## Santa Anna Public School Faculty Starts School Term Monday

Santa Anna school faculty members will start their year's work next Monday, August 12, when they report for a full faculty meeting at 9 a.m. at the elementary school library. Plans for the school year will be reviewed, and teachers will go to Brownwood during the afternoon for the TB tests that are required by law.

Tuesday, August 13, through Thursday, August 15, will be spent in Robert Lee where faculty members and aides will attend in-service training sessions. Interesting programs have been planned for the teachers from over a large central west Texas area.

Friday, August 16, will be a work day for the teachers in their classrooms. Another faculty meeting will be called at 3:30 p.m. High School students will be

registering for classes on Friday of next week. Juniors and seniors will register from 8 to 12 a.m. and freshmen and sophomores will register from 1 to 3:30 p.m. High school faculty members will assist with the registration at the vocational agriculture building.

Students will report for classes on Monday, August 19, with elementary students registering on the first day of school.

## August Rainfall Above June, July

Official rainfall in Santa Anna totaled 1.60 inches for the first six days of August. On Thursday, August 1, .20 was recorded at the official gauge east of town, and on Monday, August 5, 1.40 was recorded.

The August rainfall is well above the entire total for July which had .30, and June with a total of .15.

Unofficial measurements in other parts of town had up to 2.5 inches for the week.

# Why would anyone steal a tombstone?

Why would anyone want to pick up a grave marker that weighs hundreds of pounds, carry it nearly 80 miles away, and dump it in a creek? Who knows?

But someone removed the 102-year-old tombstone of Pleasant Byrd from its location about 4 miles northeast of the present Byrds home in Byrds, Texas and deposited in Abilene's Elm Creek where Abilene police officers found it about one year ago in the dry creek bed.

Pleasant was cutting logs for a cabin back in 1872 when he was attacked and killed by Indians. He received a wound in the side from an arrow, and died from a combination of internal bleeding and pneumonia at the age of 26.

His uncle, Jack Byrd, built and erected a monument and none ever considered that it might not still be there until Jack Byrd's daughter, Mrs. Walter (Lela) Prucell, 83, of Lake Brownwood, saw a report on Abilene

television recently telling of the find.

Her son, Charles Orbin Purcell who is a Taylor County employee and lives in Buffalo Gap, was in Brownwood visiting his mother and she related to him what she had seen on TV. He then consented to her request that he go and claim the marker, and return it to its original site.

Popular opinion has it that the tombstone was taken by vandals but Walter Purcell, Lela's husband, has a different idea.

"Pleasant's was the only grave around those parts at that time and a lot of people stopped and crossed over the fence to look at the marker, trampling up the pasture in the process," he said.

"The man who owned the field apparently didn't like that too much and so he more than likely just hauled it off, and he probably never expected the creek to go dry."

brothers, came from the East during the Civil War and founded Byrds, Texas near the Lake in north-east Brown County.

Lela Purcell's father Jack died in 1926 at the age of 68.

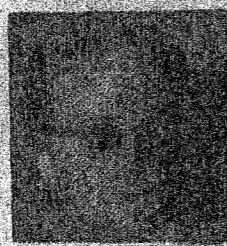

## 28 Years Ago

### ... in The News

The Good Lord has blessed us with some wonderful rains since last Monday. It started last Monday and we have received 4.5 inches of rain and have caught some water in the tanks also. It is still misting this Monday night.

Rev. Travis Gipson, the Baptist Minister, preached here Sunday morning and the Methodist minister will preach here next Sunday at 9:30 and again at 7 p.m.

Mr. and Mrs. Billy Roy Laughlin and Lee spent last week on the Gulf deep sea fishing. They took the boat at Port Aransas and Lee caught the big one -- a shark eight feet long and weighing 196 pounds. It took all the crew and the Captain to land it on the boat.

They tried to pull it in with gig hooks but it would snap them in two. The Captain shot it and when they got it on deck the Captain jumped on its head and stuck it with a knife.

They radioed from the ship they were coming in, and a crowd was at the port. This was on TV and radio news and also a newspaperman took his picture. Lee got the prize for the largest fish which was \$69. Lee is the grandson of Mrs. Edna Laughlin.

double ring ceremony in the natural garden setting. Lonnie D. McCracken gave his sister in marriage.

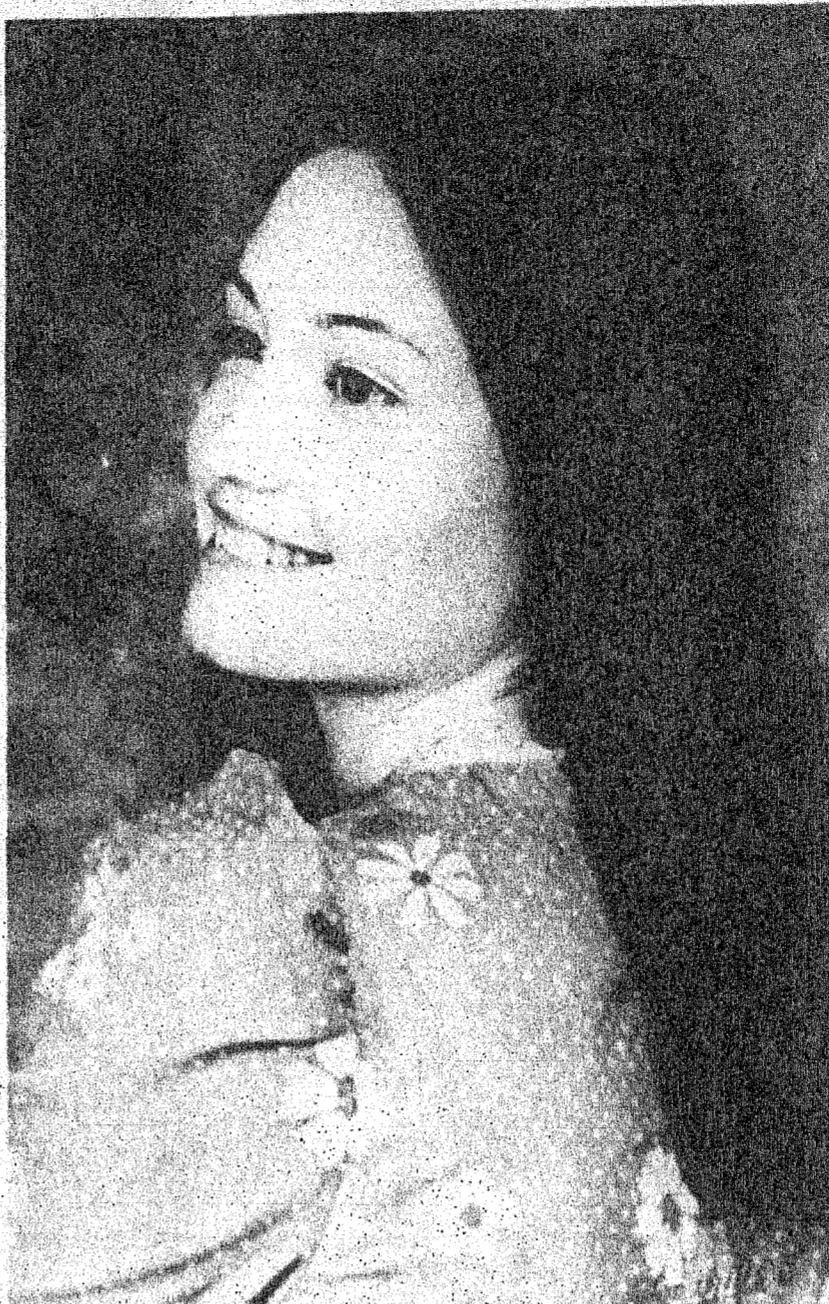

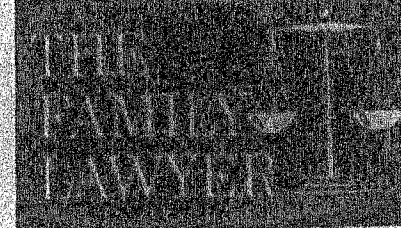
DO turn your air conditioner on in the morning when the weather is very hot. Units operate less efficiently when started in the heat of the day.

### "Fresh" Clerk

Lois, shopping for sandals, paid no attention to the fact that she and the shoe clerk were alone in the store. But suddenly he seized her in a lustful embrace. Outraged, she struggled out of his grasp and escaped through the front door.

Her complaint afterward to the owner of the store got the man fired. Then Lois followed up with a damage suit against the owner himself.

"After all," she pointed out in court, "he was this fellow's employer. Surely an employer is responsible for the way his employees treat the public."

But the court turned down her claim. Reason: the salesman had acted not in the line of duty but for his own private gratification.

Generally speaking, you cannot hold management liable for an employee's misconduct if it was not related to his job. This rule has been applied not only to amorous advances but also to beatings, gunplay, defamation of character—even practical jokes.

Thus, a motorist who was sprayed with gasoline by a mischievous gas station attendant was denied compensation from the station proprietor. The court said: "The attendant was employed to service automobiles and not to hose customers."

On the other hand, you may indeed have a claim if the employee, while doing his duty, simply overdid it. For example:

A bartender ejected a noisy patron with so much vigor that he broke the man's arm. Could the victim collect damages for his injury from the company that owned the tavern?

In this situation, the court ruled that he could hold the company legally liable. The difference was that ousting noisy customers was part of the bartender's regular duties. An employer must bear the responsibility, said the court, for the employee who does his job not wisely but too well.

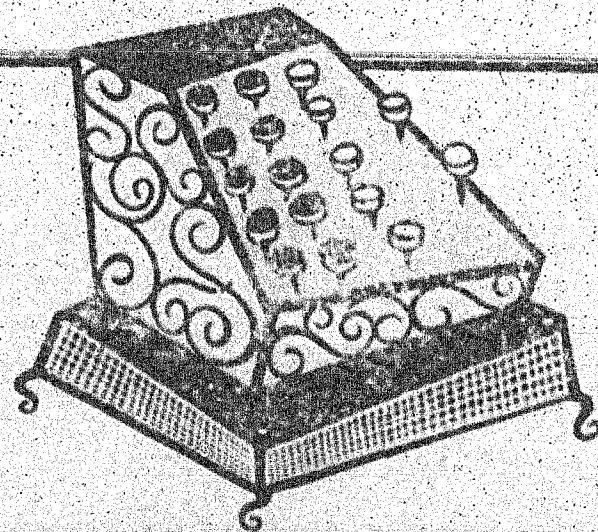

**STATE CAPITAL**  
*Highlights*  
**AND Sidelights**  
 by Lyndell Williams

AUSTIN, Tex. — When the Constitutional Convention collapsed in total failure, state legislators immediately began proposing new approaches to the long-thwarted revision effort.

A wide range of alternatives are available, and lawmakers are committed to try all of them. These suggestions already have been offered:

— Creation of a brand new Constitutional Convention, with plain citizens rather than legislators occupying most of the delegate seats.

— Submission to voters of the basic revision document drafted by the 1974 convention, without the controver-

sial separate submission proposals (like right-to-work) which deadlocked this year's session.

— An article-by-article revision, based largely on work of the convention.

— Submission of the document originally prepared by the 37-member Constitutional Revision Commission as a guide to the convention.

— If all else fails, consideration of a cleaned-up and slimmed-down version of the 1876 constitution stripped of outmoded provisions.

While the 1974 convention ran out the clock without accomplishing anything, hope remains lawmakers will have learned some lessons and that more than a year of research and expenditure of \$3.2 million will not be a total loss.

**NO SPECIAL SESSION** — Gov. Dolph Briscoe rejected requests for a special legisla-

tive session on state employee pay raises and supplementary school financial aid.

He said a special session at the tag end of an exhausting Constitutional Convention would not be practical, and the most pressing problems can be met by emergency action in the next regular legislative session.

Specifically, Briscoe committed himself to these emergency goals in 1975, which will cost approximately \$216 million in general revenue:

— A 10 per cent cost of living pay raise for all state employees effective Feb. 1, 1975. (Legislative Budget Board has recommended \$285 million in pay and fringe benefit increases for state employees during the 1976-77 fiscal period).

— An increase of \$40 per student in average daily attendance for maintenance and operation of public schools, with distribution arranged to benefit "poor" districts most.

— A 15 per cent increase in benefits of teachers who retired before March 31, 1969, and a 10 per cent increase for those who retired between that time and May 31, 1971.

— A 10 per cent increase in retirement benefits for state employees who retire before August 31, 1974.

**AUTO HEARING SET** — The annual auto insurance rate hearing has been scheduled for October 1.

The State Board of Insurance will conduct the hearing for new rates to become effective December 1.

While the hearing is usually held in the summer, it was delayed this year to get maximum information on impact of the gasoline shortage and slower speed limits which may bring rate reductions.

**AG OPINIONS** — Cities cannot purchase land for industrial site development by promissory notes to be paid out of revenues from the project. Atty. Gen. John Hill held.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded:

• District clerks are liable for mysterious disappearance of child support money paid into registry of the court prior to deposit.

• When judgement on which an execution sale is

based is void, a purchaser obtains no title to property.

• Requirements that counties, hospital districts and certain cities must adopt a uniform system of accounting and make quarterly reports of expenditures made for welfare programs are valid.

• A contract to buy fuel for a county from the brother of a county commissioner is not necessarily void when the commissioner has no interest in fruits of the contract, direct or indirect.



## Society aims to educate

The recently organized Brown County Humane Society hopes to start a program which will educate every citizen

on the proper care of animals.

The organization is under the direction of Mrs. Willis Wells, president; and Mrs. Morris Gillett, operations chairman.

Approximately 60 people attended the group's first organizational meeting held Sunday, July 27, and the society has acquired nearly \$400 in donations in its less than two-week existence.

"We are not trying to set out to save all of the animals in Brown County," Mrs. Gillett explained, "because that would be very unrealistic." "We just want to educate the people on vaccinating, licensing and keeping their animals properly."

Hopefully this new service will afford persons a place to bring animals instead of just dumping them somewhere, and this in turn will keep the city cleaner.

Memberships in the new organization are now being sought by the group, and prices range from \$7.50 per couple, \$5.00 for a single, and \$1.00 for students (college students welcome, too). The students will clean and groom the animals before they are put up for adoption.

And the old image of the mean old dog-catcher doesn't hold true here as the Brown County Humane Society has "the kindest-hearted dog-catcher that you will ever meet in the person of Doyle Miller" according to Mrs. Gillett.

The group is getting an excellent reception from the people in the county, not only in the monetary aspect, but also 100 percent cooperation from the veterinarians. The Brownwood CB Club has also lent their support in locating and reporting stray animals and cruelty to animal cases.

To help increase interest as well as working capital the society is planning to have a pet fair, with all pets and children in the county invited, and a dog auction at a local park in the near future. Animals are available immediately, too, and are kept at the city pound.

The pound is now located at the site of the Brownwood Waste Water Treatment Plant, but plans include a new and much larger building when finances permit.

More plans as well as the election of permanent officers and a board of directors is to be on the agenda at the group's next meeting which is scheduled for Sunday, August 11 in the Area General Telephone office located on Fourth St. in Brownwood.

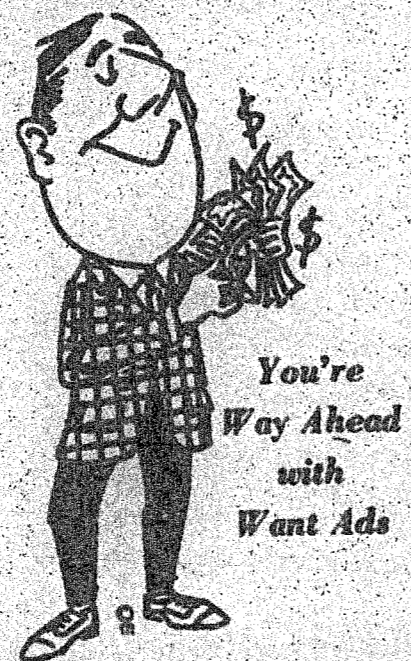

# To impeach the president

It is a big decision. Several considerations must be made. Congressman Omar Burleson looks back into history at how other impeachments or threats of impeachment were resolved...

All sorts of questions loom up in the making of a decision on the impeachment of the President.

How do you completely separate emotion from fact—absolute objectivity from any political considerations. Even after this is done, as a matter of judgment, does one base his decision on the proposition that

the evidence must be convincing beyond a reasonable doubt as is the case in criminal cases or on a "preponderance of the evidence" applied in civil cases.

It is interesting to look at history and observe how other impeachments or threats of impeachment were resolved. It may help to form a perspective in order to see current events in their relative position.

George Washington was threatened with impeachment by those who charged him with "a daring infringement of our constitutional rights." This charge arose when the Jay Treaty was concluded with Great Britain in 1794. A bitter struggle went on in Congress when some demanded that Washington hand over the

correspondence and exchanges that led up to the signing of the Treaty. George Washington resolutely refused to do so. Even though there was neither precedent nor legal guidance, one of his reasons was that the same demands would be made against his successors in the Presidency and that he would not set such an example.

Washington was deeply hurt by assaults on his capacity to govern, and on his character and honor. Several decades has to pass before he was "first in the hearts of his countrymen."

Andrew Jackson was swept into the Presidency as a military commander in a hero's role in the

War of 1812. Even before he was inaugurated, he was deeply hurt by continuous onslaughts on his character and aspersions cast upon his wife. It is interesting to note that Jackson had been one of those demanding that George Washington be impeached. The charges against Jackson grew out of chartering the Bank of the United States. Senator Calhoun in a speech in the Senate said Jackson's bank depredations were "adding robbery to murder."

Louis Brownlow in "the President and the Presidency" wrote, "every President, when he has been in office, has been denounced at some time or other as a desperate tyrannical dictator who uses the power of government to achieve his personal ambitions. The only President who was not so denounced was William Henry Harrison who lived only one month after inauguration."

Abraham Lincoln came threateningly close to impeachment in the winter of 1862-63. Secret meetings were held in Washington on plans for launching an impeachment. Historians say that radical

Republicans with reactionaries of both parties wanted a President more obedient to their wishes.

Carl Sandburg comments "for weeks denunciation flowed, mixed with clamor and criticism." The press caught up the debate and echoed the sentiments. Impeachment failed, but an assassin's bullet succeeded not long thereafter.

Lincoln's successor, Andrew Johnson, came within one vote of being impeached in 1868. His efforts to put into effect the more generous policies of Lincoln with respect to the South brought him into sharp conflict with the Congress. It all came to a head when President Johnson dismissed Secretary of War, Edwin Stanton, who not only opposed the President but secretly acted as an informant for his bitterest opponents. In this case, John Adams during a heated discussion remarked "if the President has not enough authority to change his own Secretary, he is no longer fit for office."

The trial of Andrew Johnson lasted about 12 weeks, and was presided over by a Chief Justice who was accused of wanting to be President himself. In line of

succession was the President of the Senate who has been described by some writers as "vulgar and vibrative."

Incidentally, 1,000 gallery tickets were printed and were valid for one day. These tickets were furiously competed for, to hear the trial. Galleries were crowded with relatives of Members of Congress, scores of reporters and distinguished visitors from other countries. There is a good chance that this scene may be repeated in the near future.

This process will tax the good judgment of those who must render a decision and strain the conscience to maintain objectivity.

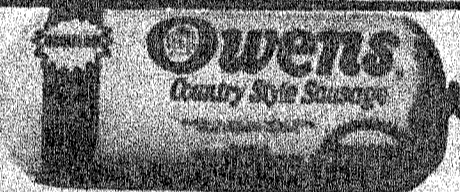
