Election Set On Amendments Next Tuesday

Polls will be open in Santa Anna next Tuesday, November 6, for the voting on nine State constitutional amendments. The election will be held at the downtown Mountain City Center with voting from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Glen Copeland will serve as election judge. Clerks will be Lorene Rice, Omadean Horner and Eudell Copeland.

The proposed amendments include decisions on annual legislative sessions and legislative salaries; homestead single adults, conservation and single adults; conservation and reclamation districts; authority to cities; probate jurisdiction; bonds and veterans land fund; ad valorem tax levies for cities and towns; and non profit water supply corporation tax exemptions.

All qualified voters are urged to vote next Tuesday.

MOUNTAINERS DEFEAT EARLY: HOST DeLEON THIS WEEK

Mountaineer tailback David Huggins led the team to a 35-12 victory over the Early Longhorns Friday night in the homecoming game. Huggins scored three times and piled up an amazing 257 yards rushing on 41 carries. It was the first district victory for Santa Anna and the second 10-A defeat for the Longhorns.

Huggins TD's came on runs of four, five and 53 yards behind the fine blocking in the line and by fullback Danny Valdez.

The first touchdown came early in the opening quarter during the first series of plays. Early evened the score when Hughes took the Santa Anna kickoff 85 yards to pay dirt.

Santa Anna took a 19-6 halftime lead, and early in the third quarter Steve Beal tackled an Early player in the end zone for a 2-point safety. Early scored

again in the third period of play. Danny Valdez scored one TD for the Mountaineers, and Mark Shambeck intercepted a Longhorn pass and ran 43 yards before being brought down on the Early three yard line. Jody Day, SAHS quarterback, took it over for the evening's final core. Neither team scored in the fourth quarter.

Mason Native Teaching Vo-Ag In SA School

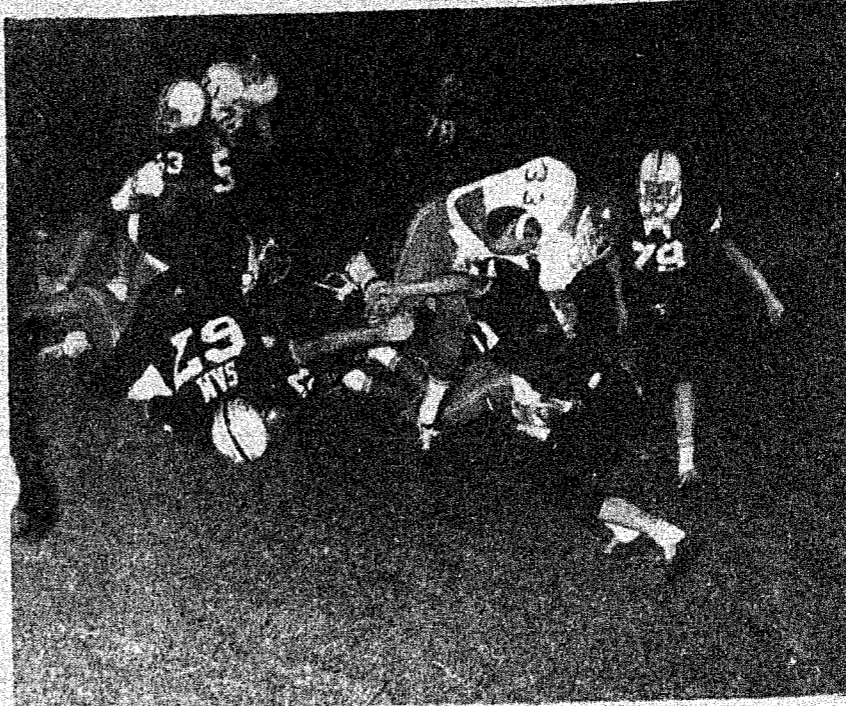

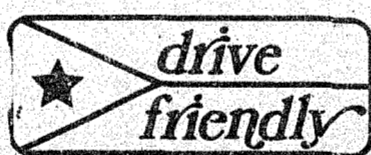

NO FOOD STAMPS SOLD HERE: MUST BE BOUGHT IN COLEMAN

Postmaster John C. Gregg announced Monday that the new food stamps will not be sold in Santa Anna as was previously announced. The only distribution point in Coleman County will be in Coleman at the post office.

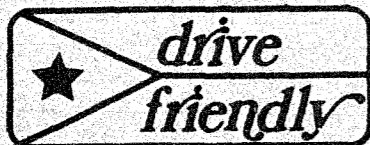
Households authorized to receive the food stamps will receive Authorization-to-Purchase cards during the first week of each month. The cards can be taken to the Coleman post office to a special window where the food stamps can be purchased. Hours for the purchase are from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. each weekday.

Purchasers must take their cards, food stamp identification and cash for the stamp purchases. The post office does not accept checks. None can use the Authorization-to-Purchase cards except the head of the household, his spouse or authorized representative. All food stamp identification cards must have the necessary signatures.

Once the food stamps are purchased they may be used to purchase all food items at local stores. All Santa Anna grocery stores will be authorized to accept the stamps for any items except tobacco products, pet food, soap, household cleansers, drug items and deposits on drink bottles.

The food stamp program gets underway today, November 1. Food stamp shoppers are reminded that the food stamp identification must be taken to the store, and shoppers must inform the checkers before they start that the purchase is being made with stamps. Stamps in the \$2 and \$5 denominations must be torn out in the presence of the checker, not before. Stamps may not be used to pay overdue bills, but they may be used anytime, not just the month that they are purchased.

Certifying offices for the stamps are the Food Stamp office in the State Department of Public Welfare in the Coleman Bank Building and the Public Assistance office in the Cobb Building in Coleman. Anyone wanting more information should contact either of the two agencies.

Farmers are being asked to carry out sound conservation practices on cropland being brought back into production in 1974.

Improved farm commodity prices and less restrictive farm program rules are expected to attract more land into production in 1974, and the U.S. Department of Agriculture is asking farmers to focus attention on conservation measures and the maintenance of the quality of the environment as they bring land back into production.

Area farmers recognize their responsibility not to jeopardize the land they farm. They realize that conservation practices not only preserve the environment, but that they also help increase net income through improved yields, better crop quality and greater production efficiency.

At a time when farmers should be taking care that they apply needed conservation practices, they are also realizing the income levels which provide the financial means to carry out resource protection. Nationally, it appears that our present cropland base is adequate to meet current and projected domestic and international demands. 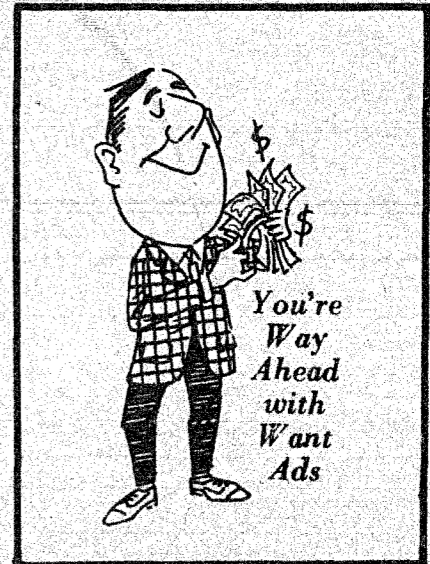
