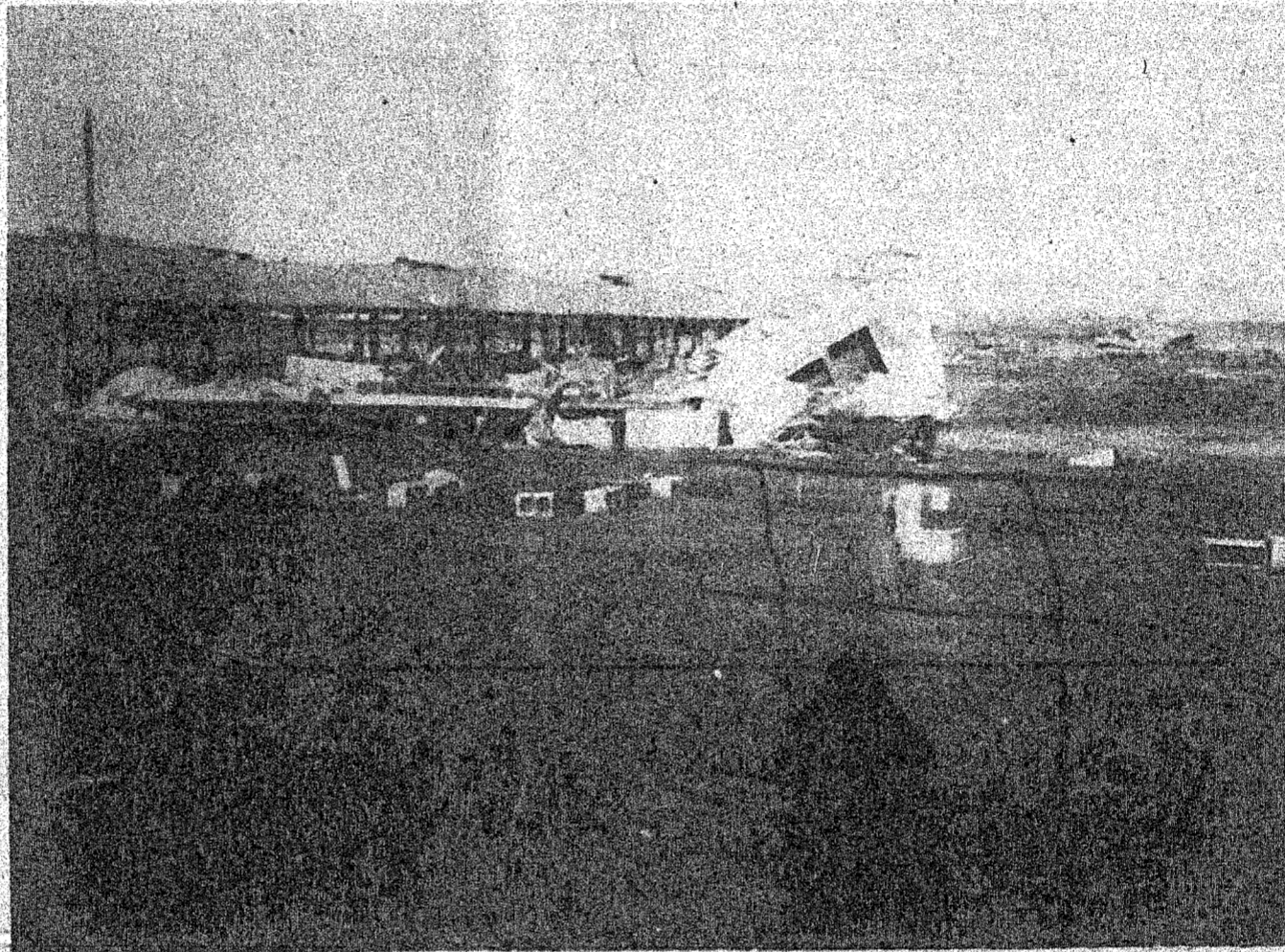
We urge local people to attend the ceremony Sunday afternoon and to offer personal congratulations to these fine young men, their leader and parents.

## Turkey Farm Damaged by Storm

direction where damage was reported near to cemetery area. The major damage was at the Isenhower Turkey Farm just south of town where one barn was destroyed and another severely damaged and 20,000 baby turkeys killed or injured.

A fast-moving storm Wednesday night, February 20, caused major damage at the Isenhower Turkey Farm at the south edge of Santa Anna and also caused damage at a number of other places in the community. The storm hit about 10 p.m. and was accompanied by about one-half inch of rain.

The apparent twister destroyed a chicken house at the Bert Tabor place and traveled northeast toward the turkey farm. The first building was severely damaged and the second one almost completely destroyed. The second building contained 20,000 baby turkeys that had been placed there just that day. Thousands were killed in the storm and the

others had to be disposed of.

One unoccupied mobile home at the farm was disintegrated in the storm and another was overturned and severely damaged. Another barn at the former Griffin Turkey Farm was damaged in the storm, and debris was scattered over a wide area.

Fences, trees, television antennas and other property was damaged by the high winds, and at the C. P. Wenzel home and Roy West place damage was reported to outbuildings when the twister apparently took an easterly course from the turkey farm.

Other minor damage was reported in the Shields Community and at the Calvin Fuller place northeast of Santa Anna.

The only injury resulting from the storm occurred when Mrs. Arch Hull fell and broke her hip as she and her daughter, Mrs. N. C. Watson, went to the storm cellar. Mrs. Watson, an employee of the Isenhower Turkey Farm, heard the storm approaching when she went to check on the baby turkeys and the two ladies were seeking shelter from the storm. Mrs. Hull had surgery to repair the break last Saturday and is in the Hendrick Hospital in Abilene.

Damage at the Turkey farm has been estimated at about \$40,000 and is said to be partially covered by insurance. The baby turkeys were the first put down this season, and another shipment had been expected the following day.

## Donham Memorial Track Meet To Be Held Friday at SAHS

High school track teams from 20 area schools will be in Santa Anna Friday afternoon and night for the annual A. D. Donham Memorial Track Meet. The meet is being sponsored by the Santa Anna Booster Club with assistance from the local school and individuals.

Preliminaries in the field events will start at 12:30 p.m. Running events will start in the early afternoon, and finals will begin at 7 p.m.

There are to be both boys and girls divisions, making a total of

40 groups participating. Also to be here will be coaches, school leaders and parents from many of the schools.

A concession stand will be open during the day, and supper for team members and visitors will be served at the school cafeteria from 5 to 7 p.m.

A small admission will be charged to the finals Friday night, and everyone in the community is urged to attend and support the local team. The meet tomorrow will be the first outing for the local girls team coached by Jerry Allen.

## Postal Rates Will Increase On Saturday

An increase in postal rates goes into effect on Saturday, March 2, according to Postmaster John Gregg.

First class postage goes from 8 cents to 10 cents; air mail rates advance from 11 cents to 13 cents; and postal cards go from 6 to 8 cents. There will also be an increase in parcel post and other postal rates, including airgrams, second and third class mail.

Postmaster Gregg also said that there is very little change in schedule of mail now that it is dispatched from Abilene instead of Brownwood. The only noticeable change is in the Sunday mail which leaves Santa Anna at 4 p.m.

## HAY, PICKUP ARE DESTROYED

The Santa Anna Volunteer Fire department was called to the Max Eubank place west of Santa Anna Monday just before noon to extinguish a fire. A large stack of old hay and a pickup truck belonging to Roy Bible of Brownwood were destroyed in the blaze, but a new barn full of hay was saved by the firemen.

Mr. Bible was hauling the old hay in a late model Chevrolet pickup and the exhaust apparently ignited the hay, starting the blaze. Firemen were too late to save the vehicle, but the smoldering hay was moved away from the barn into an adjacent field. Two fire trucks and several firemen answered the call.

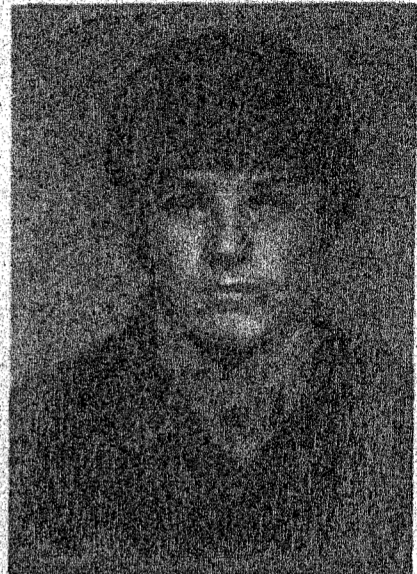

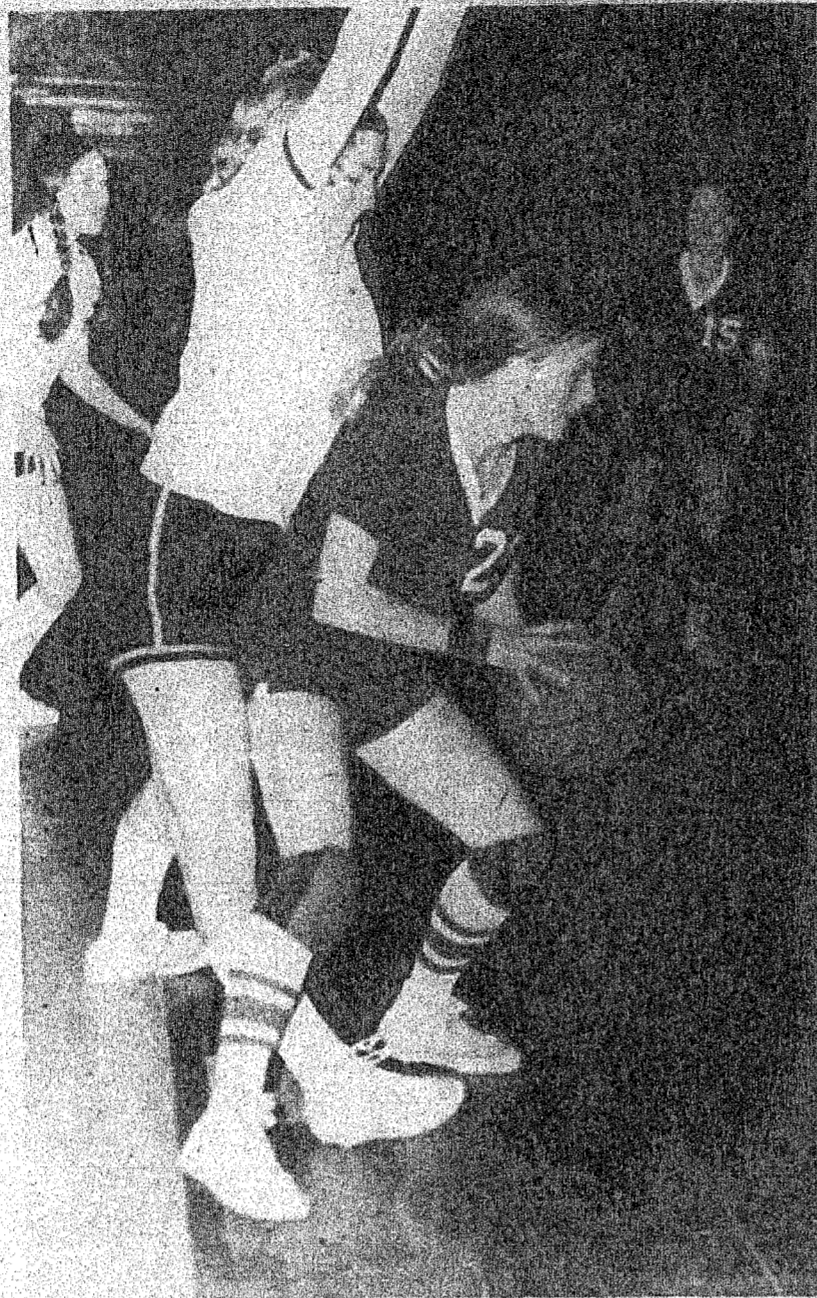
## Mrs. Wagner, 83, Buried Here On Wednesday

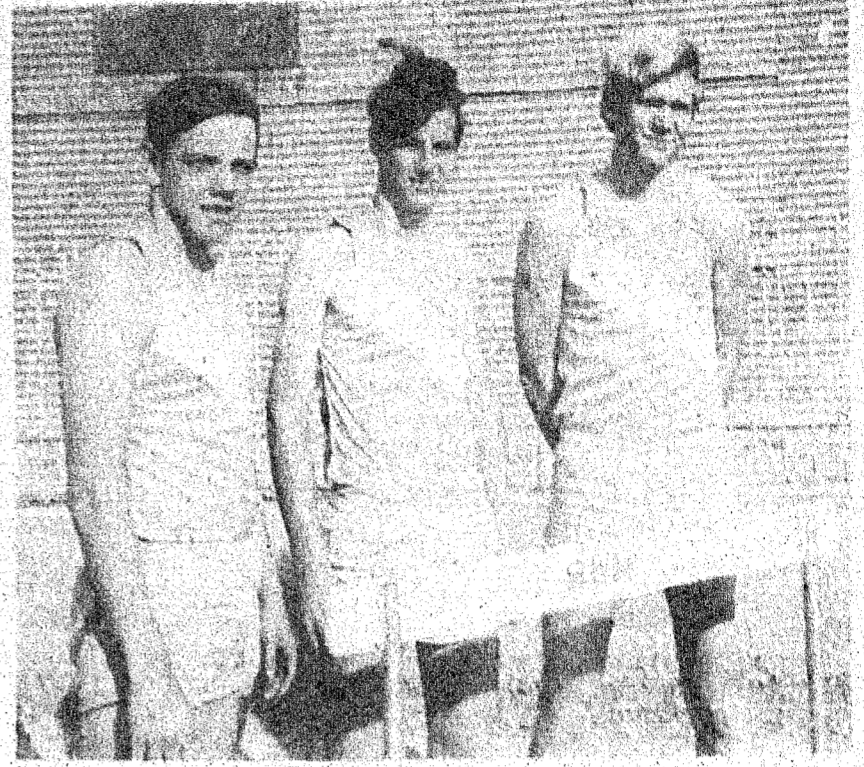
## SA Track Team Has Winners In Ballinger Meet

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## New Church Under Construction In Bangs by New Testament Holiness

(Ed note: The following story appeared in the January 30 issue of the Brown County Gazette. A number of families who have moved to Santa Anna and Coleman in recent weeks are members of the denomination mentioned in the following article.)

There are a lot of rumors around Brown County about the new church which is under construction in Bangs.

The talk ranges from the world is in its last days and Bangs will be the only place saved to more than 2,000 people are going to invade the Central Texas area preaching a new religion of fire and brimstone and faith healing.

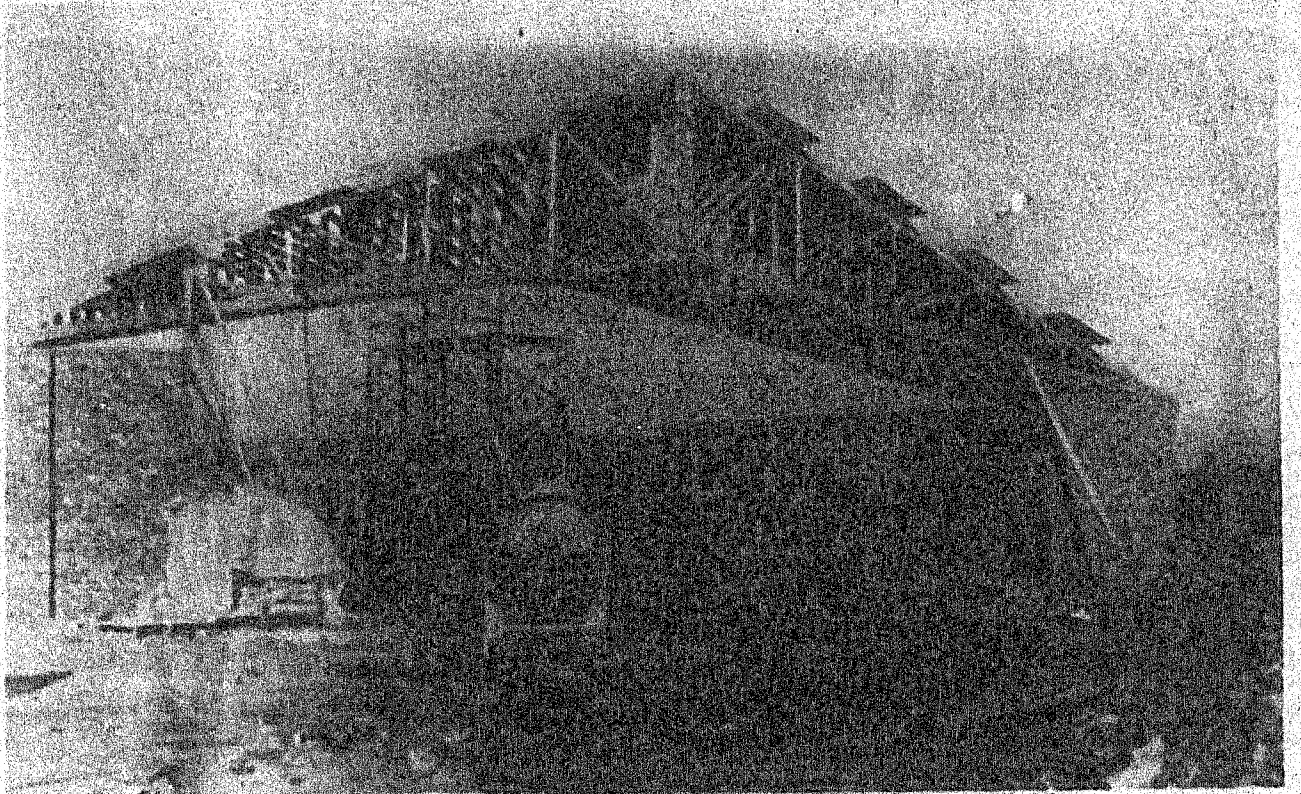
How true are the rumors? They are mostly hear-say which has gotten out of hand, spreading like a grassfire throughout Brown

County. And like a grass fire the rumors will quickly die and the county's newest residents--members of the New Testament Holiness Church--will be accepted as they begin doing their part in making this area one of the best in the state to live.

Calvin Baldwin, one of the ministers with the New Testament Holiness, says the church which is being built on the northeast side of Bangs will be nondenominational, accepting any person of any faith. "We preach only the Bible," he said.

"Our services are open to everyone. We have five a week," Baldwin said.

Instead of the regular Sunday morning service that most people are used to, the New Testament Church has only one service scheduled on Sundays, that being at 7 p.m.; but the church does

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schedule services on Saturday morning, 10 a.m. and Saturday evening at 7 p.m. and on Tuesday evening at 7 p.m.

According to Baldwin, the church does not practice any supernatural beliefs other than that of Christianity. He said that the church here is just one of several churches in the United

States which is nondenominational.

The church, like most churches, has its own magazine--the Endtime Messenger.

As to how many people will and have arrived in this area because of the new church Baldwin does not know. He said that many of the people moving here are not necessarily members of the New Testament Holiness Church. He referred to many of them as curiosity seekers. "They have just heard of the church and are coming to see what it's all about."

Baldwin did agree that the church has received some bad publicity over an incidence where a child died. He said that one night a man came to his house asking him to visit his sick child. Baldwin followed the man into the countryside where he found a family living in a tent.

The child had been sick for more than twenty days prior to Baldwin's visit to the tent. He said the child definitely needed medical treatment. The child did die, which prompted the letter to the editor from Brown County Sheriff Danny Neal. The letter appeared in the Brownwood Bulletin.

"We got some bad publicity from that," said Baldwin.

But, contrary to what many of the local residents believe, the New Testament Holiness Church does not preach against medical care. "We do believe that a person can be healed through his faith," said Baldwin, "but we have never tried to keep anyone from going to a doctor."



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There are people moving into this area because of the church, but most of them are not settling in Bangs since there is no accommodations for them here.

The church might be complete by the middle of March, Baldwin said. Members will come from a 75 mile radius, he added.

Baldwin also said that he has noticed several local residents attending services at the revival tent in which the group is presently meeting.

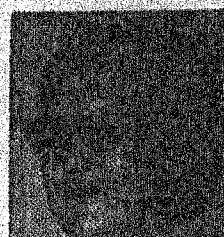

## Soil Insect Control Studied

Scientists in nine states and a province in Canada are combining forces to devise new strategies for controlling soil insects that cost farmers and homeowners millions of dollars each year.

Goal of the four-year regional research project is to find ways to manage soil insects without extensive use of pesticides.

At the present time, pesticides are the only weapons available and many of these are being banned. In addition, pests are developing resistance to the chemicals being used.

In the Mid-West, research will be concentrated on corn rootworms, a major pest. The cooperative project also will cover cotton and other major crops.

The Environmental Protection Agency has contributed \$300,000 and USDA's Cooperative State Research Service another \$185,000 to support the research.

## Aid to Elderly Now Available To Local Folks

Alternatives to nursing home or institutional care are being offered by the State Department of Public Welfare to Texas' needy aged, blind and disabled.

The new "adult social services" are designed to help those who don't require full-time nursing care to continue living at home, State Welfare commissioner Raymond W. Vowell said.

The new programs are intended for elderly people, and the blind and disabled, who receive a monthly assistance check from the federal government's Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program.

"With a little help, many elderly people who otherwise would have to enter nursing homes can live at home or in their own communities," Vowell said. "All they need is someone to help them do things they can no longer do for themselves, like cooking meals and taking care of the house."

To be offered on a statewide basis as community resources become available, the new programs include Homemaker, Chore, Foster Care, Day Care and other services to adults.

Homemaker services provide someone to perform such

personal care as bathing, exercising and giving medication, as well as preparing meals and doing light housework. The service will be provided for a few hours a day or on a 24-hour basis for a temporary period until the person is able to do for himself.

A similar program is Chore services, which is less personal, and provides a home service aide who can help with such things as cooking, cleaning, doing the laundry, shopping for groceries, minor repairs and yard work.

Day Care, a familiar service for children, will become available for adults as well, either in a family day home or at a day center. Family day homes are to provide a place for relatives to leave an elderly or disabled person during working hours. These homes will be approved by the Welfare Department and are limited to caring for three or fewer persons. Day Centers care for larger numbers, providing meals and recreational and other activities in a supervised group setting.

Elderly persons will have another alternative. Foster Care Services for Adults offers a 24-hour care in foster family homes which are approved and supervised by the Welfare Department. They are designed for people who are unable to maintain their own homes, but who do not require regular nursing home care.

The Department of Public Welfare pays for these services and is interested in locating people who are willing to offer their homes for day care or foster care, as well as those who wish to contract with the department to provide Chore and Homemaker Services to adults. Persons in need of such services or who wish to offer their services should contact the Welfare Department at 106 W. Cedar Coleman, or by calling 625-5569.

When aged, blind or disabled SSI recipients are found to be living in hazardous conditions or in situations in which they cannot protect themselves, a DPW social services worker will act to correct those situations through the Protective Services program.

In addition, the Welfare Department will assist SSI applicants and recipients in finding and using community resources related to education, employment, health, housing, transportation and other needs. "Our primary goal in offering alternate care is to help as many people as possible delay going into nursing homes until they really need to," Vowell said. "Nursing home or other institutional care continues to have the support of the Welfare Department when there are no other alternatives."
