

Your Volunteer Fire Department has envisioned and offered to build an attractive metal building to house your rural fire fighting equipment and for the first time have all the equipment at one central location. In the past these pieces of rural equipment have been parked at various locations on city and commercial property, most times exposed to vandals and thieves, and always exposed to the elements.

The new addition is proposed to be constructed by the firemen and without financial support from membership drive funds. The only request the Fire Department has made is to consider the Department's need and report to the City government--the Mayor and City Council--on your opinion on the new addition.

Our fire insurance rates and our security vary in proportion to the efficiency and strength of your Volunteer Fire Department. Are you doing your part, neighbor? If not, do it today and speak FOR the VFD and the proposed new addition to the Department.



Highway Project In Community Now Approved

U. S. Highway 84 and 67 in Coleman County from Santa Anna, east to the Brown County line is included in the Brownwood highway district's program of work for an amount of \$530,000 according to Lawrence Schulz,

district engineer of the nine county highway district headquartered in Brownwood. This is in addition to the \$1,186,000 previously authorized for construction of a 4-lane highway on this 7.2 mile section.

Schulz explained the additional financing was made necessary due to the ever rising costs being experienced in the highway industry.

Advance planning of this project has been underway for several years in the highway department's Coleman residency

under the supervision of Erle Mayo.

Coleman County is cooperating with the highway department in the acquisition of additional right of way necessary for this work.

Schulz said the Texas Highway Commission has approved a \$4,900,000 3-year program in his district, as a part of the statewide 1975-1977 Consolidated Highway Program which provided \$250 million for construction or reconstruction of a total of 2,036 miles of rural and urban highways.

More Candidates Seeking Jobs In Coleman County May Election

With the filing deadline near, a number of people have announced as candidates for the May Democratic election.

W. W. (Pete) Skelton, Gouldsbury farmer and rancher and a former County Commissioner, has announced for County Judge. He is seeking the post to be vacated by Frank Lewis who is retiring after 15 years in office. Four others have reportedly announced for that position.

In the race for County Treasurer, Santa Anna resident Rondue Horton, a former city deputy sheriff, has announced his candidacy. Also announcing this week to the NEWS is George H. Epperson of Coleman. Mr. Epperson is a Coleman barber and a former employee of a bottling company, Monte Gideon, County Treasurer for the past 15

years, is retiring from the position.

County Clerk Glenn Thomas is so far unopposed for the position of County Clerk as is County School Superintendent D. H. Williams. Precinct Two Commissioner Jake McCreary and Justice of the Peace Ben J. Garrett have also been the only candidates to file for those positions.

In the Coleman County Tax Assessor-Collector race, appointee John F. Sprinkles is opposed by Henrietta Gilbreath of Santa Anna and Billie Baker.

Deadline for filing for the primary is Monday, February 4.

Grady and Genia McElver and Allen Horneil visited Oscar and I Sunday evening.


