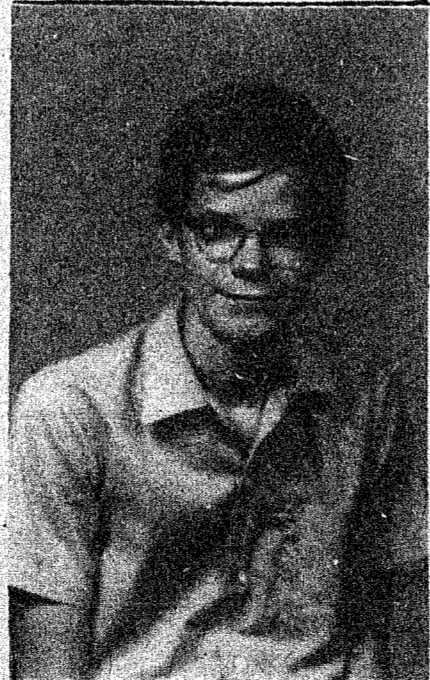
Recommendations were made for teachers in the Title I program subject to funding of the special program.

Members of the class will be seated in a group and presented gifts from the church during the service.

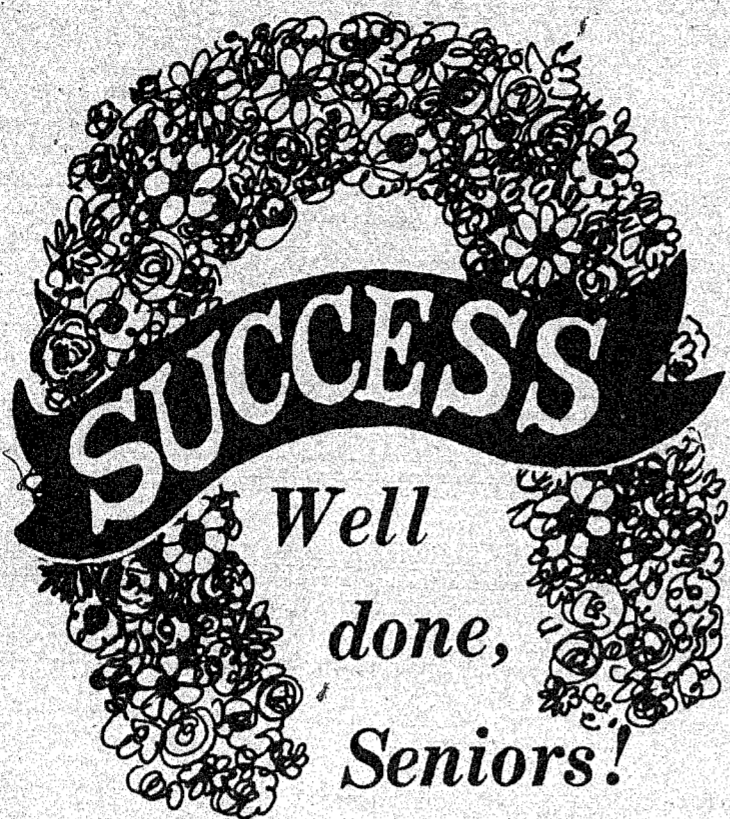

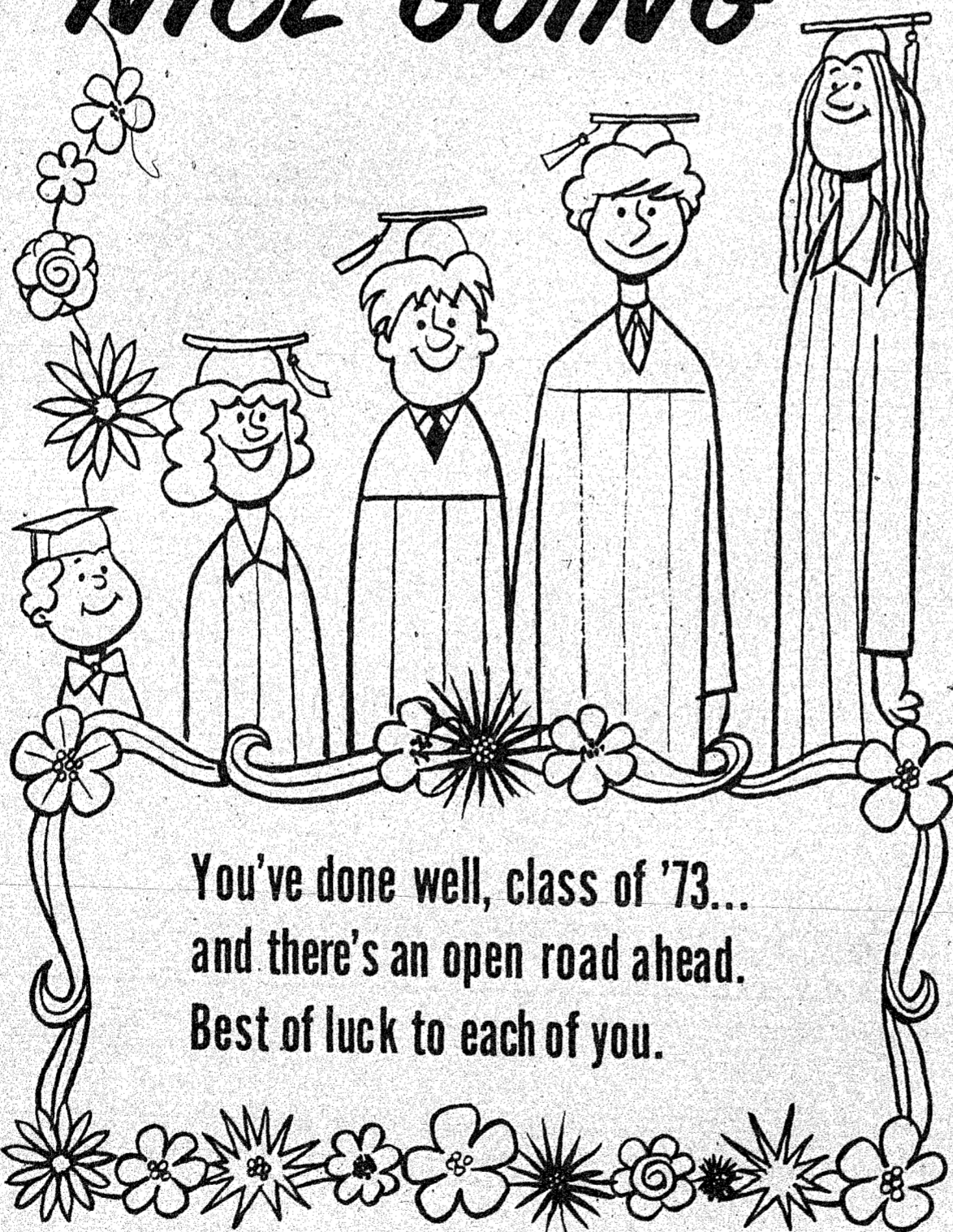

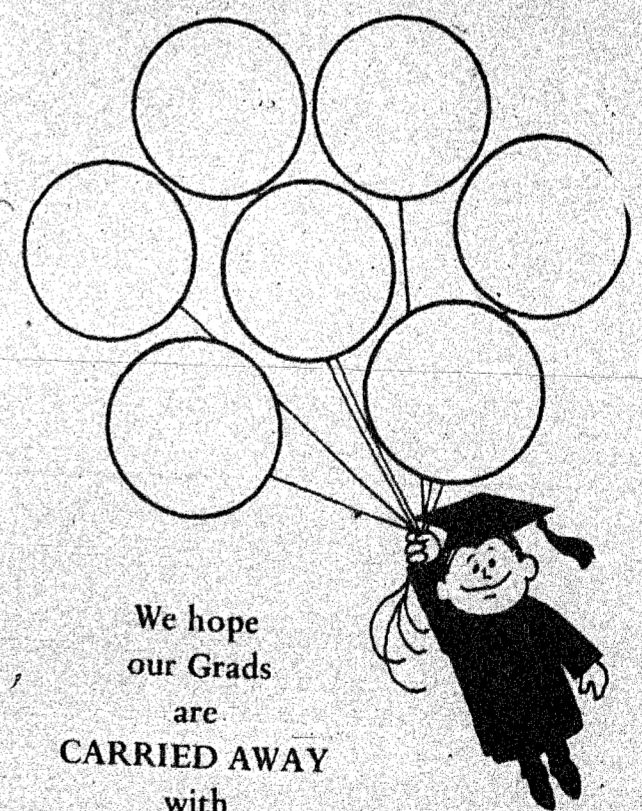

S.A. Science Teacher, Student Chosen to Attend Seminar

Susan Kay Newman, junior student at Santa Anna High School, and Floyd Marshall, teacher of physical science, biology and chemistry at SAHS, have been selected to attend the 13th Texas Nuclear Science Symposium at the University of Texas in Austin, June 4th through 7th.

The symposium is a program of the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation (TAERF), sponsored by ten utility companies of Texas and the University of Texas. West Texas Utilities sponsors the Santa Anna group. The four-day event will be attended by some 500 selected high school science students and teachers from schools throughout the state.

Joel Wilson and Bill Tedder from the Public Service Department of WTU in Abilene will accompany the Santa Anna people.

Foremost scientists in the nation will speak to the students during the 4-day symposium, with emphasis on the nuclear fusion research which is aimed at converting deuterium (found in ordinary water) into atomic power as an inexpensive fuel for the production of electricity and other uses. Highlight of the event will be a trip through the recently completed Plasma Dynamic Laboratory which houses the Texas Turbulant Tokamak used in the advanced research program. Students invited to attend are selected on the basis of scholastic standing and interest in science.

Susan, daughter of the Thomas C. Newmans, is particularly interested in science and the field of animal study. She raises show lambs and had the champion cross breed at San Antonio in \$72 as well as the champion flampshire sheep in Dallas.

Susan has showmanship trophies for sheep Showmanship, and is a member of FFA, FFA, Beta Club, Librarians Club, 4-H and is one of the Santa Anna High School Annual Staff.

Susan says that she is looking forward to attending the symposium and meeting other interested in the subject as well as hearing the distinguished scientists who will be speaking during the 4-day event.

Floyd Marshall is completing his third year as a principal, and teacher in the science department of Santa Anna High School. Marshall moved to the city from Melvin where he was superintendent and teacher of science.

Marshall is a great believer in scientific field trips and group studies such as the nuclear science symposium. He planned a group field trip through Oak Ridge

last year and was prevented from completing the trip due to cancellation of tours on the day the group arrived.

Marshall said that he definitely feels that the symposium is a great program, and considers it an honor for both the student and teacher to be invited to attend.

Floyd and Beth Marshall have three children, Dr. Jerry Marshall of Rotan, Jimmy Marshall, teacher of biology and coach at Jourdanton, and daughter, Sandra Wuest, graduate of South Texas State and teacher of Home Economics in San Marcus public schools.

The Santa Anna student and teacher will leave for Austin Monday morning, June 4th.

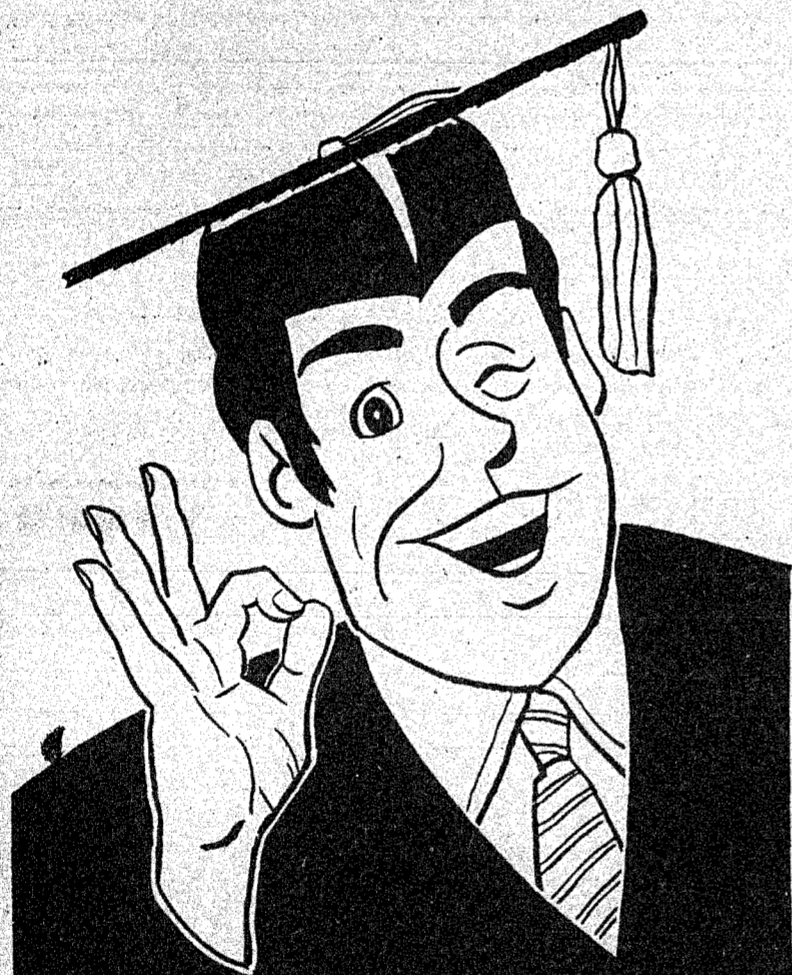
Weaver Grandson Visits Relatives In Santa Anna

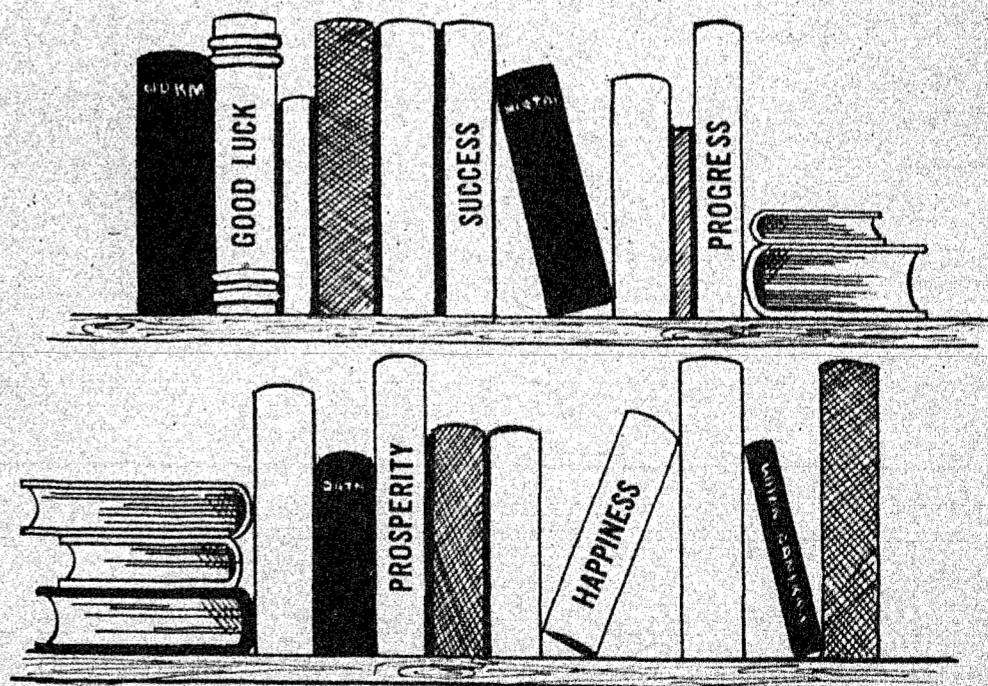

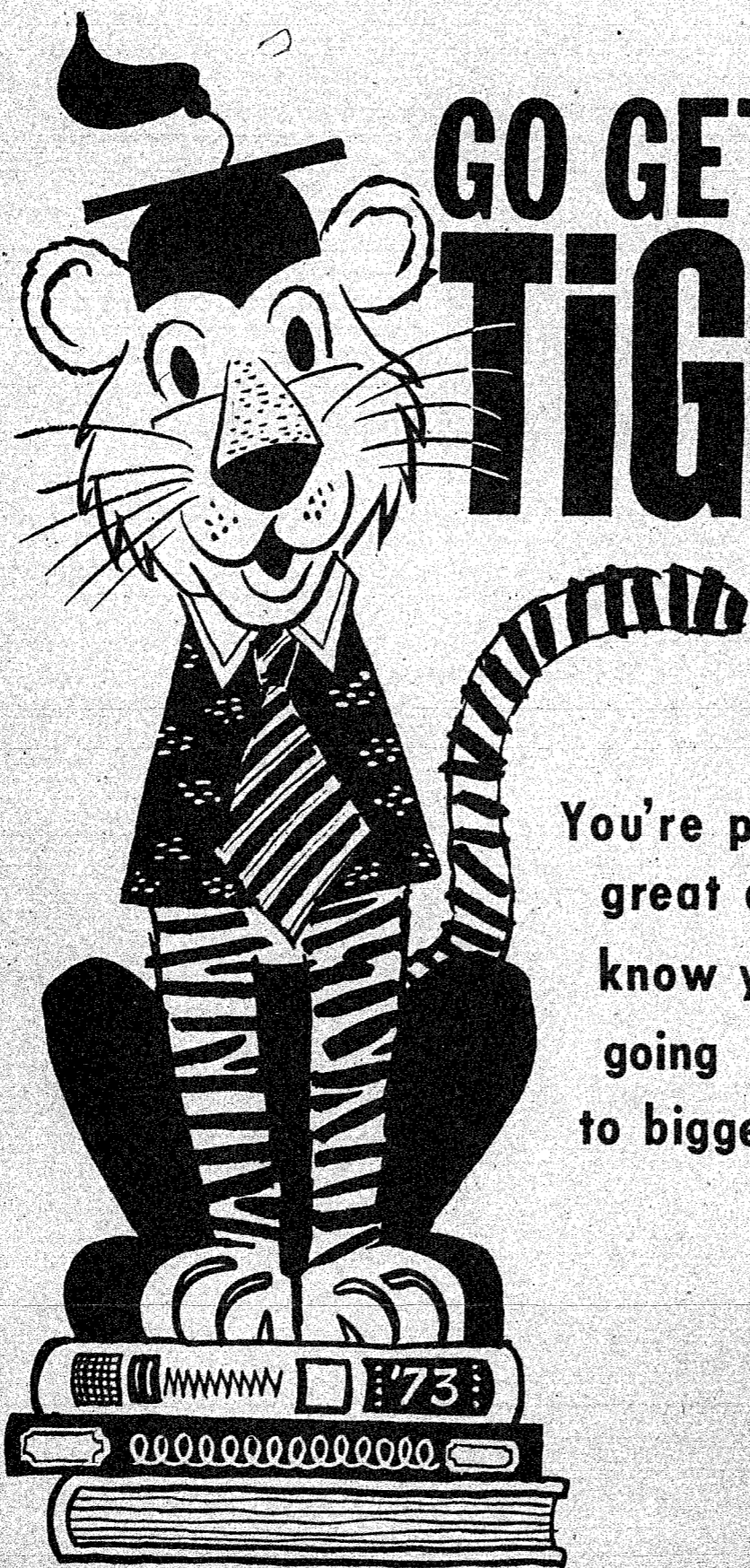

Robbed At Work

Hired as floor manager in a department store, Phyllis asked where she should leave her new fur coat during working hours. Since there were no more lockers available, she was told to leave the coat in a corridor closet.

A few days later, the coat was stolen from the closet. The store denied any responsibility for the loss, but Phyllis—unconvinced—took the matter to court.

At the hearing, the company said it had never guaranteed its employees against theft. But it seems the closet had neither lock nor guard. Finding a lack of reasonable care, the court said the company would have to make good the loss.

It is common for employees to deposit clothing and other personal belongings in company facilities while at work.

As a rule, the company must provide reasonable safekeeping if—as in Phyllis' case—the employee has been instructed to put the article in a particular place. This creates a "bailment" relationship, with a legal duty imposed on the company as the "bailee."

But the duty is not unlimited. In another case, also involving a stolen coat, the clothes closet was within a locked enclosure to which only employees had access. A court ruled that the company had made a reasonable effort to prevent theft, hence could not be held liable.

Of course, some responsibility rests upon the employee as well. A toolmaker who owned his own tools often left them overnight on his work bench. Right above the bench was a broken skylight. One night a thief climbed in through the skylight and decamped with the tools.

Could the company be blamed for the loss because of the broken skylight? A court said no, because the toolmaker himself was aware of the danger. By leaving his tools in such an accessible place, said the judge, he had "assumed the risk" of their being stolen.

Blackmon said he plans to check with the station next week and issue a news release. The only definite information they could give at this time is that it will probably be after May 25.

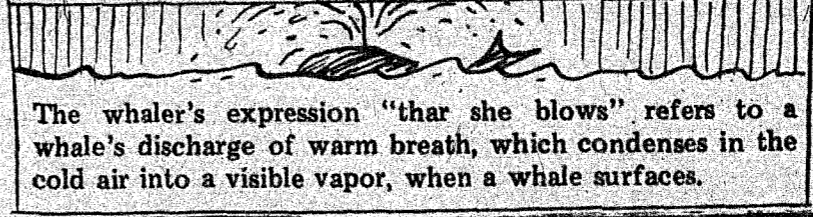
Blackmon adds that it's always a good idea to add a spreader-sticker agent to the spray as well as zinc sulfate to head off rosette.

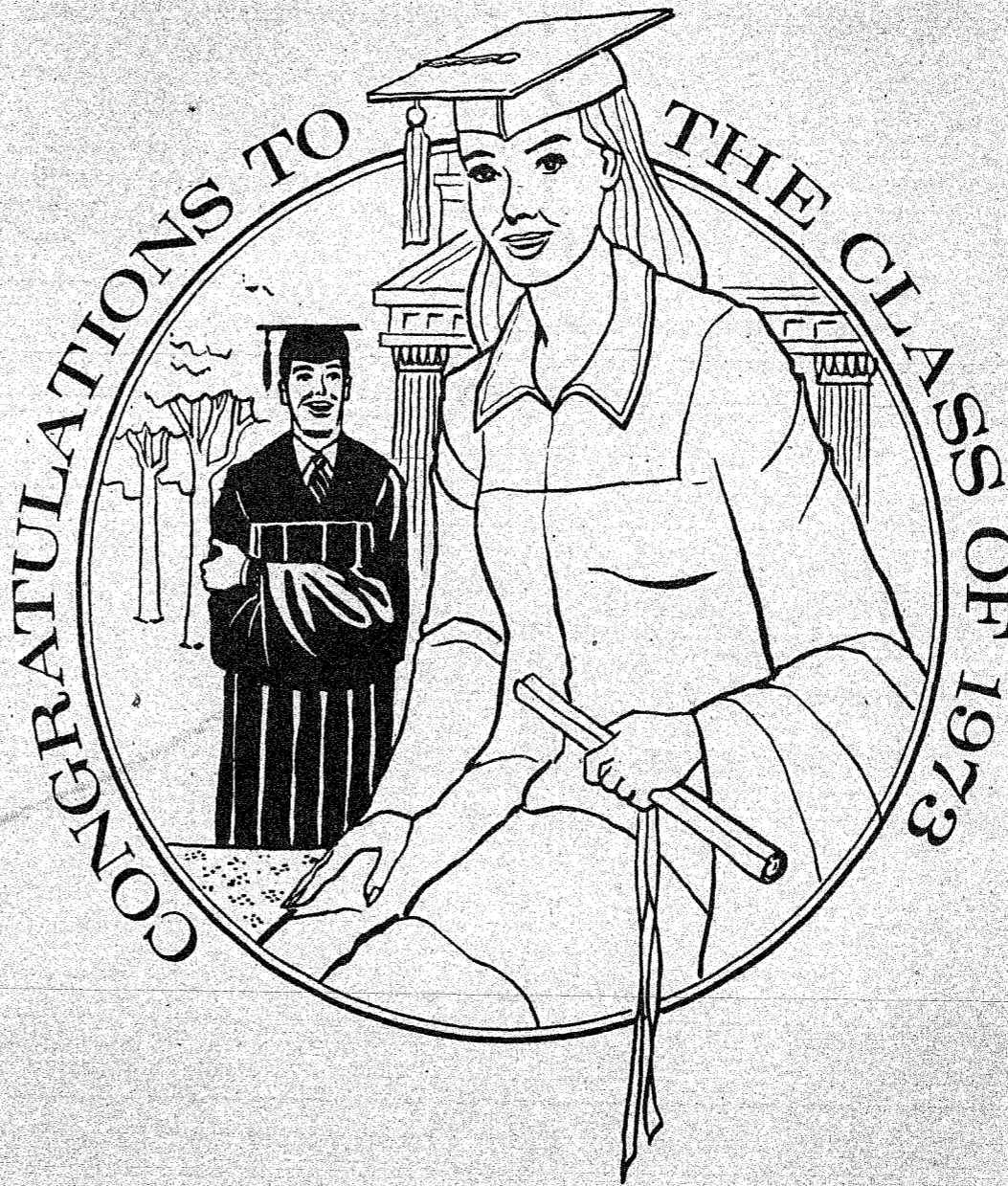

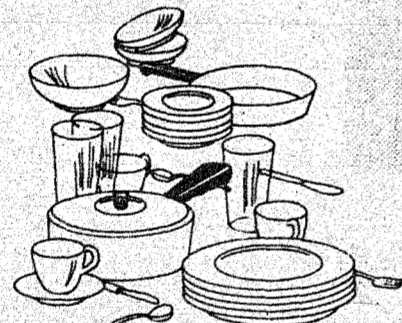
Boy Known Here Top Graduate Of Zephyr JHS

The commencement exercises for the eighth grade class will be held on Friday night at 8 p.m. at the Zephyr High School auditorium.

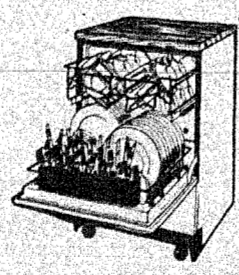

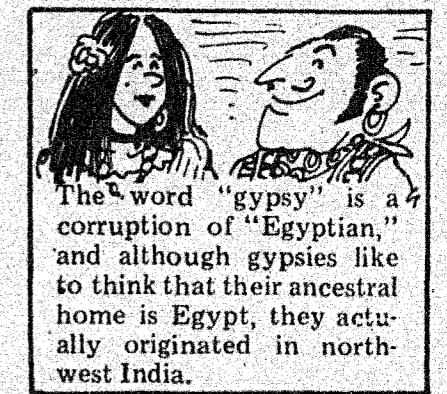

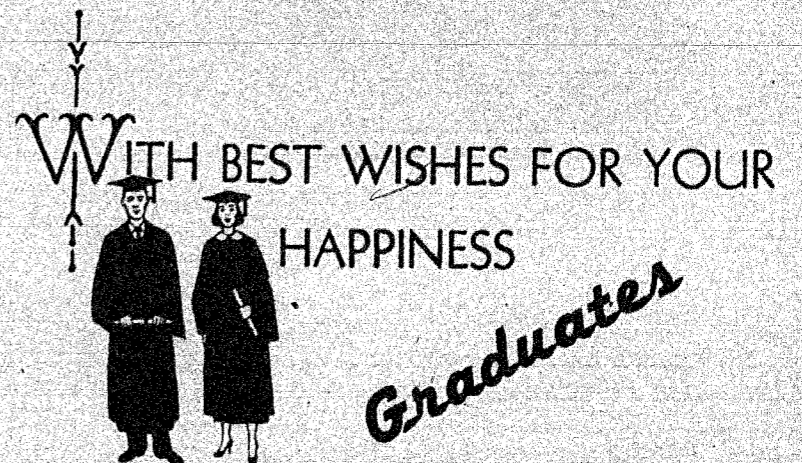

The relocation of the office will simply move the records and files to Room 2106 of the Post Office Building at 341 Pine Street in Abilene, where office space will be shared with Local Boards No. 115 in Abilene, No. 36 in Eastland, and No. 77 in Anson.

All young men are required by Federal Law to register with Selective Service within 30 days before or after their 18th birthday. Young men desiring to register should report to the Local Board office in Abilene or to one of the officially appointed registrars in Coleman County. 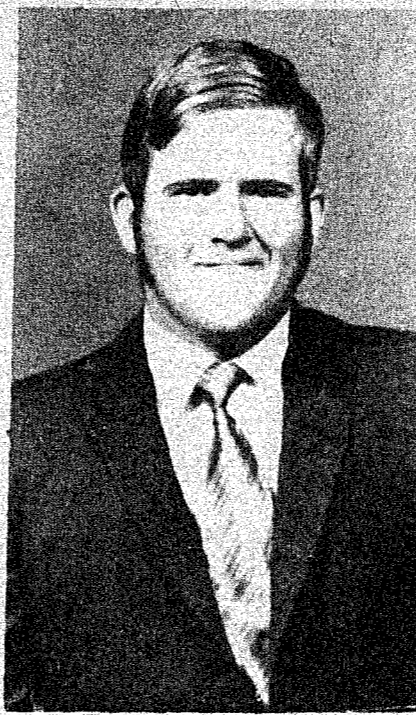

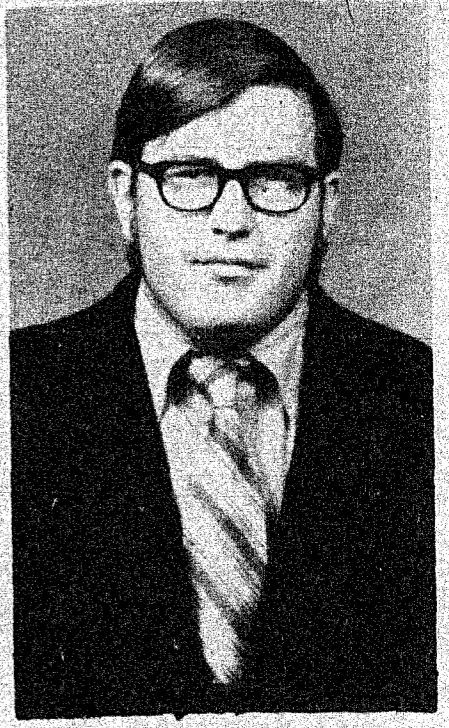
DAVID CUPPS

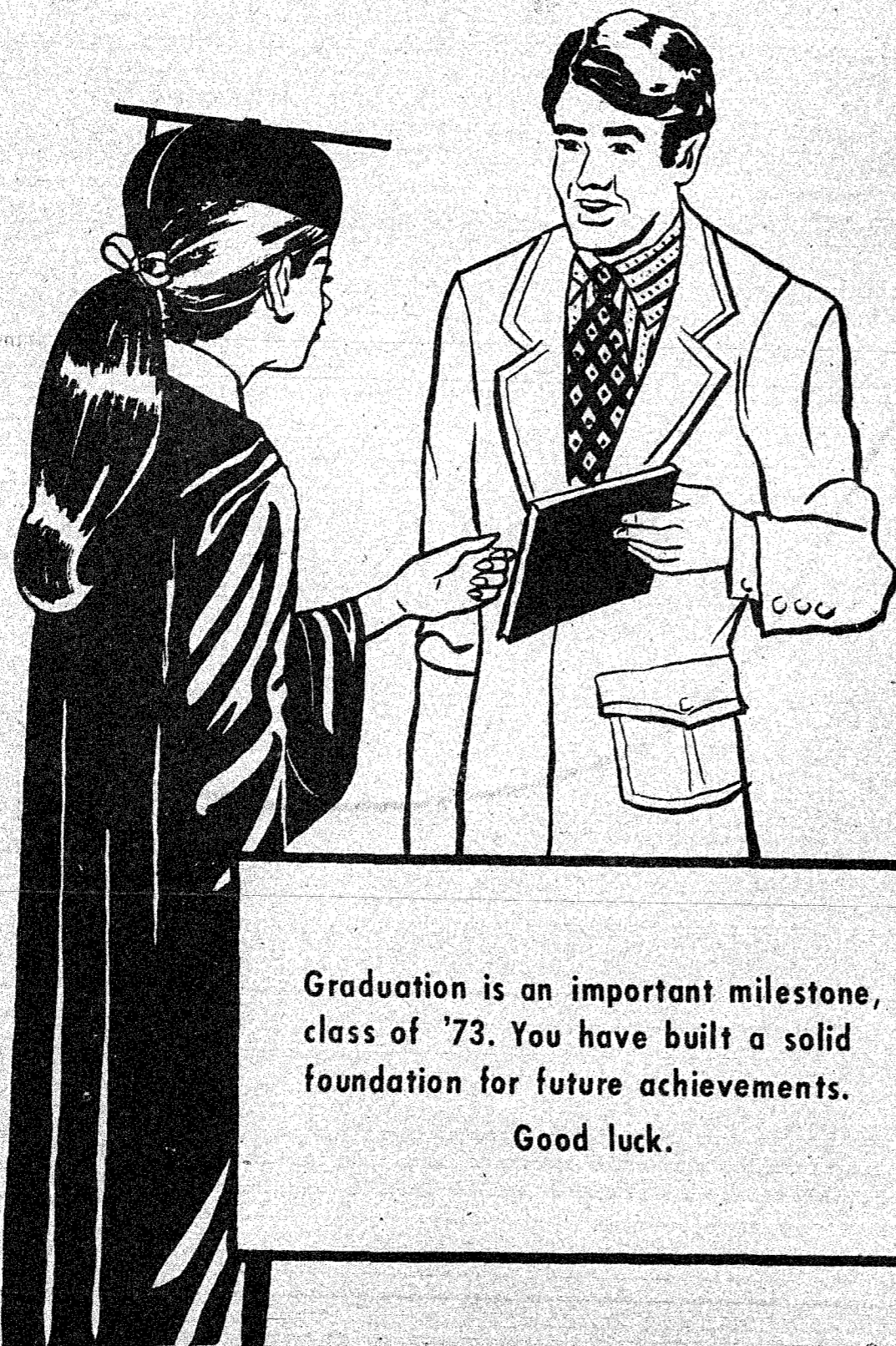


TOMMY McINTIRE

In her Freshman year Janice joined the FHA of which she has been a member for the past four years.

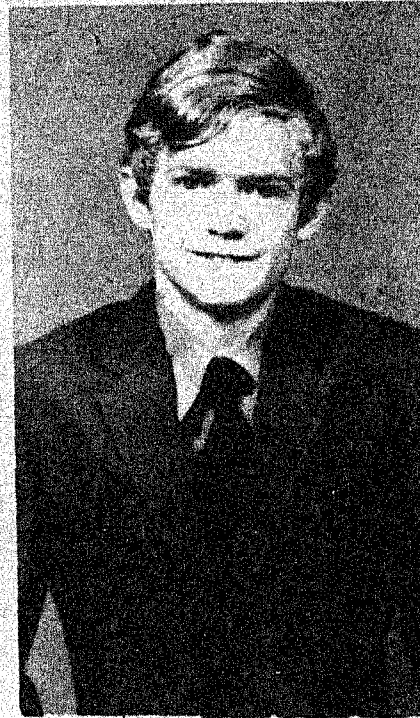

BOBBY CULLINS

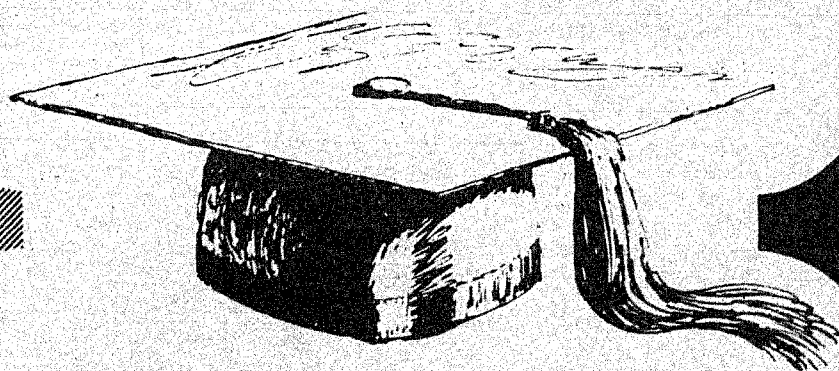

My current plans are not to go to college but instead go to work after I graduate.

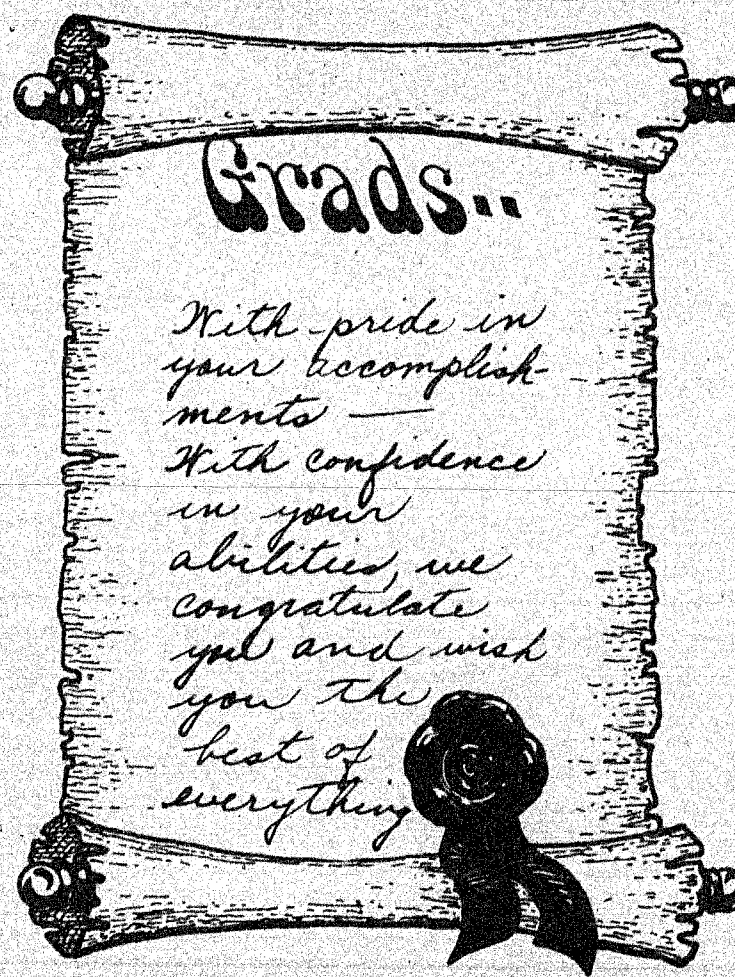

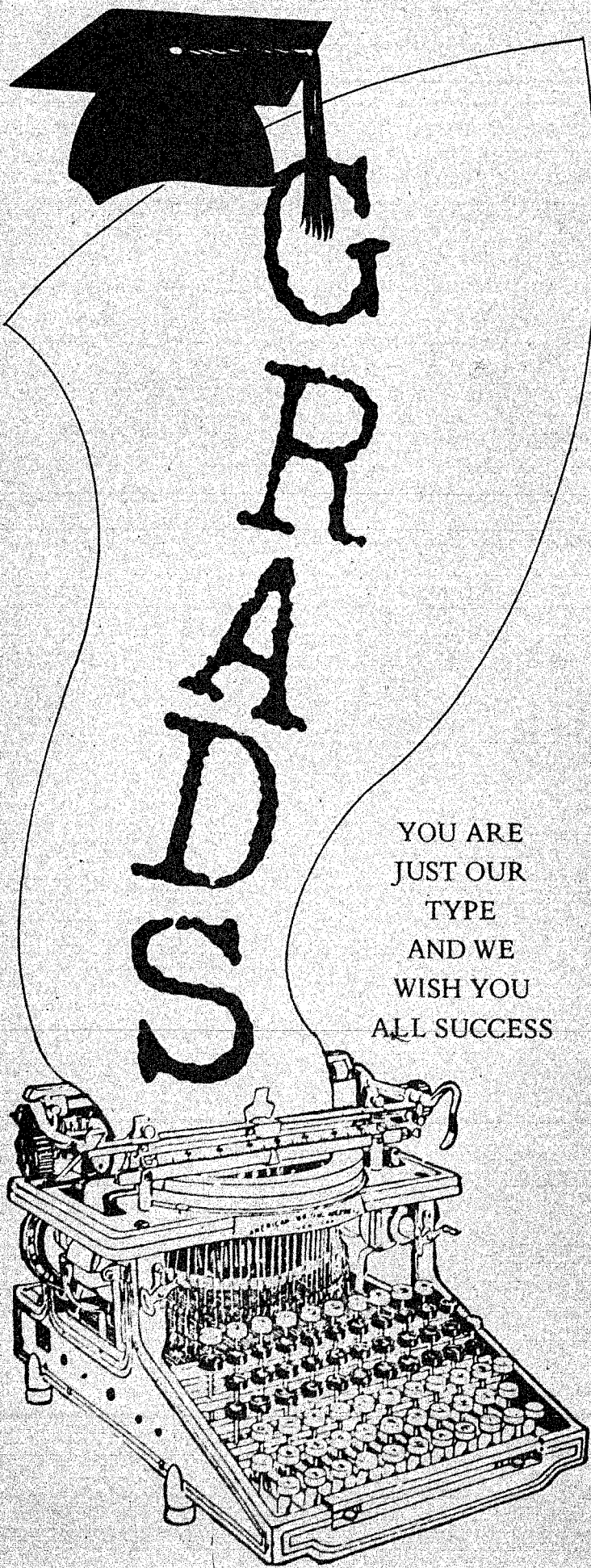
The year I was a Junior I had a lot of fun enjoying new things as

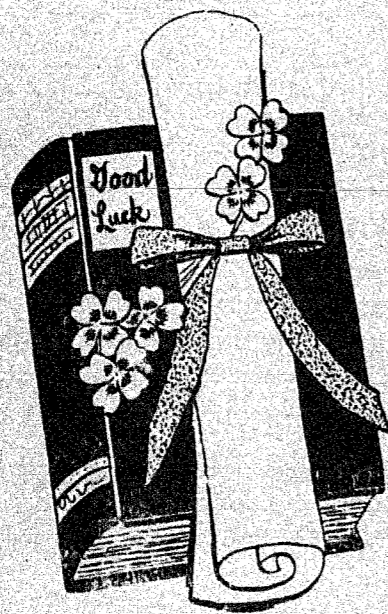

My high school education began in late August of 1969. I have enjoyed being in high school, and I have many wonderful memories from these past four years.

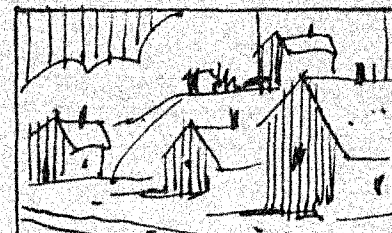
My best times have been when I was twirling with the band; marching at half time and in parades. The band has been the most fun of any organization I have belonged to.

After twelve years of study I am about to graduate from Santa Anna High School. Most of my formal education is over but I will continue to learn many things from the greatest teacher - Life.



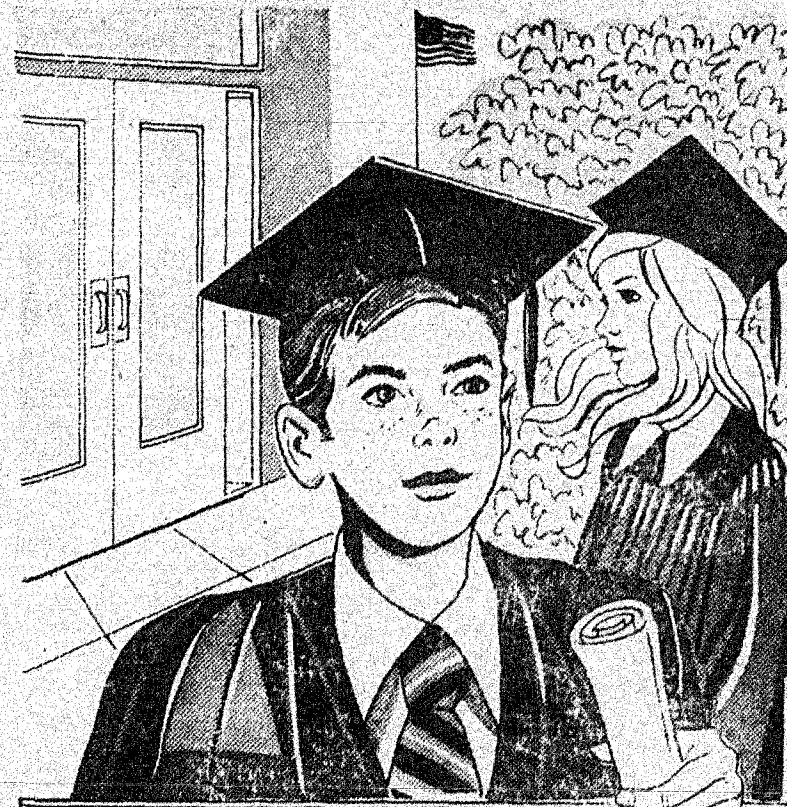

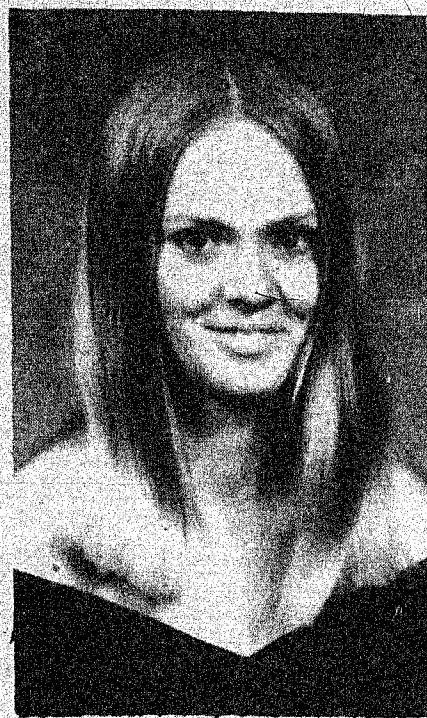

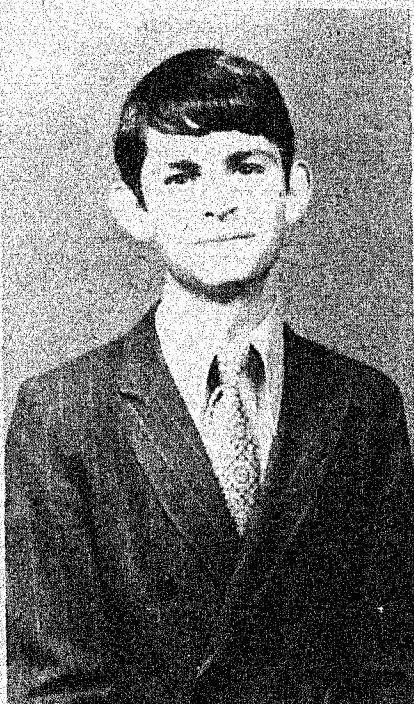

RICKEY JONES

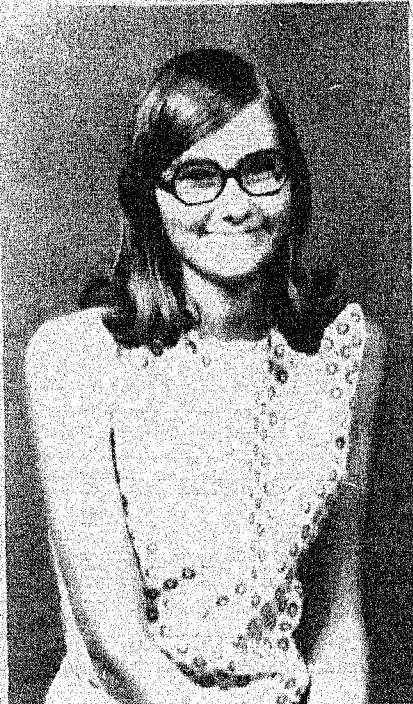

She started school at Santa Anna in the year 1961 and graduated from the eighth grade in 1969. During these years many things happened. She experienced many happy moments and many sad ones.

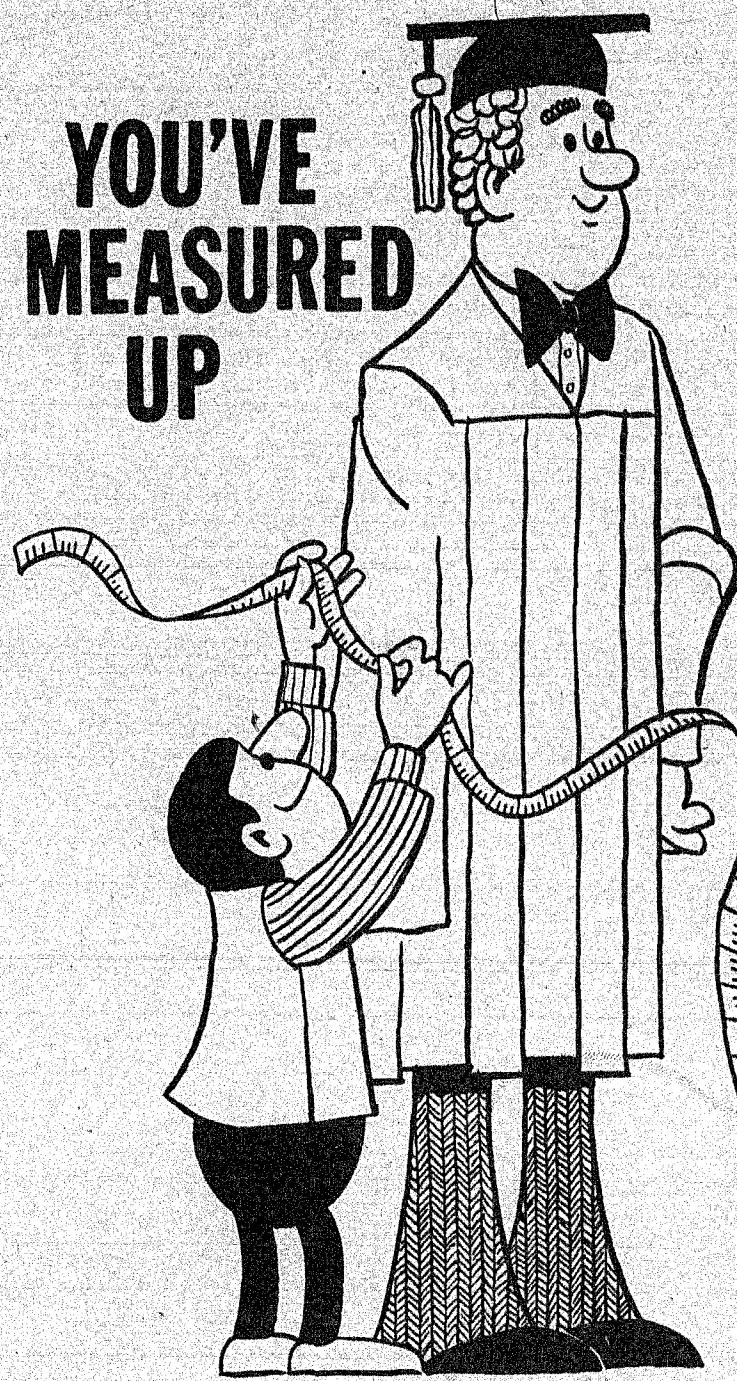
In the fall of 1969, she entered a new building to begin four long years that passed surprisingly fast. There were many new experiences. There were sports activities, class events, and four years of FHA.

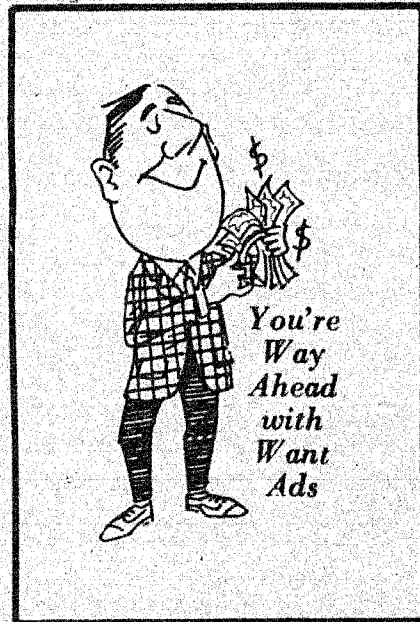


CLINE SMITH

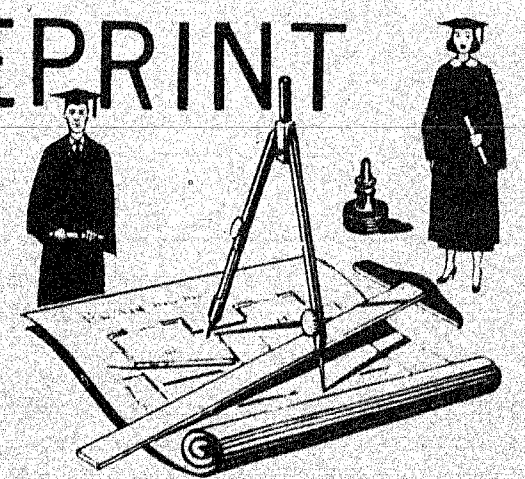


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
