Doug Moore Jr. Given Award For Public Relations Work

LACKLAND AFB, TEX.—Mr. Doug Moore Jr., has been awarded a cash bonus by the Air Force in recognition of his sustained superior performance while serving as chief of public information and assistant to the information officer at Lackland AFB.

Mr. Moore, son of Mr. and Mrs. D. H. Moore, Santa Anna, has been in his present position at the Air Force Military Training Center here since March 1972. He was cited for his performance since February 1973.

During the cited period, Mr. Moore was active in Operation Homecoming, which was the reception of a number of former prisoners of war at the USAF Wilford Hall Medical Center here. Several of his story ideas were developed and used nationally by television and the wire services during 1973, and he supervised the writing of other articles for publication in nationally distributed magazines.

A 1949 graduate of Santa Anna High School, Mr. Moore served

more than 20 years in the Air Force before he retired in 1970. Before coming here two years ago, he worked as historian and newspaper reporter.

He is married to the former Betty Goen, also of Santa Anna. They have five daughters: Donna (Mrs. Richard Padilla of Long Beach, Calif.), Virginia (Mrs. Don Bleam, San Antonio), Cindy, Nina and Wendy.

Local Teacher Will Represent County Group

R. C. Smith, Coleman County TSTA President elect, is planning to attend the 95th annual state convention of the Texas State Teachers Association March 14-16 at the Fort Worth-Tarrant County Convention Center.

He will be among the 10,000 TSTA local association members and guests expected to attend. He will be the official representative to the 1974 TSTA house of delegates. That is the state association's governing body, which will meet three times during the convention to act on proposed amendments to the TSTA constitution and conduct other business.

The 1,540 official delegates are elected from the 484 local associations throughout the state. They are certified by districts on the basis of one delegate per 100 members or major fraction of 100, to represent the 151,000 members of TSTA. Every local association is entitled to at least one official delegate.

Dr. Joyce Brothers of New York City, noted psychologist and author, will give the keynote address for the convention at 7:30 p.m., Thursday, March 14.

Jesse Owens of Phoenix, Arizona, who won four gold medals in the 1936 Olympics, will speak at the second general session at 9:30 a.m. March 15.

Duane works at McCrary's Service Station each afternoon. Owner Luther McCrary supervises Duane's work which includes all service station duties.

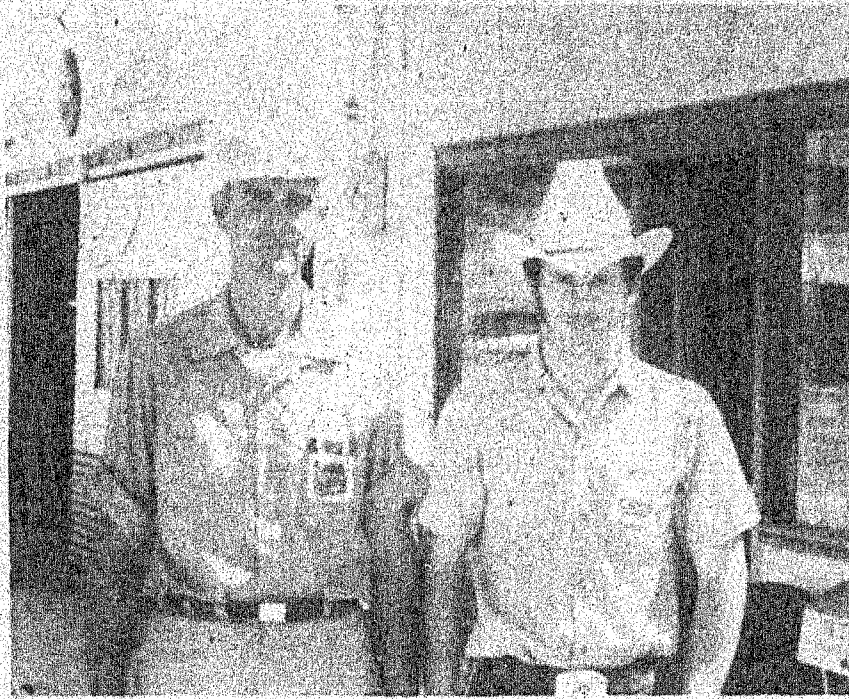
Duane has been a member of the Mountaineer football team all through high school and takes part in many other activities. He is vice-president of the FFA chapter and a member of Beta Club. His

The ASCS office is in the process of developing the 1974 Rural Environmental Conservation Program. The County Development Group will meet Wednesday, March 6, to select practices for Coleman County. Additional information concerning sign-up dates and specific practices will be furnished producers in a special newsletter soon. The program is expected to begin around April 1.

Sign-up dates for participation in the feed grain, wheat and cotton programs are not certain at this time. Producers will be notified as soon as this information is available.

There is a special provision in the program concerning disaster payments to producers who suffer a crop loss due to natural causes. Details of this provision are not available at this time, but any producer who is planning to plow up wheat or barley should come by the ASCS office before destroying evidence of the crop. A visit to the farm will be necessary in order to protect your interests and for us to have a record of your planted acreage.

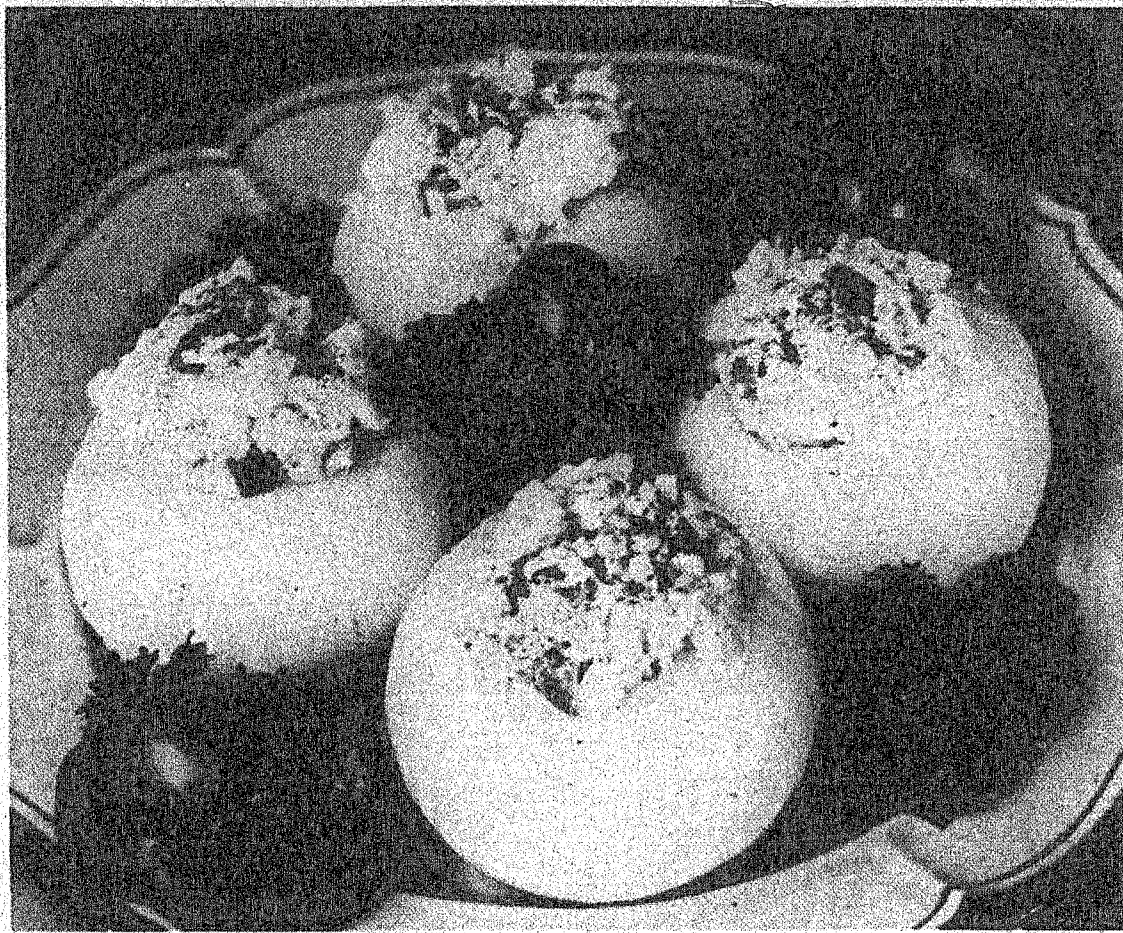

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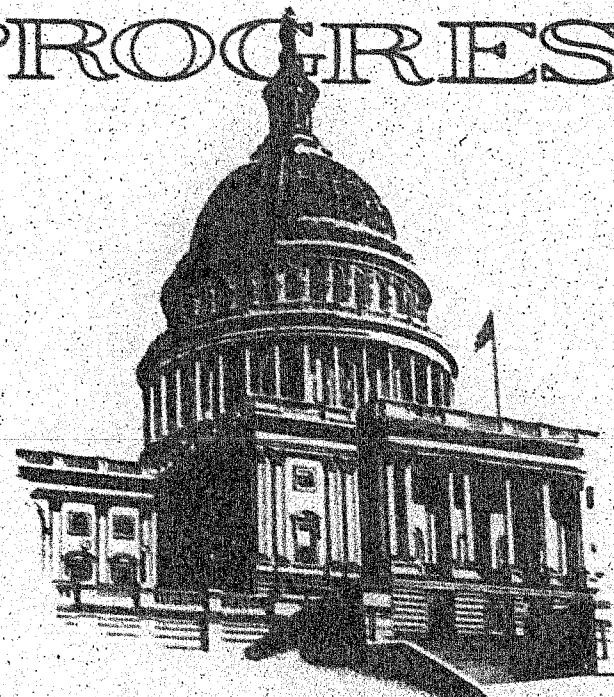

Lucille's hobby is working. She is a member of the Concho Baptist Church in Coleman.

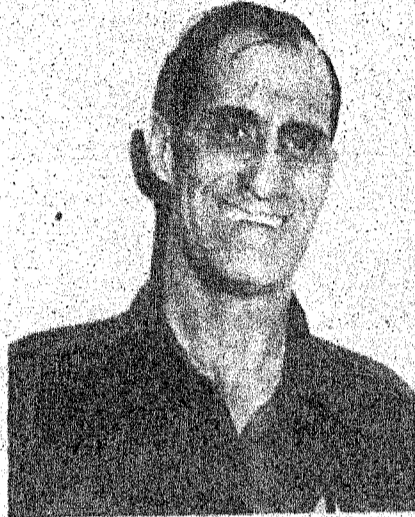
Elbert Todd, a native of Iowa, has been employed at Ranger Park Hospital for the past three years. He was selected this month as Employee of the Month by other members of the staff.

An organ has been purchased for the United Presbyterian Church and was installed last week. Karen Gordon will serve as organist, and Mrs. J. W. McClellan is pianist.

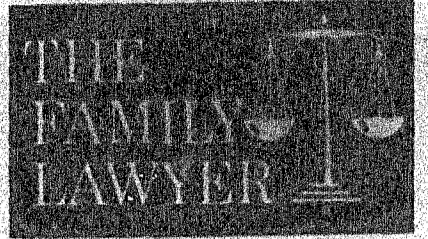
Mrs. Jack Allen is choir director for the church and conducts rehearsals each Wednesday night.

Proving Poverty

How poor does an accused person have to be in order to qualify for free legal counsel? This question is arising more frequently, now that the courts have broadened the rights of the indigent to have a lawyer provided at government expense.

To begin with, he need not be absolutely penniless. Take the case of a man arrested on a felony charge. He had \$100 in cash, but no other assets or income of any kind. A court ruled that he was entitled to have a lawyer appointed for him.

"It is not necessary that an accused person be utterly destitute," said one judge. "Indigence is a relative term, and must be measured in each case by the service to be furnished. It connotes a lack of resources which, in the light of everyday practicalities, prevents the employment of competent counsel."



However, cash on hand is not the only test of poverty. In another case, a man charged with drunk driving had just \$50 in his bank account. But he also had a steady job, two cars, and an equity in a house.

Rejecting his demand for free counsel, the court said "it stretches the imagination" to think he could not find a private attorney ready, willing, and able to take his case.

"The Constitution does not require," added a federal court, "that gratuitous services should be extended to persons who can afford to pay."

Suppose the accused himself is broke but has friends or relatives with money. In most cases, that won't matter. Thus:

A college student, arrested on a charge of theft, had no financial resources. He did have a married sister who could afford to hire a lawyer for him, but she refused to do so.

The court thereupon decided that the student was entitled to have a government-paid attorney. The court reasoned that money in someone else's pocket did not make him any richer.

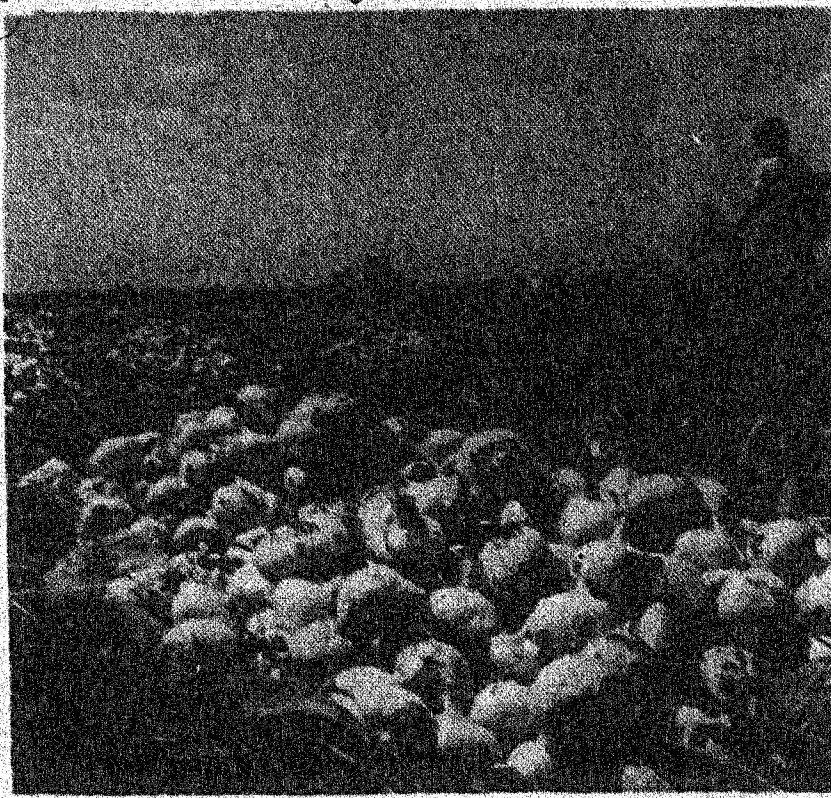

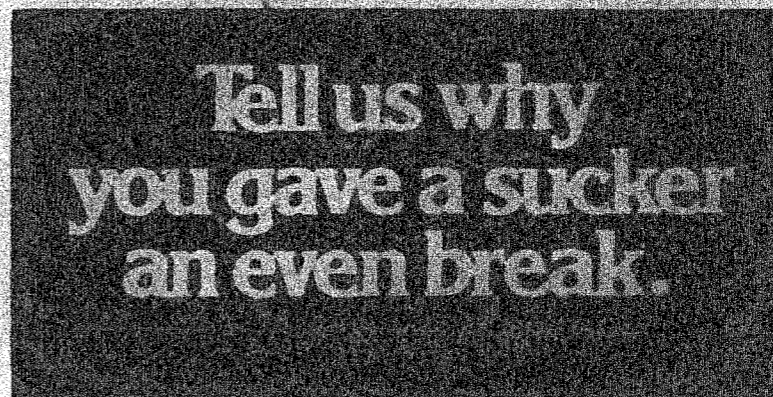

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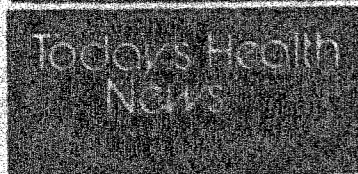

Do you know what to do in a medical emergency? Max Klinghoffer, M.D., who pioneered emergency medical services at Chicago's O'Hare airport, lists five priorities to guide emergency rescuers:

1. Stop major hemorrhaging. Blood loss can kill a victim in three to five minutes. (This doesn't apply to minor bleeding or oozing — a person isn't losing too much blood from a wound on the arm or a nosebleed that may look worse than it is.)

2. Restore respiration and heartbeat. Rescue efforts aren't going to do any good if the person has stopped breathing or his heart is no longer functioning. To establish an airway or heartbeat, begin cardiopulmonary resuscitation (by mouth-to-mouth resuscitation and chest massage).

3. Immobilize major fractures.

4. Control pain by immobilizing the injured area and making the person as comfortable as possible. Verbally reassuring the victim also can help prevent shock.

5. Don't move the victim unless you have to; if necessary, do it carefully and deliberately. "A lot of people who are injured, but not seriously, become critically injured and die as a result of careless transportation," says Dr. Klinghoffer.

He also recommends that those suffering from specific diseases, such as diabetes, or certain allergies even those wearing contact lenses should carry some notice of this on their person. Special identifying bracelets and wallet cards are available for this purpose. When there is a medical emergency, rescuers should look for these notices, explains Dr. Klinghoffer, and respond accordingly.
