## Local Industry in Production At Downtown S-Anna Location

Maranatha Industries Inc. started production Monday on the portable hunting blinds that the company is to produce for nationwide distribution. The initial staff of seven was on hand for the first day of work at the temporary location downtown.

Tim Harris, brother of the corporation president, Dennis Harris, is general manager. Other employees are Madie James, Wanda Daniel, Grace Perez, Bonnie Ruberville, Christine Bufield and Alice Garza.

Dennis Harris's son, Doug, at home on leave from the service, was also assisting with the first day's operation.

The portable hunting blinds are constructed of metal and heavy fabric and are packed into a bright draw-string bag. The blinds will be distributed through sporting good stores and other retail establishments as well as being available at the factory.

The company will be located in the former Corner Drug building for the present time. However, plans are already being made to move to a larger location in Santa Anna in a short time. It is planned to enlarge the operation to about 40 employees, all to be hired from the local work force as long as qualified people are available.

## Gouldbusk Man New Co. Judge

Pete Skelton, Gouldbusk farmer and rancher, was elected Coleman County Judge Saturday in the second Democratic primary election. He defeated Charlie Hunter by a wide margin. Incumbent Frank Lewis did not seek re-election.

The County Judge post was the only race on the local ballot. However Precinct Four voters chose Max Horne as County Commissioner over Paul Templeton.

There were 186 votes cast at Santa Anna with Skelton receiving 139 and Hunter polling 47. The county-wide totals included 1312 for Skelton and 645 for Hunter.

Newly elected county officials will take office on January 1, 1975.

The girls softball program gets underway this week with games in Coleman. There are two Santa Anna teams, the Panthers, coached and managed by Pat Daugherty and Toni Nichols, and the Debs, coached by Pauline Scott.

### Postal Service Seeks Employee

Applications are now being accepted at the Santa Anna post office for a part-time flexible employee. Postmaster John C. A Civil Service Examination will be given in Brownwood the latter part of June, from which a register will be established. The selection of the employee will be made from this register.

★ **Southern Savings Puts On New Look** ★

It was 1959, and Brownwood got its first look at Southern Savings and Loan.

The organization was primarily founded by Roy H. Simmons and perhaps even Simmons, who serves as president of the savings and loan, didn't really see the true potential of the business at that time.

Now, 15 years later there is an excess of \$39 million on deposit, and customers of Southern Savings and Loan have logged more than \$10 million in earnings accumulated

by interest paid on savings.

Why the tremendous growth? Some credit is to the financial genius of Simmons while others point to conditions, environment, and circumstances lending greatly to the development of such an institution in the 1960s.

But, when looking back over the growth of Southern Savings, one has to surmise that it was a combination of both along with being blessed with a staff of loyal employees and dedicated directors.

Simmons was definitely a financial wizzard, and economic conditions in Central Texas were certainly adaptable for a savings and loan in the 60s which has brought the institution to its current position.

This Sunday will mark the grand opening of Southern Savings and Loan Association's new building at 501 Center Avenue in Brownwood.

The new structure is located only one block south of its old building at 401 Center.

It features 9,000 feet of floor space, more than three times the amount of space in the

previous location. It was built by Bank Builders of America. Completion took around two years of planning and actual construction.

The facility is manned by 19 employees and is constructed so that future expansion is aimed at a second story.

Southern Savings' branch office is located at 106 N. Austin in Comanche.

The new structure also features a pedestrian mall, complete with benches, small trees, and grass.

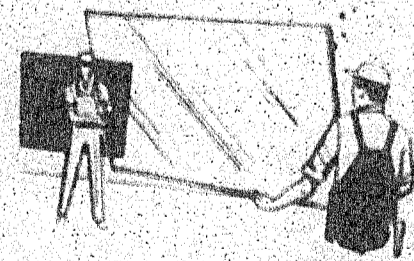

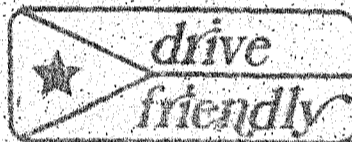

**In Our Opinion**

THE CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION has those who believe in freedom of the press and freedom of speech up in arms over the wording used in their "right to privacy" section.

The way the section is written, a newspaper could not even write a story about anyone without their approval, regardless of the circumstances, without invading their "right to privacy."

In the first place, it would seem to us that it would conflict with freedom of the press and freedom of speech provisions in the national constitution. Secondly, by placing it in the constitution, it would take a vote of the entire state to change it in the future, should it need revision. The place for such laws should rest with the legislature where it could be amended as needed.

Newspapers of this country have been the greatest deterrent to wrong-doing because of the dislike of anyone to adverse publicity. A good example is the Billy Sol Estes case, where a "snooping" reporter uncovered an operation that eventually sent Estes to prison, and in doing so won himself a Pulitzer Prize in journalism.

Every since the founding of this nation freedom of the press has meant freedom of the people, and when any government element, from city to federal begins to muzzle the press, then freedom of people begins to dissolve.

The Texas Press Association and the Texas Daily Newspaper Association have suggested that the words freedom of speech and freedom of the press be added to the paragraph of the Right to Privacy Provision; but Convention President Price Daniel, Jr., has not been inclined to do so.

Had the constitution contained the suggested right to privacy provision in it, then the reporter who uncovered the Estes scandal would have made himself liable to suit for having written a story that uncovered wrong-doing that was going on, and instead of stopping a crime, he would probably have been ruined financially.

We hope the people of the state will not allow a group of liberals who are trying to make a mockery of our freedom to let it go unchallenged. We are going to have two chances—one when we contact our representatives on the constitutional convention and again when we vote on the new constitution.

It would be a shame for the good parts of the new constitution to go down the drain because of a few bad parts, wouldn't it?



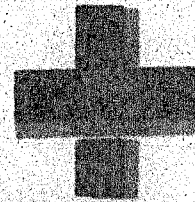

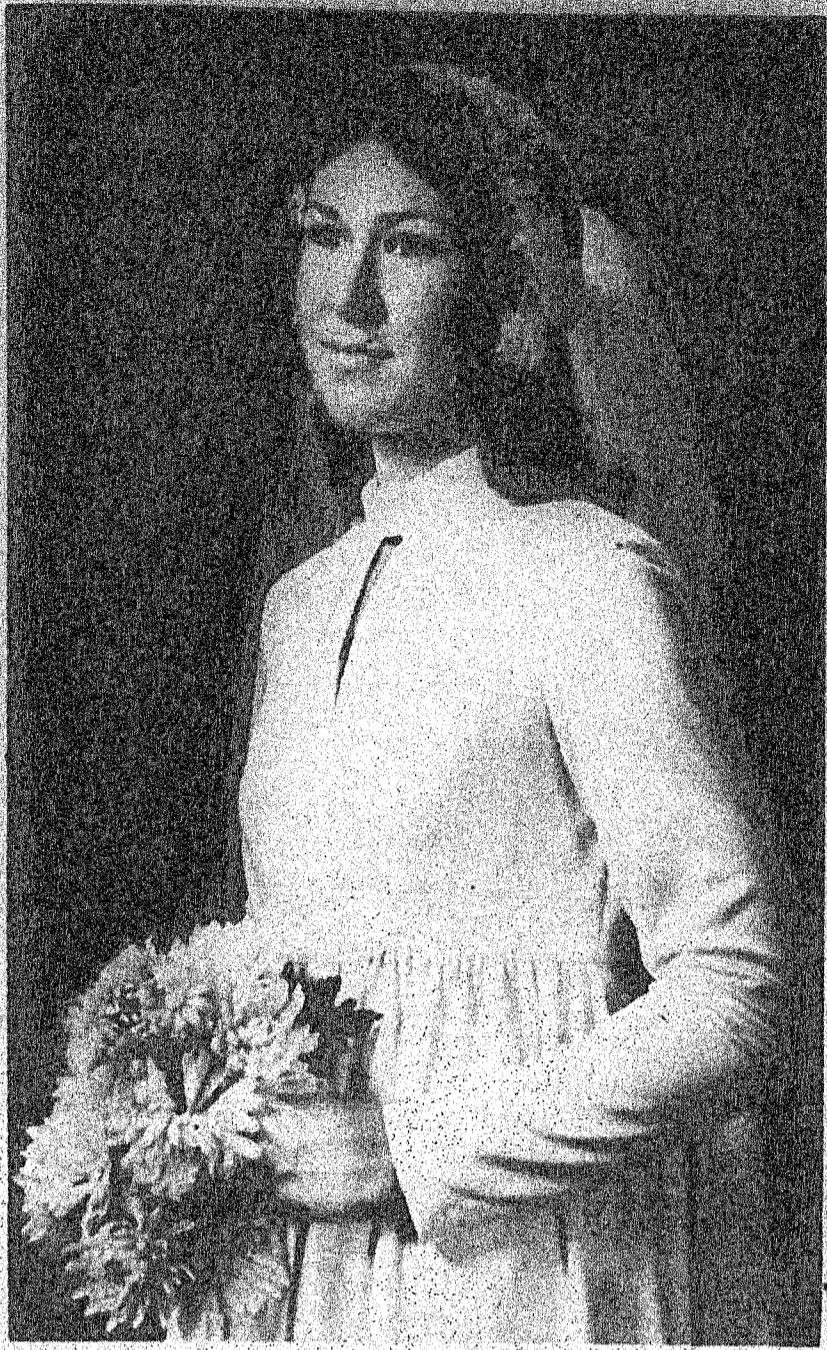

**Her Brother's Keeper?**

When Kate's brother became a widower, she moved in with him and took over the care of his household. Three years later, he too passed away. At the probate of his estate, Kate put in a claim for "services rendered."

"Although my brother and I never discussed money," she told the court, "I just took it for granted that eventually I would be paid for my work. After all, I didn't have to do it. I was not my brother's keeper."



But the court disagreed and rejected her claim. The court said the natural presumption was that Kate had helped her brother for reasons of affection, not money. If she expected payment, added the court, she should have made that clear from the start.

Questions of this kind arise often in probate proceedings, when claims for services rendered to the deceased must be dealt with. As a rule, the closer the relationship between the claimant and the deceased, the more likely the court is to say that the services were given free.

But the individual circumstances can make a big difference. In another case, a man sought payment for carpentry, painting, and cement work he had done on the house of his late brother.

This time, the brothers had been living separately, with their own separate families. In this situation, the court decided that the claimant could reasonably have expected to be paid, even without any agreement to that effect.

The extent of the services, too, may be a factor. A sister who took over the management of her brother's home also took over the burdensome task of nursing him. He was seriously ill, and needed almost constant attention.

After his death, a judge ruled that the sister was indeed entitled to wages for her efforts. The judge said that even for a loving sister, this was an extraordinary amount of service.
