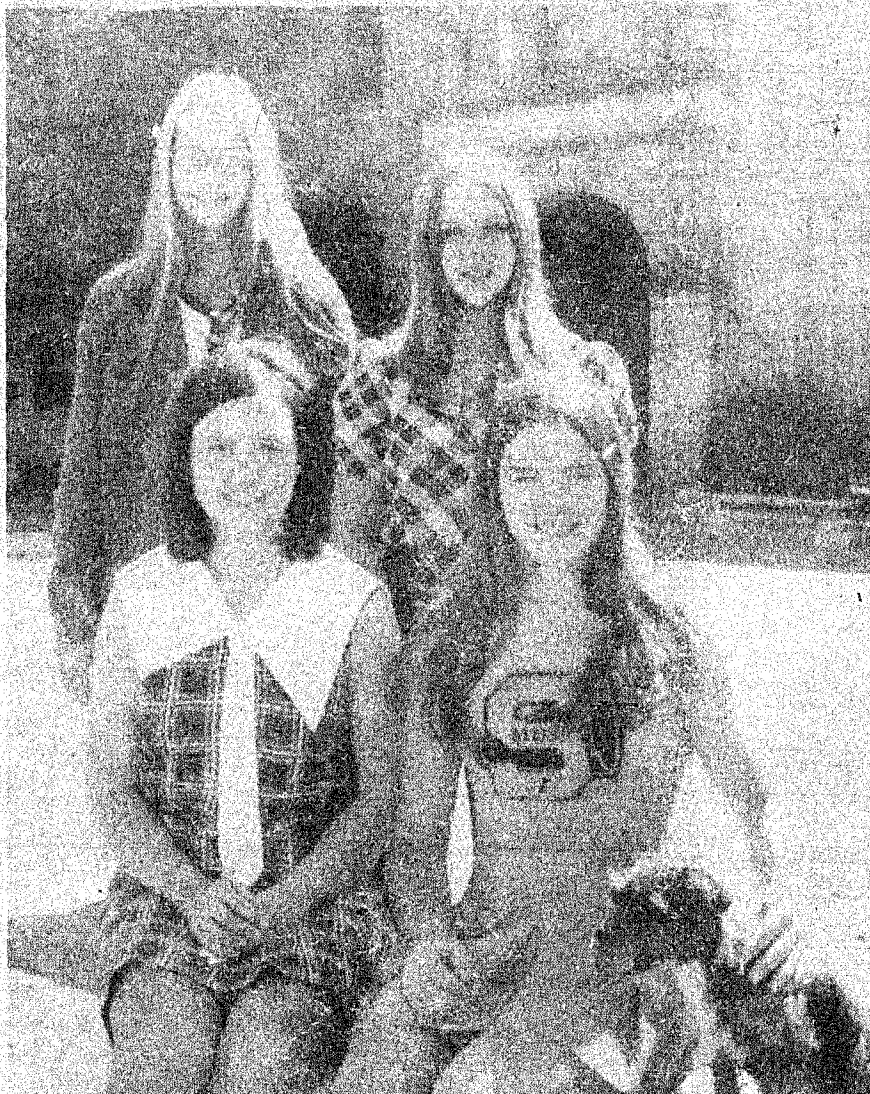
Sunday, October 28, will bring the return of Standard Time and the end of Daylight Savings Time. We have decided that it's not a different time we dislike, but the change from one time to another.

### SAHS IS ASSIGNED TO CLASS B; 11-MEMBER DISTRICT IS ZONED

Santa Anna High School has been re-assigned to Class B for the next two years according to a recent news release from the Texas University Interscholastic League office in Austin. The new classification is based on high school enrollment for the past two years.

Santa Anna moved from Class B to Class A for the 1972-73 and 73-74 school years based on enrollment the year prior. At that time the high school enrollment rose above the 120 mark.

Enrollment figures for classification have also been raised this year with Class B schools to have below 125 students and Class A from 125 to 234. The former dividing line was at 120 students.

Supt. Cullen Perry announced Tuesday that Santa Anna will be in an 11 member district next year. Santa Anna will be in the west zone with five of the schools, and there

will be five schools in the east zone. A zone playoff will be held at the close of the regular football season to determine the champion for District 6-B.

Teams in the west zone will be Richland Springs, Eden, Rising Star, Blanket, Gorman and Santa Anna. Those in the west zone are Meridian, Valley Mills, Evant, Lometa and Crawford.

The 1974 football schedule is being compiled this week, but already completed is the district schedule starting on October 11 and ending with a date for the zone playoff on November 16.

There will be 997 schools participating in UIL football next year. Among the new schools will be Talpa-Centennial in 6-man competition who discontinued football several years ago and is now rejoining the ranks.

Another change of interest is the advance of Sonora, a long-time Class A power, to Class AA.

## Local Man Charged Monday With Arson Of Vacant House

A Santa Anna man was jailed in the Coleman County jail Monday afternoon in connection with a fire in a vacant house in Santa Anna. The man was arrested Monday and charged with the arson in the case.

The old Woodruff home on Wallis Avenue, now owned by E.D. Walker of Santa Anna, was damaged by a fire during the weekend which caused a great amount of damage to the interior but did no visible damage to the outside of the structure. The blaze occurred sometime Saturday night or early Sunday, according to investigators.

According to Clifford Stephenson, Santa Anna City Fire Marshall, a gallon plastic jug of gasoline with grass rope "wick" was ignited in a closet of the home. An apparent lack of oxygen in the closed house prevented the blaze from spreading throughout the frame home. The closet was charred by the blaze and paint burned throughout the adjoining rooms. The bottom of the plastic jug was still intact in the closet floor, according to Stephenson. The blaze had completely extinguished when the damage was discovered.

An agent from the ABC

Realtors of Brownwood discovered the damage Sunday when showing the home which is listed for sale. The fire was not reported to local officers until Monday when it was investigated, by Deputy Sheriff H.F. Fenton, Stephenson and local VFD officials. The arrest came a few hours after the investigation was begun. The identity of the suspect was not revealed by investigators pending further investigation.

Dear Editor:

I guess everyone has his hang-ups. Some are more serious than others. These days apparently a lot of people-- young people-- are hung up on drugs. When you warn them against drugs such as marijuana, they are quick to point out that marijuana is no worse than alcohol, and alcohol is quite an accepted beverage in society. No questions are asked.

So you take a man who drinks; maybe he will point to the people who light one cigarette after another and pollute the air for everyone around them. That's his excuse-- unless, of course he does both. Then maybe he says at least he is not using drugs.

The truth of the matter is that in all three cases these people are using drugs. And whether they will admit it or not, they are using crutches. The tobacco smoker smokes because he wants to be one with the crowd, and eventually he is "hooked", so that is no longer the primary reason. The drinker has the same basic purpose for drinking-- until he is hooked. And the one dabbling in drugs starts for the same reason-- it's the in thing. And then he is hooked-- psychologically if not physically, and far too often it ends up physically as well.

Some people explain that smoking this or that or drinking is their only pleasure. This is a sad commentary of the affluent American life. I happen to be a Seventh-day Adventist, and some people might wonder how I get any pleasure out of life because my church prohibits the use of anything like tobacco, alcohol, coffee, and other narcotics, besides recommending a lot of other restrictions for health reasons. But when these harmful elements are cleaned out of one's life, it is beautiful! And full of fascinating things to do and taste and see. I wish I could just tell all these blase people about it. That's why I am writing this letter-- just to say, "Try the bright clean way without crutches. You'll like it."

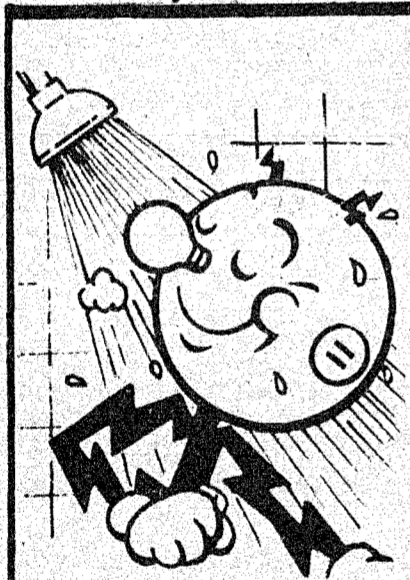

**In Our Opinion**

THE FIRING OF Archibald Cox as special prosecutor in the Watergate case has probably brought the Nixon administration to its lowest point of popularity and has dropped the confidence of the American people in the administration to the lowest in its history.

Congressman Poage stated that "It is funny that the president would go to this extreme if he had nothing to hide," and that is the feeling of most other Americans.

This action has just about convinced the people that the old saying, where's there's smoke, there must be fire, is true.

Many of us felt that Spiro Agnew probably didn't have anything to hide, either, but apparently we were mistaken. If the truth ever comes out, then we may find that Mr. Nixon has some skeletons in his closet, too.

It is almost impossible to expect a government as big as ours to operate without some corruption. There are just not that many honest people, it seems. Time was when a man was as good as his word, but that seems to be a thing of the past. It is sad to say, but this old world seems to be getting worse and worse, just as it says in the scriptures, and the bigger the office in government, the more impast dishonesty has.

Odd as it may seem, honesty seems to vary with the part of the country one is in. We will not make an accusations, but to say that the Southwest is the most honest part of the country. The hang over from the old west still lingers in our part of the country and men still pride themselves on being a man of his word. 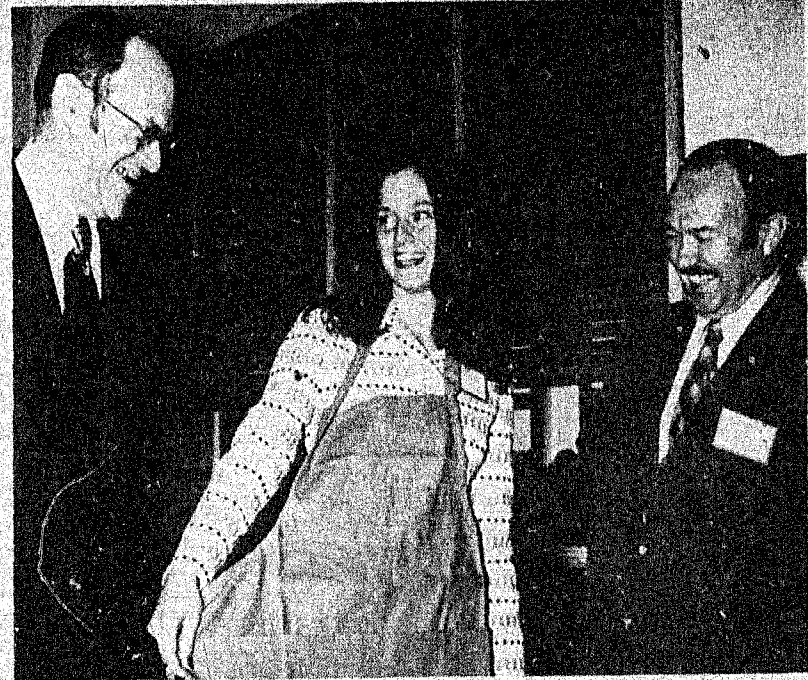

A son, Frank Mills, a former Coleman County sheriff and Texas Ranger, predeceased her in death.



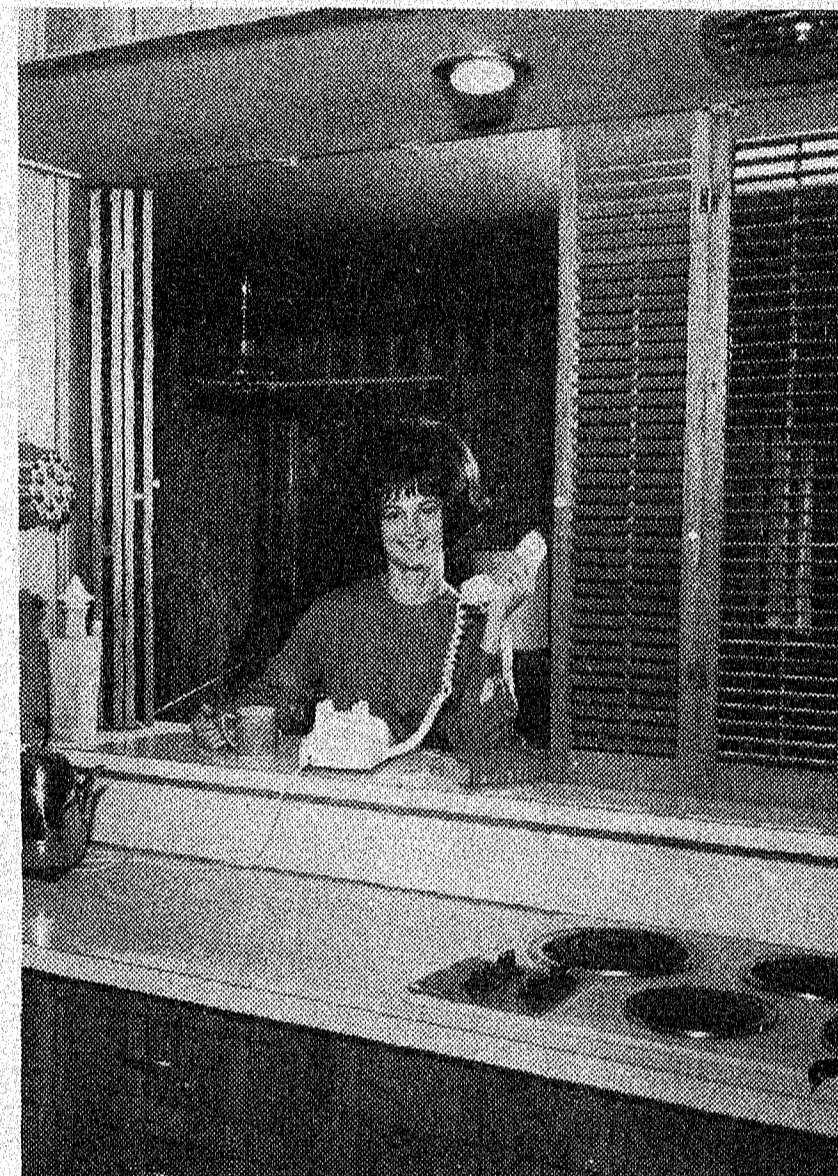
## Driving Course To Be Sponsored By Lions Club

Susan, a senior at SAHS, was awarded third place for showmanship during the stock show.

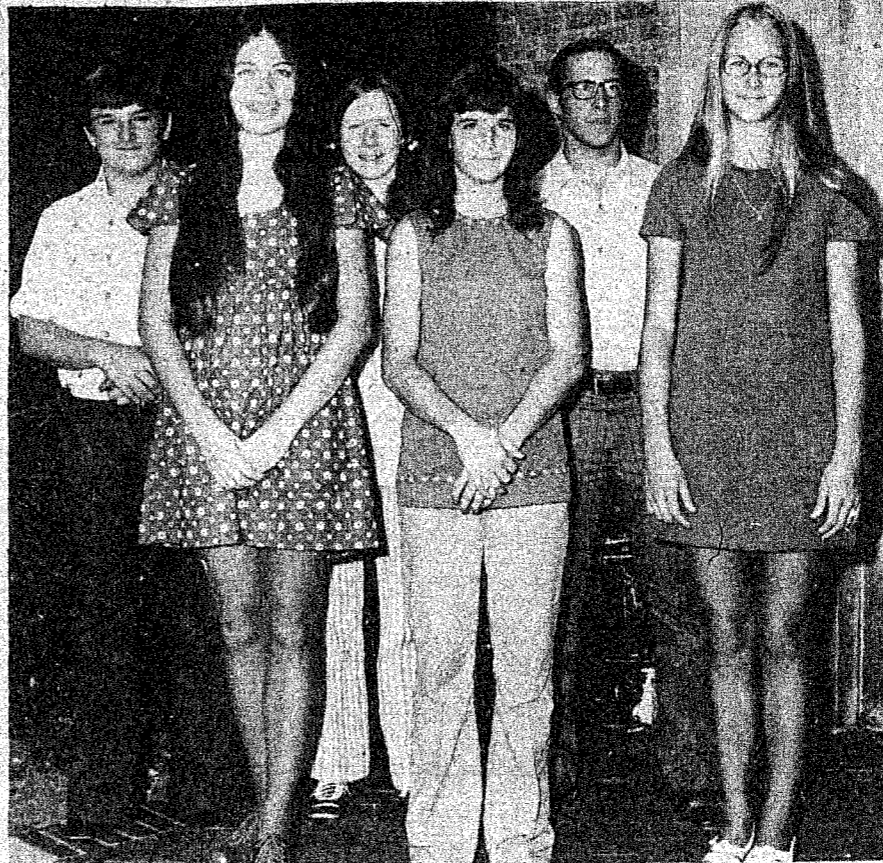
## State FB Prexy Will Be Speaker At Meet Tonight

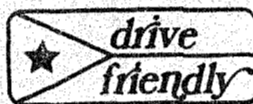

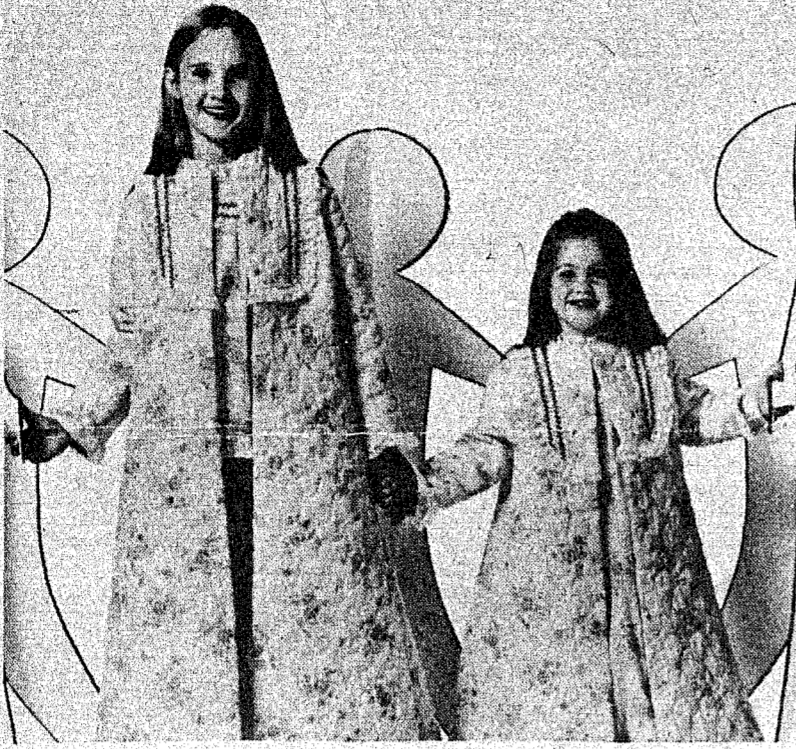

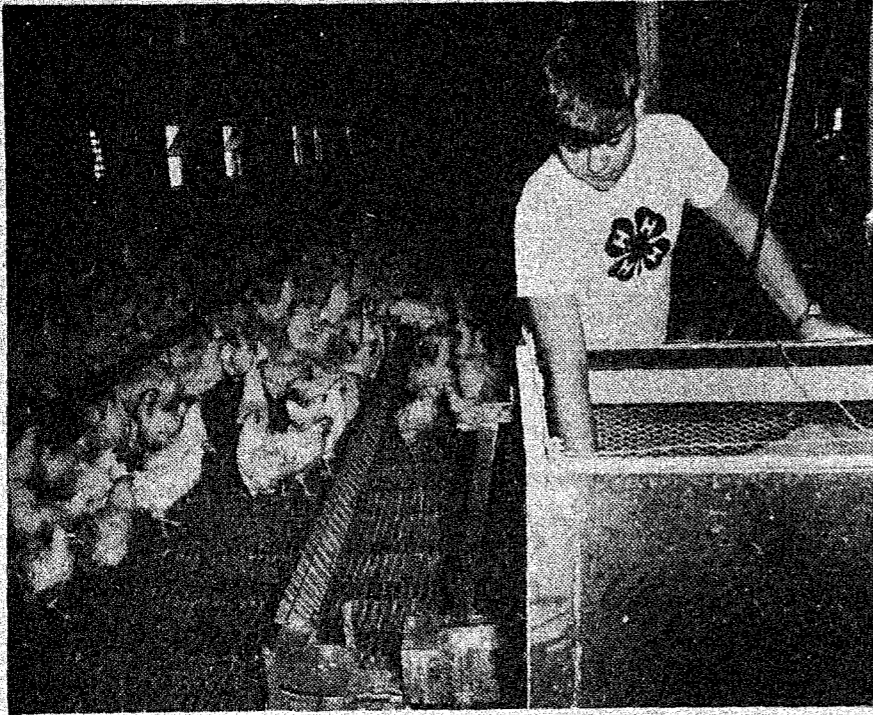

### CAMPING TIPS

Getting away from it all with a weekend campout is one of the most relaxing and inexpensive forms of recreation available to the city-bound family. But to enjoy your visit to the wild, first develop a few outdoor skills such as campfire building.

The fire is the true "heart" of your camp, so gathering wood and building a campfire should be your first order of business when you reach your camp site. Collect kindling—small dead branches and twigs—and larger pieces of wood up to about eight inches in diameter. Pile the fuel at least four feet from the fire site.



Select a spot away from overhanging trees and clear the area of tinder for about 10 feet in all directions. Hollow out a pit about 18 inches wide and four inches deep and dig a small trench at one side for air flow. Ring the pit with rocks, flat side up on which to set pots and pans.

Build your fire using the "tipi" method. As the name implies, build a small tipi, beginning with kindling and adding gradually larger pieces of wood. Light the fire by inserting a small wad of paper and touching a match to it. Unfortunately, you cannot be

sure of finding dry kindling, and paper often will not light damp wood easily. To eliminate this problem, try using a new dry fire starter called Fire-Stix which is available at supermarkets, sporting goods and department stores. Place one or two pieces of the product inside the tipi and light it. The starter will flame steadily even in wet or windy weather, assuring you of a fast start to your campfire. Non-poisonous, non-explosive and compact, the product will light even when it is wet. An entire week's supply of the starter weighs about six ounces and occupies the space of a sandwich in your backpack. For the address of your local dealer, write Fire-Stix, P.O. ### ASCS NEWS

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has announced that detailed specifications now applicable to bagging and bale ties used in packaging cotton tendered to Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) under its cotton loan program will be discontinued beginning with the 1974 crop of cotton.

Under the change bagging and bale tie specifications will be limited to more general provisions which apply currently, perhaps augmented by other provisions of a general nature as are deemed appropriate. All bagging qualifying under present regulations would, of course, continue to be eligible under the broader standards announced.

Examples of possible additions were described in the notice of proposed rule making published in the Federal Register on May 17, 1973. As in the past, experimental materials being tested under the auspices of the Joint Industry Bale Packing Committee will be exempt from the general provisions.

The May 17 notice stated that detailed specifications for bale packaging materials were being reviewed to determine whether they should be continued, modified, or rescinded for the 1974 crop. Views and recommendations of interested parties were solicited. Almost all respondents recommended retention of detailed specifications now applicable. The dominant reasons expressed for doing so related to two points: (a) an interest in maintaining a uniform tare, and (b) concern that the quality of wrapping materials would deteriorate through competitive pressure in the absence of government regulation.

All landowners are reminded to be at the courthouse between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. on November 9 to obtain the permits and tags for the coming hunting season which starts November 17 and ends on January 1.
