## Gilda Stanford Is Hired For SAHS Position

The Santa Anna Independent School District board of trustees met at the high school office on Tuesday, October 10, for the regular monthly session. All members were present for the session with president A. D. Pettit presiding.

Vernon Parnell led the opening prayer. Minutes of the September meeting were reread and approved.

Bills and accounts for the previous month were studied and approved for payment totaling \$1,696. Approval was made of school tax assessments for 1972 which showed a decrease in assessments of \$123,610. The decrease will amount to approximately \$2,000 less in school taxes for the coming year.

Members of the board approved the application for Foundation Funds from the State.

A letter was read from the State Building Commission which gave approval for the new vocational building. Final approval of the new building was granted by the Board and the last payment on the structure will be made.

Mrs. Jane Wagner, high school commercial teacher, was granted a leave of absence due to illness. Mrs. Gilda Stanford of Brownwood was granted a restricted contract for the position until Mrs. Wagner returns.

The next meeting of the board will be on Tuesday, November 14.

The Santa Anna Junior High football team will end their season next week when they travel to Goldthwaite for a game on Tuesday, October 24. Coach Dwight Hudson's team defeated Goldthwaite last year on the home field.

The JHS team played Rising Star on October 3 which ended with Santa Anna losing 26-12. On the following week the junior Mounties played Gorman and won by a 20-0 score.

The game this week was a home game with the Early Yearlings Tuesday night with the score to be listed next week.

## Mountaineers to Host Ranger In District 10-A Tilt Friday Night

The Santa Anna High School football team will open district play Friday night when they host the Ranger High School team. The game Friday night will begin at

7:30 p. m. as will all the district games.

The Ranger team is another relatively new opponent for the Mountaineers as Santa Anna and

Ranger met in 1966 in the Class A ranks for the bi-district title and then had an exchange of games for the following two years.

The Bulldogs are 0-5 for the season and will be seeking a district victory. Santa Anna is 2-3 for 1972.

Even though Ranger is winless through five games J. A. Smelley, the Mounties' head mentor, feels that Ranger is probably as physically strong as any team in the district.

"Ranger has been playing a tough non-district schedule," Smelley said; "They have a good football team, and if they put it all together we'll be in for a real fight."

The Mountaineers should be in excellent physical shape. Randy Long has recovered from his ankle injury which occurred four weeks ago. He will be back in the trenches.

Smelley says the Bulldogs will run the football right at you, but they are also capable of burning defense with their aerial game.

Smelley and his crew have had two weeks to prepare for Friday's district opener. According to the Mountaineer football boss, "the open date should have helped us, but a team never knows how an idle week will effect them."

The Mounties are hoping their sputtering offense will jell Friday. Thus far this season, Santa Anna has had trouble lighting up the scoreboard, but the stopper brigade appears sound.

The defense has given up 106 points those stats are a little deceiving since 67 of those points came against Wall and 27 against Rule.

Rule is rated the No. 1 team in Class B and Wall is one of the premier Class A teams in the state.

In other District 10-A games slated this week, Bangs tangles with Early in a contest that has been termed for Brown County championship. Bangs sports a 4-1 mark the Longhorns have a 2-2-1 record in non-district play. The Bangs - Early tilt is slated for Saturday night at 7:30 p. m. in Dragon Memorial Stadium.

Last year's champ De Leon will be at home against Cross Plains at 7:30.

The game Friday night will be one of the two remaining home games this season and it is hoped that a large number of local people will attend.

The pep rally Friday afternoon will begin at 3:45 at the school gymnasium and is open to the public.

## Special ID Card Still Available

Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, has reported that almost 7,000 Texans have obtained special personal identification cards since the DPS began issuing them September 1, 1971.

The cards, which were authorized by the 62nd Texas Legislature, are laminated and contain a color photograph of the holder. They are the same size as a Texas Drivers license.

Information appearing on the cards includes the holder's date of birth, height, sex and eye color. Each card has a special identification number issued by DPS.

These cards are especially valuable to those persons who do not hold a Texas drivers license, but who need some sort of official card to help establish their identity. Applicants have included the elderly, persons too young to obtain drivers licenses, and blind and handicapped persons. All Texans are eligible, however, Speir said.

In order to obtain a personal identification card, the applicant must appear at a DPS drivers license field office, execute a special application form, present a birth certificate or other documentary evidence of identity, and date of birth, be fingerprinted

## Jessie F. Nixon Is Found Dead

Jessie Faye Nixon, 60, was found dead at her home in Santa Anna on Sunday night, October 15, after friends became alarmed when she failed to respond to telephone calls and at the door. Entry was forced and her body was found in the bathroom.

City policeman Roger Beard was summoned to the residence on Avenue B, and Justice of the Peace Ben Jack Garrett ordered an autopsy to determine the cause of death. The autopsy was to determine the exact cause of death although there was no evidence of foul play. Preliminary investigation showed she died Friday night or Saturday morning.

The Coleman County native was born in Valera March 10, 1912. She was a registered nurse and a member of the Santa Anna First Baptist Church.

Funeral services were held at Stevens Funeral Chapel in Coleman on Tuesday with burial in the Valera Cemetery. Rev. Bill Brewer, pastor of the First Baptist Church, officiated at the services.

The applicant's photograph will be taken and he or she will be issued a temporary receipt. The regular, laminated card will be processed and mailed from DPS Headquarters in Austin.

Speir said identification cards are dated to expire four years from the applicant's next birthdate.

## Antlerless Deer Permits, Tags Available Nov. 2

Antlerless deer permits and special antlerless deer tags will soon be available to landowners in several Texas areas.

According to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials, special antlerless deer tags will be issued in some counties in lieu of permits.

The difference between a permit and a tag is that permits are issued in limited quantities based on overpopulation of deer, carrying capacity of land and in ratio to the proportion of land having surplus deer.

Special tags are used where either sex hunts are approved.

There are no limitations on the number of tags a landowner may obtain since the hunts are designed to allow full landowner control in deer harvest.

Antlerless deer permits and tags will be issued between 8 a. m. and 5 p. m. November 2 at the Coleman County Courthouse for land owners in this area.


The other game on the Jayvee Schedule, set for October 26 with Early, will probably be cancelled.

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## In Our Opinion

THE UNITED STATES suffers from the same malady of some of its people—it just can't seem to live within its income.

During the last four years we have spent \$80 billion more than we took in, and there doesn't seem to be any relief in sight.

We can't blame it all on Congress nor can you blame it all on the administration. They are both at fault and must share the responsibility.

Congress recently passed the revenue sharing bill, a measure that the administration asked for. That is like a business who is losing money subsidizing another business that is losing money. Neither will profit in the long run, and both are doomed to bankruptcy.

The only solution to the problem is increased taxes on a people who are already over-taxed, and that is not a guarantee of a solution, because as taxes are increased they will also find more to spend money for.

The logical solution to the problem is one that seems to rub both Congress and the administration the wrong way. That would be reduced spending. But economy in government doesn't seem to interest our politicians because it don't make votes in many quarters. Those whose foresight ends with the immediate and who can profit from deficit spending just are not interested in present day economy.

Looking to the future, we can't see where our children will be able to bear the load, and the trend toward big, socialistic government seems an insurmountable problem. When will Congress see the light and try to cut spending? That will happen when the rank and file people get up on their hind feet and demand that they stop the give-aways. Not only do we give away billions to unwarranted welfare, we send other billions away in foreign aid. We need to keep most of that aid at home.

We have never learned that you can't buy friendship and so we send more money to other countries, many of who will spit on us, and let our spending run in the red year after year. If we kept only foreign aid at home, we could cut a nice slice of our national debt out every year, and eventually whittle it down to our size, but if we continue to send and spend, then the end is desolate at best.





# Trickham Water Supply Debated

TRICKHAM - One businessman in this southeastern Coleman County community which lists an official population of 12 says he sees no need for the proposed pipeline which would bring water into this area along with most parts of western Brown County.

Leston Cozart, owner of the lone grocery store here, says he has a pump in nearby Mukewater Creek which supplies his water needs.

Cozart pointed to the long and narrow concrete obstruction which spans from one bank of the creek to the other beneath the bridge on FM 1176 east of his business and home.

"We've got the dam and the water is down from it, but the creek is full. Do you know what I mean?" he asked.

"There's plenty of water there to do until spring and maybe then some."

Cozart indicated with a nod that he was familiar with the water shortage which is currently affecting residents of Brookesmith, about 10 miles southeast of Trickham, and the efforts of officials of an area water corporation to gain emergency financing to begin work on a pipeline.

"I Didn't Want It"  
"They tried to sell me," Cozart said, "but I don't want it." He explained, "Why should I pay \$10 per month for water when I have a pump down there and can get it this way at a cost of \$6 or \$7 per month?"

But longtime Trickham postmaster Mrs. Minnie Wilson told The Bulletin that she also has a pump in Mukewater Creek and her pump makes a total of six which are used by area people for their water.

"You know the pumps are taking out a lot of water plus evaporation," Mrs. Wilson says. "The creek has had one tiny little rise this year—and it didn't even fill it."

Mrs. Wilson said she is a stockholder in the Brookesmith Water Supply Corp. which was organized in May 1971 with plans to gain a water pipeline system in this area with financing through the Farmers Home Administration.

But officials of the water corporation learned last week that while the loan total for the pipeline is available now from FHA the federal grant which is

also needed for the project is not immediately available.

"Keep Putting It Off"  
"The pipeline would help us," Mrs. Wilson says. "I thought we could get it, but they keep putting it off one more year. Some say we won't get it in our lifetime. But I hope we do."

She explained that each of the pumps in Mukewater Creek are placed in different locations by the owners. "The hole where I have been getting my water in dried up now," she says. "I can't tell how long the rest of the water will last."

She says she is now having a 60-barrel tank constructed so she can haul water from Santa Anna.

"And I don't know how long I can get the water from Santa Anna since they haul for so many there."

Mrs. Wilson says she recently saw a man who is interested in moving into Trickham. "But he won't move in here until there is water."

J. H. Martin, operator of the Martin Jersey Farm at Trickham, says, "Some dairymen think the pipeline is a real good idea."

Martin says he has about 125 head of cattle here including replacement calves and cows which are dry.

"The pipeline would be beneficial to my dairy. Now we have to provide chlorinated water to the milk for the inspections," he says. "The pretreated water would be of great help to us. We wouldn't have to add the chlorine."

"Unusually Dry Area"  
Martin described the Trickham-Brookesmith area as "an unusually dry area" compared with Brownwood, Coleman and other Mid-Texas towns. "So far, we have gotten about 10 inches of rain all this year."

He explained that "all anybody has in this part of the country (Trickham) for water is the creek or a private tank. We all have to depend on that—and it's untreated."

Mrs. Carl Sheffield, who lives with her husband between Trickham and Brookesmith, where they now have 45 head of registered cows and "Some sheep," says she is also waiting the pipeline.

"I think it would help the prosperity here," Mrs. Sheffield says. "We wouldn't turn down water when it is the scarest thing."

She says she understands that plans for the pipeline call for it to be laid along the property line of the stockholder. Unlike her sister, Mrs. Wilson at Trickham whose property line is only a few feet from her home, she says the Sheffield property line is some distance from their house.

"Still Worth It"  
"But it is still worth it to us to pay for our own line all that way," she says. "We believe it is to our advantage."

Mrs. Sheffield says, "We are

better off for water than most people (in the area) because we have a spring. But others have springs too, come to think of it, and they aren't all doing so well."

A Sheffield neighbor, Clarence O. Ford, the original secretary for the Brookesmith Water Supply Corp. and still an active stockholder, told The Bulletin that only one Trickham area resident had declined to become a stockholder on the pipeline.

According to president Richard Ray of Brookesmith, the project now has 803 deposits for meters with covers about 220 miles of pipeline from Winchell in south Brown County to the Grosvenor area in the north.

"We have put up over \$80,000 for our part of the project," Ray says, "and we are in desperate need for water facilities now."

In the engineering report compiled by Yeatts & Decker Inc. of Abilene which was given to Ray last month, the consulting engineers estimated the total cost of construction at \$1,607,000.

"\$8 Per Month"

"If a loan of \$988,000 and a grant of \$543,000 is obtained through FHA," R. Leon Decker reported, "the minimum monthly water bill would need to be \$8 per month and the average customer using 6,000 gallons per month would pay an \$11.80 per month water bill."

Since Brookesmith residents have been hauling their own drinking water three months, Ray told The Bulletin that "we have a definite emergency now and we are going to do everything in our power to get an emergency federal grant to get this water project started."

Brown-Mills County FHA supervisor Harold Kennedy, who had previously scheduled a conference with state FHA officials in the Temple office last Thursday, told The Bulletin the meeting has been postponed until this Tuesday because one official could not be present last week.


