FALL FESTIVAL OF FAITH PLANNED BY METHODISTS

A Fall Festival of Faith will be held at the United Methodist Church next week, starting Sunday, November 5, and continuing each evening through Wednesday, November 8.

Rev. Bobby Weathers, pastor of the Brownwood First United Methodist Church and a former pastor of the local congregation, will be speaker for the four services.

Billy C. Bartley of Coleman will be song leader, and Mrs. Bartley will be organist. Mr. Bartley is an active Methodist layman and principal of Coleman West Ward School.

All services will be held at 7:00 p. m. according to the pastor, Rev. Louis Shambek. Different groups in the church are in charge of filling the pews each night. Sunday night the WSCS is in charge; Monday through Wednesday it will be the Methodist Men, Nitia Daniel Circle and the church youth.

Rev. Weathers began his ministry in 1949 and served his first pastorate in the Buffalo-Indian Creek charge. His appointment to the Santa Anna charge was in 1963 and he served here for four years. After serving at DeLeon for three years, Rev. Weathers was named pastor of the Brownwood Church. He has returned to Santa Anna many times on special occasions and local members include many of the members of the now-disbanded Buffalo Methodist Church where he began his ministry.

A graduate of Texas Wesleyan College and Perkins School of Theology, he also attended Howard Payne College and McMurry College in his undergraduate years.

MOUNTAINEERS TAKE 10-A LEAD

The Santa Anna Mountaineers took the lead in District 10-A football Saturday night when they defeated the Early Longhorns 32-24 at the Early homecoming game. The Mountaineers now stand 2-0 in district play and are the only undefeated team in the district.

Early was first to get on the scoreboard on a pass play from Lance Blackwell to David Watkins. The PAT conversion was good giving the Longhorns an 8-0 lead early in the first quarter.

Santa Anna scored twice in the second period of play for an 12-8 halftime lead. The first score was on a TD by Rocky Dean, and Horner made his first TD in the second quarter.

Dean kicked the extra point on the Mountaineers' third quarter score by Horner.

Early scored again in the third period, leaving five point lead for the Mountaineers. Valdez scored twice to give the Mounties their 32 point total, then Early made their final score on another pass play for the final 32-24 tally.

Santa Anna led the Longhorns in nearly every category except passing including 24 first downs to Early's 11.

The other four teams in District 10-A had games Friday

night with Cross Plains defeating Bangs 19-8 and Ranger blanking DeLeon 25-0.

The schedule this week has Santa Anna at DeLeon for a 7:30 game.

City of S-Anna To Get \$13,218 Revenue Share

Santa Anna city officials have received word that the first payment in the Federal Revenue Sharing funding will be received here on December 1. The first annual payment under the program is slated to be \$13,218.

Coleman is to receive \$158,019 in the funding, the totals based on the size and per capita income of the towns. Towns under 500 in population are not included in the program.

The five-year program is being set up so that towns will receive quarterly checks. Money from the fund can be used for almost any community improvement except to pay off bonded indebtedness or for matching funds for federal projects.

Mayor Thomas Wristen and the City Council will plan for the use of the Santa Anna money, but a portion of the money is expected to be set aside for the purchase of a new fire truck. The remainder will possibly be used for day care center fund, improvements to city water lines and for street improvement.

According to Mayor Wristen, the welcome revenue will not be difficult to spend as there are numerous places that additional money is needed.

Fire Destroys Bryans' Store At Rockwood

One of Rockwood's few remaining businesses, Bryan's General Store, was destroyed by fire Sunday night, with the building and stock listed as a total loss.

Curtis and Betty Bryan, owners and operators of the business, were taking inventory of the damaged contents Monday and were undecided about re-opening the store.

Denise Blair, teen-age daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Eurell Blair, awoke about midnight Sunday and smelled the smoke from the nearby fire. She awoke her parents who notified the Bryans, who in turn called the Santa Anna Fire Department.

Two trucks were dispatched to Rockwood where the fire was kept under control. The blaze apparently started in the ceiling of the building and the upper portion of the structure was completely gutted.

Although no estimate of the loss has been made, the Bryans said insurance would only partially cover the loss.

The Bryans have owned and operated the store for the last ten years, purchasing it from Claud Box. The store was the unofficial gathering place for Rockwood residents where a "domino" room provided entertainment and amusement for local men. Ironically the domino room was the only portion of the building left undamaged by the blaze.

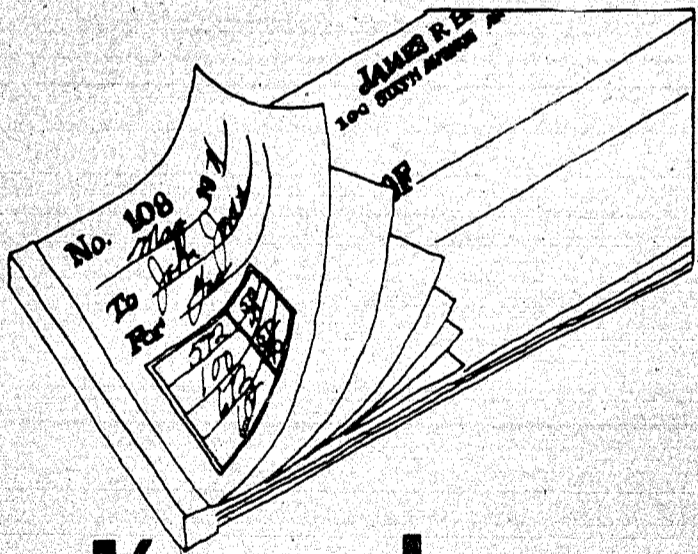
REUNION PLANS ANNOUNCED FOR CLASS OF 1962

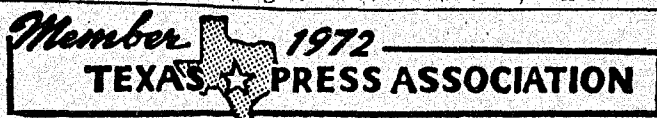

NEXT TUESDAY is one of the most important days of the year for citizens of the United States. It is election day and we will elect a president among many other important positions in our federal, state and local governments.

Far be it for us to tell you how to vote. More than likely most of us have already made up our minds, but this writer would like to tell you how he will vote, and why.

He will vote Republican for the first time in his life, because he feels that country should be put above political party, not only this year, but any time.

We will agree with many that President Richard M. Nixon has made many mistakes in his first four years in office and that we have disagreed with him many times. But any man who does anything will make mistakes. A lack of errors indicates a lack of activity, and in my remembrance there have been several instances of that in public officials.

However, we still believe that what he has done is much closer to the will of the American people than the aspiring Democrat, and that includes what we feel is right for our country. This country is not ready for the pro-socialist ideals of Sen. George McGovern, though he has mellowed considerably from what he apparently favored when he won the Democratic nomination. The bad part of his logic is that he favored one thing in one part of the country or before a particular group, and then something else in another part of the country or before another group. No one, except possibly himself, is sure of just what he is for and what he is against. However, all indications are that he favors cutting our military to a dangerous low, favors high funds for liberal welfare, is far amnesty for draft dodgers who left the country to keep from serving in the armed forces, and has indicated that he will penalize businesses in taxes.

Our first objection is to cutting the military to a dangerous low. There could possibly some cuts if the peace treaty is signed with the North Vietnamese, but we should remain a power second to none if we are to keep our freedom and retain our voice in world affairs. Once we become a second rate power, we have had it.

Secondly, there has always been and always will be a need for welfare in this country. Many people who are unable to work, or have passed the age that should have to work, should be helped. We object to helping those who refuse to help themselves, although they are physically able to do so. A guaranteed annual wage for all people would make help impossible to get. Let's help those who need it.

As for amnesty for draft dodgers, we feel that they fit in the same category as deserters, because they, in effect, did just that. None of us wanted a war, but we had one, and we were obligated to defend our country just as we did in World War I and II.

We also feel that his country has traveled the road to socialism far too fast in the last 40 years. Some of the social legislation was necessary, but when a little met the approval of the country the politicians felt a lot would do wonders. It's like the man oiling the machine, if a drop will help, a quart will do wonders. We disagree.

We will vote for Richard M. Nixon for president on November 7, and recommended that you do likewise.

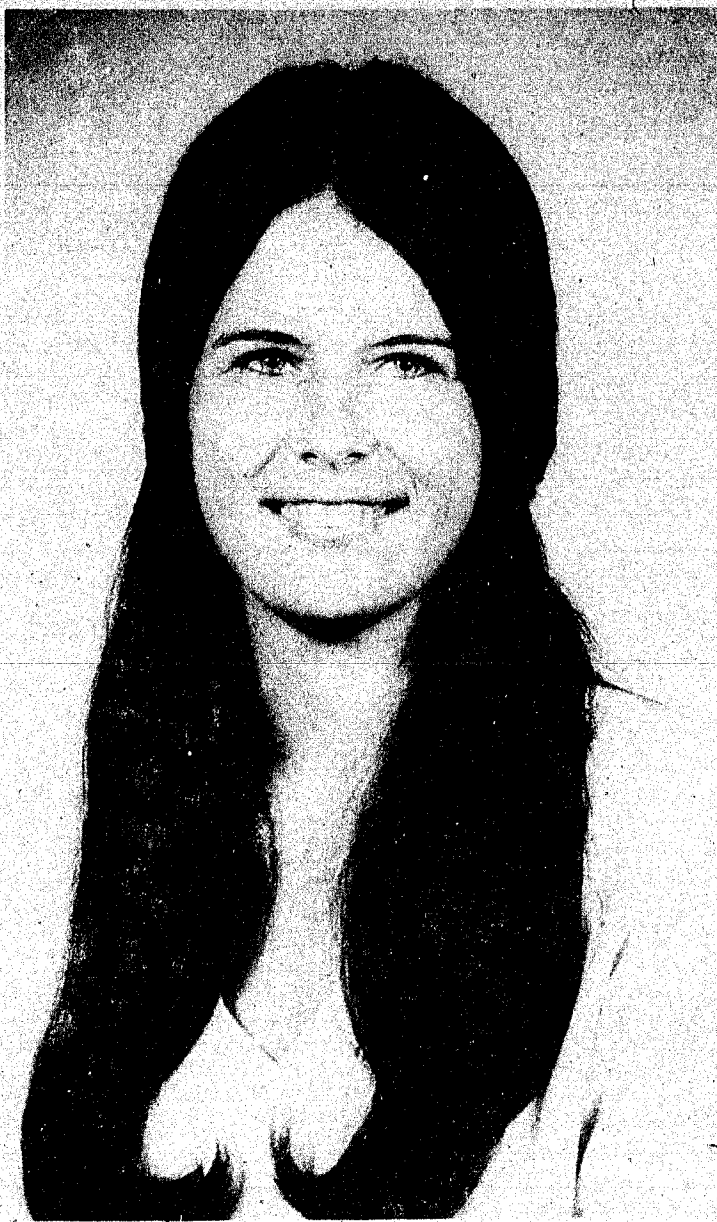
Abilene Title Won Saturday By G. Rodgers

PRUSSIC ACID KILLS STOCK

Although recent summer-like weather tends to indicate that winter is still a long way off, it's just a matter of time before the season's first freezing temperatures arrive. Such a killing frost can spell danger for livestock producers that have cattle grazing on sorghum stubble or any of the sorghum-sudan hybrid pastures.

"The reason is prussic acid poisoning of the animals," points out Dr. James Armstrong, veterinarian with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University.

"The danger of prussic acid poisoning exists mainly in pastures and fields where sorghum stubble is making regrowth and where there is

vigorous, young growth of Johnsongrass, sorghum-sudan hybrids and related plants. Such growth generally has a high content of prussic acid, especially if produced under stress of dry or cool weather."

According to Armstrong, the main danger to livestock is grazing such pastures and fields immediately after a killing frost.
