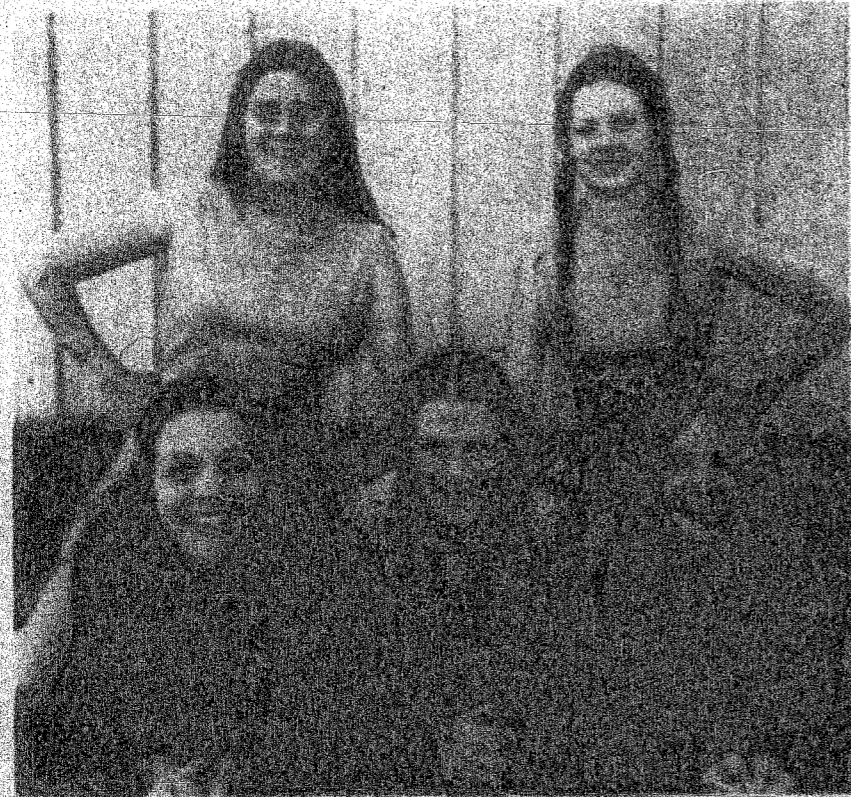
The season will continue through October 30 with shooting hours from 12 noon until sunset. Daily bag limit is 10 and possession limit is 20.
