:105) (Proverbs 6:23) Ignorance is darkness; Sin is darkness. The sinner is represented as being under the "power of darkness". As mentioned in a previous article, the world could not create its own spiritual light (Col. 1:13, 2 Peter 1:19).

Mirror: (2 Cor. 3:18, Jas. 1:23-25) It being a mirror shows man as he really is.

FIRE: (Jer. 23:29) Fire is the greatest purifying agency known to man. Our souls are purified by the word of God, "when we obey the truth" (1 Peter 1:22).

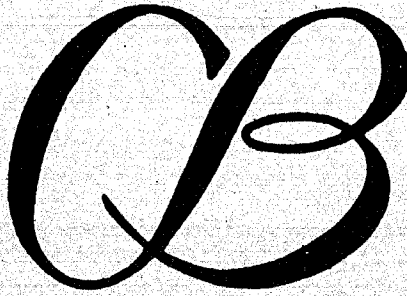
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Recent Bride Feted Staurday With Gift Tea

BAKE SALE SATURDAY

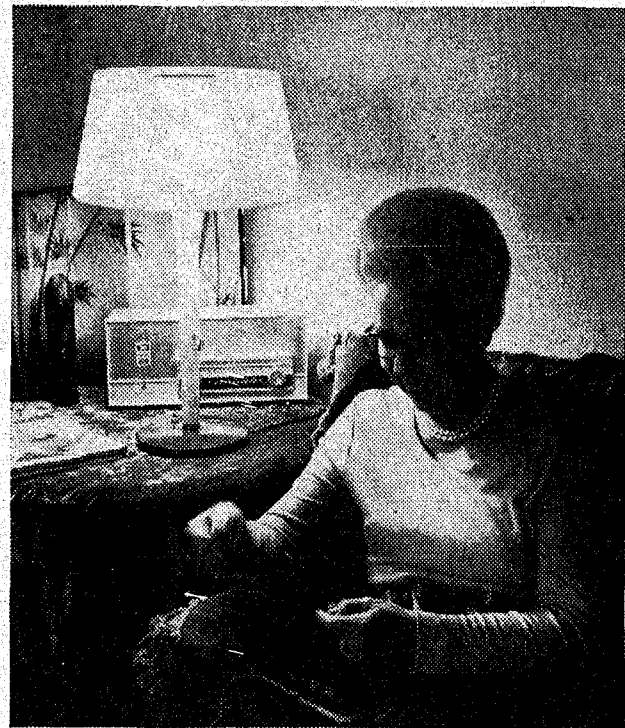

Also as a fund raising project, members of the drill team are selling Quarterback Club memberships. The members of the girls' organization will be soliciting memberships during the next few weeks.

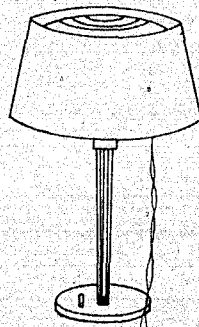

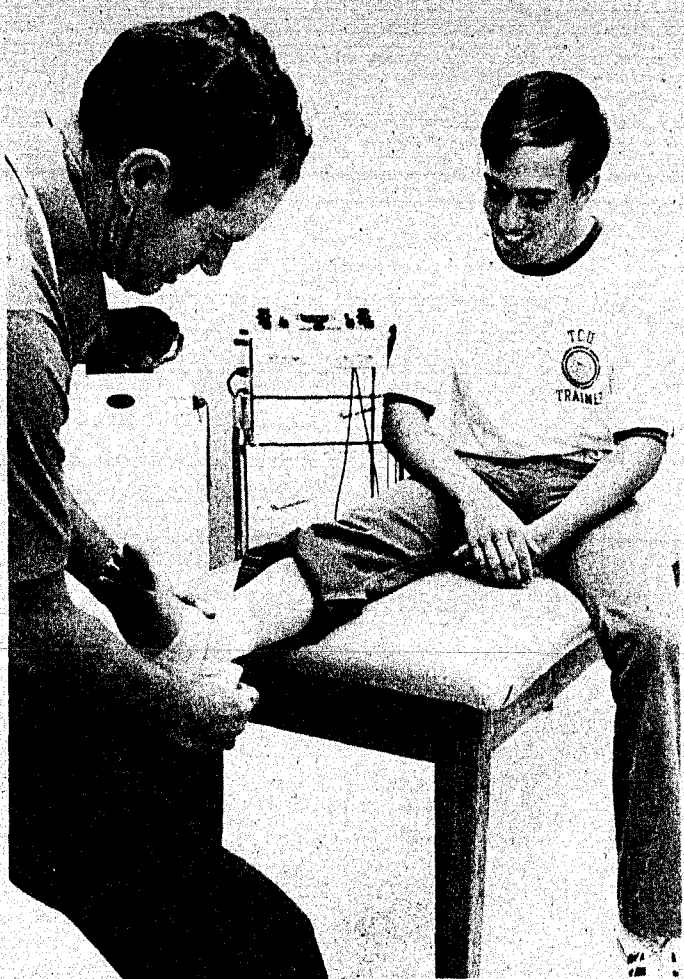
