

The new building program would bring a slight increase in school taxes by increasing the tax rate. There would be no increase in property valuations.


The Santa Anna school taxes are among the lowest in the state and considerably lower than those in moset of the neighboring school districts.

The Santa Anna Independent School District is in very good fiinancial shape, and the 20-year bond issue is still well within prescribed indebtedness for school districts of this size and valuation

# Growth Promoter Still With Us! Adds Profits To Weaner Calves

Pay-weight of weaning steers can be increased as much as 25 pounds by implanting suckling calves with a growth stimulator reports Mike Mccravey county Extension agent in Coleman County. The results from trials in seven Edwards Pleateau counties have shown responses for 4 to 63 pounds of additional gain at weaning, depending on length of the test, breed of cattle and pasture conditions.

The growth promotor used in these trials was "Ralgro" Thirty-six milligrams of the compound were injected under the skin of the ear when calves were approximately three months of age. The 128 implanted calves responded with an everage 25 pound increasein weaning weight over the control animals.

The heavier weaning weights were due mostly to a greater accumulation of muscle and bone. One to two pounds of the additional gain paid for the implant and the remaining 23 pounds of gain were profit.

There were no undesirable side effects from the implants and the calves will still respond to a growth stimulant when implanted at the stocker and feeder stage. In most of these tests the growth stimulator was implanted at the normal calf working time. There was little equipment or labor required since the implanting took no more than two or three seconds


### Prize Winners May Claim Gifts At WTU Office

### Adventists Urge Increase Gifts For '74 Missions

With per capita giving among Seventh-day Adventists already at \$425 in the present year, members have been urged to think in terms of doubling their mission giving in 1974.

Mrs. C. P. Wenzel, Sabbath School superintendant for the Santa Anna Adventist church, pointed out that the devaluated dollar was causing real difficulties for the church's mission program in many lands. "Already", she said, " a large percentage of our members have stepped up their contributions to overseas missions, and we feel that still other members will want to join them in this special "doubling" program we are instituting."

The superintendent stated that a number of mission budgets have had to be cut because of the dollar devaluation. "We want to stop that," she said. "We have always been a church known for its mission work-in 198 countries and we do not want to see the work diminished in any way. As a people looking for the soon return of Christ to earth, we cannot do less than we are now doing to sound the gospel alert."

Mrs. Wenzel reports that at the Autumn Council this last fall the denomination approved an overseas budget of \$36 million for 1974. "This is several million dollars higher than that for 1973," she added, "but it still doesn't make up for the dollar at its present lack of buying power."

The local church is studying stewardship this quarter with an emphasis on the difference between collections and offerings. "Our guts to God's work," she said, "should be offerings, not a response to collections. In fact, many Adventists budget their church dollars as faithfully as they do their living budgets, with specific percentages of this income allotted to certain kinds of church
