The Santa Anna City Council met in regular session at the City Hall on Thursday evening, May 9. Mayor Thomas Wristen presided.

Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. Current accounts were approved for payment.

Action on annexation of 70 acres of land adjoining the east city limits was tabled. Action will be taken after further development of the property is made.

The City Council voted to have Austin attorney Jack McCrary collect delinquent city taxes. Mr. McCrary is also collector for the local school district.

HAS SURGERY MONDAY

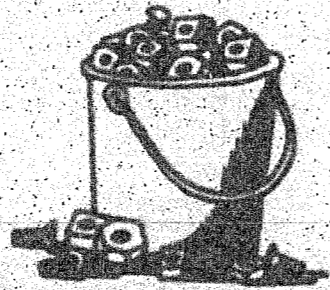

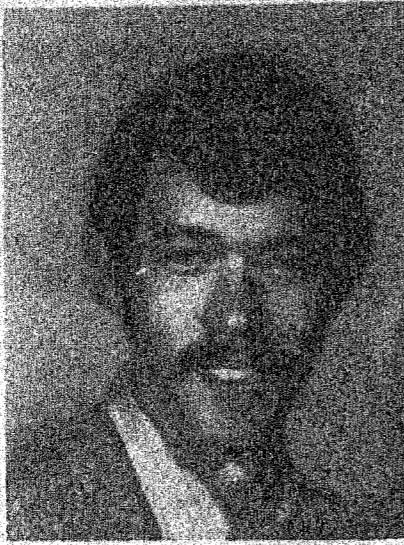

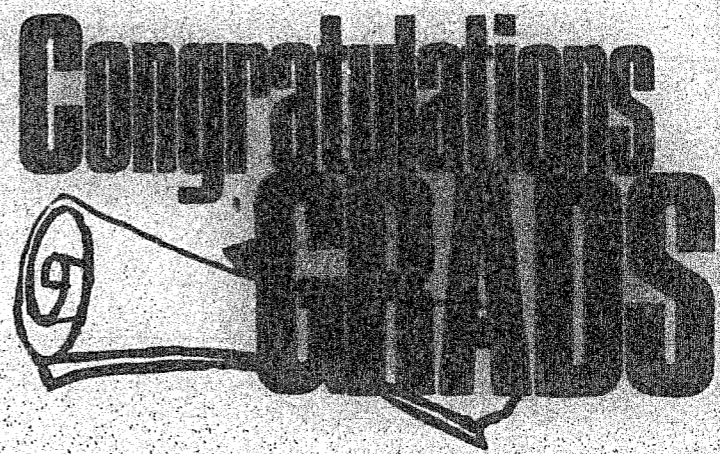

Wind and hard work help make clean air. According to a recent survey of urban pollution, the 10 cities with the cleanest air — not "squeaky clean," but cleanest — all have two things in common: natural ventilation, provided by regular winds, and active citizen organizations dedicated to fighting pollution. Three of the top 10 are in Texas — Dallas, Houston, and San Antonio, which came out number one. The other seven are San Francisco, California; Boston, Massachusetts (the only East Coast city to make the grade); Seattle, Washington; Kansas City, Missouri; Memphis, Tennessee; Columbus, Ohio; and, in the same state, surprisingly, Toledo, located on the edge of over-polluted Lake Erie. The cities were rated by the Mitre Corporation, which, on contract to the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), determined a National Air Quality Index which measures both particulate matter (such as dust, mist, ash, smoke, and fumes) and pollutant gases.

Every city, except Boston, depends on natural gas for both heating and electricity generation; all but Houston have eliminated incineration as a method of destroying garbage, choosing landfill as the alternative. These, however, are not without their drawbacks. There is a serious shortage of natural gas, for example, and unless new supplies are found, its consumption may have to be restricted. And sanitary landfills often present problems of earth settling and ground seepage. Besides, many cities are running out of sites that can be filled in with garbage.

Undaunted, and convinced that alternatives can be found when needed, the top 10 have taken long strides in reducing industrial emissions and are planning action against the nation's number one polluter — the automobile. Many also have established centers for recycling glass, cans, and paper. Columbus, for example, has 10 such centers — organized by a group called Waste Watchers.



TIPS FOR OUTDOORSMEN

SPORTSMAN'S WEATHER GUIDE

When readying for an outing, whether a hunting, fishing or boating expedition, sportsmen become concerned about the weather.

After all, weather has much to do with the success of every outing, as well as the comfort of the sportsman.

Weather predictions aren't always correct, even by the weatherman, for conditions do suddenly change. That's why outdoorsmen often check age-old weather signs before submitting themselves to the elements.

Rain Indicators

These rain indicators are easy to recognize and usually are reliable:

1. A halo around the sun or moon means that rain is approaching.
2. So does smoke when it curls downward.
3. When clouds are low and accumulate in a web-like formation, rain is near.
4. When cumulus clouds acquire tufts, giving them the appearance of shell bursts, rain is indicated.
5. Beware if lightning is to the West or Northwest. A storm is probably coming your way.

Fair Weather Signs

1. When smoke curls upward and vanishes, fair weather is ahead.
2. When clouds are high and the air is dry, chances of rain are slim.
3. If it's storming to the East or South, and you can see lightning, the storm will probably pass you by.

SHARPENING THE KNIFE

Ever discover your knife was dull when you needed it most?

Be it a pocket knife or a hunting knife, there is one quick way to sharpen the blade. Simply remove your leather belt and use it as a strop.

If you have nothing to attach the buckle to, so you can use it like the barber does his strop, then stand on the buckle and pull up on the strop with one hand while you strop away with the other hand.

HANDY WORKSHOP STROP

A handy strop for your work shop, to sharpen steel knives, can be made by gluing an unfinished piece of leather to a piece of wood.

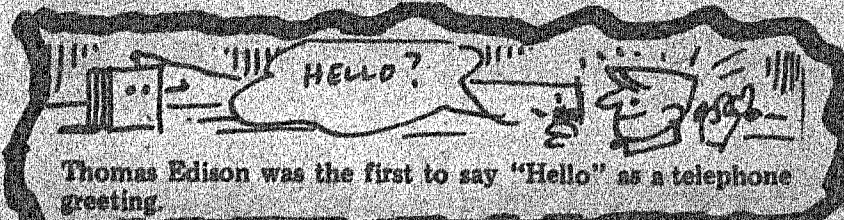
Length of the wood would be determined by the length of the leather. If a foot or more is available, glue the leather down tight, then bore a hole in the wood, about an inch from one end and hang the "sharpener" in a convenient spot by the work bench.

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Know Safety Rules Before Plunging In

With spring fever just around the corner, the Texas Safety Association urges that eager swimmers review basic safety rules before taking the first plunge of the season.

No matter how elated the adventurous swimmer is at the prospect of mixing sunshine and water after a long winter, it is still foolish to swing from trees into water, dive from cliffs or jagged rocks or swim in swift-moving waters or near waterfalls.

Swim only in protected areas, obey safety rules enforced by lifeguards, and stay out of the water altogether during thunderstorms or when tired, overheated or chilled.

Heroic Doctor

Two workmen digging at a construction site were buried to the waist by a sudden cave-in. A doctor, passing nearby, rushed to the scene and gave lifesaving first aid until they could be rescued by other workmen.

But the doctor himself suffered painful injuries. Was he entitled to collect damages from the construction company, on the ground that its negligence had caused the cave-in?



In a court test, the company said it was not liable.

"We admire his courage," said the company, "but anyone who ventures voluntarily into danger does so at his own risk."

However, the court said the doctor was indeed entitled to a damage award. The court said the company should have foreseen not only that workmen might be trapped but also that rescuers might rush in and get hurt too. As one judge put it:

"Danger invites rescue. The cry of distress is the summons to relief. The wrong that imperils life is a wrong to the imperilled victim; it is a wrong also to his rescuer."

Generally speaking, the law pays due respect to the heroic impulse. In fact, most courts will favor a rescuer even when the danger is merely to property, not human life.

Thus, a man injured while trying to stop a rolling automobile was awarded damages later from the car owner, who had failed to set his brakes. The court said saving property, although less urgent than saving life, is nevertheless a laudable course of action.

Still, the law does not condone outright recklessness. Another case involved a woman who was killed by a freight train while trying to pull her dog off the tracks. She had leaned over even though the train was in plain sight, bearing down fast.

Under these circumstances, a court ruled, her family could not hold the railroad responsible for the tragedy.

"A person is not excused from the consequences of his own acts in exposing himself to danger," said the court, "where the peril is so obvious."

THE MAIL BOX

Dear Editor:
This is a rather special Memorial Day coming up next Monday for many of our American homes. Vietnam is past. The boys no longer lie belly down in rice paddies, fingers glued to their rifles. They no longer stare at barbed-wire enclosures waiting endlessly for the hour of liberation. The scream of shells for them is silenced. They're home again, with their families, meeting the day-to-day problems we all face.

But not all of them are home. And it is with these men our thoughts dwell on this Memorial Day--not with the heroes, not with the returned POW's, not with the shiney buttoned officers or just plain GI Joe's. Our thoughts fly to the long wards of military hospitals where lie men who may never return home. For some of these men the roar of battle will never cease.

We pay tribute to our dead warriors. Let us this Memorial Day stand in silence to honor those who have returned with life but faded hope, to honor those who can no longer understand the meaning of the word.

We would not deal in words that claim their sacrifice was made for us. There are many who would say the war was a futile exercise in destruction. But aren't all wars so? 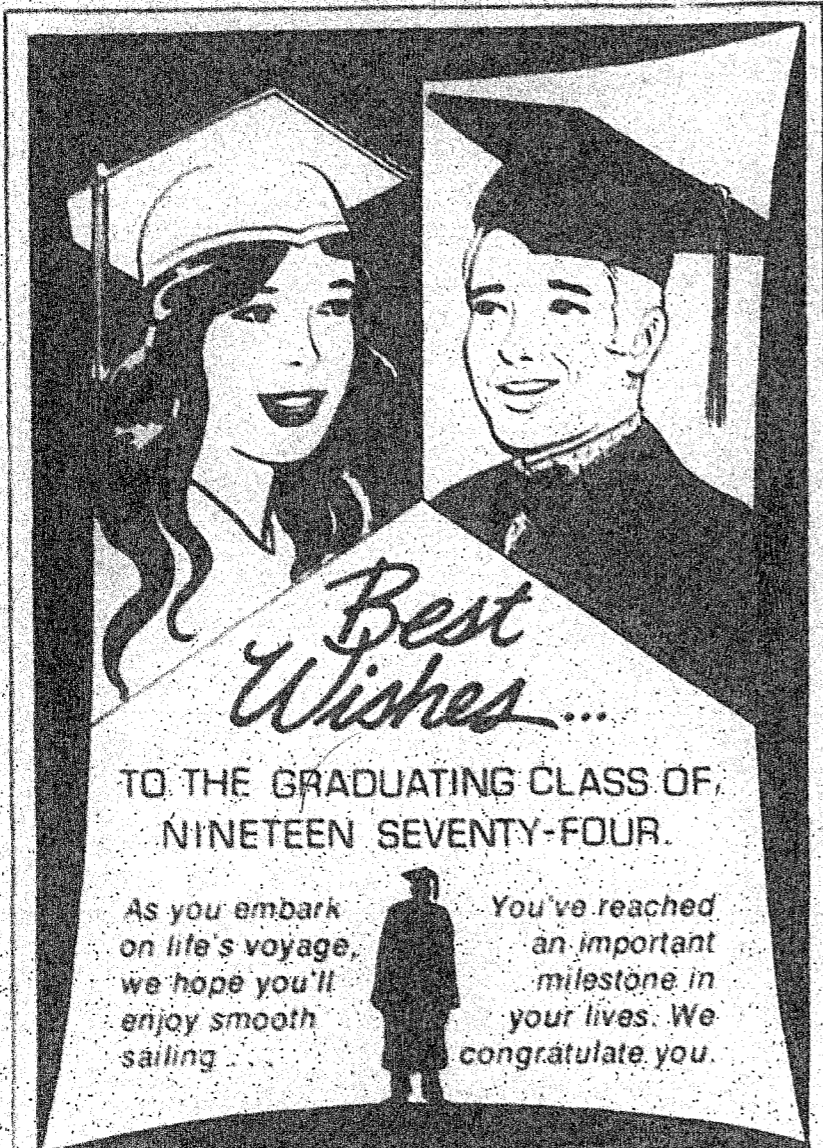
After touring Lake Pontchartrain we went back to the midway. There we rode just about every ride they had.

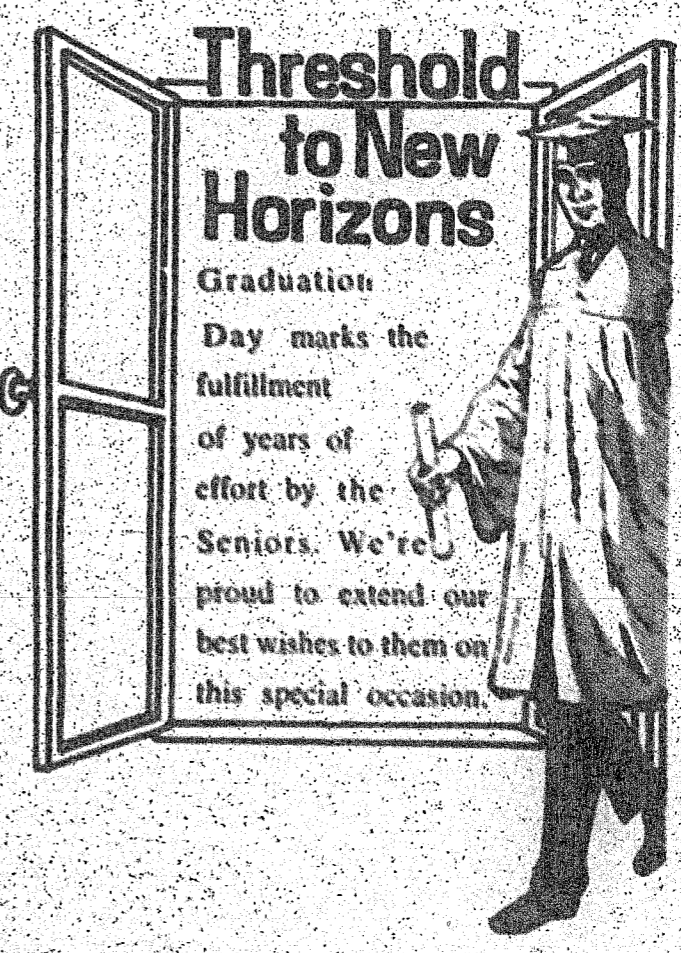

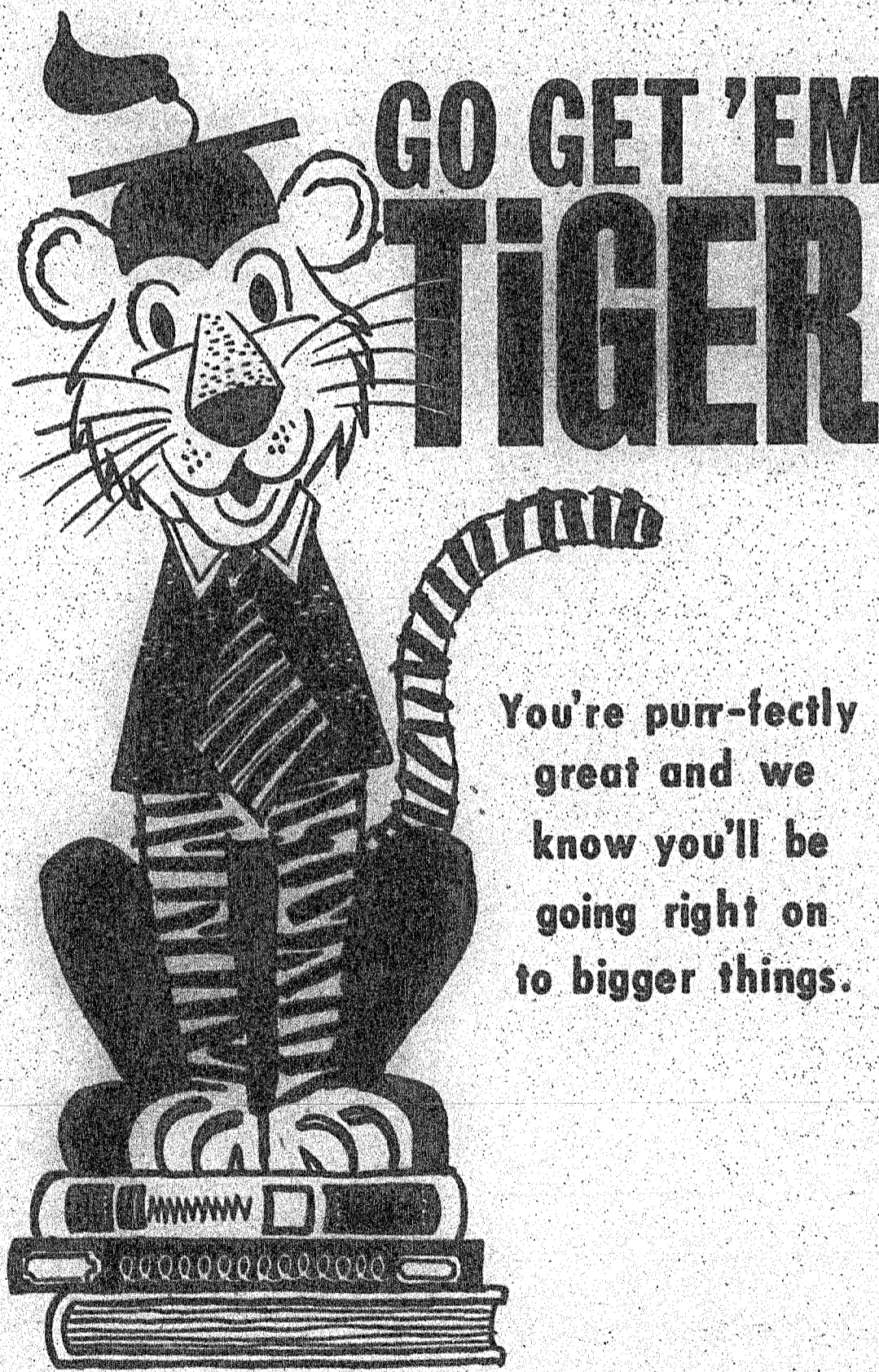

In large kettle or Dutch oven add broth and water. Add tomatoes, onion, potatoes, sugar, lima beans, salt, pepper, green pepper and okra. Cook 30 minutes or until vegetables are tender. Add turkey, corn and butter. Cook five minutes longer. Serves 10-12.

Also during high school I represented my class in the Halloween Coronation and was elected Valentine representative from the senior class.

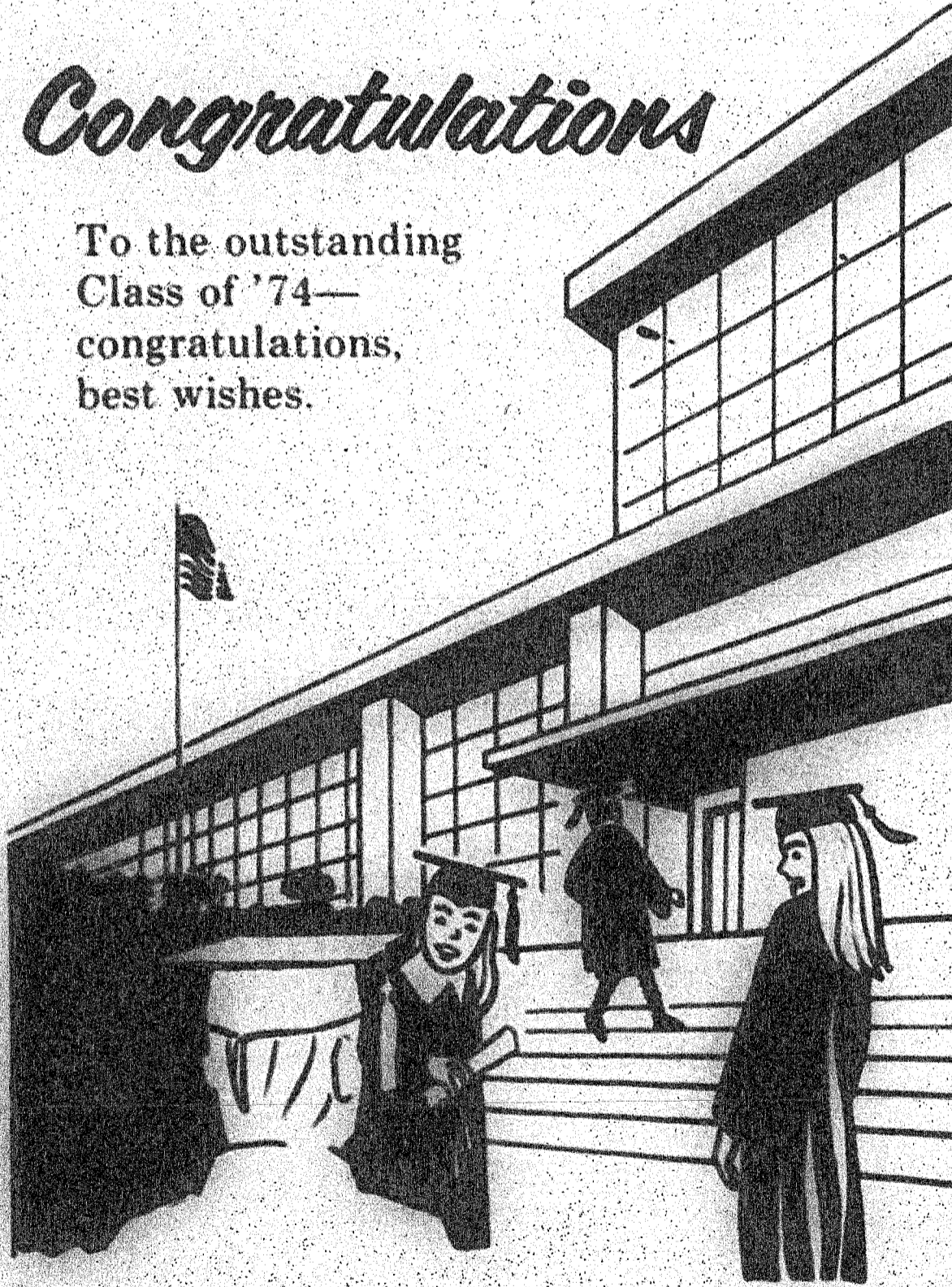

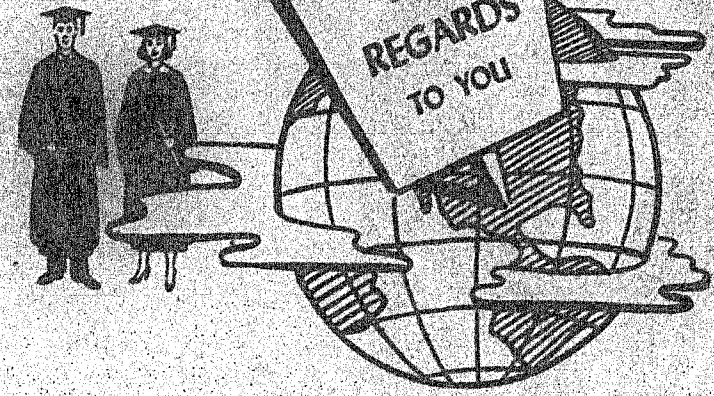
The years passed along and soon I found that I was ready to start junior high school. But junior high was not at all like grade school.

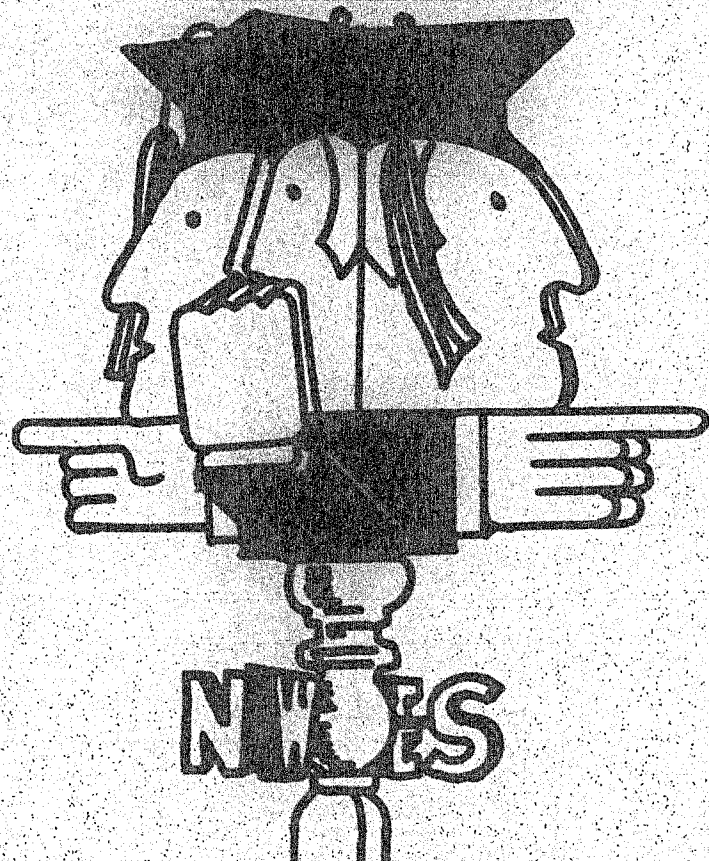

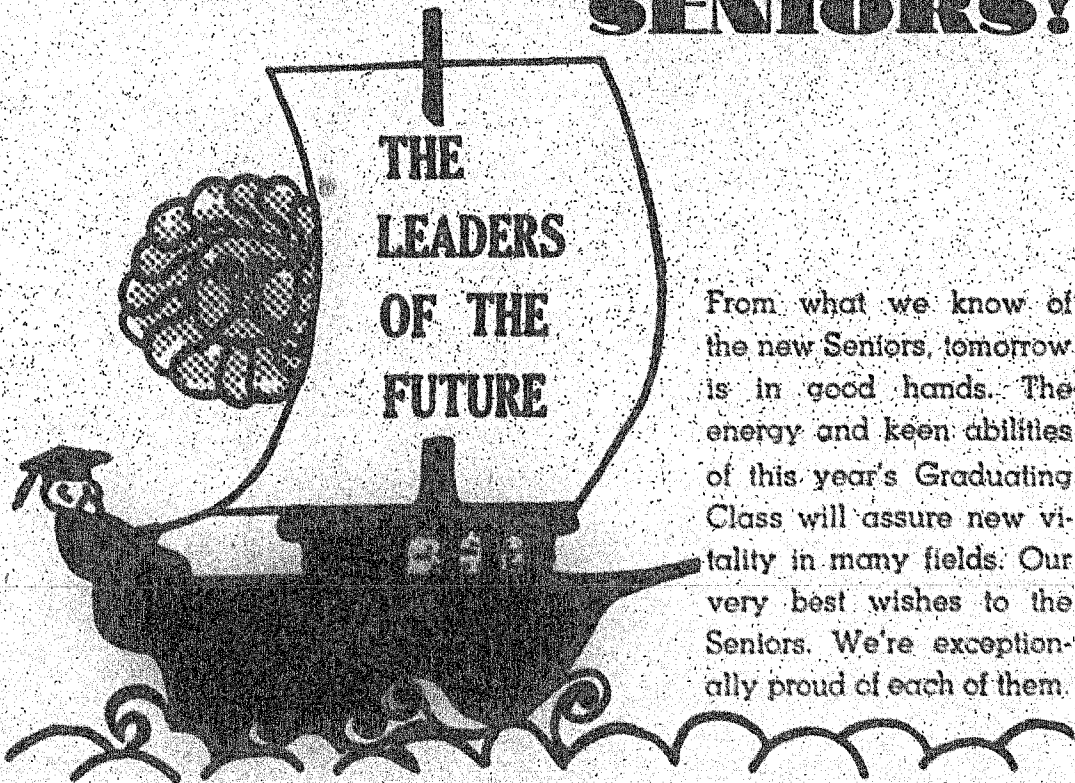

At the time I was born, my family was living in Burkett, but when I was almost two we moved to Coleman. When I was four years old my father died.

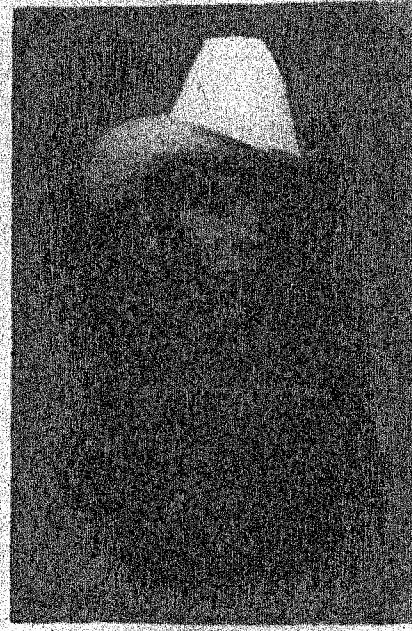

As a graduating senior my plans are to attend Tarleton State University and major in agriculture, preferably wildlife science.

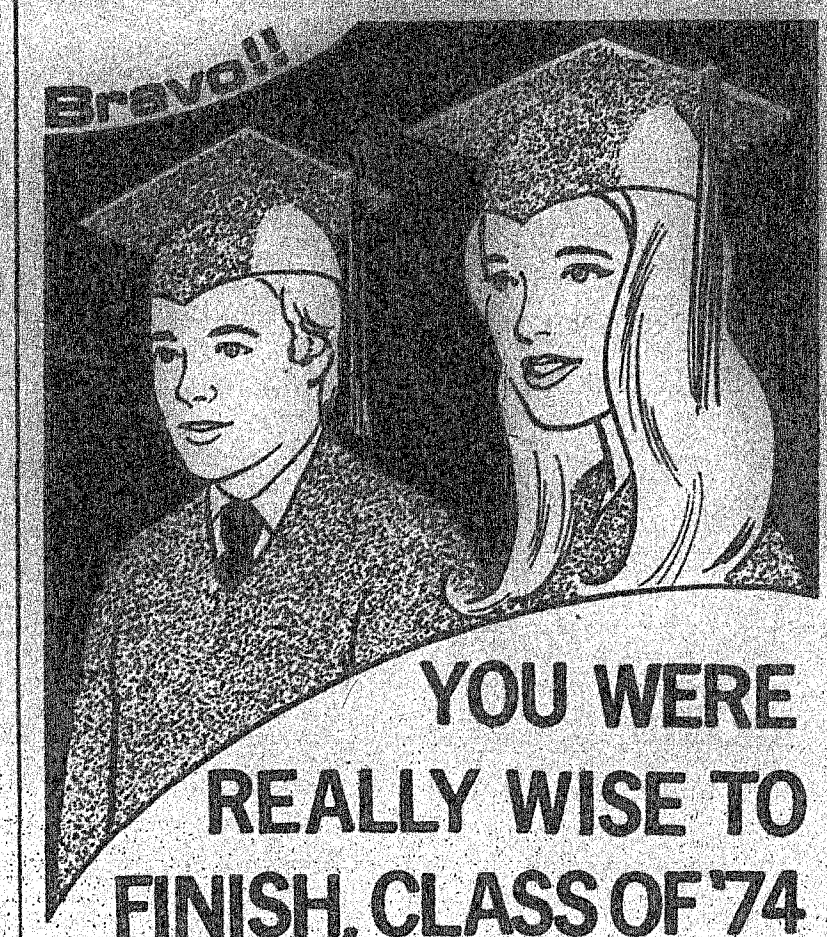

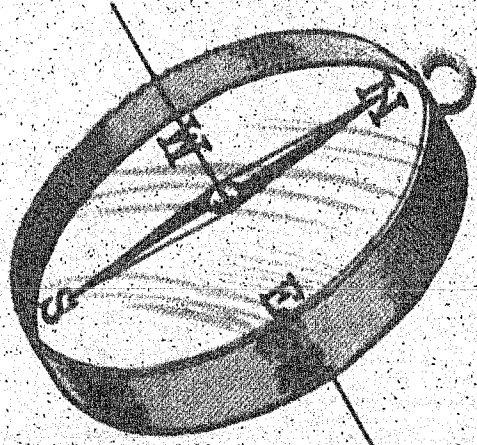
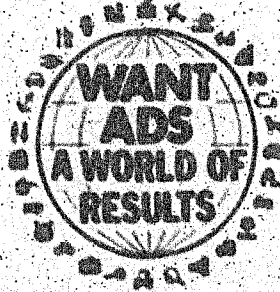

EARNIE COYLE

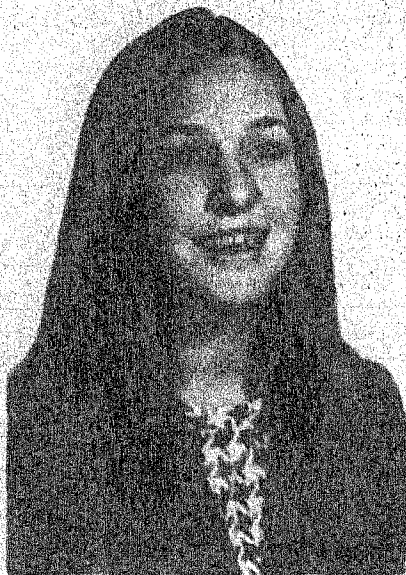

My freshman year brought on the challenge of making new friends again.

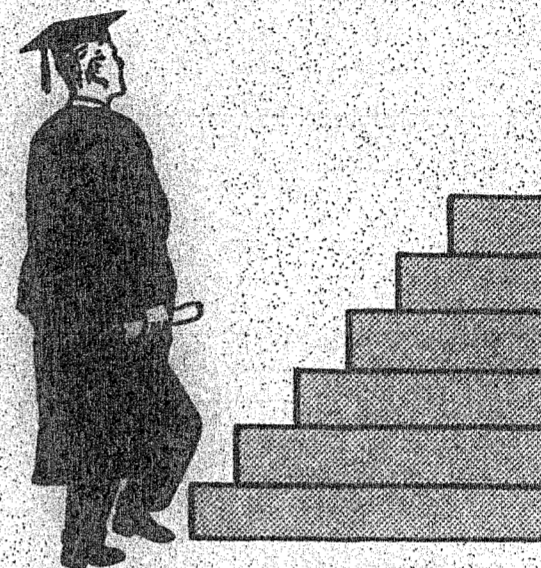

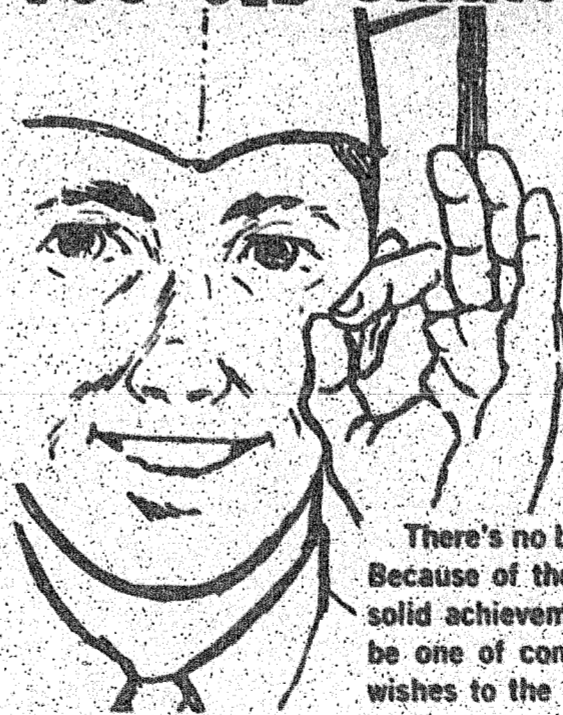
