DEDICATION IS PLANNED NEAR TRICKHAM JULY 7

A dedication service for the Texas Historical marker near the graves of Trickham pioneer William P. Williams and his wife will be on July 7, announced Hurschel Dunn of Coleman today. Dunn is chairman of the Coleman County Historical Survey committee which sponsored the marker.

The service will be held at the Trickham Union Church at 6 p.m. followed by the unveiling of the marker at the Fiveash Cemetery some three miles southwest. A catered supper will be at the Trickham Community building, and many descendants of the Williams and Fiveash families are expected.

Williams and Enoch Fiveash were married to the Bowles sisters in Mississippi in the 1850's and came to Texas and to the Mukewater in late years of the Civil War. Williams became known as "Mukewater Bill" as there was another Bill Williams living on Sand Creek in Brown County whose wife and children were killed by Indians in 1871.

When the Williams and Fiveash families reached the Mukewater there was no settlement at all, only the log house where John Chisum kept his trail supplies and which his employees could sell to passers-by in need.

Mukewater Bill and his wife, Elizabeth, were the ideal pioneer type, afraid of nothing and with a vision of what the frontier could become. They had sold property in Mississippi and brought the money in gold and silver in a wooden box which a granddaughter, Mattie Ellington Gaston of Cranfills Gap, remembered to her dying day. The two men and their young sons built comfortable cabins on the creek and ran their herds of cattle on the open range. Before many years they hired a teacher and

used an empty cabin for a school; the teacher and the big boys went to school wearing pistols, and more than once they saw raiding Indians riding along the valley.

The Williams cabins were attacked at times. The prosperous family had several guns, an unusual thing when most of the settlers were too poor for that, and when Indians came raiding early one morning and Williams was not at home, Elizabeth stood them off herself, handing the flintlocks to her children to reload after she had fired them. Her shots brought down two Comanches and a horse one of them was riding.

Among their children was Larkin, best known for his remark about a small five-shooter when he was fourteen years old. Already wearing the larger .44's, he was scornful. "If anybody shot me with that thing and I found it out, I'd kill him!"

Mukewater Bill and Elizabeth died in the home of a daughter in Coleman in the late 1890's they were buried in the Fiveash cemetery which was started in 1876 when all the Fiveash family living at home and also a hired man took smallpox, all of them dying except a son, Dick. Burials were in corner of the Fiveash land.

The Historical marker will be placed near the gate, as the graves of the Williams pair were unmarked and are now unknown, among the forty or so in the little cemetery.

A great-grandson, Larkin E. Williams of Porterville, California, will head the gathering of the Williams descendants who are expected from several states besides Texas. The Fiveash, Ellington and Gaston branches of the family will also be represented.

Hurschel Dunn will be in charge of arrangements for the July 7 service and dedication.

Wonderful West Texas Travel Includes Far West Texas

Texas history from a century ago and scenery shaped through the ages dominate the vacation opportunities of Far West Texas, that region rolling west of the Hill County to El Paso.

And today's 55 mph speed limit scoot-bus the fuel far enough to see it all: the Sonora Caverns, Langtry, Big Bend, restored old Fort Davis, and Guadalupe National Park and El Capitan.

These and more than five dozen travel stops are mentioned in the new "Wonderful West Texas Fun and Adventure Map," says J. Fike Godfrey, executive vice president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

Sonora Caverns, best-known of the Edwards Plateau caves, was discovered only in 1961.

Langtry is the home of Judge Roy Bean's frontier court and an attractive Texas Highway department tourist information center. It shares the Rio Grande region with Amistad (Friendship) Reservoir and the Texas-Mexico town of Del Rio and Ciudad Acuna.

Up river is Big Bend, one of Texas' two National parks, a blend of desert and mountains, horseback trails and house trailers, and the canyon waters of Santa Elena, Mariscal and Boquillas.

Plenteous air currents make Marfa the site in early summer of the national sail plane meet. Twenty-one miles north, 19th Century Fort Davis isn't far from the 20th Century's McDonald Observatory, both open to the

public.

The Texas Highway Department also recommends a scenic 74-mile drive, looping through the Davis Mountains.

More mountains lie across Interstate between Van Horn and Ysleta, location of the Tigua Indian Reservation, the only one in West Texas.

Just beyond there's populous El Paso and Juarez. A tank of gasoline goes a long way there, with the handy concentration of border shopping, bullfights, dog and horse racing and the Mt. Franklin scenic tramway.

Between El Paso and Carlsbad Caverns rise El Capitan and Guadalupe Peak, both above 8,000 feet, and Guadalupe Mountains National Park.

To the east, the wind has sculptured 4,000 acres at Monahans Sandhills State Park. Oiltown Odessa has America's second largest meteor crater and Globe of the southwest, an authentic replica of the original Shakespeare Globe Theatre, with professional talent.

And there's Balmorhea State Park with one of the world's largest swimming pools, Fantasyland in Frann with Alley Oop and dinosaur tracks beside U. S. 67 between McCamey and Fort Stockton.

Details are available in a library of 200 brochures, available from the west Texas Chamber of Commerce, Box 1561, Abilene, Texas 79604.

REDDY'S VACATION TIPS

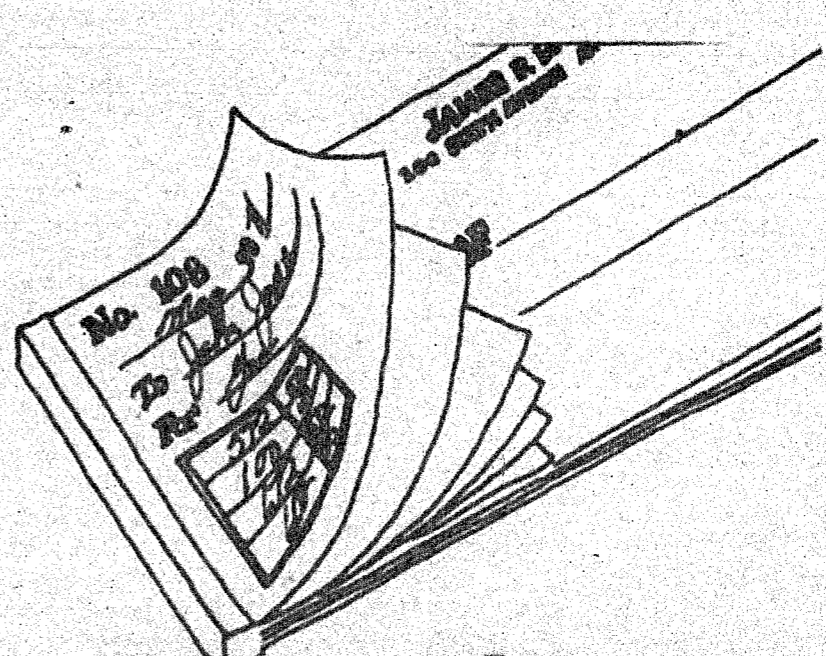
- REFRIGERATOR OR FREEZER:** Change thermostat control to slightly warmer (or "Vacation") setting according to the manufacturer's recommendations.
- DISHWASHER:** Make sure it's empty. Shut the door, but do not latch.
- DISPOSER:** Run and flush with cold water.
- ELECTRIC RANGE:** Make sure all switches are in the "Off" position.
- WASHERS:** Turn off water supply at faucets.
- WATER HEATER (ELECTRIC):** Turn off at circuit breaker panel. When you return, run a small amount of water from a hot water faucet to make sure there is water in the tank before you run the circuit on.
- TRASH COMPACTOR:** Remove any accumulated trash.
- TELEVISION SETS:** Unplug from electric outlet and disconnect the antenna lead-in cable.
- CLOCK RADIOS, ETC.:** Check these and all other items with automatic "On-Off" controls. Disconnect the ones that won't be needed.
- LIGHTING:** Be sure that all lights are off except those needed for security, such as: 1) yard light and/or other exterior lighting with automatic controls -- on at dusk, off at dawn; 2) portable lamp in living area with automatic control; 3) hall or bathroom light.
- AIR CONDITIONING:** Normally, air conditioning should be turned off completely while on summer vacation. However, if there is anything in your home that might suffer heat damage, the thermostat setting could be raised 5 to 10 degrees above normal operation and the unit left on. For comfort, you might have a friend or neighbor turn on the unit the day of your return.

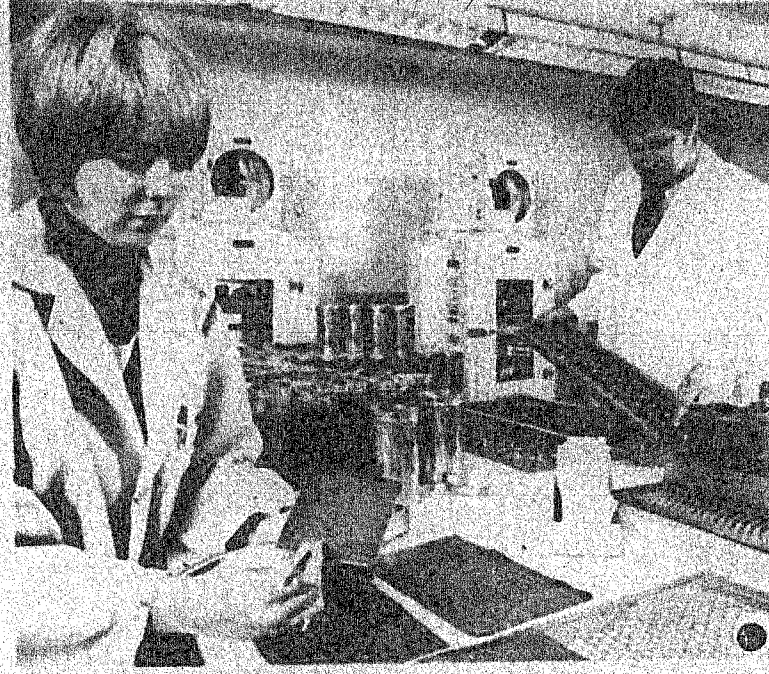

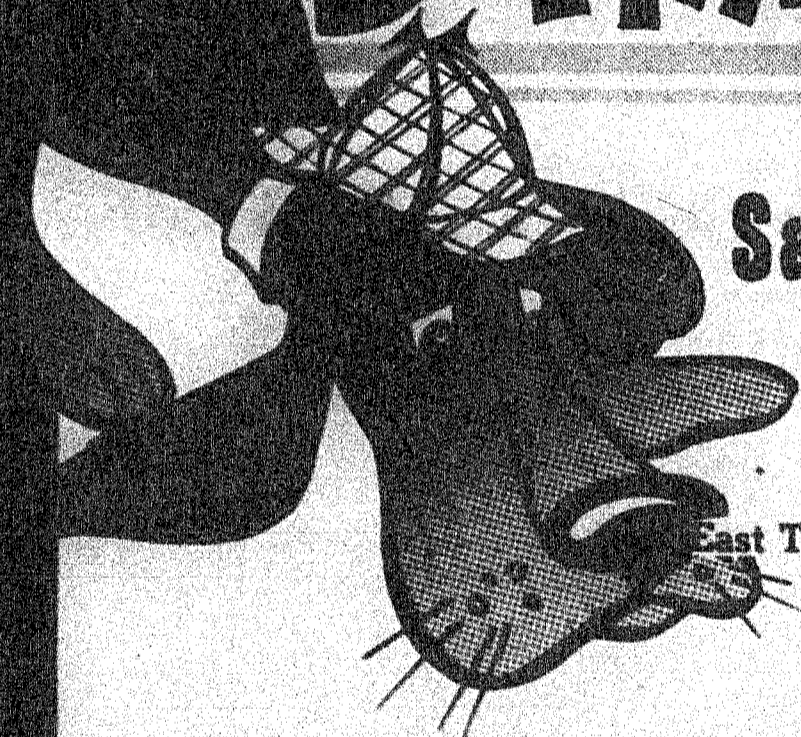

Curfew

Curfew laws, designed to keep youngsters off the streets at night, have been around for almost 100 years. But only recently have the courts been taking a close look at their validity. Does a city have the legal authority to put limits on anybody's freedom of movement?



The basic idea has generally been approved. One youth, arrested under a curfew law, challenged it as a form of discrimination against younger people. But the court pointed out that minors are lawfully singled out with regard to everything from marrying to driving, from attending school to buying liquor.

Upholding the law, the court said:

"Children are under recognized disabilities in many respects. Because of their lack of mature judgment, they are subject to continuing supervision until they become of age."

Nevertheless, a curfew law may be struck down if it is too broad. Another case involved a curfew that banned all minors from the streets after 10 p.m., with almost no leeway for exceptional circumstances.

In a court test, the judge noted that this law could punish youngsters coming home from evening classes, from work at the library, from school games or dances, even from church activities.

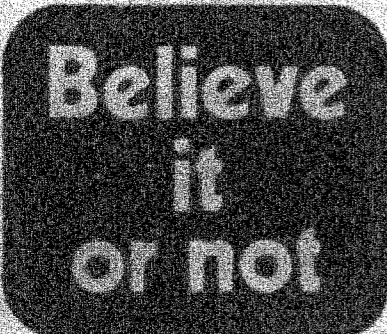
Finding the law invalid, the court said it violated "the right of every person to enjoy and engage in lawful and innocent activity."

In one recent case, police booked the father of a 16-year-old boy for "allowing" him to be out after the curfew hour.

The court conceded that it was constitutional to punish the parent in such a situation. However, it seems the father had been told—and had honestly believed—that his son was spending the night at the home of a friend. Dismissing the charge against the father, the court said he could not have "allowed" conduct of which he was not even aware.

THE TIME FOR THANKS AND A TIME FOR THOUGHT

Please Excuse the delay in the publication of my thank you note to the voters of Coleman County, but I felt that I should wait until the final outcome of the Primaries so it would not seem that I was trying to influence anyone in this election, I consider my political obligations very important to the community and my family, I feel that the statements that will follow my thanks are necessary to fulfill my obligations to the voters who gave me their votes of confidence.

I sincerely extend my heartfelt thanks to the voters who supported me in my quest for the office of County Judge of Coleman County in the past May 4th Primary, and I can assure them that my primary interest in the office was for the People of Coleman County, and I sincerely hope that they voted for me because they felt I was a thoroughly qualified candidate for the office and not because they felt I was a "good ole boy".

The following statements are made with candor. I felt that they should have been made during my campaign for the Judge's office, but I am sure that the voters would have said "well, ole John is just throwing mud to gain some votes", although when one is telling the truth he is not slinging mud, so now that I do not have anything to gain by telling the truth; maybe some of the voters will re-evaluate the importance of our electoral system and the importance of each Candidate being thoroughly qualified for the office that he or she seeks; because really, the elected offices of a County are of vital importance to every tax-payer in the County in one way or another.

Considering the facts of Politics in Coleman County, did you know that there were at least five willful violations of our state election laws and code in this past May 4th and June 1st primaries and that the election judges of the precincts where these violations occurred could be and should be fined a minimum of \$500.00 for each of the violations occurring in their voting precincts? The polls are supposed to be a place where a voter can cast a Secret ballot, therefore, the elections should be conducted in a manner prescribed by state laws, and not just a place where people get together and discuss who they want to vote for; these decisions should be made before a person goes to the polls, no-one should be able to look over your shoulder and see how you voted, when one can do this it is not a Secret Ballot. Did you know that there are specific qualifications set forth in the Texas Election Laws for the office of County Judge?

For those of you who are interested, I can furnish you with the specific violations, the chapter, article number and the page on which it can be found in the book of Texas Election Laws.

I think that the qualifications of any candidate should be paramount and should befit the office that he seeks; if this were the case, then a voter could be assured of a qualified person no matter for whom he voted, even if it were a "good ole boy". I think the only exception to this rule should be when none of the Candidates for a particular office are qualified for it, in this case, one should vote for the Candidate Whom he or she honestly believes will make the most honest effort to fulfill the duties of the office that he or she seeks.

I don't believe that the tax payer should have to foot the bill for someone else to do the work of an elected official unless the work load is such that the elected official is unable to do it all. If the official is a drunk or has so many outside interests that he is unable to carry out the duties of his office, then he should be removed from that office, and above all he should not be Re-elected because you feel sorry for him or because someone else has done a good job of taking care of his office through his last term in office. "A candidate should consider what he can do for the office he seeks, not what the office can do for him".

I believe that any and all elective office holders should base their business and or political decisions on what will best benefit the majority of their constituents and not simply because it is or will be Politically expedient. Incompetence in any job is a direct result of not being qualified for it in the first place and I know of no job nor office for which being a "good ole boy" would qualify a person. You most certainly would not hire a person to take care of your children nor run your business or your farm or ranch simply because he was a "Good ole Boy" you probably would require him to have the qualifications for the particular job. A person would not go to a

Commissioners' court to hire a Plumber nor should he go to a Plumbers' meeting to hire a County Commissioner; unless of course he had other specific qualifications that would qualify him or her for the office. We know that County Commissioners work with County Judges, but I'm sure that this fact does not supply the necessary experience to qualify a commissioner for the job of a County Judge. There is a world of difference in the scope and responsibilities of the job of a County Judge. There is a world of difference in the scope and responsibilities of the two offices; the judge has to pinch hit for a commissioner at times, plus a multitude of other responsibilities that have no connection what-so-ever with the commissioners court, and above all, the County Judge should be a man who will not quit in the middle of a term, "no matter how rough the going gets," any elected official who has walked away from his responsibilities and the confidence that the voters have placed in him by resigning from the office before the finish of the elected term should certainly not be given the chance to do so again. An office holder should always think of the people who put him in that office and consider what he can do for the office and not what the office can do for him. He should not be a person who would quit school or college because he couldn't hack it; then ask the County tax payers to pay him to learn what he should have learned in school. An incomplete course in law or anything else is "kinda" like a road that ends abruptly, it just won't take you anyplace. He should not be a person who has never been a success at anything that he undertook or who has depended on the good name and monetary backing of someone else, and if he is a school teacher with no other qualifications, then he should stick to school teaching. A county should elect Commissioners who will respect other elective offices (they were elected also) and men who have the inestinal fortitude to tell another elected official that they intend to cancel his insurance or cut his salary (for no reason) and not elect those who will do these things then lie about it and deny it was done. Furthermore, Commissioners, who will tell the men who work for them who not to vote for certainly should not be elected. The American people have the most powerful weapon in the world (The Vote) it can change the whole United States if it is used wisely, and the whole country can change (without the will of the people) if it is not used wisely. There are almost 6,000 registered voters in Coleman County (there should be many more) and just barely over 3,000 voted in the past Democratic primary elections. This is a pitifully few votes when one considers the importance of County Government as a whole. Our County Government (all the elective offices) is like a machine; it cannot function properly with even one useless gear or a gear that does not know what it is supposed to do, so when we vote, lets vote for a gear that knows what and how to do it's job, and not just for a "good ole boy".

I have heard people say that if a candidate did not think enough of his or her vote to ask for it, then he wouldn't get it, yet these same people will vote for a candidate in state or national elections who they have never seen and certainly the candidate could not ask them for their vote personally; in these cases they (the voter) ascertain from what he or she says on T.V. or what he puts in the paper whether or not he is qualified for the office that he seeks, because they know not if he is a "good ole boy". I have heard people comment that a candidate did not dress the way they thought they should, but did they ever stop to think that a terrible pile of junk can be covered up with a nice paint job or a pretty outside wall; so you see, it is not the outer part of a man or woman by which you should judge them, but the inner part. I even heard people make the statement that they would vote for a man simply because his opponent was a woman and they felt that a woman should not hold a public office. I feel that any person who would not vote for a woman simply because she was a woman even though she was a well qualified candidate certainly does not care about the well being of the office involved.

It was not and is not my intention to offend any particular one in the foregoing statements, but if the shoe should happen to fit anyone, I'm sure they will know how to wear it. In case anyone should want to know anything about the statements I have made, please feel free to call me at any time, give your name and I will gladly make clear to you any part of my statements.

Again, I want to thank all of those who voted for me and expressed their confidence in me by doing so.

Prayer groups and criticism!

This is the first of a two part series explaining Gerald Green and his group of Christ worshipers in a house of prayer. Wednesday, June 26's Gazette will feature a story on how Brownwood and Comanche are accepting Green and his unusual manner of worship.

A group of people have come together from varying denominations to form a new church, which pastor Gerald Green would call if he had to name the group, the body of Christ worshipping in the house of prayer.

They have been a "church" for about the last 8-10 months, holding their meetings in the Adams Street Community Center in Brownwood.

In the beginning, Green and his wife were workers in the First

Baptist Church of Comanche where his pastor urged the congregation to "get on fire for the Lord." Well, Green took that seriously and along with a few other persons started a prayer group about 2 years ago which met at his house.

Soon only a handful of people grew to 80. They witnessed, helped young people with drugs and other problems, but their unorthodox tactics brought on adverse criticism. Still the group continued to grow. Membership is now over 100. With the growing numbers Green needed a larger meeting place.

His sister, Mrs. Claude Cox, lived in Brownwood and she recommended the Community Center. That's how he found his way from Comanche to here.

According to the Bible, the scriptures say that anyone who tries to live a Godly life will be persecuted, Green said. He explained that the group of believers have unfair

rumors going around about them. "If those who would criticize us would just come and visit our meetings, they would see that we just teach the Bible and lift up Jesus," he stressed.

"90 percent of the people, and I used to be one of them," said Green's sister "Can't understand why people want to get together and talk about the Lord." The membership of the church includes young single people, young and old married couples, middle-aged and aged people all from differing backgrounds who can unit with the love of Jesus, Green said.

Everyone is allowed his view of "doctrines" but Green shuns any argument about such things. "We believe in the ordinance of the Lord's Supper and water baptism, but if someone, for instance, wants to be sprinkled that it okay," he added. "Just don't lift me up," he continued, "because I am nothing. Jesus receives all the credit for what I do or what is accomplished

through this group." "Again let me say that if anyone who criticizes our church would just come and visit, they would see that we believe and teach the Bible from the first of Genesis to the last of Revelation," said Green.

Anyone can prove what they want to by just picking out a verse here and there, "and that is why I do a lot of reading, never just taking a verse out of context, letting the people digest

the whole of the message, and allowing them to weigh and consider it in their own mind," he explained.

Recently the church received confirmation that they may hold their services every Sunday afternoon in the Brownwood Coliseum at 1 p.m.

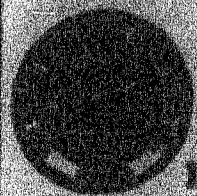
